Highlight Satellite Transmissions

The Southwest Conference will provide two satellite transmissions of highlights of each of the SWC basketball teams this season. The preseason feed will run on Wednesday, November 1, 1995. A March 12 feed will feature men's and women's teams involved in post-season play.

Bulletin Board System

Updated Southwest Conference statistics and releases for football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball and baseball can be accessed by calling the league's bulletin board computer system. Media members wishing to obtain SWC stats to their computer via modem can do so through this service.

Men's and women's basketball statistics will be updated to this service on a daily basis.

Media can access this service by dialing 214/634-8857. The modem setup is: eight bits, one stop, 2400 baud and no parity. The user name is "media" and the password is "SWC". Users may setup their own user name and password by following the instructions upon system connection.

Fax-On-Demand

SWC releases, statistics and information on all sports can be accessed by simply dialing one telephone number from the handset of any fax machine.

The league office and all nine SWC sports information offices are subscribers to Fax-On-Demand. Fax-On-Demand is an automated 24-hour a day, seven day a week service that instantly sends the latest SWC sports information directly to your fax machine.

The league office will no longer mail releases and information as extensively as in the past in lieu of the Fax-On-Demand system. SWC basketball releases will be updated to the system each Monday, while statistics will be updated on Mondays and Thursdays. Daily statistical updates can be accessed on the computer Bulletin Board system.

From Love Field

SWC Office: Approx. 2.5 miles. Depart airport and turn right onto Mockingbird Lane; follow Mockingbird toward I-35E; take a left onto Brookriver, just prior to I-35E. The office is immediately to the left.

Reunion Arena: Approx. 7.5 miles. Depart airport and turn right onto Mockingbird Lane; follow Mockingbird to I-35E South; turn left on I-35E South to Commerce Street East/Reunion Blvd.; exit to the right and follow looping access drive; make an immediate right onto Reunion Blvd.; then proceed to Reunion Arena.


From Dallas-Ft Worth Airport

SWC Office: Approx. 10 miles. Depart airport through the South exit; move into the left lane and bear to the left onto Hwy. 183

East (to Dallas); travel Hwy. 183 East through Irving and into Dallas. Hwy. 183 will merge with Hwy. 114 East at Texas Stadium and, eventually, I-35E South; take Mockingbird exit; take a left on Mockingbird Lane and go under two underpasses to Brookriver. Take a right on Brookriver and the SWC office is on the left.

Reunion Arena: Approx. 15 miles.

Depart airport through the South exit; move into the left lane and bear to the left onto Hwy. 183 East (to Dallas); travel Hwy. 183 East through Irving and into Dallas. Hwy 183 will merge with Hwy. 114 East at Texas Stadium and, eventually, I-35E South; take Commerce Street East/Reunion Blvd exit; exit to the right and follow looping access drive; make an immediate right onto Reunion Blvd.; then proceed to Reunion Arena.

Southwest Conference competition officially ends with the 1996 SWC postseason baseball tournament, but the success, tradition and excellence of the circuit live on in such events as the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, solid NCAA finishes and the futures of millions of student-athletes and undergraduates who have been associated with 12 universities which composed the conference from 1914-96.

A sound Olympic tradition, 339 first team All-America choices in the sports of football, basketball and baseball alone, over 200 GTE-CoSIDA Academic All-America beneficiaries in 17 sports since 1952, five Heisman Trophy winners, five Outland Trophy winners, three Vince Lombardi Trophy recipients, one Jim Thorpe Award victor, and nine decades of excellence are just some of the many-faceted fruits reaped by the still-successful Southwest Conference.

Little did a small group know on May 6, 1914, that it would leave a legacy that spanned many generations when the first organizational meeting of the proposed Southwest Conference was held at the Oriental Hotel in Dallas.

Since that fateful day, the conference survived two world wars, a pair of armed conflicts in Asia, rugged financial turmoil during the Great Depression years, and the conflicts and controversies that make college athletics the unique and entertaining aspect of society over three-quarters of a decade later.

Entering the 1995-96 competitive seasons of nine men's championships (the 81st consecutive year of SWC competition in two sports or more) and nine women's title attaining sports (in the SWC's 12th year if women's intercollegiate competition, starting in Sept., 1982), the SWC can boast of 63 NCAA or national wire service football championships in a total of 15 different men's and women's sports.

In its infancy the SWC had an even wider geographical area than the current, eight university league. Present for the May 6 meeting were representatives from Baylor University, Southwestern University, Oklahoma A&M College (now Oklahoma State), Texas A&M College, Louisiana State University, the University of Arkansas and the University of Texas.

At a meeting of the fledgling group on Dec. 8, 1914, representatives from the University of Oklahoma and Rice Institute (now Rice University) at the Rice Hotel in Houston also were in attendance. Arkansas, Baylor, Southwestern, Oklahoma, Oklahoma A&M, Texas A&M, and Texas joined the two new colleges as charter members of what was called the Southwest Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. The nation's fifth-oldest Division I conference was off and literally running.

By March, 1915, the SWC already had its first football All-America choice in Oklahoma back Forest Geyer (1915) and had crowned its first basketball team champion after the 1914-15 campaign in Texas (5-0), which edged Rice (5-1) by a half game for honors.

In 1918 Rice returned to gridiron action while Southern Methodist University permanently replaced Southwestern, based in Georgetown, Texas, in the football standings. Oklahoma, which captured the initial football championship during the 1915 season, withdrew in 1920 and was replaced in that one season by Phillips University of Enid, Oklahoma.

Oklahoma A&M lasted until 1925 before leaving the league, but Texas Christian University of Fort Worth entered the scene during the 1923 season for the first of its 73 SWC campaigns.

And when the conference began, the annual membership fee was a nominal \$10. By 1932 annual dues was fixed at \$100, and it had remained one of the nation's best athletics bargains for almost a century.

On Nov. 24, 1921, the first ex-officio "broadcast" of a sports event of any kind took place when Texas A&M cadets W.A. "Doc" Tolson and Harry M. Saunders joined electrical maintenance staffer B. Lewis Wilson to produce a wireless account of the 0-0 tie between the Aggies and Texas Longhorns in football. That was followed by the first actual radio broadcast



of an SWC game on Nov. 25, 1926, when General Ike Ashburn gave the play-by-play account of A&M's 28-0 victory over Texas at College Station.


Game officials and their orderly assignment became a part of the SWC Office in the 1920's along with cooperation with the Southwest Officials Association, a longtime partner of the SWC, while legislation governing scouting of opponents went into effect during the 1927-28 academic year.

The first of several hundred SWC competitors in the Olympic games (42 SWC athletes, two head coaches, six individual and team medal winners were represented in the Seoul Olympics of 1988 while 62 competitors and officials from SWC schools quali-

fied for the 1992 Olympics) was a meritorious sprinter on the United States' 1928 team — Rice's Claude Brace.

As the conference moved into the 1930s and 1940s growing and maturing programs in all areas — from track and field to baseball to tennis to swimming — were taking shape for the seven teams who survived the comings and goings and formed the crux of the SWC until Texas Tech entered in 1958. Houston later gained admission into the SWC for the 1971-73 academic year (competing for the first time in football in 1976), and the SWC enjoyed some of its most nationally-successful football seasons since SMU, TCU and Texas A&M captured American college grid titles from 1935-39.

The settling effect brought with it the need to have a full-time office, headed by an Executive Secretary (later re-titled Commis-

sioner). In 1938 Dr. P.W. St. Clair assumed a part-time position as the SWC's first Executive Secretary and served in that position until May, 1945. He was followed by James H. Stewart (1945-50), the conference's first full-time Executive Secretary), Howard Grubbs (1950-73), Cliff Speegle (1973-82), and fourth full-time Commissioner Fred Jacoby (1982-93) before Steve Hatchell (1993-95) and Kyle Kallander (1995-96).

The SWC maintained the oldest continuous contractual agreement (from 1942-95) with a major bowl game between the conference and the Cotton Bowl Athletic Association. This gridiron marriage produced numerous battles for national supremacy and an always-entertaining contest on New Year's Day since the initial classic in 1937.

From football legends such as Hall-of-Famers Darrell Royal of Texas, Jess Neely of Rice, and Madison 'Matty' Bell of four SWC schools, to Baseball Hall of Fame member Teddy Lyons of Baylor to Olympic champions such as Houston's Carl Lewis to Women's Basketball Players of the Year Kamie Etheridge of Texas and Sheryl Swoopes of Texas Tech, the Southwest Conference continues to produce exciting moments in intercollegiate athletics.



Dr. Ray M. Bowen is the 21st President of Texas A&M University, the nation's third largest university.


Prior to assuming the presidency of Texas A&M on June 1, 1994, Dr. Bowen served for a year as interim president of Oklahoma State University. He joined the administration at Oklahoma State in 1991 as provost and vice president for academic affairs.

He began his professional career in 1965 when he joined the mechanical engineering faculty at Louisiana State University. Two years later, he accepted an appointment in the Mechanical Engineering and Mathematical Sciences Department at Rice University, where he served for 16 years including five years as department chair. Dr. Bowen later served as dean of the College of Engineering at the University of Kentucky.

Dr. Bowen was a member of the National Science Foundation staff on two occasions. Prior to accepting the top academic position at Oklahoma State, he served for almost two years at NSF's Washington D.C. headquarters, most recently as deputy assistant director for engineering. He also served as director of the Division of Mechanical Engineering and Applied Mechanics from 1982-83.

Immediately after receiving his Ph.D., he began three years of active military duty and served on the faculty of the Air Force Institute of Technology in Dayton, Ohio. He subsequently served for a year as a post-doctoral fellow at Johns Hopkins University. He has twice served abroad as a visiting professor, in 1974 in New Zealand and 1979 in Germany.

He holds two degrees from Texas A&M. He earned a B.S. in 1958 and a Ph.D. in 1961, both in mechanical engineering. He also received a master's degree from the California Institute of Technology in 1959.



Kyle Kallander

Commissioner

Kyle Kallander was named sixth Commissioner of the Southwest Conference on June 7, 1995. He came to the SWC in Aug., 1992, as Assistant Commissioner after serving as director of advertising and promotions for the University of Washington from 1989-92.

Kallander's duties at the SWC have included football affairs, including game administration and television, compliance programs, championship administration and special events such as the annual GTE/SWC Football Kickoff Luncheon, and the SWC Spring Meetings.


The native of Mercer Island, Washington, and holder of both an undergraduate and master's degree from the University of Washington, coordinated advertising and promotion for 23 men's and women's sports for the Huskies for three years.

He has worked for two decades in a variety of athletic endeavors which have had regional and national impacts. Kallander began his career as a public relations assistant for the NFL's Seattle Seahawks and later became director of marketing for SportsInk. The latter organization handled various college game programs and the souvenir edition for the 1984 U.S. Women's Olympic Marathon Trials.

From 1983-85 he also served as sports coordinator for Uniprint Printing Co. in Seattle and was responsible for all phases of publication for

five college and professional organization's game programs, media guides and special supplements.

In 1985 the Washington resident began a seven-year association with the University of Washington, first as an assistant to the athletic director. His tenure has included such diverse duties as handling the UW football team travel, director of compliance, selling Husky promotional packages to regional and national sponsors and serving as a liaison to university flagship radio and television stations for broadcast sponsorships and promotions. Kyle and his wife, Lisa, have two sons - Stefan and Tristan.



Bill Foster

Associate Commissioner

One of the most respected names in college basketball circles, Bill Foster is in his third year at the Southwest Conference office as an associate Commissioner.

Foster's responsibilities include a wide variety of day-to-day basketball administrative duties as well as the planning and undertaking of the Dr Pepper SWC Classic. He arranged for a first-ever SWC all-stars' basketball tour to Mexico in 1995. Foster also serves as tournament director for the first and second rounds of the NCAA Tournament, hosted by the SWC at Reunion Arena in 1996.

One of the nation's most outstanding on-the-floor-coaches and basketball organizers, Foster became the first coach in NCAA history to guide four different Division I schools to 20-win seasons. He was named the National Basketball Coach of the Year in 1978 after leading the Duke Blue Devils to a 27-7 record, the NCAA Final Four and the national title game against Kentucky. That team's efforts are chronicled in noted author John Feinstein's book *Forever's Team*.

Foster served as president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches and has served as a member of the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame Board of Trustees for more than 15 years and currently serves as president of the Hall of Fame. He is also a member of the Elizabethtown College, Pennsylvania and Rutgers University Sports Halls of Fame. Foster, who has served as a college basketball analyst for CBS and ESPN, has coached 12 players who have continued their careers in the National Basketball Association and 40 others who have competed professionally in Europe and Asia.

In the summer of 1992, Foster was head coach of a Big Ten squad that traveled to Europe and compiled a 6-1 record against teams from England, Belgium and the Netherlands. He also coached teams in the 1986 U.S. Olympic Festival in Houston and the 1991 Japan/Aloha Classic. A noted clinician, Foster had made speaking appearances in many foreign countries including Greece, Belgium, The Netherlands, China, Japan, Costa Rica, Iceland, Switzerland, and the Philippines.

Foster compiled a career record of 467-409 in 33 seasons as head coach at Bloomsburg (Pa.) State, Rutgers, Utah, Duke, South Carolina, and Northwestern. Prior to coming to the SWC, he served as Interim Director of Athletics and Recreation at Northwestern after a six-year stint as head coach of the Wildcats.

A native of Norwood, Pa., Foster served from 1951-52 in the U.S. Air Force, graduated from Elizabethtown College in 1954 and earned a master's degree from Temple University in 1957. He coached six years at Chichester and Abington high schools before taking the head position at Bloomsburg State College.

Foster and his wife, Shirley have four daughters - Vicky, Debra, Julie and Mary.



Coley Chambless

*Assistant Commissioner
Championships and Compliance*

Coley Chambless is in her fourth year with the Southwest Conference office and her first as Assistant Commissioner. She was Legislative Assistant in the SWC in 1993-95.

Chambless' duties revolve around coordinating SWC student-athlete eligibility, championships, coaches certification and GTE Academic Hono Teams. She also assists with the league's drug-testing program and coordinates the Commissioner's Honor Roll each semester, while aiding with the administration of the SWC volleyball, men's and women's swimming, and men's and women's golf championships.

Chambless served the league office as an administrative intern during 1992-93 and was involved with a number of issues related to the SWC post-season basketball tournament, including assisting with ticket operations and coordinating VIP hotel arrangements.

A 1992 graduate of SMU, Chambless, formerly Coley Jordan, was an All-SWC women's golfer for the nationally ranked Lady Mustangs and served as the team's co-captain. She was also appointed by late SMU president A. Kenneth Pyle to the SMU Athletic Council.



Bo Carter

*Assistant Commissioner
Media Relations*

Bo Carter is in his 10th year with the Southwest Conference media relations office. Carter is responsible for the overall operation of the media relations office, with primary responsibilities being football and baseball.

Carter joined the SWC office in August, 1986, after 12 years at Mississippi State University. He served as sports information director for eight years and assistant sports information director for four years. Carter was named SID for the Bulldogs' athletic program in 1978, succeeding the legendary Bob Hartley.

Carter is a former president of the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association (NCBWA) and has been chairman of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Membership Services Committee. He is also a member of the United States Basketball Writers of America (USBWA) and Football Writers Association of America (FWAA). Carter has served on the CoSIDA Publications Committee and Gambling Awareness Committee as well as the NCAA Communications Committee.

The Sheffield, Ala., native worked with some of college basketball's best teams while in the SWC and at Mississippi State while making eight total trips to the College World Series in Omaha, Neb. In 1993, he won the Wilbur Snyppe Award for service to the NCBWA and is a member of the NCAA Communications Committee. Before joining Mississippi State, Carter was in sports with the Nashville Tennessean as a summer intern and then a full-time staff writer for two years.



Charley Green

Assistant Director of Media Relations

Charley Green, who has been an assistant on three sports information staffs of leading NCAA Division I institutions, has been SWC Assistant Director of Media Relations since May 1995.

Green is a native of Philadelphia, Pa., and entered the field as a student assistant at the University of Texas from 1988-91. After graduating from Texas, he later served as a staff assistant at the University of Florida under SID John Humenik in 1992.

The veteran of numerous SWC championship events and co-media host of the Dr Pepper SWC Women's Basketball Classic from 1993-95 started in the SMU sports information department as an intern in 1992 and was elevated to full-time status in 1993. He was chief of media operations for the 1994 NCAA Men's Golf Championships in McKinney.

Green serves as the key media relations contact for the 1996 NCAA Midwest Men's Basketball First Round Tournament games at Reunion Arena in March and will be media relations coordinator for the men's portion of the '96 SWC Basketball Classic. He will also supervise media relations for SWC men's and women's outdoor track and field.



Chris Ward

Assistant Director of Media Relations

Chris Ward, former media services director for the CISL finalist Dallas Sidekicks, has been an Assistant Director of SWC Media Relations since Oct., 1994.

Ward, a 1992 graduate of Texas Christian University with a degree in advertising/public relations, also served as a media services intern under the illustrious Kevin Sullivan of the Dallas Mavericks' NBA squad during his Aug., 1993-Oct., 1994 tenure at Reunion Arena.







Excitement is the new buzzword in Central Texas when people talk about Baylor Basketball. Excitement of a new era, a new coach and a new attitude towards basketball in Waco, Texas.

Baylor made a bold step in the summer of 1994 when the board of regents voted to move away from the Southwest Conference and into the spotlight of premier college athletics as a member of the new Big 12 Conference.

The university then solidified its commitment to basketball and its student-athletes with the appointment of Harry Miller as the school's head basketball coach on January 25, 1995.

Miller, 43, made his mark on the Baylor program in his first season as head coach as the Bears set 10 team SWC and school records and saw three individuals break numerous school and conference marks as well.

"I won't look back. I won't look sideways. We are going to go straight forward," said Miller.

Miller came to Baylor as an assistant to former coach Darrel Johnson, having an impressive list of credentials after a long and distinguished high school coaching career in Texas.

He was named assistant coach at Baylor in the summer of 1994 and made the transition to the college game quicker than expected. He was elevated to interim head coach in November of 1994 and then given a five-year contract in January of 1995.

Miller began his coaching career in 1974 at Edna Junior High School. He coached for 14 years at Seguin High School before taking over the reigns at Temple High School from 1991-94. While at Temple, two of Miller's teams were nationally ranked. He is the only person to have coached in both the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches (TABC) and Texas High School Coaches Association all-star games.

Coach Miller, who compiled a 366-166 record as a high school coach, has served as president of the TABC, the largest basketball organization in the world. In 1989, the Texas Commissioner of Education appointed Miller to the UIL Executive Council, marking the first and only time that a coach had served in that capacity.

Miller played basketball for two seasons at Texas Lutheran College after transferring from Howard Junior College in 1972. He was an honorable mention All-American at TLC during his senior season. He received his Bachelor's degree from Texas Lutheran in 1974 and went on to earn a Master's from Southwest Texas State in 1984.

Miller has joined his son, Roddrick, at Baylor. Roddrick and former Temple High teammate Brian Skinner were both freshmen for the Bears in 1994-95.

Miller and his wife, Linda, have one daughter, Kevea, a student at the University of Texas.

Those are the words that helped Alvin Brooks endure his first season as the head basketball coach at the University of Houston.

As an assistant coach at Houston for seven years, Brooks witnessed the Cougars post a 142-73 record and earn three NCAA tournament berths, three NIT appearances and win one Southwest Conference regular-season title and one SWC Post-Season Classic championship. Despite this success, however, he knew that Houston was going to have to change its style of play if the Cougars were to develop into a consistent national top-25 program.

That meant a transition from a deliberate offense and matchup zone defense.

Having grown up 15 minutes from the UH campus, Brooks witnessed legendary coach Guy Lewis build a rich tradition with a full-court pressing defense and a disciplined, up-tempo offense.

As a point guard at Wheatley High School, Brooks also learned a similar style of play under highly-successful head coach Jackie Carr.

Brooks began his first season determined to change the Cougars' style of play. What resulted was beyond anything he could have imagined.

Houston's 1993-94 season included a 13-game losing streak and an 8-19 overall record. In addition, Brooks and his coaching staff posted post-midnight office hours to review tapes of each loss.


Last year, the Cougars managed just nine wins but did beat six of their seven Southwest Conference foes, including an 80-77 win over TCU in the first round of the Dr Pepper SWC Classic in March.

While Brooks might have been tempted to revert back to the old style of play, he was grateful for the advice that Lewis and Carr offered. "Stick with what you believe in," they told him.

Brooks has certainly taken steps to get the Cougar program headed into the right direction. He has signed two highly regarded recruiting classes. His staff meets daily with players to closely monitor academic progress. Brooks has also made the players more involved in the Houston community by visiting children in elementary schools and area hospitals.

Prior to coming to Houston, Brooks spent five seasons as an assistant coach at Lamar. He also was a point guard for the Cardinals and was an all-SLC performer. He still holds school records for assists in a game, season and career.

Following his collegiate career, he was drafted by the San Antonio Spurs of the NBA.

Willis Wilson

(Rice University '82)

Willis Wilson, a former student, athlete and assistant coach at Rice University, returned in 1992 as the school's 22nd head men's basketball coach. It was a move universally applauded, not only for the hire of one of America's bright young coaches, but as a continuation of the recent upswing of Rice basketball.

Wilson's first Rice team went 18-10, including regular-season sweeps over Texas, Houston and Texas Tech. The Owls finished the Southwest Conference race in second-place, but their late-season 90-67 win over champion SMU was the most-lopsided decision in the SWC that season. In Wilson's second season, the Owls posted a 15-14 record and advanced to the second round of the 1994 Dr Pepper SWC Classic.

He continued his success in 1994-95, guiding the Owls to a 15-13 record and advancing to the semifinals of the Dr Pepper SWC Classic. Rice had its fifth consecutive winning season, the longest streak in the conference.

A five-year assistant coach at Rice under Tommy Suits and Scott Thompson, Wilson spent one year away from the University as an assistant coach under Mike Montgomery at Stanford University. As a member of Thompson's staff during the 1988-91 seasons, Wilson helped the Owls improve their SWC standing each year. During Wilson's final year with Thompson (1991), the Owls had their first winning record in 20 years and an NIT appearance which marked the first post-season action for the school in 21 years.

Wilson also assisted in recruiting the players that notched a 21-11 record in 1992, Rice's first 20-win season since 1954. In 1992, Wilson assisted Stanford to an 18-11 mark and an NCAA tournament berth against Alabama.

The 35-year-old Wilson is now in his 13th year at Rice and fourth separate affiliation with the University. After matriculating to the campus in August, 1978, Wilson was a four-year letterman for the Owls under Mike Schuler (1978-81), and Tommy Suits (1982). He co-captained the owls to a 15-15 mark in 1982 and was a teammate of current NBA star and Rice Athletic Hall of Fame member Ricky Pierce, now with the Seattle SuperSonics.

A 1982 graduate of Rice with a B.A. degree in political science, Wilson was a Will Rice College fellow and member of the college court during his undergraduate days. He also participated in the Rice Volunteers for Youth program.

Wilson's first collegiate coaching experience came at Rice as an assistant to Suits during the 1985-86 season. In 1986, he left Rice to become the head coach at Houston's Strake Jesuit Preparatory School before returning to Rice with Thompson one year later. Wilson also was an assistant basketball and track coach at Strake Jesuit in 1982-84.

A native of Indianapolis, Ind., Wilson won all-metro Washington and all-county honors for Montgomery Blair High School in Silver Spring, Md. As a junior, he led Blair to the 1977 Maryland state title. Following his senior season, he was the most valuable player in Montgomery County, and captained the McDonald's Coaches Scholarship all-star game in the Capital Center.

Mike Dement, 41, was named the 14th men's basketball coach in SMU history on May 5, 1995. Dement was a head coach at North Carolina-Greensboro from 1991-95 and Cornell University from 1986-91, compiling a nine-year overall record of 122-123.

"This is a major job in a major conference," said Dement. "SMU is a good professional opportunity for any coach. There's a lot of excitement about SMU and its move to the Western Athletic Conference in 1996-97. There is a newness about this position and this program, which is exciting."

"When I started talking to people I trusted," said SMU athletic director Jim Copeland, "I heard a lot of names. One that kept coming up was Mike Dement. He's honest, and he wins games. As I learned more about Mike during the search process, I became more convinced that he was the right person to lead SMU men's basketball to national prominence."

Dement took over the North Carolina-Greensboro program in 1991-92, its first full year in Division I. Just three seasons later, the team finished with a 23-6 record (the best in the history of the program) and a Big South regular season championship. Three times during the 1994-95 season, North Carolina-Greensboro received mention in both the Associated Press and CNN/USA Today Top 25 polls.

Prior to taking over the North Carolina-Greensboro program, Dement was the head coach at Cornell from 1986-91. He led Cornell to the NCAA Tournament in 1988 after the Big Red won their first Ivy League title in 34 years.

Dement served as an assistant coach at three schools before becoming head coach at Cornell in 1986. He had assistant coaching tenures at East Carolina (1985-86), Cornell (1983-85), and Duke (1982-83). Dement's first college coaching experience was a volunteer assistant position under Mike Krzyzewski at Duke.

In five years as a head coach in the high school ranks, Dement posted an overall record of 109-26 at two schools in his native North Carolina. He began his coaching career at Louisburg (N.C.) High School in 1976-77.

As a player at Louisburg College from 1972-74, Dement helped lead the team to a second-place finish in Region X. Dement was a three-time all-conference selection and four-year letterwinner at Louisburg High School. He played on the school's 1971 state championship team.

Dement earned an associate of arts degree from Louisburg College in 1974 and a bachelor of science degree in health and physical education from East Carolina in 1976.

Born April 10, 1954, in Louisburg, N.C., Dement and his wife, Linda, have a son, Michael (12), and a daughter, Emily (four).

Tom Penders

(Connecticut '67)

With six 20-win seasons and NCAA tournament appearances in the last seven years, Tom Penders has taken basketball to a level previously unseen at the University of Texas.

The impact of Penders is easy to see in the win column, it is how his teams have won that has drawn attention. On the way to averaging 22.1 wins per season, Runnin' Horn teams under Tom Penders have averaged an eye-popping 90.5 points per game. It is that wide-open style of play that has caught the attention of fans across the nation.

The 50-year-old Penders enters the 1995-96 season with a 155-71 (.686) record in seven years at Texas. In 24 years as a head coach, his record stands at 425-280 (.603).

He is currently the second-winningest coach in Texas history. Only Jack Gray (1937-42, 1946-51), with 194 wins in 12 seasons, has won more.

When Penders became the 22nd coach in University of Texas history on April 6, 1988, he inherited a team that had won 16 games the year before and a 16,231-seat arena that averaged 4,028 fans per game. In the four-year span prior to Penders' arrival, the Longhorns were 64-55 and hadn't won over 20 games in a season since 1979.

Immediately, Penders put his stamp on the Texas program. He began calling his team the "Runnin' Horns" - a true oxymoron to UT fans who had watched the Longhorns plod up and down the floor in the years preceding Penders' arrival. He spoke to every alumni and booster group in the state of Texas, talking of an up-tempo, fast-paced style of play. When the ball went up for the 1989 season opener, Texas basketball took off.

His 1989 squad came out of nowhere to finish second in the Southwest Conference and earn a bid to the NCAA Tournament. That season, the Runnin' Horns set 22 school and SWC records and more than double their attendance.

In 1990, Texas shocked the basketball world by advancing to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament and was just three points away from the Final Four. The 1991 season saw Penders' squad finish the season to a second-place SWC finish and No. 23 Associated Press ranking, and in 1992 the Runnin' Horns again advanced to the NCAAs.


After a 1993 season in which key injuries and suspensions robbed Texas a chance at the NCAA Tournament, the last two seasons saw the Runnin' Horns bounce back with a vengeance, winning or sharing both the regular-season and SWC Tournament titles. Both those squads also advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

A 1967 graduate of Connecticut, Penders played in both the NCAA Tournament in basketball and the College World Series in baseball and was captain of both Husky teams.


The popular Penders and his wife Susie have two children - Tommy, a guard who lettered for the Horns the last two years, and Karli.

Despite the myriad of problems facing the Texas A&M basketball program when Tony Barone became head coach in 1991, Barone was not about to change his blueprint for developing successful basketball teams.

In six years at Creighton, Barone's method proved its worth as he took a downtrodden program and turned it into a national contender. He was determined to do the same at A&M.

In 1993-94, in just the third year of his program, Barone's plan began to payoff as the Aggies finished tied for second in the SWC and received an NIT bid, the Aggies' first postseason tournament in seven years. Playing with a full allotment of scholarship players for the first time at A&M, his team finished 19-11 and he was the consensus selection as the SWC's coach of the year.

A 1968 graduate of Duke, Barone has always emphasized the importance of academics in college athletics and as a result, all but one of the 20 players he brought into his program at Creighton have earned their degrees and the other one is still in school. In his first year at A&M, the basketball team posted its highest-ever aggregate grade point average.

Barone's past success on the basketball court has gained him a national reputation, leading such notables as former Marquette coach and NBC college basketball analyst Al McGuire to comment, "If I was to start a basketball program tomorrow, Tony Barone would be my coach."

Barone, a former Chicago Cubs batboy and Wrigley Field concessions vendor, was a two-time all-state guard at St. George HS in Evanston, Ill., and achieved his dream when Duke coach Vic Bubas awarded him a scholarship.

He took his win-to-survive philosophy to Duke and as a sophomore helped the Blue Devils to a third place finish at the 1966 NCAA Tournament. Barone earned three letters, became an academic All-America and was elected team captain as a senior.

Barone arrived at Creighton in 1985 too late to recruit for his first season, but the Bluejays managed to finish 12-16 and tied for fourth in the MVC.

In 1988-89 Barone's Bluejays surged to a 20-11 record, their first MVC title since 1978 and their first-ever conference tournament crown, which propelled the team to its first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1981. As a result, Barone was named District XII coach of the year by the National Association of Basketball Coaches as well as MVC coach of the year.

In 1989-90, the Bluejays posted their second straight 20-win season, finishing with a 21-12 ledger, placing second in the league and receiving their first NIT berth since 1984. In Barone's final season in Omaha, Creighton won the most games in its long history, completing a 24-8 slate and posting a first-round NCAA Tournament victory. In 10 years as a college head coach, Barone has built a record of 151-148 (.505).

Barone and his wife, Kathy, live in College Station with their two sons, Tony, Jr. (23) Brian (17). Their daughter, Amy (25), and her husband, Kevin Kentfield, reside in Omaha. Tony, Jr. played three years as a guard at A&M.

Billy Tubbs

(Lamar '58)

Considered "the man who builds college basketball programs," Billy Tubbs wasted little time in redirecting the Texas Christian basketball program following his hiring as the Horned Frogs' coach April 9, 1994. In just his first season at TCU, Tubbs led a team that had won just 13 games the previous two seasons through a record-breaking campaign – one which saw the Horned Frogs contend for the SWC title, lead the NCAA in scoring offense, break numerous school records, feature the nation's leading scorer and rebounder as well as the SWC's Player- and Newcomer-of-the-Year, all en route to posting a 16-11 final ledger. Needless to say, Tubbs' efforts were rewarded when he was named consensus SWC Coach-of-the-Year.

That's just another example of what Tubbs has accomplished throughout his 21-year head coaching career, having fashioned an absolutely amazing won-lost record during his stints at Southwestern (Texas), Lamar, Oklahoma and TCU. He ranks among the NCAA's all-time winningest active coaches with an overall record of 455-211, a .683 winning percentage. He also sports an impressive postseason record of 26-15.

He has twice been named national coach-of-the-year by Basketball Weekly (1983 and 1985). Tubbs was also a finalist for Associated Press Coach-of-the-Year honors in 1985 and 1989.

Tubbs has demonstrated the ability to take a dormant basketball program, located in the heart of football country, and mold it into a national power as well as a feature entertainment attraction.

Despite recruiting classes lacking high school All-Americans, nor having a legitimate post player, and by using a somewhat visionary approach, Tubbs can coach – and outcoach – the best of them. He pioneered the up-tempo, transitional game affectionately referred to as "Billyball".

Following stints as an assistant coach at Lamar and North Texas, as well as two years as head coach at Southwestern, Tubbs hit the big time when he took over as head coach at Lamar in 1976-77. In four seasons under Tubbs, the Cardinals jumped out of the shadows and into the spotlight, earning two NCAA Tournament berths, advancing to the "Sweet 16" in 1980.


From Lamar, Tubbs moved north of the Red River to undertake the rebuilding process at Oklahoma. Over the next 14 seasons, he would guide the Sooners to 13 consecutive winning campaigns, posting a 333-133 record. He led Oklahoma to four Big Eight titles and nine NCAA appearances. His 1987-88 team was the second-highest scoring squad in NCAA history (102.9 ppg) and reached the NCAA Championship game.

Born in St. Louis, Mo., and raised in Tulsa, Okla., Tubbs earned a Bachelor of Science degree in physical education from Lamar in 1958, then earned a Master of Education degree from Stephen F. Austin in 1959.



James Dickey

(Central Arkansas '76)

James Dickey became Texas Tech's 11th head basketball coach in April of 1991 and has turned the Red Raiders back into one of the more competitive teams in the Southwest Conference.

The 41-year old Dickey led the Red Raiders to an 18-12 overall record in 1992-93, but those are not the impressive numbers. The clean sweep and 3-0 record that enabled the Techsters to win the 1993 SWC Post-Season Classic (as the #5 seed in the tourney) is what has Tech fans aglow over their personable head coach and his program.

Dickey, who again led Tech to the postseason with an NIT berth and 20-10 record in 1994-95, has learned his trade from some of the best college basketball coaches in the country and his career as an assistant at some of the more prestigious roundball schools in the U.S. hasn't hurt any at all.

The coaching desires burned so deep within him that he began his career at the small college level as he served on the staff at Harding College in Searcy, Ark., for the 1976-77 season. During his stint with the Bison program he earned his Masters degree.

He moved to the high school ranks the following season as he accepted the head coaching duties at Harding Academy, just across town from his previous job. He served as the school's head coach for two seasons, compiling an impressive mark of 43-36 and leading his squad to the conference title in 1978. He was named the conference's "Coach of the Year" following that campaign.


After the '81 season, as an assistant at Central Arkansas, Dickey served on coach Eddie Sutton's staff at Arkansas for four years and helped lead UA to a record of 96-30 in that time. The Razorbacks put together four straight NCAA tournament appearances and won the 1982 Southwest Conference regular season and post-season titles.

When Sutton made the move to Kentucky in 1985 he packed Dickey's bags almost as fast as his own and the two struck out for the Southeastern Conference.

Dickey took a season off from the coaching ranks in 1989-90 and was involved in family business. He joined the Texas Tech staff in July of 1990 and spent the following season as an assistant coach. A coaching change following that campaign saw him named the interim head coach and then on April 10, 1991 he officially became Texas Tech's 11th head coach.

He took the 1991-92 club that was his first as a head coach and led them to that 15-14 overall mark, while finishing 6-8 and in fifth place in the Southwest Conference standings. The "experts" had picked the Raiders last in the league in pre-season polls after four straight losing seasons.

The merits of his successful debut in the head coaching ranks were duly recognized as he was named consensus Southwest Conference "Coach of the Year" and the District "Coach of the Year" by the NABC for his efforts.


1996 National Collegiate Division I Men's BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIP



SWC Co-Championship Years

In the event of ties for first place in final basketball standings, the Southwest Conference declares co-champions. Prior to the Post-Season Classic, inaugurated for the 1976 season, playoffs were held in co-championship seasons to name the SWC representative in the NCAA championship tournament.

A new set of rules was adopted in the event of ties for first, or any other place in the standings, as final rankings determined the bracketing of the Post-Season Classic.

The rules for bracketing tied teams in the Classic.

In the event that a tie occurs for the championship, the seed position will be determined by (1) record against each other, and (2) record against other conference opponents starting with the next higher team and working down.

Ties for all seeds below first shall be settled by (1) record against each other, and (2) record against other conference opponents starting with first-place team(s) and working down.

If the formula does not produce a break of a tie, a coin flip shall be used to determine the bracketing. Following are the results of past co-championship seasons:

1935 — A bid for a three-way championship playoff between Arkansas, Rice and SMU was not acted on by Arkansas. No playoff was held.

1942 — Rice represented SWC in NCAA tournament, Arkansas yielding because of injuries and service enlistments.

1943 — Rice accepted National Invitation Tournament bid, canceling best-of-3 playoffs with Texas for NCAA tournament.

1944 — Rice withdrew from playoff consideration due to military commitment and regulations, then Arkansas withdraw from NCAA tournament because of auto accident injuring several players.

1945 — Arkansas, Baylor and Rice entered four-team NCAA playoff with Arizona. First round — Arkansas 50, Rice 34; Arizona 55, Baylor 47. Second round — Arkansas 65, Arizona 44.

1950 — Baylor was selected for NCAA tournament over Arkansas and Arizona by selection committee composed of Matty Bell of SMU, Jack Gray of Texas and Emil Larsen of Border Conference. Arizona had accepted NIT bid, making a three-team playoff impossible to arrange, and Baylor had defeated Arkansas in both regular-season SWC meetings to win committee approval.

1951 — First round — A&M 50, TCU 44 (Texas drew a bye). Second round — (best-of-3) — A&M 45, Texas 43; Texas 35, A&M 34; A&M 33, Texas 32.

1954 — (best-of-3) — Rice 70, Texas 62; Rice 72, Texas 71.

1958 — Arkansas 61, SMU 55 (at Shreveport).

1962 — Texas Tech 71, SMU 67.

1965 — SMU 80, Texas 78 (at Waco).

1972 — Texas 83, SMU 82 (at Waco).

1978 — Texas and Arkansas tied, Texas drawing the first-place spot in the tournament by beating third-place Houston twice while Arkansas split with Houston.

1979 — Texas and Arkansas tied, Texas drawing the first-place spot in the tournament by beating third-place Texas A&M twice while Arkansas split with A&M.

1986 — A tri-championship occurred among TCU, Texas A&M and Texas. TCU drew the No. 1 spot in the tournament by virtue of beating fourth place SMU twice while Texas A&M split with the Mustangs. In head-to-head competition, TCU and Texas A&M split while Texas split with TCU but lost twice to A&M.

1992 — Texas and Houston tied, Texas drawing the top seed in the tournament by defeating Houston in both contests during the regular season.

1995 — Texas and Texas Tech tied, with Texas drawing the top seed. The teams split two regular season meetings, but Texas earned the top seed by virtue of beating third place TCU twice, while Texas Tech split a pair of meetings with TCU.

Basketball Governing Bodies



USA Basketball

As the name suggests, USA Basketball is the national governing body for men's and women's basketball in the United States. As the national governing body, USA Basketball is responsible for the selection and training of USA national teams that represent the United States in various international and national basketball competitions, including: the Olympics, World Championship, Pan American Games, World University Games, Junior World Championships and U.S. Olympic Festival.

During each year, USA Basketball fields teams that compete in various international competitions. In 1992 that included the USA "Dream Team" which captured the gold medal at the Barcelona Olympics and the world's attention.

In 1993, approximately 180 athletes proudly wore the red, white and blue USA uniforms in various basketball competitions held around the world during the summer.

USA Basketball is actually an association of associations. Current USA Basketball active members include the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU), Continental Basketball Association (CBA), National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC), National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), National Basketball Association (NBA), National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS), National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA), National Pro-Am City Leagues, National Wheelchair Basketball Association, United States Armed Forces (USAF) and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA).

USA Basketball was organized in 1974 and known as the Amateur Basketball Association of the United States of America (ABAUSA). The name change from ABAUSA to USA Basketball occurred October 12, 1989, shortly after the International Basketball Federation (FIBA) modified its rules to allow professional basketball players to participate in international competitions. USA Basketball then admitted the NBA as an active member and made the name change.

USA Basketball is governed by its Executive Committee and Board of Directors which are appointed and elected by active members. C.M. Newton, Director of Athletics at the University of Kentucky and a former very successful collegiate basketball head coach, serves as President of USA Basketball for the 1992-96 term. The Vice President is Russell Granik, Deputy Commissioner of the NBA, Vice President for Men is Thomas Jernstedt, Deputy Executive Director/Chief Operating Officer for the NCAA, and the Vice President for Women is Susan Blackwood, Associate Athletic Director at the University of Texas. 1976 USA Olympian Quinn Buckner and Carol Callan, Director of Athletics at Fairview High School (Colo.), serve as Treasurer and Secretary respectively. Serving as USA Basketball's Executive Director is Warren S. Brown, a former administrator for both the NCAA and the National Federation of State High School Associations.

In addition to the selection and training of men's and women's basketball teams that represent the USA in international and national competitions, USA Basketball is also involved in coaching clinics, the sanctioning of U.S. team tours of foreign countries and foreign tours of the U.S.



National Association of Basketball Coaches

Founded in 1927, the National Association of Basketball Coaches currently claims 4,500 members.

Consisting of university and college coaches, with associate membership afforded to athletic directors, conference commissioners, faculty members, officials, high school and junior college coaches, this organization is clearly the basketball fraternity.

Since its inception, the NABC has continually worked to further the best interests of the game of basketball as well as the players and coaches who participate in the sport. In doing so, the NABC has established the following goals and objectives to pursue its mission:

- To promote the ideals of integrity, sportmanship and teamwork among men's basketball coaches and the players whom they coach;
- To unify coaches on issues pertaining to basketball at all levels;
- To provide member services that address needs of the coach professionally, emotionally, physically and spiritually;
- To encourage basketball coaches to serve as community outreach agents who elevate moral, ethical and educational values;
- To enlighten the general public, media, institutional educators and athletic administrators to the fact that coaches are good for the sport and the young people whom they serve;
- To work with the legislative arm of the NCAA on issues that affect basketball and intercollegiate athletics, in particular identifying issues that not only benefit the student athlete but also the ability of the coaching staff to work effectively and beneficially within their institution.

The NABC holds its annual convention and exhibition each spring at the host city of the Final Four. During the Final Four week, the NABC also

sponsors two other major events. The annual East-West All-Star basketball game and beginning this year the NABC College All-Star Fan Jamboree.

The organization also bestows awards, sponsors research programs, competitions, and clinic seminars. It also supports the Hall of Fame.













SWC Classic History, I & II



SWC CLASSIC I — MARCH 6, 1976 (MOODY COLISEUM)

TEXAS TECH 74, TEXAS A&M 72

DALLAS — The Southwest Conference's first-ever Post-Season Classic was staged in SMU's Moody Coliseum, and Texas Tech's Red Raiders walked away with the first-ever Post-Season Classic championship.

Behind the play of the tournament's first Most Valuable Player — forward Rick Bullock — Texas Tech fought back from a 42-39 halftime deficit to defeat the No. 1 seed Aggies 74-72 and earn the SWC's automatic invitation to the NCAA Tournament. Bullock accounted for 28 points, 19 rebounds and four blocked shots as the Red Raiders shot 60.3 percent from the field.

The game marked the second straight in which Bullock took control. The previous night the senior from San Antonio scored a tournament-record 44 points in the Red Raiders victory over No. 4 seed Arkansas, 70-63. It was all Bullock as the Red Raiders had only one other player (Mike Russell) score in double figures. Texas A&M and Texas Tech finished the 1976 SWC race one-two in the final standings. It marked the second consecutive season the Aggies and Red Raiders placed first and second in the final SWC regular-season standings.

Senior Sonny Parker led three A&M players in double figures with his 20 points as both Parker and Bullock were voted to the All-Tournament team.

Under the first-time format the No. 1 seed Aggies received a bye to the finals while the No. 2 seed Red Raiders had to win four games to capture the championship. Tech beat Rice 101-84 in the first round, Houston 80-69 in the quarterfinals, and Arkansas 70-63 in the semifinals before defeating the Aggies.

SWC CLASSIC II — MARCH 5, 1977 (THE SUMMIT)

ARKANSAS 80, HOUSTON 74

HOUSTON — What fans were hoping for was a matchup of the Southwest Conference's top two teams — Arkansas and Houston — in the finals of the second annual SWC Post-Season Classic, and that's exactly what happened. Houston was the No. 2 seed and hometown favorite, but the spotlight was on Arkansas, ranked among the nation's Top 20 and a perfect 16-0 against the SWC in 1977.

And thanks to "The Triplets," the Razorbacks left Houston a perfect 17-0.

Arkansas' famed trio — Marvin Delph, Ron Brewer and Sidney Moncrief — combined for 67 points, 22 rebounds, seven assists and four steals as the Razorbacks kept their record unblemished against SWC competition in 1977. Arkansas became the first team since SMU in 1956 (12-0) to go through the regular season without a defeat, and the first team to do so since the conference expanded to a 16-game round-robin schedule.

Houston, which finished the season at 29-8 and, at 13-3, was the tournament's No. 2 seed, watched as the three took control in the second half. After holding a slim 38-37 halftime lead, it was all Arkansas and Ron Brewer in the second half. The junior finished the night with 29 points (13-of-19 from the field), four rebounds and Tournament Most Valuable Player honors. Moncrief chipped in 22 points and a game-high 13 rebounds while Delph connected on 7-of-10 from the floor for 16 points.

Charles Thompson led all Houston scorers with 23 points, followed by Otis Birdsong's 21 points. The Cougars held a slim 36-35 advantage in the rebounding department, but UH's 25 personal fouls proved to be the difference. Arkansas went to the line 29 times, converting 22. SWC CLASSIC III — MARCH 4, 1978 (THE SUMMIT)

HOUSTON 92, TEXAS 90

HOUSTON — Texas came to Houston as the No. 1 seed for the third annual Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic, but left without the two things Head Coach Abe Lemons wanted most — the Classic championship and an NCAA Tournament invitation.

Guy Lewis' Houston Cougars, playing before a sold-out house of 15,330, used six players in double figures to slip past Lemons' favored Longhorns 92-90 and earn the SWC's automatic invitation to the NCAA Tournament. With the victory, the Cougars (No. 3) became the lowest seeded team to ever capture the Post-Season Classic crown.

Texas had not played since the end of the SWC regular season while Houston defeated Rice, Texas Tech, and Arkansas to earn the right to play Texas. Houston took a 47-41 lead at the intermission, and the second half proved to be just as close. The Longhorns, behind four players in double figures, outscored the Cougars 49-45 over the final 20 minutes. Jim Krivacs chipped in a game-high 25 points while forward Ron Baxter added 24.

However, the Cougars decided advantage on the boards was a big factor. Houston outrebounded the Longhorns by a 52-38 count as Tournament Most Valuable Player Mike Schultz paced the Cougars with 16. Texas' starting center Gary Goodner, just 6-8, did not grab a rebound and scored only two points in 14 minutes before fouling out. His replacement Phillip Stroud, had only six points and two rebounds in 15 minutes.

Texas' backcourt of Johnny Moore and Krivacs combined for 38 points, eight rebounds, 12 assists and eight steals.

SWC CLASSIC IV — MARCH 3, 1979 (THE SUMMIT)

ARKANSAS 39, TEXAS 38

HOUSTON — No. 1 seed Texas and No. 2 seed Arkansas played in front of a record 15,449 fans in the finals of the fourth annual Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic. And the end result also found its way into the record book.

Arkansas Head Coach Eddie Sutton instructed his fifth-ranked Razorbacks to slow things down, and the result was a 39-38 victory for Sutton and a third straight trip to the NCAA Tournament. Each team used only six players apiece as the game went into the record books as the lowest scoring in Post-Season Classic history.

Arkansas held an 18-15 halftime lead as the teams combined to attempt just 24 first-half field goals — Arkansas was 8-of-18 while Texas was 6-of-16. Things picked up in the second 20 minutes as Arkansas was 8-of-17 and the Longhorns were 10-of-20.

Only three players reached double figures. Texas' Tyrone Bryanan was the game's leading scorer with his 21 points while Arkansas' Sidney Moncrief (13) and Scott Hastings (12) combined for 25 of the Razorbacks' 39 points. All three were named to the All-Tournament team, with Moncrief earning Tournament Most Valuable Player honors.

The two teams combined for a 32-of-71 showing from the field and attempted just 18 free throws between them. The Hogs outrebounded Texas 24-18, with Steve Schall's eight leading all rebounders.

SWC CLASSIC V — MARCH 1, 1980 (HEMISFAIR ARENA) TEXAS A&M 52, ARKANSAS 50

SAN ANTONIO — It may have been the first year in San Antonio for the Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic, but the championship game was the same old story. For the fourth time in the five-year history of the tournament, the championship was decided by two points or less. This time it was No. 1 seed Texas A&M downing No. 2 seed Arkansas, 52-50.

For the second straight year a record crowd attended the final as 15,728 fans watched the Aggies capture their first Post-Season Classic crown. Prior to 1980 the only other time Texas A&M had appeared in the championship game was in Classic I, losing to Texas Tech 74-72. This time, however, the Aggies and "The Wall" left with the championship trophy and a NCAA Tournament bid.

A&M Head Coach Shelby Metcalf referred to his front line of 6-11 Rudy Woods, 6-7 Vernon Smith and 6-6 Rynn Wright as "The Wall of College Station," and that "Wall" helped the Aggies to a 14-2 regular-season record and SWC title. The three combined for 22 points, 19 rebounds and three blocked shots against the Razorbacks, but a 6-2 guard by the name of David Britton was the Aggie who stood the tallest.

Britton, voted the Classic's Most Valuable Player, poured in 23 points, grabbed four rebounds and handed out three assists, and almost single-handedly beat the Razorbacks. His free throws in the game's closing minutes sealed the victory for the Aggies. Britton finished the day connecting on 6-of-13 from the field, but a more important 11-of-13 from the free throw line.

The 18th-ranked Aggies could convert on just 16-of-39 field goal attempts, but their 20-of-28 showing at the free throw line proved to be the difference. Arkansas went to the free throw line only nine times, hitting eight.

SWC CLASSIC VI — MARCH 7, 1981 (HEMISFAIR ARENA) HOUSTON 84, TEXAS 59

SAN ANTONIO — Sixth-seeded Texas instantly became the Cinderella team of the tournament, as the Longhorns eliminated No. 4 seed Texas Tech and No. 1 seed Arkansas to reach finals of the sixth annual Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic. But the clock finally struck midnight for Texas against Houston.

The Longhorns, the lowest seed to ever advance to the championship game, fell short against Houston, 84-59, as the Cougars defeated Texas for the Classic title for the second time in three years.

Sophomore guard Rob Williams scored 37 points and handed out six assists in powering the Cougars to an easy victory and the automatic invitation to the NCAA Tournament. Williams finished with a 13-of-19 showing from the field and a perfect 11-of-11 from the free throw line. Williams' 37-point effort ranked second on the Classic's all-time single-game scoring list.

Houston shot a blistering 63.6 percent from the field, hitting 35-of-55 attempts while also outrebounding the Longhorns 36 to 24. Center LaSalle Thompson was the only bright spot for Texas with his 27 points and nine rebounds. Mike Wacker was the only other Texas player to reach double figures with 10 points.

Houston freshmen Clyde Drexler and Michael Young combined for 30 points, 18 rebounds, five assists, six blocked shots and four steals. Drexler alone accounted for 15 of the Cougars' 36 rebounds.

SWC CLASSIC VII — MARCH 6, 1982 (REUNION ARENA) ARKANSAS 84, HOUSTON 69

DALLAS — Arkansas captured its third Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic title in seven tries as the Razorbacks, ranked No. 13 in the nation, rolled to an 84-69 victory over the No. 2 seed Houston Cougars. The game marked the fifth time in the seven-year history of the tournament the top two seeds met for the championship.

The Razorbacks used four players in double figures to ease past the Cougars. But it was two first-half technical fouls called on Arkansas Head Coach Eddie Sutton that seemed to ignite the Razorbacks. UH's junior All-SWC guard Rob Williams made three of the four technical foul shots, putting the Cougars up 24-22, but Sutton's tactics aroused the Razorbacks.

The game was knotted at 32 at halftime, but the Hogs exploded for 52 second-half points to put UH away. Arkansas shot an impressive 63.3 from the field (31-of-49) and forced 19 Houston turnovers.

The Razorbacks balanced scoring attack was led by sophomore guard Alvin Robertson, who finished with 23 points. Other Arkansas players in double figures were Keith Peterson (17 points), Scott Hastings (16 points) and Darrell Walker (14 points). Houston had only one player in double figures as Williams accounted for 24 of the Cougars' 69 points.

Arkansas' defense did an exceptional job of stifling Houston's strong inside game, shutting down centers Larry Micheaux (six points, three rebounds) and Akeem Olajuwon (eight points, one rebound) and forwards Clyde Drexler (nine points, nine rebounds) and Michael Young (three points, one rebound).

DALLAS — Houston was making its fifth championship game appearance in the eight-year history of the Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic, contrasted to TCU's first. And for the third time the Cougars got to cut down the nets, this time with a 62-59 victory over the Horned Frogs.

However the Cougars, the nation's No. 1-ranked team entering the Post-Season Classic, had to sweat out the last five minutes of the game. All-American center Hakeem Olajuwon staked the Cougars to a 55-43 lead with 5:49 to play, but that's when the fun started.

Enter Houston's traditional problems at the free throw line. TCU sent the Cougars, who converted on just 8-of-22 free throw attempts for the game, to the line nine times over that last 5:49 in one-and-one situations. Seven of the nine times the Cougars came away empty handed, and the Horned Frogs, behind Darrell Browder (13 points), Nick Cucinella (11 points) and Doug Arnold (16 points) trimmed UH's lead to 60-57.

But Houston's Larry Micheaux finally sank two free throws with seven seconds remaining to insure the victory and preserve UH's No. 1 ranking entering the NCAA Tournament.

Houston survived on the play Olajuwon (19 points, nine rebounds) and Tournament Most Valuable Player Michael Young (15 points, seven rebounds). All-SWC forward Clyde Drexler could account for only seven UH points, although he did grab a game-high 11 rebounds and seven steals.

Houston forced 18 Horned Frog turnovers as TCU showed signs of fatigue down the stretch. TCU played the late game Friday night, upsetting No. 2 seed and ninth-ranked Arkansas 61-59 in the semifinals.

HOUSTON—It was a familiar site for Southwest Conference basketball fans—Houston and Arkansas meeting in the championship game of the SWC Post-Season Classic. Nothing new or unusual about that. It had happened twice before, with Arkansas winning both times (1977 and 1982). This time, however, it was Houston's turn.

The No. 1 seed and No. 5-ranked Cougars held a six-point lead at the half (28-22) over No. 8 ranked Arkansas, then jumped out to an early 15-point lead in the first 10 minutes of the second half. But when Tournament Most Valuable Player Hakeem Olajuwon fouled out with 7:28 to play, it was all left up to senior Michael Young.

Arkansas was able to trim that 15-point UH lead to six with Olajuwon (20 points, 11 rebounds and 10 blocked shots in 27 minutes) watching from the bench. But the Cougars scored nine points, with Young contributing five on a three-point play and two free throws to help hold off the hard-charging Razorbacks. Arkansas center Joe Kleine (13 points, 11 rebounds) took advantage of Olajuwon's absence over the final 7:28, and almost led the Hogs to the victory.

With Olajuwon on the bench Arkansas outrebounded the Coogs 38-26 for the game, and thought it had it won in the final seconds. The Razorbacks put up three shots in those final seconds before Charles Balentine put in what many thought to be the winning shot. But the officials ruled the horn had already sounded, ending the game and giving UH its second straight Classic championship.

SWC CLASSIC X—MARCH 10, 1985 (REUNION ARENA) TEXAS TECH 67, ARKANSAS 64

DALLAS—It was No. 1 vs. No. 2 again. Seventeenth-ranked and No. 1 seed Texas Tech vs. No. 2 Arkansas on the 10th anniversary of the Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic. And it was only fitting the school that captured the first Classic championship in 1976 win the 10th in 1985.

Texas Tech offset an impressive performance by Arkansas center Joe Kleine to hand the Razorbacks a 67-64 defeat and earn the SWC's automatic invitation to the NCAA Tournament. Kleine finished the day with 36 points and nine rebounds, and walked away with Most Valuable Player honors. With that, Kleine became the only player in Classic history from a non-championship team to win the MVP award.

Texas Tech jumped out to a seven-point halftime lead (34-27) but a strong second-half showing from Arkansas had the Razorbacks in position to win the game. Tech was able to increase that halftime lead to 10 points at 19:43 of the second half, but a 17-6 Arkansas run gave the Razorbacks a 44-43 lead with 13:13 to play.

The Red Raiders trailed by as many as five points with 4:29 to play (61-56), but senior guard Bubba Jennings scored five of Tech's final nine points to give it the victory. Arkansas turned the ball over twice in the final three minutes, and twice the Razorbacks could not convert on one-and-one opportunities.

For a game as close as this was, Texas Tech had a 10-point lead at one point (37-27 at 19:43 of the second half) and Arkansas enjoyed an 11-point advantage (18-7 at 11:21 of the first half).

SWC CLASSIC XI—MARCH 9, 1986 (REUNION ARENA) TEXAS TECH 67, TEXAS A&M 63

DALLAS—Texas Tech set two distinctions with its 67-63 victory over No. 2 seed Texas A&M in the championship game of the 1986 Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic. The Red Raiders became the lowest seed (No. 5) to ever win the Classic title, and became only the second team in the 11-year history of the tournament to win back-to-back championships.

The lowest seed to ever win the title before Gerald Myers' group stunned the Aggies was No. 3 Houston back in 1978. And the only team to ever win consecutive Classic titles was, again, Houston, which turned the trick in 1983 and 1984.

For Myers' it was his third Classic championship, and more importantly, one nobody expected his Red Raiders to even compete for, let alone win.

Tech, after defeating No. 4 seed SMU and No. 1 seed TCU in previous rounds, held a slim 32-31 halftime lead over the Aggies, who shared the SWC regular-season title with TCU and Texas. There were 15 lead changes alone in the first 20 minutes, with Tech's largest lead being five (12-7 and 14-9).

The Red Raiders were able to open that halftime lead to 10 points when junior Dewayne Chism put in an offensive rebound for a 47-37 advantage. Texas A&M chipped away at the Red Raider lead, trimming it to four (55-51) with 5:22 to play, but could never pull any closer until the final 20 seconds.

Tech converted the Aggies' 12 turnovers into 18 points, and senior Tony Benford earned Classic Most Valuable Player honors. Benford accounted for 21 points, seven rebounds and four assists in helping Tech to its third Classic title.

SWC CLASSIC XII—MARCH 8, 1987 (REUNION ARENA) TEXAS A&M 71, BAYLOR 46

DALLAS—Texas A&M put the finishing touches on its Cinderella story with an easy 71-46 victory over No. 2 seed Baylor in the finals of the 12th annual Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic.

The Aggies, who entered the tournament as the No. 8 seed, became the lowest seed to win the title in Classic history. A&M breezed through the tournament field, knocking off No. 1 seed TCU and No. 4 seed Texas Tech in route to the finals.

The Aggies were led by senior forward Winston Crite, who scored 16 points and grabbed 11 rebounds against the Bears. For the tournament, Crite averaged 24-points in three games, which put him tied for 10th-place on the Classic's single-tournament scoring list. Crite also earned Classic Most Valuable Player honors while he joined Arkansas' Sidney Moncrief as the only players in Classic history to earn All-Tournament honors three times.

A&M's 25-point victory tied the Classic record for largest margin of victory—Houston defeated Texas 84-59 in the 1981 Classic championship game in San Antonio.

The Aggies jumped out to a quick nine-point lead (13-4) at the 14:22 mark of the first half and never looked back. In fact, Texas A&M never trailed in the game, as Darryl McDonald's 12-foot jumper at 19:04 of the first half gave the Aggies a 2-0 lead. A&M's lead ballooned to 16 twice in the closing minutes of the first half before Baylor trimmed it to 34-21 at the half.

It was A&M's second Classic championship in four appearances, with the first coming in 1980.

SWC CLASSIC XIII—MARCH 13, 1988 (REUNION ARENA) SMU 75, BAYLOR 64

DALLAS—SMU used a furious rally in the game's final 6:08, fueled by point guard Kato Armstrong, as the Mustangs erased a five-point Baylor lead for a 75-64 victory and the championship of the 13th annual Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic.

The Mustangs, the SWC's regular-season champion and the tournament's No. 1 seed, captured their first Post-Season Classic title in the school's history. SMU also became the first team since Texas Tech in 1985 to win the SWC's regular-season and tournament crowns in the same season.

The Ponies jumped on Baylor early, running away to a 45-35 halftime lead. But the Bears, enjoying their first 20-win season since 1947-48, rebounded nicely in the second half after showing signs of fatigue during the first 20 minutes. Baylor had to survive an emotional, last-second 74-73 semifinal victory over No. 3 seed Arkansas in Saturday's late game.

Baylor quickly cut into SMU's lead in the second half, trimming the deficit to four (49-45) at the 13:10 mark. The Bears later grabbed the lead by virtue of a 12-2 run which began at the 11:17 mark and ended with a Robert McLemore layup with 6:39 to play. That gave Baylor a 60-55 advantage and the Bears first lead since 9-8 early in the first half.

However, Armstrong and the Mustangs rebounded after a timeout, outscoring the Bears 204 over the game's final 6:39. Armstrong scored eight of his team-high 23 points in the game's final minutes as the Ponies snapped Baylor's 10-game winning streak. Baylor's Michael Williams, voted the Classic's Most Outstanding Player, led all scorers with his 31 points.

SWC CLASSIC XIV—MARCH 12, 1989 (REUNION ARENA) ARKANSAS 100, TEXAS 76

DALLAS—The 17th-ranked and top-seeded Arkansas Razorbacks jumped out to an early 11-point lead then coasted to an impressive 100-76 victory over No. 2 seed Texas to claim the championship of the 14th annual Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic.

The Razorbacks' tournament championship marked the second-straight year the SWC's regular-season champ claimed the Post-Season Classic crown. The 1988 season saw SMU walk away with both. The tournament title also ended a seven-year drought for Arkansas, which last won the SWC Post-Season Classic crown in 1982.

The Razorbacks, led by Classic MVP Lenzie Howell's 28 points and 12 rebounds, jumped on Texas early, running out to a 13-point lead (19-6) with 15:15 to play in the first half. The Razorbacks, with their superior depth, extended that lead to 20 points at the half, taking a 57-37 advantage into the locker room to the delight of a capacity crowd of 16,240.

Arkansas continued much of the same in the second half, as the lead ballooned to 29 (97-68) with 2:19 remaining. The Razorbacks had four players score in double figures including Howell's 28, while the Arkansas defense limited SWC regular-season MVP Travis Mays of Texas to just 18 points. The Longhorns could connect on only 1-of-7 three-point attempts, well below their regular-season average.

Arkansas' 100 points set a Classic championship game record.

SWC CLASSIC XV—MARCH 11, 1990 (REUNION ARENA) ARKANSAS 96, HOUSTON 84

DALLAS—The championship game had a definite red tint to it—No. 7 Arkansas vs. No. 26 Houston. And it was Arkansas red that won out, as the Razorbacks claimed their second straight SWC Post-Season Classic championship with a 96-84 victory over the Cougars.

The Razorbacks, ranked among the nation's Top 10 all season, entered the tournament as heavy favorites after claiming their second straight SWC regular-season title in 1990. But the Cougars earned their first championship game appearance since 1984 on the strength of 11 consecutive regular-season victories and tournament wins over Rice and Texas.

Arkansas jumped out to an early 11-point lead at 34-23 with 9:22 to play in the first half, but the Cougars, by virtue of senior Chris Morris' 14 first-half points, steadily whittled away at the Arkansas lead. The Cougars actually owned a one-point advantage (44-43) with 2:37 left in the opening half when junior Darrell Mickens knocked down a 15-footer, but Arkansas outscored UH 9-6 over the final 2:37 to take a 52-50 lead into the locker room.

The Razorbacks jumped on Houston quickly in the opening minutes of the second half as their lead ballooned to 15 (65-50) at the 17:19 mark on guard Arlyn Bowers' two free throws. After that, Houston could pull no closer than seven points (91-84) with 2:39 to play.

Arkansas' Todd Day, voted the Classic's Most Outstanding Player, led all scorers with 22 points and paced five Razorbacks in double figures. Houston was paced by All-SWC forward Carl Herrera, who led the Cougars with 17 points and 11 rebounds.

SWC CLASSIC XVI—MARCH 10, 1991 (REUNION ARENA) ARKANSAS 120, TEXAS 89

DALLAS—The fifth-ranked Arkansas Razorbacks used seven players in double figures to roll to an easy 120-89 victory over the No. 23 Texas Longhorns and became the first school in Southwest Conference Post-Season Classic history to claim three straight tournament titles.

The sellout crowd of 16,713 witnessed one of the best 20 minutes of college basketball in the first half as the Longhorns, making their second championship game appearance in three years, play the talented Razorbacks nearly equal. Joey Wright poured in 18 first-half points as Texas trailed the No. 1-seeded Razorbacks 55-49 before a national TV audience on ABC.

However, the second half was all Arkansas.

Center Oliver Miller and guard Lee Mayberry combined for 43 points, and Arkansas blew open a close game early in the second half. The 120 points set a Classic championship game record, while Arkansas also became the first team to score 100 or more points in each of its three 1991 tournament games.

The Arkansas victory avenged a 99-86 loss to Texas in Austin exactly a week earlier, spoiling the Razorbacks' bid to become only the third team to post a perfect 16-0 record in SWC regular-season play. The Hogs also became the first team to place four players on the All-Tournament team, led by Miller, voted the Classic's Most Outstanding Player.

SWC Classic History, XVII & XVIII



SWC CLASSIC XVII – MARCH 15, 1992 (REUNION ARENA) HOUSTON 91, TEXAS 72

DALLAS – Houston overcame an 11-point deficit, 36.7 percent first half shooting and fatigue to cruise to a 91-72 win over Texas, a team that had beaten the Cougars in their two previous regular-season meetings, to claim the championship of the Post-Season Classic XVII.

Texas' vaunted defensive pressure was no avail as the Cougars pounded the ball inside to outscore the Longhorns 58-35, while shooting a warm 69 percent in the second-half before 11,156 fans and a national Raycom and Prime Network television audience. The Cougars were led by senior Sam Mack's 28 points, while junior guard Derrick Smith scored 15 of his 17 points after halftime to increase Houston's win streak to nine games and its win total to 25.

Smith canned two three-pointers during a 16-6 Cougar run that launched the second half. Senior forward Craig Upchurch scored three baskets during that run and scored 16 of his 20 points in the second stanza. The comeback marked the second-straight for Houston after the Cougars overcame a 22-4 deficit in its double-overtime semifinal win over TCU the night before that lasted to almost midnight.

After shooting 50 percent in the first half, Texas connected on just 37.1 percent from the field in the second period, including 0-for-5 in their normally comfortable three-point range.

Texas' Dexter Cambridge was named the Classic MVP after scoring 29 points in the final, becoming only the third player in tournament history from the losing team to win the honor.

Houston's win avenged two Longhorn victories earlier in the year after the two teams tied for the regular-season championship with identical 11-3 records. The Cougars raised their record in SWC Classic championship games to 4-3 overall and 3-0 over the Longhorns.

SWC CLASSIC XVIII – MARCH 14, 1993 (REUNION ARENA) TEXAS TECH 88, HOUSTON 76

DALLAS – The old saying about those not learning from history being doomed to repeat it is somewhat true. True at least to the Texas Tech Red Raiders, anyway. Tech entered the championship game of the Post-Season Classic XVIII with a perfect 3-0 title game record. They learned from their past appearances and, against Houston on this day, history repeated itself as the Red Raiders won a convincing 88-76 championship victory over the Cougars.

The Red Raiders, after finishing fifth in the Southwest Conference regular-season standings, entered the Classic with something to prove. Impressive shooting from the field and an inspired performance from sophomore guard Lance Hughes, help Tech prove one thing: They were the SWC Classic champions and were headed to the NCAA Tournament.

The Red Raiders shot a warm 54 percent from the field and an impressive 50 percent from the three-point line, while Houston went just 5-for-20 from that distance. The Cougars also only shot 40 percent from the field and played catchup the entire game, falling behind by as many as 18 points in the first half.

A 7-2 run at the end of the first half cut the Tech lead to 13 points. However, the Red Raiders opened the second stanza with a 19-6 run keyed by several Houston turnovers and 11 points by Hughes and senior Will Flemons. That run opened-up a game-high 26-point Tech lead. Despite 29 second-half points by UH's Charles Outlaw, David Diaz and Anthony Goldwire, the Cougars could get no closer than 10 points the rest of the way.

The win increased Texas Tech's record in the Classic to 26-13, the second-best in the SWC behind Houston's 27-13 mark. Tech also improved to an undefeated 4-0 record in Classic championship games. Red Raider coach James Dickey also increased his career record in the Classic to 4-1.

Hughes was named the Tournament MVP, while teammate Will Flemons was named to the All-Tournament team, along with Houston's David Diaz and Charles Outlaw.

DR PEPPER SWC CLASSIC XIX – MARCH 12, 1994 (REUNION ARENA) TEXAS 87, TEXAS A&M 62

DALLAS – Texas entered the 1994 Dr Pepper SWC Classic ranked 25th in the nation and the prohibitive favorite to win the tournament title. However, the Longhorns had entered six previous championship contests and had yet to come away with a victory.

A crowd of 11,164 and a national ESPN television audience witnessed the regular-season champion Longhorns defeat Texas A&M by an 87-62 margin in the championship game and win its first-ever SWC tournament title in its 19-year history.

Tournament Most Outstanding Player B.J. Tyler recorded an outstanding performance with 35 points, eight assists and three steals as Texas won its eighth contest in a row.

Texas led 48-27 at halftime. A&M began the game in a 2-3 matchup zone defense, but Texas was able to work the ball inside to center Rich McIver, who scored the Longhorns first six points with a layup and two dunks. In the second half the Aggies switched between a man-to-man defense and the zone, but were unable to stop Tyler, who made five-of-10 treys in the game and helped the Texas defense force 20 A&M turnovers.

In addition to Tyler on the all-tournament team were: teammate Albert Burditt, Rice's Torrey Andrews, David Edwards of Texas A&M and Mark Davis of Texas Tech. Tyler was the second Longhorn to be named Tournament Most Outstanding Player in three years.

DR PEPPER SWC CLASSIC XX – MARCH 11, 1995 (REUNION ARENA) TEXAS 107, TEXAS TECH 104 (OT)

DALLAS – After splitting a pair of regular season meetings, SWC frontrunners Texas and Texas Tech got their first-ever opportunity to meet in the Classic championship game. NCAA Tournament hopes were on the line for both sides.

The Longhorns and Red Raiders did not disappoint the crowd of 12,852, the largest for a Classic final since 1991, nor the ESPN audience. Texas did not miss a field goal (4-4) nor free throw (6-6) in overtime of its 107-104 victory.

Texas Tech recovered from a 47-41 halftime deficit to take a 92-89 lead in the final seconds, but freshman Brandy Perryman delivered a game-tying three pointer for the Horns to send the game into overtime deadlocked at 92-92.

It was the first time a Classic final had gone an extra period, and it was the Horns who prevailed, despite being outrebounded by a 40-20 margin for the game and seeing starters Tremaine Wingfield and Rich McIver foul out.

Senior guard Terrence Rencher led Texas with 31 points, leading him just seven shy of breaking the SWC all-time scoring record (UT's Travis Mays had 2,279) heading into the NCAA Tournament. He would score 34 points in two NCAA games to finish his career with 2,306 points.

The Horns' Reggie Freeman made his first start since the 10th game of the season and delivered 24 points, including a 6-7 performance from three-point range. Roderick Anderson dished out 12 assists and joined Classic MVP Rencher on the all-tournament team.

The Red Raiders were led by all-tournament team selections Jason Sasser (28 points) and Mark Davis (21 points, nine rebounds). Darwin Ham entered the game shooting less than 60 percent from the foul line but sank nine of 11 free throws and finished with 19 points and nine boards.


