## Board orders higher insurance rates

AUSTIN (AP) — The State Insurance Board ordered a 16.3 percent average increase in private passenger car insurance rates Wednesday.

New rates will take effect with policies written or renewed on Nov. 1 and will increase Texans' total premiums by \$221 million a year.

Drivers' actual premiums will vary widely, depending on such factors as where they live, their age and sex, the kind of cars they drive and the use they make of their autos.

Some 60 percent of the companies selling auto insurance in Texas charged less than the board-set rates last year, with an average "deviation" of 10 percent.

A typical driver's premium change will range from a \$1 reduction in Tom Green County — the only place getting a decrease — to a \$78 increase in Rockwall County.

For the first time, the board took insurance companies' investment earnings directly into account in automobile rates. Board chairman Bill Daves said the average rate increase would have been 21.9 percent if the traditional rating formula had been used.

Until this year, the board had used a formula that included 5 cents on the premium dollar for insurance companies' pre-income tax profit. The new rates

approved by the board include only 1.8 cents for before-taxes profit.

Insurance companies had requested a 23.7 percent increase, which would have raised total premiums by \$331 million.

Last year, the board refused to increase rates, citing the super-heated pace of inflation and record investment profits to the insurers.

Daves said the companies still are doing well, despite a \$1.9 billion loss in 1980 from their underwriting business. When investment income is added to the picture, he said, the companies had a combined income last year of \$11.9 billion.

Nonetheless, Daves said, it was proper for the board to approve the 16.3 percent increase recommended by its staff actuary, Gaylon Daniel.

"Even though the overall net income figures for the industry look good, I am concerned that sustained high levels of long-term interest rates may subject the investment portfolio of companies to instability in the coming years," he said.

Daves said he was concerned by the high volume of bonds, many purchased years ago at low rates of interest, in insurance companies' investment portfolios.

He also observed that the board is about to embark

on a \$200,000 two-year study of investment income, making Wednesday's rate action just "an interim step in the treatment of investment income in ratemaking."

David Irons of Dallas, attorney for the Texas Automobile Insurance Service Office, an industry organization, said the companies would not fight the investment income issue in court because the board would be studying it in depth.

He said Texans' "improved driving experience" led to a lower rate increase recommendation than the 28 percent the companies requested last year.

"However, the number of accidents and the cost of accidents must be stabilized or reduced before we can hope to stabilize or reduce insurance rates," Irons said.

Rates for all categories of auto coverage except bodily injury liability - which pays for the injuries one causes in auto accidents - were raised. Bodily injury liability rates, for basic coverage, will drop 0.3 percent.

Also contained in the rate decision was bad news for young men under 21 who own automobiles or are the principal drivers of cars owned by someone else. The "differential" between their rate and that of a driver over 25 will be increased in all parts of the state. Age differentials for men between 21 and 25 will drop for liability insurance but rise for collision coverage.

## Raises, funding shift result in discontinuation of classes

Due to a \$100,000 budget cut and an increase in the salaries of teaching assistants, teaching fellows and lecturers; the College of Humanities and Fine Arts experienced an unusually high amount of cuts in sections and classes originally listed in the fall class schedule, a college official said.

The exact figures were unavailable at press time, but college administrator Diane Murphy admitted the cuts were above the average loss all colleges suffer because of small class or section enrollment.

According to Associate Dean Lawrence Curry, the money to pay teachers was not available. Since teaching assistants and

teaching fellows are given priority placement by the college, Curry said classes utilizing lecturers were the hardest hit.

Teaching assistants', TF's and lecturers' salaries are funded in this way: half the money is provided by "lapsed salaries" from a "faculty line" allocation and half from a "lump sum" specifically earmarked for that purpose, Curry said.

Lapsed salaries are any monies left over from permanent teachers' salaries because of leaves without pay or staff turnover.

So where did the money go? Two main points were brought up by both Curry and Murphy. First, the "faculty line" allocation had \$100,000 re-allocated to other colleges by

the campus administration last spring. Second, the salary increase won by the TA's, TF's and lecturers during the spring confrontation between the teachers and the administration made it impossible to fill as many staff positions as in past semesters. Murphy pointed out that the 14.3 percent budget increase to fund the raise went only to the "lump sum" and not to the faculty line allocation.

Explaining the \$100,000 re-allocation, Provost George Magner said, "It (the college of Humanities and Fine Arts) has clearly suffered and enrollment declined over the past several years." Magner said other colleges have had dramatic enrollment increases recently and money was re-allocated to them.

## S. Africa gives name of captured Soviet

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Two lieutenant colonels were among an undisclosed number of Soviet soldiers killed by the South African troops who raided Angola, a military spokesman said Wednesday.

In a release carried by the South African Press Association, the spokesman identified a captured Soviet officer as Sgt. Major Nicolai Feodorovich Pestretsov, captured as he traveled in a military vehicle in a column of black nationalist guerrillas.

In Paris, the ambassador of Angola's Marxist government acknowledged it was possible Soviet soldiers were among those killed in last week's fighting in southern Angola. "We have never made any secret of the fact that our Soviet friends are training our army to help Angola defend its territory," Ambassador Luis Jose d'Almeida said.

Tuesday, South African Defense Minister Magnus Malan said this was the first indication Soviets were involved directly with the Angola-based black nationalist guerrillas of the South-West Africa People's Organization, or SWAPO.

SWAPO has been fighting for 15 years to drive South Africa out of South-West Africa, a mineral-rich adjacent territory the white-minority government has controlled since the end of World War I. The territory is also known as Namibia.

The defense spokesman said the captured Soviet, Pestretsov, had been in Angola since 1979. The rank of master sergeant, traditionally the highest level for an enlisted man, was not familiar to sources in Moscow.

U.S. intelligence manuals say the highest rank for a non-commissioned Soviet soldier is warrant officer — which was the first description the South Africans gave of the captured man.

The SAPA news agency said security forces already had taken out of Angola six Soviet T-34 tanks, more than 100 vehicles made in communist countries and dozens of anti-aircraft guns. The Defense Department said it confiscated hundreds of tons of small arms and ammunition.

South African forces launched the four-pronged attack Aug. 24, 60 miles into Angola, and claimed to have killed at least 400 Angolan soldiers and SWAPO guerrillas and knocked out radar and anti-aircraft installations.

Lt. Gen. Jannie Geldenhuys told journalists that less than half of the people killed during the operation were SWAPO members. He said the other dead were "most probably Angolan soldiers."

An estimated 20,000 Cuban troops now stationed in Angola arrived in 1975 to help the Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola win power in the civil war that followed Portugal's decision to give the colony independence.

On Monday the U.S. representative to the United Nations vetoed a Security Council resolution condemning the South African attack. The reason given was that the resolution did not extend criticism to the Cuban and Soviet presence.

The U.N. General Assembly is to meet in special session Thursday afternoon to discuss the issue of independence for South-West Africa.

## Editorial

### We should not pay

Texas consumers took it on the chin — and wallet — yesterday when the State Insurance Board ordered a 16.3 percent average increase in car insurance rates.

The Board rejected a similar request last year because of rampant inflation and record investment profits for the companies.

They were valid reasons for denying an increase then, and they are still valid today.

Inflation still nibbles away at the consumer's buying power and the insurance companies had a combined income of \$11.9 billion this year when investment income is added.

The Board cited worries over the affect of long-term high interest rates on the companies' investment portfolios as a reason for granting the request.

If the insurance firms can't keep themselves solvent by hiring some good brokers and accountants with some of that \$11 billion profit, that's their tough luck. Policy holders should not be forced to bail them out of future hot water that isn't even lukewarm now.

The increase is unwarranted and proves once again that the State Insurance Board is no more an industry watchdog and regulator than is the Public Utility Commission.

# Lewis waits for World Cup

By now, Carl Lewis should not require any introductions.

The 20-year-old UH junior from Willingboro, N.J. has attracted enough media attention to have his name, life and accomplishments in track and field known throughout the world.

Lewis has been featured in major U.S. newspapers and magazines. Television has captured his soaring jumps and exciting races. Reporters have engulfed Lewis with one question after another, and he has patiently responded to each

one.

The attention hasn't yet persuaded Lewis from dropping out of school or quitting track for a Hollywood career. He still competes to win and to prove that he's the best at what he does.

Lewis caught the fancy of the world when he became the first athlete since the legendary Jesse Owens to win both a track and a field event in a national collegiate meet.

Owens did it in 1936. Lewis did it in the NCAA Track and Field Championships on June 5, 1981. He flew 27 feet, three-quarters of an inch for the long jump win and had a blazing,

wind-aided time of 9.99 seconds in the 100-meter dash.

Lewis duplicated the feat in the U.S. Track and Field Championship on June 20. His mark of 28 feet, 3½ inches gave him the second best legal jump in history, the best ever at sea level, and a national collegiate record.

The competition continued deep into the summer, but on European soil. Lewis jumped 26 feet, 4¼ inches for first place in an Oslo, Norway meet. A third-place showing in the 100 (10.15 seconds) in a Milan, Italy meet was followed three days later with another 100-meter win back in Oslo.

World-traveler Lewis has been resting in Rome, Italy since an Aug. 18th meet in Zurich, Switzerland, where he had had another long jump win (27 feet, 11½ inches).

Lewis has used his summer activities to prepare for the World Cup track meet in Rome this weekend. He will be competing in the 100 and the long jump. He will also run as anchorman of the 400-meter relay team.

Lewis is not the only U.S. participant from UH. Sophomore Stanley Floyd will join Lewis as the second leg of the relay team. Freshman Anthony Ketchum was invited as an alternate to the team.

Floyd, the world's top sprinter in 1980, kept his own busy schedule this summer. He recorded a 200-meter wins at meets in Budapest, Hungary (20.41 seconds) and London, England (20.51). He finished second behind Georgia's Mel Lattany in 100-meter dashes at Budapest (10.12) and London (10.25).

 prep 400-meter time in the nation this year (45.64, converted).

Lewis again will be the man to watch. He is still after Bob Beamon's world record mark in the long jump (29 feet, 2½ inches), a mark that has been on the books since 1968. UH track Head Coach Tom Tellez, who coaches Lewis in the jump, is convinced it's just a matter of time before Lewis breaks the record.

"Carl has done everything a guy could do except get the world record," Tellez said. "But, the distance doesn't matter. All he has to do is jump far enough to win. I think he's ready physically. It's a matter of him being ready mentally."

Lewis' sprint coach, Clyde Duncan, thinks the U.S. relay team (which includes Lattany, James Sanford of USC and Jeff Phillips of Tennessee) is favored to win.

"The Americans should do extremely well," Duncan said. "They should win the 400-meter relay, unless something unforeseen should happen. The 1,600-meter relay team (Walter McCoy of Florida State; Willie Smith of the Athletic Attic Track Club; Tony Darden of the Philadelphia Pioneer TC; Cliff Wiley and Edwin Moses) is also favored. They have five quarter-milers who have run 45.5 seconds or better. No other country has runners who have run that well."

Another person who has an active interest in the outcome of the World Cup is Lewis' sister, Carol, who is beginning her studies at UH this semester. Carol is a long jumper in her own right. She holds an indoor mark of 21 feet, 7½ inches and bounded 21 feet, 6 inches in the U.S. dual meet with the Soviet Union in Leningrad in July. She predicts a big finish to her brother's summer.

"I think Carl should win in the jump, maybe with twenty-eight feet or more," Lewis said. "He has a fantastic chance to win the 100-meter dash. And the 400-meter relay team has four of the five best sprinters in the world. Carl could bring back three gold medals with him."

Both Carl and Carol should have the chance to bring home gold medals from the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles. But, that's another story.

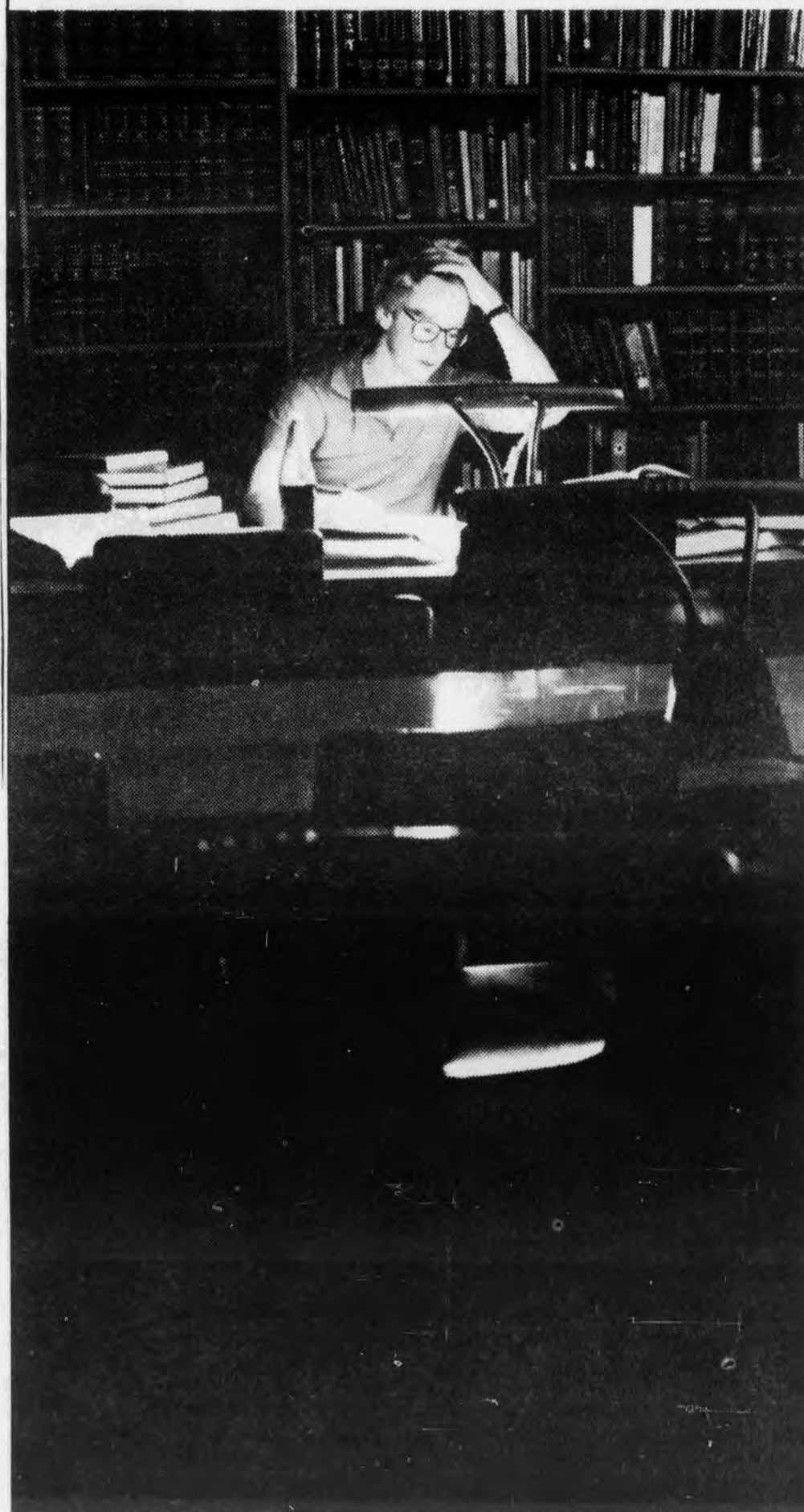

**Engineering professor given grant  
to study Houston's water treatment**

The City of Houston has contracted a UH civil engineering professor to apply computer monitoring and control techniques, called automated process monitoring, to the Sagemont wastewater treatment plant.

Dr. John F. Andrews, a member of UH's environmental engineering program and an expert on instrumentation, control, and operation of municipal wastewater treatment plants, has been given a 30-month, \$676,000 contract by the City of Houston to find how to best employ automated controls in the wastewater treatment system.

The project involves three sections of the wastewater division; research evaluation, plant operations, and maintenance.

The research will follow three steps.

Andrew's group, including several UH graduate students, will set up computer hardware at the Sagemont plant to monitor the amount of power and chemicals used at peak operation hours. They will record the data over a

six to nine-month-period.

With the recorded data, the group can create computer simulations of the Sagemont plant using the UH computer system. The team will vary plant inputs, such as composition of the wastewater, amount and type of usable chemicals, the quantity of incoming wastewater, and time of day. The various simulations will show the effects of stresses upon plant operation costs.

Finally, the group will make recommendations for the selecting of computer monitoring and control system equipment for Houston's future wastewater treatment plants. The recommendations will consider a computer system's reliability, initial expense, operation and maintenance costs, effect on plant efficiency, ease of use, and staff needs.

"There are three priorities to managing any wastewater treatment plant: keep the facility operating, meet pollution permit limits, and minimize operating expenses," Andrews said.

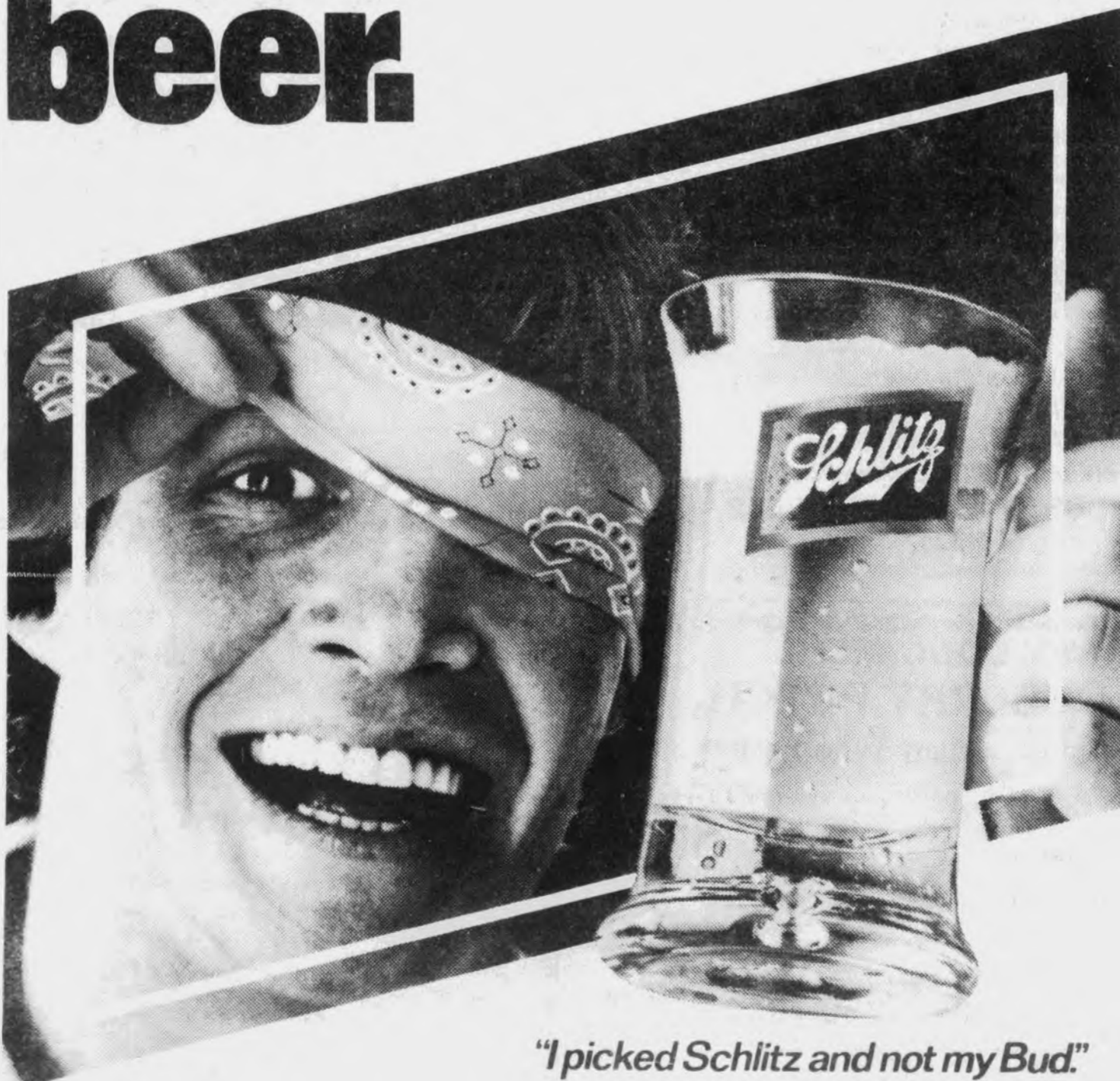
According to Andrews, many communities across the nation face large operating expenses for

wastewater treatment plants because of a lack of foresight regarding plant operation costs in facilities designed and built in the last 10 years. While the federal government paid for most of the plants built during that period of time, local governments must finance all the operating expenses.

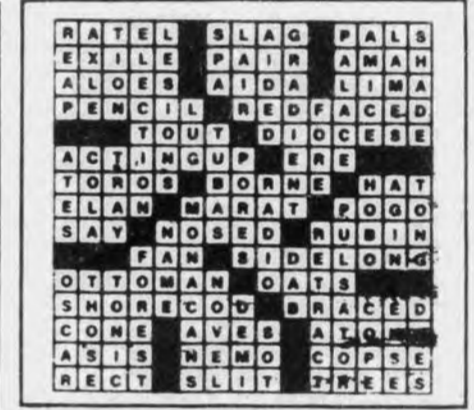
"Municipal wastewater is very dilute (more than 99 percent water). Processing large amounts of water to remove small percentages of waste is very costly," Andrews adds. Houston's wastewater treatment standards and flat terrain increases operating costs, according to Andrews. (The city maintains 249 pumping stations and close to 4,000 miles of sanitary sewerlines.)

The Sagemont plant was selected for this study because it contains a unique combination of equipment, Andrews said. There is a pumping station on the treatment plant site, providing an excellent opportunity to evaluate the most effective way to automatically control the three different types of pump systems used throughout the city.
