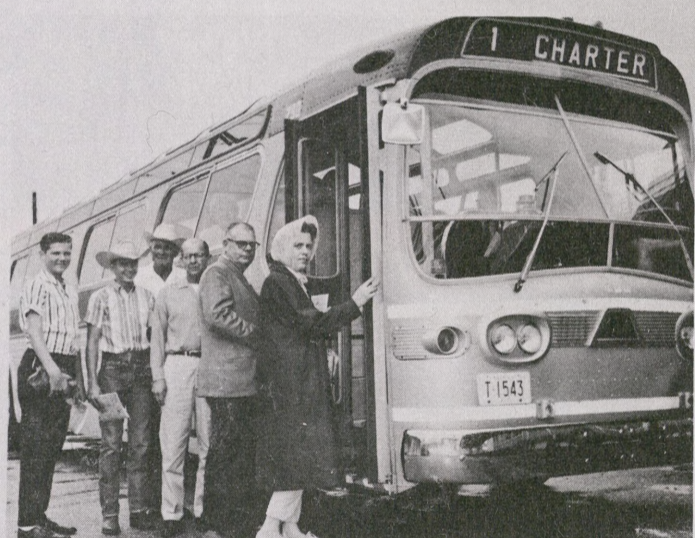


## Refinery Family Day SCORES A Hit

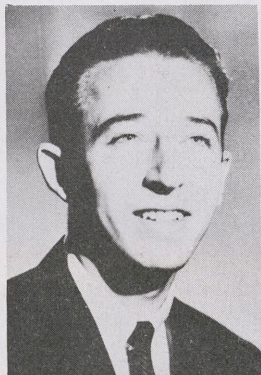
#### FAMILY DAY (CONT'D.)

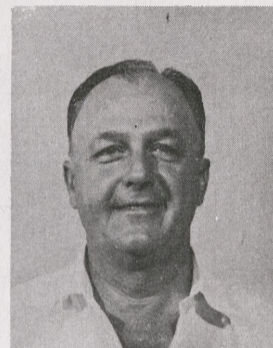

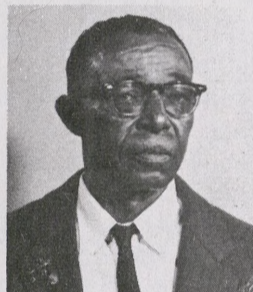
