



UNITED FUND CAMPAIGNS GET UNDERWAY AT THE COMPLEX

The 1976 United Fund campaign to support 45 agencies in providing 163 services for people throughout the Houston area will be accomplished through three solicitation groups. One group will solicit at the plant, one at the refinery and one will cover Administration, Major Projects, General Services, Purchasing, Accounting, Employee Relations, Environmental, Medical and Security.

United Fund co-chairmen at the plant are John Dever, operator No. 1, "A" Department, and Leroy Abrahamson, manager, Inspection/Materials. At the refinery they are John Kindla, mechanic, Automotive, and Al Ott, process manager, Catalytic Cracking. L. C. Garrett, buyer, Purchasing, is heading up the drive for the service groups listed above.

Each group will have its own fund goal to achieve. Yet, all groups wish to encourage every employee to give their fair share so that vital services may be

made available to people from all walks of life regardless of race, creed, age or sex.


According to United Fund literature "an individual need is the only requirement" to receive assistance through United Fund agencies.

August 4 marked the mail rooms joining forces in a continuing effort to provide a more efficient and economical service. According to Bob Long, supervisor services, the combining of forces has enabled increased services to the complex by providing more mail runs per day at the refinery and increasing the number of delivery locations at the plant. Mail deliveries to the administrative locations have remained the same.

"We intend to keep reviewing our services," states Bob, "to ensure that our users are satisfied, and we solicit their comments for improvements at any time."

In conjunction with the mail room consolidation, a company courier service was initiated. An increase from two to four daily courier runs to and from the Infor-

NOVEMBER 3 DEADLINE FOR 1977 SCHOLARSHIP COMPETITION ENTERIES

Like everything else, the cost of a college education continues to rise. Yet, for students who qualify, there is a lot of scholarship money out there - money that takes at least part of the burden off parents faced with the rising cost of everything.

So far as Shell parents are concerned, part of that scholarship money might come from the ninth annual Shell Companies Scholarship Competition. Again this year, the Shell Companies Foundation, Incorporated, will sponsor 50 college scholarships for Shell children

who will complete high school in 1977 and enter college in 1977. As in the past, all phases of the competition will be handled by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC).

Those eligible to compete are sons and daughters of regular, full-time employees and retired or deceased employees of Shell Oil Company (including Shell Chemical Company and Shell Development Company) and Shell Pipe Line Corporation.

Students who wish to compete must submit completed 1977 entry forms by *November 3 of this year* to: Scholar-

ship Competition, Shell Companies Foundation, Incorporated, Two Shell Plaza, P. O. Box 2099, Houston, TX 77001.

Additionally, they must take the preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT), which will be given in high schools on *October 21 or October 25 of this year.*



S. A. PICTURES DON'T JUST APPEAR IN SHELEGRAM

A number of questions have come up with regard to the procedure for getting service anniversary photographs in the SHELEGRAM. Here's how to do it.

You will be notified by Employee Relations senior analyst Bobby Garrett to have your picture taken at Cheesman's Studio at 2009 Tatar in Pasadena at least six weeks prior to your service anniversary date. After you are notified, it's up to you.


