

## GARY DILLARD ADDRESSES CIMA MEETING

The Channel Industries Mutual Aid (CIMA) organization met February 1 at the chemical plant cafeteria to adopt plans for strengthening the organization during 1977. The meeting was attended by 51 representatives from 33 member establishments.

A five-minute video tape was shown of the 1976 CIMA drill held at the refinery fire training ground followed by a brief welcome by Shell's DPMC general manager Gary

Dillard.

"In our type of industry," said Dillard, "our first line of defense still remains the men on the job and the in-plant fire crews. The CIMA organization," he continued, "provides an effective defense against major fires which could exceed the capabilities of any single member." After acknowledging the need for a continuous process of self-improvement by CIMA members, he stated

In existence for over 20 years, CIMA originated from a joint effort by industries and other agencies to provide improved fire protection in the industrial area around the ship channel.

The group's resources include 25 fire trucks, including foam and dry chemical units designed especially for petroleum or petrochemical fires; two fire boats; eight ambulances; three tele-squirt trucks capable of shooting water long distances; and a large amount of specialized equipment and fire hose.

Available assistance also includes three rescue teams and more than 350 people, among whom are key personnel from each industry who are specialists in fire fighting tactics for their industries and products

NOW THROUGH APRIL

February is a month of memorable dates - Lincoln's Birthday, Washington's Birthday, Valentine's Day, Groundhog Day.

But Texans will observe most closely February 1, first day for filing 1977 motor vehicle registration applications. The registration period continues through April 1.

The 1977 stickers will be affixed in the upper right-hand corner of rear license plates. Motorists will leave the 1976 sticker in the upper left-hand corner of the same plate.

Between February 1 and March 1, motorists may order their registration stickers by mail.

Deadline for having the 1977 stickers affixed to metal plates is midnight April 1.
