

## Pork Chops at Homecoming Time

**T**HOUGH not considered a rare delicacy by the connoisseur of fine foods, the University of Houston Cougars would readily settle for pork chops—well done—at the Homecoming feast table.


A year ago, against Tennessee and impossible odds, the Cougars broke the school's Homecoming Day jinx by taking the Volunteers' label seriously and submitting them to the same brutal treatment their forefathers received when they bit off a chunk at the Alamo some 117 years previously. Considering the heroism and generosity of those first volunteers, the 33-19 beating a year ago was something more than rude, but politeness and history must stand aside when an institution seeks a Homecoming football victory.

The odds against a Cougar win on the eve of the Homecoming game in 1953 were adequately described as impossible, but compared with the outlook for 1954, Tennessee was a cinch.

Thinking back just a couple months ago to the days when the experts were adjusting the pre-season rankings, the Alumni Association may have thought it was doing Coach Clyde Lee and the Cougars a favor by selecting Arkansas as the game to be dedicated to the old grads. But on November 27, it would appear to the outsider that the exes had rearranged the date for April Fool's Day.

Prior to September 18, Arkansas found itself relegated to its usual position in the Southwest as the likely place for other football teams to knock the mud out of their own cleats. Six weeks later, there were stacks of mud all over the Southwest, but the campus at Fayetteville was spotless.

The man behind the change in the Ozarks is one Bowden Wyatt, who was first introduced in these parts two years ago as head coach of the University of Wyoming. On that occasion, his team was an underdog to the great 1952 University of Houston team

which will forever be remembered as the Kimmel Corps.

As expected, the Cougars utilized their massive defensive unit to its fullest extent and whipped Wyoming 20-0.

Two football seasons can result in

some humorous developments, and if anyone can muster a grin, we refer to the circumstances surrounding this festive occasion.

In 1952, the University of Houston won its first game over a Southwest Conference team, beating, of all teams, Arkansas, 17-7. As stated, that same team inflicted a 20-0 wound in the side of Wyatt's Wyoming Cowboys. Though Wyatt was not at Arkansas in '52, he now seeks revenge for both of our successes.

In addition, the Cougars did not improve relationships with Wyatt in 1953 on Homecoming Day when Tennessee was the unsuspecting victim. You see, Wyatt has a certain fondness for the Vols, since General Robert Neyland had an All-American end in 1938 named Bowden Wyatt.

But all is not gloom and darkness within the ranks of Jack Patterson, Jimmy Dickey, Billy McIlroy, Wayne Shoemaker, Lavell Isbell and the rest. They face some great names in Arkansas uniform, names that have become great over a period of ten weeks. But they surrender nothing to Bud Brooks, Henry Moore, Preston Carpenter, and George Walker.

If the appetite of the Hog is to be satisfied, the Bowden Wyatt single wing must be capable of digesting the culinary works of one Clyde V. Lee. His record against the formation since the University of Houston became recognized as a major college is: 1950—Houston 36, William and Mary 18; 1952—Houston 20, Wyoming 0; and 1953—Houston 33, Tennessee 19.

Thus a glimmer of light sneaks through on the prospects for pork chops on Saturday.







## U. H. Sideline Coaches Form Houston's Largest Football Club

"THE University of Houston Sideline Coaches Association," is the weighty title of the Cougar football aficionados who meet each Thursday on campus to relive the previous Saturday's game.

Growing from a mere handful of FB fans back in '49, the all male group now lists nearly 200 members. In return for their annual dues, the club issues an official red-and-white coaching cap to be worn at each meeting. Thus properly attired, the "coaches" are privileged to view the film of the game, listen to the scouting reports on forthcoming games and get a little "inside" information about our boys.

Current "Head Coach" Tom Menefee has ramrodded the '54 version of the UHSCA which offers such attractions as weekly door prizes and cash awards, plus a "Purple Poop" sheet which brings weekly prizes of clothing and Parker 51 pens to the lucky guessers. Seasonal winners of the pick-'em contest are rewarded with a complete suit of clothing, a gold watch and a set of auto tires.

Local merchants participating in the awards include long-time member Fred Mosk, Levit Bros. Jewelers, and the McCarter Tire Co.

The UHSCA constitution includes provision for annual awards to the outstanding boys on the team for their work on the gridiron. The specific aims of the club are to promote Cougar athletics, and to permit the members a real insight to the problems and needs of the teams and coaching staff.

Guest speakers this year have included UH President

Bruce, sports publicists from various schools, a SWC referee, a football equipment expert, and former coach Homer Norton of the '39 Texas A&M national champs. Of course Head Coach Lee speaks at each meeting. The program has been further spiced with acts from the upcoming Varsity Varieties production and a Barbershop Quartette.

One of the more important accomplishments so far this season was the assembling of 140 members for the meeting following the Cougar's loss to Baylor in their opening game. At this meeting a letter of reassurance was sent to the team, with the signatures of all those attending.

The letter was posted in the locker room and Clyde Lee reported it was received eagerly by the boys.

Meetings this season have averaged about 110 in attendance, with the number jumping to 230 on the only "Ladies' Night" held this year by the stag group.

The UHSCA is a strong answer to suggestions that the UH lacks the spirit that typifies older schools. Already the paid membership exceeds any other Touchdown, Quarterback or similar club in the city of Houston. Tom Menefee and the officers are already looking forward to the time when Oberholtzer Hall's Green Room will be too small to accommodate the numbers of Cougar boosters who wish to attend.

And, when that time arrives, the crowd will be handled well, just as the University itself handles its problems and keeps growing.

# Seven-Foot-Cougar Leads '54 Cage Quintet

**C**OMplete with the first seven-foot basketballer ever to play for a Texas college, the Cougar cage team opens its schedule Dec. 2 at College Station, Houston, seeking its 100th win, and the Texas Aggies, will officially open the new 8,500 seat G. Rollie White Coliseum.

The Cougars' 84-inch giant is Don Boldebeck, a native of Lincoln, Nebraska, who came to the University a year ago from tiny Nebraska Wesleyan College. "Bolde" has waited out the necessary year to establish eligibility and is classified as a junior with two years of play remaining.

Boldebeck, who played no high school basketball, began his cage career in college. He currently holds nearly every scoring record at Wesleyan. He also led that school to the NAIA tournament in both 1952 and 1953, scoring 1,759 points in two seasons. That's just ten points less than the entire Houston team made last season.

Boldebeck came to Houston to see what he could do in stiffer competition. There's no doubt that he will get the acid test. Houston, playing in the notoriously rough Missouri Valley Conference, will have league dates with such national powers as Oklahoma A&M, St. Louis, and Wichita. In non-conference games, Houston faces Bradley, Texas, Missouri, Oklahoma City, and Murray State of Kentucky.

In addition, the Cougars will participate in the nation's oldest and most respected holiday season tournament, the All-College Tournament at Oklahoma City.

Coach Alden Pasche will be counting on Boldebeck to give Houston fine rebounding strength, left and right-handed shooting, and deadly accurate tip-in power.


Aside from Boldebeck, Pasche will have seven lettermen returning, having lost three others. They are Guards Jackie Bell (5-11), Lupe Lopez (5-11), Herb Hoskins (6-2), and Jose Palafox (6-1). The three returning forwards are Jack Foster (6-2), Jim Hatton (6-4), and Jerry Pettiette (6-3).

Graduation losses included Gary Shivers (6-9) and fiery Guard Jack Mosher. Shivers and Mosher represented 808 of the Cougars' total 1,769 points in the 1953-54 campaign. Shivers led the team in scoring with 405 points, just two ahead of Mosher.

Only four candidates reported from the freshman team, but they show consider-

able promise. Bob Powers, a 6-5 All-Stater from El Reno, Oklahoma, and a member of the 1953 high school All-American squad, moves up to add depth at forward.

The same is true of Jimmy Ash, a 6-3 All-State player out of Beaumont's South

Park High School. Ash led the freshman team in scoring last year, hitting an average of 15.7 points in 15 games.

Andy McElveen, a 6-foot All-State boy from Lake Charles, La., and the highest scorer in that state two years ago, will lend aid at the guard position. The fourth frosh graduate is 6-4 Granville Hambricht. Playing both center and forward, Hambricht was an All-State player with Alvin (Texas) High School's 1953 District and Regional Champions.

As was the case a year ago, when the Cougars played six of the top 20 teams in the nation, Houston will again offer the roughest schedule of any team in the Southwest, adding support to the claims that the University of Houston is the unchallenged "Basketball Capital of the Southwest."


