



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PRESIDENT BILL



“A NEW BEGINNING”

The first American presidential candidate ever to include lesbians and gay men and their concerns in a major party platform has swept to victory. The first presidential candidate since the onslaught of the AIDS epidemic to directly address this vital issue has been elected to our highest office. The first presidential candidate to address a specifically gay and lesbian political rally is headed to the White House.


Whatever else the pundits say about this election, all of the above are historic to the gay and lesbian community. Bill Clinton sought our votes and was willing to do what no other presidential nominee has ever done: He openly courted our votes. Understandably community groups from ACT-UP to the Human Rights Campaign Fund will closely watch Clinton's performance in pursuit of these promises—and, hopefully, our watchdog activists will give the President-elect the necessary breathing room to make considered and wise decisions on our issues.

It is perhaps too early to ascertain the gay vote for Clinton. A poll conducted prior to the election showed over 90 per cent of gays and lesbians supporting Clinton. Yet a CNN poll showed something over 70 per cent of gays and lesbians voting for Clinton, with over 17 per cent voting for President Bush.

It is incomprehensible to us that even that many gays could vote for a man and a party which condemned our very lives, denied our innate difference and relegated our lifestyle to a chosen evil—both criminal and sinful. One day, hopefully, all gay men and lesbians will rise above self-loathing and inner doubts.

While there were individual victories such as Congressman Gerry Studds winning re-election in a redrawn district in Massachusetts and Texas State Representative Glen Maxey easily gaining another term, not all the news is reassuring. While the anti-gay Proposition 9 in Oregon was defeated, the vote was close, and in Colorado the anti-gay initiative passed. The Religious Right can only be encouraged by these mixed results and in their frustration with losing the presidential race the Christian Coalition will concentrate even more on its anti-gay agenda. At least we experienced momentary joy in watching Pat Robertson, on his cable network, discomforted by Clinton's victory and blaming Bush for deserting "family values."

But whatever mixed results this election may have brought, in the final balance the election of Bill Clinton to the highest office in the land is, for the gay and lesbian community, historic. Truly, a new day has dawned in the long and lonely struggle for equal rights. We now must work even harder to assure its fruition and someday we will stand on equal ground with all fellow citizens and our loved ones will no longer be dying by the thousands to a disease so long ignored by an unaware and uncaring national administration.



Bering's choir sings to keep pipe organ playing; THRF receives grant

The Chancel Choir of Bering Memorial United Methodist Church will present a special concert of hymns, gospels and spirituals on Saturday, Nov. 14 to help raise funds to restore the church's pipe organ.

The concert begins at 7:00 p.m. and is open to the public. It is part of a number of fund raising activities sponsored by the church's congregation to raise \$125,000 to restore and maintain the 66-year-old pipe organ. The organ, a gift from the Bering family, was installed in the church in 1926. In the 1970s a new console and other additions were made to the instrument.

"Since then, the instrument has begun to fail mechanically. For several years Bering's technicians have performed near miracles to keep it playing. Now, it is time to perform major restorative work," says J. Frank Shroyer, chairperson of the organ restoration committee.

Bering Church has long been active in assisting persons afflicted with AIDS. Several years ago some of Bering's members founded the Bering Community Service Foundation which funds numerous assistance projects for PWAS.

"We hope that the community

will, in turn, enthusiastically support the church's organ restoration project," Shroyer adds. The choir concert will be directed by Rob Seible, choir master at Bering. Tickets are \$10 and may be purchased in advance at the church office, 1440 Harold St., or at the door.

THRF receives grant of \$5,000

The Texas Human Rights Foundation announced today that it has received a \$5,000 grant from the Playboy Foundation to support its law suit challenging Article 21.06 of the Texas Penal Code, commonly known as "the sodomy law." The law suit, which has resulted in Article 21.06 being ruled unconstitutional by two lower courts, will be heard before the Texas Supreme Court on Jan. 5, 1993. The Texas Supreme Court will decide the case once and for all and hand down a ruling on whether the statute, which criminalizes consensual sex-

ual relations between individuals of the same gender, violates the right to privacy guaranteed by the Texas Constitution. In a written statement, Executive Director Cleo Wilson said, "Since its inception in 1965, the Playboy Foundation has supported efforts to eliminate archaic laws governing private sexual behavior between consenting adults. A definitive ruling will not only bring Texas into the 21st century, but will protect this most basic privacy issue." TIW AIDS Legal Project Director Kim Vickery agreed, saying, "This is a matter of personal choice and privacy. We hope that the Texas Supreme Court agrees with the appellate court in ruling that it is unconstitutional to criminalize what consenting adults do in the privacy of their own homes." TBRF Director of Development Suzy Wagers added, "We would like to formally recognize the Playboy Foundation for their commitment to this issue. With the appeal to the Supreme Court and court costs and attorneys' fees already at \$60,000, this funding is crucial." Thousands expected for Oklahoma's first organized walk to benefit AIDS

OKLAHOMA CITY, Friday, Oct. 30 (AP)—More than 5000 people, including Jeanne White, are expected to brave predicted rainy weather on Sunday to take the state's first organized walk to benefit AIDS victims.

"We've got people coming in from Woodward, Shawnee, Enid—all over," AIDS Walk director Harold Hasel said Thurs-

day. "They'll just be bringing umbrellas."

The walk in Oklahoma City will be similar to one held in New York City earlier this year, where some 20,000 umbrella-toting people covered several miles during a heavy downpour to raise nearly \$4 million.

White, mother of Ryan White, will speak to walkers during opening ceremonies before joining them on a 5K trek through

downtown Oklahoma City.

Ryan, who died of AIDS in 1990 at age 18, gained national attention when the school he attended in Kokomo, Ind., tried to ban him from classes.

Although participants are encouraged to collect \$20 per mile walked from sponsors, anyone wishing to show support may join in the walk, Hasel said.

Proceeds will benefit 16 AIDS-related organizations, including the WINDS home for AIDS patients; anonymous AIDS testing; a hot meal program that delivers food to homebound AIDS patients called "Loaves and Fishes" and psychological and counseling services.

The walk will begin at 2:00 p.m. in Bricktown.

'Wheels of Justice' premiere; open house at Neartown Police Storefront

Don Maines' new play, "Wheels of Justice," premieres at 8:00 p.m. Saturday in Cullen Hall at the University of St. Thomas in Montrose. Maines also directs the two-act script, which involves a feud that erupts between neighbors over the sale of a truck.

UST will host another performance next Saturday night before the play moves to Houston's Alley Theatre for a gala performance at 7:00 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 17. Proceeds from "Wheels of Justice" will launch an innovative wills and estate-planning project that Texas Accountants & Lawyers for the Arts (TALA) is developing for the artists with AIDS. Tickets for the UST performances are \$8.00 (\$5.00 students) available at the door.

The cast includes Stephanie Delape, Peg Glazer and Carole Orsak, as well as two attorney/actors Roly Purrington and Ted Pfister.

Maines wrote "Wheels of Justice" in Edward Albee's playwrighting class at the University of Houston, where Maines earned his law

degree. Twists and turns of the plot are based in part on consumer law lessons Maines learned working with Richard Alderman, the "People's Lawyer" on Channel Two New.

The author of two previously successful plays, "Is Alexander Godunov?" and "Reindeer Games," Maines began his writing career as a movie theatre critic for The Daily Texan, the student newspaper at the University of Texas. As a journalist, he won three United Press International awards for feature and editorial writing.

TALA's new AIDS project is being created in response to the

epidemic's disproportionate impact on the arts community, explained Jane S. Lowery, TALA's executive director. "Many artists have died without making a will or planning for the care of their work," she said.

"Consequently, paintings, musical works, literature—a generation of artistic development—is in danger of becoming lost."


TALA's network of 700 lawyers and accountants has provided free legal and accounting assistance to artists and non-profit arts organizations throughout Texas since 1979.

Happy Birthday to the MacAdory House without celebration this year

On Wednesday, Oct. 28, 1992, The MacAdory House celebrated its eighth anniversary. "Celebrated" is not exactly correct, there was no celebration; no cake, no speeches, no nothing. Even the staff of AIDS Foundations Houston, Inc. the agency which has run the "Mac House" for these past eight years, took no notice. No one remembered that the Mac House, which grew out of, and has largely been supported by the gay and lesbian community of Houston, was the first privately funded AIDS residence in the nation. No one gave a thought to the thousands of persons with H.I.V. who have found love

and shelter there, or of the many volunteers who have maintained the house and raised funds to keep it operational. Volunteers like Eleanor Munger (Reverend Mother), the Sunday afternoon volunteer, who seeing a critical need for hospice care, left AFH and opened Omega House, volunteers like the "A Team," the volunteer team which ran the Mac House in the early years, a group of mostly gay men who one day decided that they were actually a French Order of Nuns, the Little Sisters of Perpetual Attitude, and gave each other names like "Sister Mop and Glow," "Sister Spic and Span," "Sister Saran Wrap" and "Sister Juris Prudence," no one remembered.

As the AIDS epidemic has ground on relentlessly, we as individuals and as a community have become desensitized, numbed by the sheer body count. Overwhelmed by the present and discouraged by prospects for the future, we seldom take the time to remember the positive accomplishments of our community. I believe that it is vital to our individual and collective sanity that we remember; that we remember how we as a community rose to meet the challenge of AIDS when on one else cared; how organizations like AIDS Foundation Houston, Inc., the Montrose Counseling Center, Omega Foundation, the PWA Coalition, Body Positive, Bering Foundation and a number of other AIDS service providers grew out of the gay

and lesbian community; how these organizations continue to serve the HIV population at large even though the demographics have changed, and fewer and fewer of our gay brothers and sisters comprise the client lists of those agencies.

In this day when states like Oregon and Colorado have initiatives on the November ballot to officially declare gays and lesbians, "scum"; when national figures like Pat Robertson, Jerry Falwell, and their fellow Republican bigots extol the virtues of family values but preclude the gay and lesbian community from being a family or having values, it is important that we remember and proudly demand the respect we have so justly earned.

TB is back and it's deadlier than ever; Hypertension study at Baylor

"Tuberculosis is a major threat to public health," says Dr. Benjamin Interiano of The Methodist Hospital in Houston. "We are definitely seeing more TB cases now and attribute the increase to conditions that exist in many urban areas."

Tuberculosis is a bacterial infection of the lungs which is transmitted through the air. TB is very contagious, but it usually takes close contact with a TB patient over an extended period of time to become infected.

According to Interiano, TB was widespread until 1963 when the number of cases reported dropped dramatically. Nearly a quarter of a century later, in 1987, the number of TB cases shot up and continues to climb.

Those at increased risk of contracting TB are Blacks, Hispanics, health care workers, migrant workers, homeless people, and those who live in crowded, poorly ventilated conditions. Interiano attributes the recent spread of tuberculosis to the influx of immigrants from Asia and Latin America where it is common.

Most people don't realize they've been infected, so it is important to be aware of TB's warning symptoms: a chronic cough, fatigue, weakness, unexplained weight loss, loss of appetite, and fever.

"The best way to control tuberculosis is to treat infected cases properly and quickly," says Interiano. "It is important to trace the infection back to its source and test all the people who have

had contact with the infected person."

TB is 100 percent curable when it is discovered and treated properly. "When the infection is found, it can be treated with a medication that kills the germ," says Interiano. "But the medication must be taken for six to nine months."

The test for tuberculosis is simple and should be given annually to those considered at "high risk" of contracting the disease. A small needle is used to put tuberculin under the skin. In two or three days, a health care professional will check for a reaction that indicates the presence of the germ.

TB tests are offered through your physicians office. They are also offered for free or for a small fee at many city health clinics. Call the clinic in your

area for more information.

High blood pressure study

Volunteers with hypertension are needed for a study on high blood pressure at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

The effects of two FDA-approved medications will be compared in older adults. Men and women, age 55 and older, with high blood pressure may qualify for the 14-week study.

Participants will receive a complete physical examination, routine medical evaluations and laboratory testing at no charge. Free parking will be available.

Discrimination prohibited against homosexuals in Canadian armed forces

TORONTO, Tuesday, Oct. 27 (AP)—Homosexuals will no longer face discrimination that barred them from careers in the Canadian armed forces, the Department of National Defense announced Tuesday.

The decision came after the Federal Court of Canada ruled Tuesday morning that restrictions on gays in the military are contrary to the Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

"The Canadian Forces will comply fully," Gen. John de Chastelain said in a statement from Ottawa. "Canadians, regardless of the sexual orientation, will now be able to serve their country in the Canadian Forces without restriction."

The court case involved Michelle Douglas, a lesbian drummed out of the Air Force in 1989.

The ruling by Judge Andrew MacKay came minutes after lawyers for Douglas

and lawyers for the federal government met in a downtown courtroom for a trial that had been expected to last three weeks.

Douglas, now a Revenue Canada investigator in Ontario, sought \$550,000 in damages.

MacKay's ruling said her rights had been denied and that any military policies "that have evolved regarding the service of homosexuals in the Canadian

Armed Forces are contrary to the Charter"

The challenge was one of five launched by homosexuals over military policies that barred recruiting of homosexuals and promotion of homosexuals already in the service.

A year ago, the chief of defense staff dropped plans to end the policy because of strong objections from some Tory members of Parliament.

Gay rights wins in Oregon and Maine, appears to have lost in Colorado

As The New Voice went to press, final results were not available.

Oregon voters on Tuesday said they especially came to the polls to choose a president and express their opinion on Measure 9, the statewide anti-gay rights initiative.

Here is what some of them said about Measure 9:—"I'm in favor of it. I guess I think about my grandkids. The basic moral issues that we've taught them are being undermined. Things that we believed 25 years ago people aren't believing today."

Rodney Goff, 55, a pharmacist from Beaverton.—"It's a discrimination measure and I think it would keep people from wanting to move to the state or open businesses here."

Jean Lester, 23, of Portland.—"I think it's very discriminatory. I'm appalled that it even got on the ballot. It's an embarrassment to the state."

Lisa Douglass, 26, a buyer for an industrial distributor in Beaverton. —

"It's a repressive, Hitler-like law that would set a precedent to spread discrimination."

Landis Long, 42, a painter in Portland.

Voters apparently rejected the anti-gay measure.

Maine voters uphold ordinance

Residents of Maine's largest city voted Tuesday to retain a controversial local ordinance that bars discrimination against homosexuals.

The final unofficial tally showed that 19,643 voters, or 57 percent, supported the ordinance that prohibits discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation in housing, jobs, credit and public accommodations.

The Portland ordinance—similar to measures in effect in at least six states and 130 cities—was approved last spring by the city council, but opponents collected enough signatures to

force a referendum.

Jim Duran, leader of Concerned Portland Citizens, said the group's opposition to the ordinance proved that the support wasn't as strong as the 7-1 margin by the city council.

Some 14,770 residents, or 43 percent, opposed the measure.

Tampa also keeps pro-gay ordinance

Tampa residents who want to repeal a city ordinance that protects homosexuals against discrimination were winning late Tuesday night.

The language on the ballot asked whether the portion of the human rights ordinance dealing with sexual orientation should be repealed. A "yes" vote would repeal the discrimination protection for gays. A "no" vote preserves the protection.

With 48 percent of the precincts counted, there were 25,700 votes in favor of repealing the law, or 59 percent, com-

pared with 17,714 votes against, or 41 percent at midnight.

Colorado ballot very close

An anti-gay rights measure was failing by a narrow margin in the early voter returns Tuesday night, but exit polls showed many Colorado voters oppose civil protections for homosexuals.

With early returns counted, the "no" votes had 51 percent, compared to 49 percent who voted "yes," or for Amendment 2.

However, voters questioned outside polling places earlier Tuesday made Amendment 2's outcome questionable. Slightly more than half of those surveyed said homosexuals should not have legal protection from discrimination in jobs and housing, tilting the measure towards passage.

About two-thirds of Bill Clinton voters favored gay-rights protections, compared with only a little more than a quarter of President Bush's voters.

'Danton's Death' at Alley Theater through Nov. 15th

No one could ever accuse the Alley Theater of taking an easy route. Even in a season which is being promoted as an effort to enhance audience accessibility, the artistic and administrative staff of the Alley has decided to challenge the intellectual prowess of its patrons with a stunningly provocative production, from one of the world's most celebrated playwright/directors, of one of the foremost plays of the 19th century.

"Danton's Death," by Georg Buchner is being presented on the Alley's Large Stage through Nov. 15th. This production, conceived and directed by Texas-born Robert Wilson, from a new English-language version of the play by Robert Auletta, is a masterpiece of avant-garde theater in which striking visual images, created almost solely by lighting design, work in perfectly

attuned conjunction with the motion of the actors, the utilization of space and the manipulation of sound for a startling theatrical experience.

The work, which is a staple of European theater but is rarely performed in this country, is a historical account of the rivalry between Georges Danton and Maximillian Robespierre during the latter days of the French Revolution. It was written by Buchner in 1835 and is reflective of his fascination with the ideals and shortcomings of the revolution and contains his observations on death, moralizing and the extent to which power can corrupt.

The play opens with Danton (Richard Thomas) lounging with his wife Julie (Marissa Chibas) while some of his associates are in a brothel. His friends express concern that the strident rectitude of Robespierre will lead him and his allies against Danton. Danton, however, dismisses their uneasiness by asserting that he is far too visible a symbol of the revolution to be in any real danger.

Robespierre (Lou Liberatore), who tells the mob that the "strength of the Republic is virtue," is determined to continue the blood bath known as the Reign

of Terror. When Danton confronts him, arguing that enough blood has been shed, enough lives lost, Robespierre reacts indignantly and is easily persuaded by his associate Saint-Just (Jon David Wiegand) that Danton and his allies must be arrested and brought before the Revolutionary Tribunal.

Danton refuses to flee even though he is warned, and he and his compatriots are imprisoned. In their prison cell, which they share with American political philosopher Thomas Paine, Danton and his followers reflect on their impending death and the horrifying turn their revolution has taken.

"Danton's Death" is a remarkably studied, intelligent work especially when one considers that Buchner's primary motivation in writing it was to receive much needed funds. Auletta's updated version of the classic loses none of Buchner's intensity or poet-

cism. The real changes occur in Wilson's production.

Wilson's unconventional style will not find ready appreciation among a sizable portion of theater patrons (I would estimate that he lost 20% of his audience during intermission at the performance I attended), and this is truly unfortunate.

Wilson has a beautiful and alluring vision that requires only a suspension of traditional theatrical expectations to be enjoyed and admired.

Before any words are spoken, before every member of the audience has been seated, a lone figure is seen on the stage. Cloaked in black, with white face and a red gag painted across his face, he moves deathly and noiselessly from one area of the darkened stage to another. In the center stands an obelisk, dark and foreboding, as if surveying the stage. To its right, a small torch flickers at a lesser height. To the left and closer to the audience an open book lies on the stage in a spotlight.

The figure moves slowly and circuitously to the book and examines it. He moves across the stage, again in roundabout fashion, this time stopping at the torch, which he squelches and takes

with him as he leaves.

Through all this the background changes from a glorious, inviting blue to an unappealing, blanching white to a warmly, sinister red.

Is Wilson showing the destruction of hope and justice (the torch) even as the perpetrators claim they are acting with the guide of superior knowledge and morality (the open book)? Or is he decrying the disdain for enlightened reason (the book examined and disregarded) by authorities intent on imposing their self-frighteous convictions on the populace (the torch suppressed)? This abstraction is not meant to be esoteric but is rather intended to evoke interpretation.

At other times his meaning seems less elusive. When Robespierre and Saint-Just are plotting Danton's arrest, they operate within a rectangular field of light that grows ever smaller indicating the tightening area of free expression the plotters will tolerate. Conversely the prison which houses Danton and his friends is represented with shimmering wire for bars with a languid pool in the center and a starry night in the background emblematic of the inherent impossibility involved in repressing independent thought.

A similar stylization can be seen in the two principals. Robespierre's movements are stiff and autocratic. His motion is deliberate and calculated and he speaks imperiously and coldly. When he does show emotion it is mere vitriolic fervor.

Danton, on the other hand, moves with grace and fluidity (Wilson's strong dance influence at work here). He speaks with both passion and reason, and we see a much larger emotional range in him.

Wilson also uses strong aural techniques in his production. The sound of ominous organ music, portending incipient doom, is heard at various times. On

occasion the sounds relate more directly to the action on stage as with laughter and merrymaking heard while Danton's friends are in a brothel or the clang of metal on metal and glass shattering as the mob grows violent. At other times the relation is metaphorical—a swarm of bees or flies for the murmur of the crowd and the amplified sound of a drip for the dankness of a prison cell.

Even Wilson's genius, though, can give way to the trite. At one point Danton makes reference to the "blood-soaked Messiah," and his arms are extended outward in a clear representation of the cross. And there are moments when his motivation simply escapes me, as in the numerous times several of the characters made slow mechanical turns to face another direction or any of the several times when a character spoke with his back squarely to the audience.

All in all the production technique is so all encompassing that it's at times easy to overlook the actors. There were fine performances from all involved, though and Thomas and Liberatore are of particular note.

Thomas has a calm, unforced touch that underscores Danton's humanity and captures the unfettered earthiness of the protagonist.

Liberatore is an icily, controlled maniac as Robespierre. His performance is spine-tingling and deathly.

Among the rest of the cast, Marissa Chibas and Melissa Bowen both successfully convey concern for their respective husbands as the situation deteriorates around them, and later the tragic despondence of losing their mates to the guillotine; Jon David Wiegand is mesmerizing and heinous as Saint-Just; and Jeffrey Bean gives a praiseworthy turn a voice of pragmatism and insight.

Robert Wilson's production of "Danton's Death" is a strong and demanding piece of theater. It will take a brave theater-goer to attempt it, and an astute theater-goer to remark on it. Take a friend, go see "Danton's Death," and then go have coffee and talk about it. This show deserves an audience; it deserves discussion.

Fine Dining and Light Jazz at The Blue Water Grill

For an afternoon or evening of relaxing dining, try Blue Water Grill at 2181 Richmond at Greenbriar.

Recently I had the opportunity to sneak into Blue Water during their peak lunch rush on a Friday and had quite a pleasant surprise. To begin, there is plenty of parking available in the newly refurbished Shepherd Plaza and the restaurant is a quick trip down Richmond or exit Highway 59 South at the Shepherd exit. The location is easy to find.

The hostess and waitstaff were remarkably friendly and attentive and I was seated right away. There are plenty of tables, spaced at comfortable distances, so as not to infringe on fellow diners and provide a clear walk space for the waiters. For a more romantic feel, ask for a booth. There are several and they are also quite comfortable. The decor is very soothing to the eye, in a turquoise blue and salmon scheme with blonde wood and glass brick walls that let in just enough light without large distracting windows. There is currently a collection of primitive impressionist art by Jeri Moore that lends an almost Caribbean flavor on display. The music was nice with selections that range from Enya, and Streisand to light jazz and is kept at a low enough level to be enjoyed, but not loud enough to make the diners shout above it.

Attire for the most part would be considered casual, but there were quite a few business people in suits for lunch.

The staff also managed to juggle a birthday party for seven, and a young family with child and there were no incidents.

The menu is full of delectable items from which to choose and I had a hard time with my decisions. For starters, I tried the Artichoke bottoms, topped with sauteed shrimp and calamari served in a burre blanc sauce. The portions were overly generous and the seafood was tender. There was lots of garlic in this one. This appetizer could easily be split between two to three people.

The meal came with the Blue Water's "signature" Caesar salad which was

crisp and flavorful and bread was also served.

I chose one of the daily specials for an entree; broiled flounder with pineapple salsa, served over a bed of saffron rice with fresh spinach that was sauteed in olive oil and garlic. The fish was delicate and the salsa slightly picant and very tasty. Once again the portions were generous and I could only eat half of what was offered.

The menu is full of items with rich, unusual flavors and health conscious choices of olive oil, light sauces, and fresh vegetables. And owner/chef

George Phou does an excellent job in menu selection and preparation for his "East meets Southwest" style. Chef Phou is also the owner of the Fu's Garden Restaurants on University Boulevard and on San Felipe.

For those of you with a beer bottle pocket and champagne taste like myself the Blue Water Grill offers their "Early Bird Special." These are five different entrees served daily from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. all with a Caesar salad and none are over \$8.00. The choices include pasta, seafood, or chicken.

There is also a large bar, separate from the main dining area that offers lots of room for waiting for you table during a rush or seating for cocktails before the theater if that's your forte. Paul English provides live jazz Thursday through Saturday nights from 8:30 to midnight and also on Wednesdays beginning Nov. 4th.

The Blue Water Grill's hours are Monday through Thursday 11:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., Friday 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m., Saturday 5:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. and Sunday 5:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. Prices are moderate and definitely fair. Service with the special touches is excellent and friendly. Atmosphere is relaxing and cool. Music light like the food.

I highly recommend to you The Blue Water Grill and if you have room try the Blue Water Crab meat and Corn Chowder which is served with blue cheese and bacon by the bowl or cup. It's a specialty! Thanks to manager, Craig Anderson and my waiter, Saul, for a very delicious enjoyable lunch.

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

The story behind Tennessee Williams New Orleans Literary Festival

New Orleans was said by Tennessee Williams to be his "only true spiritual home." Through his life, it was the only city where he ever owned a home. Since 1987, a group lead by local television producer Peggy Scott Laborde has honored Williams with a namesake literary festival held annually in his "spiritual home."

Julia Burka, Executive Director of the festival took umbrage with an assertion in this column (July 31/August 6, 1992) that Williams' gayness was down played at the festival. In a recent conversation she said, "We do not intentionally avoid the subject. It has come up repeatedly from the beginning of the festival, usually in the 'I Remember Tennessee Panel.'"

The panel is made up of people who worked with Williams professionally or knew him personally. "Last year there was his brother Dakin and a childhood friend named Esmeralda Hayes." Burka said this year's panel is still being organized.

"That panel is not put together specifically to talk about his homosexuality," Burka said. "It's put together to get information from people who actually knew him. Anyone who was a friend of his knew about his personal life as well as his professional life. We would be insane to say, 'Be sure you don't mention that he was a homosexual.' Such a thing never occurred to us."

"Williams often referred to what he called his 'duality.' I think he lived in a

different era than we live in now. Perhaps, if he were alive today, he would be, well, who knows what his attitude would be. Perhaps it would be more militant."

Perhaps. In 1988, when Williams was nearing his seventieth birthday, he told Eric Paulson in a Laborde produced television interview, "I think that duality of gender is very useful to a writer, he can write books from a male point of view, or from a female point of view, or in between." Indeed, an attitude of another time.

The difference seems to be one of recognizing Williams' homosexuality as existing and recognizing his homosexuality as a major ingredient of his self and how it influenced his creativity. In other words, he was neither a straight man nor a women. He was a gay man, and it shows in his work. His gayness may well have been what gave Williams the fresh point of view that helped others see anew their own situation.

Again Burka,, "Last year, Edward

Albee,, also a gay playwright, was invited to be the keynote speaker. He talked, about what you were writing about, how Tennessee Williams was writing about his personal (gay) life.

"Albee said he gave an interview in the New York Times in 1991, in which he

said, "Tennessee Williams knew the difference between men and women as well as I do. If you are writing about men, you are writing about men. If you are writing about women, you are writing about women." He did not think Williams was writing about his private, sexual life in all cases.

"Who knows whether he was or wasn't. All I'm telling you is that there are different views on it and we try to expose all views. We do not carry the banner of any one set of

beliefs. We don't have any point to prove other than intellectual honesty and literary criticism. We don't censure anybody."

Peggy Scott Laborde said of the controversy, "If anyone in the lesbian/gay community has had any kind of concern

that the festival has tried to hide Williams' gayness their concern is unfounded. It has come out numerous times over the past seven years what his sexual preferences were. We don't have a problem with that, we admire the man as a playwright."

New Orleans based playwright Frank Aqueno offered this observation,, "When I attended my first Tennessee Williams Festival, I was appalled to find there was not a mention of his sexual preference in any of the literature, press, or programs of the festival. After attending several events I thought of having a T-shirt made saying, 'Tennessee was Queer!'"

"My concern is when I hear people say we did this play and we had that panel discussion that mentioned the fact he was gay, I'm concerned people should understand his gayness is key to his work. It is in the forefront of things one would need to know to understand and to appreciate his work fully."

It is very clear in everyone's mind that Tennessee Williams is a Southern writer. It should be equally clear that he is a writer who came to what he created from the perspective of being gay. How could it be otherwise?

The 1993 festival is holding a play writing competition with a \$1,000 cash prize and a staged reading of the winning effort. Plays to be considered should be under one hour. More than one entry may be submitted but a \$15 fee must accompany each entry. 

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


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

It feels great to have your prediction come true! Now, the hard work begins. The national gay community has an unprecedented opportunity to do a one-time correction toward our national goals. Our leadership, both local, statewide and national must take immediate steps in order to take advantage of President Elect Clinton's victory of Tuesday.

Over the past twelve years we've proven to be our own worse enemy. The frustrations during the Reagan and Bush administrations, exacerbated by the years of the AIDS crises, caused the creation of groups such as ACT-UP and QUEER NATION. the 90's will desire. "We'll give the automobile consumer the same things we'd like from our doctors—compassion from someone who listens and cares, and at an affordable price," says Weismann-McClain. Repairs will even be broken down into a priority list, if the customer is unable to afford everything at the same time. Other plans include free diagnostic services for used car buyers and training classes covering simple car maintenance. Within two years the owners also hope to provide self service bays, where customers can make their own repairs using rented tools—under the instruction of an on-site mechanic.



New study: AIDS-related brain damage linked to leaky blood vessels

ANAHEIM, Calif., Wednesday, Oct. 28 (AP)—Brain damage in many AIDS patients may be caused and worsened by leaky blood vessels in the brain, a new study suggests.

The leakage itself may be an important cause of some of the brain changes seen in AIDS patients, but it also may help blood-borne nerve toxins, the AIDS virus and other disease-causing organisms reach brain tissue, said Dr. Carol Petito of the University of Miami.

While working at Cornell University Medical Center in New York, Petito and colleagues studied brain samples from 33 deceased AIDS patients and from 22 people who died of other causes.

In more than half the AIDS patients, brain tissue showed evidence of blood

vessel leaking in the nerve-rich white matter of the brain, signs of a breakdown of the "blood-brain barrier" that normally prevents substances in the bloodstream from entering the brain.

The research, to be published in an upcoming issue of the Annals of Neurology, was released Wednesday during the annual meeting of the Society for Neuroscience. It was one of several studies presented on AIDS-related brain and nervous system damage.

Neurological symptoms ultimately affect two-thirds of adults and 80 percent of children infected by HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. Such symptoms can be subtle at first, including difficulty in concentration and memory. Speech, thinking and movement skills eventually slow.

In patients who survive infections earlier during the course of AIDS, the brain damage "can progress to a full-blown dementia which ... can leave the patient in a complete vegetative state," said Dr. Clayton Wiley, of the University of California, San Diego.

Wiley found that when AIDS directly infects the central nervous system, there is significant thinning of the brain's neocortex, the mostly highly evolved part of the cerebral cortex, which is the brain's region of conscious thought, movement and sensation.

Dr. Stuart Lipton at Harvard Medical School said drugs called "calcium channel antagonists" are being tested in patients suffering AIDS dementia. He recently showed that two such drugs—

memantine, an anti-Parkinson's disease drug, and nitroglycerine, used by heart patients—can prevent nerve-cell damage in animals with AIDS-like nervous system disorders.

In another experiment, scientists are developing a way to transfer genetic information from herpes simplex viruses into AIDS-induced brain tumors in an attempt to make the tumors vulnerable to an anti-herpes drug.

So far, the method has been used to kill rat brain tumor cells in test tubes, according to neurologist Doros Platika and colleague at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York. His next step is to test the method in mice that suffer an AIDS-like condition because their immune systems have been suppressed.



Lesbian's appointment taken to Presbyterian Church's highest authority

IRVING, Texas, Friday, Oct. 30 (AP)—The Presbyterian Church (USA) cannot be true to its own moral standards and allow a Rochester, N.Y., church to select an avowed lesbian as pastor, the denomination's national ruling body was told Friday.

"We are talking about conduct that is at conflict with the moral principles of the church," attorney Julius Poppinga of Newark, N.J., said.

The controversy surrounding the Rev. Jane Spahr was one of six appeals before the Permanent Judicial Commission of the General Assembly, meeting Friday and Saturday at a hotel near Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport.

Friday's hearing was forced by the protests of a group of upstate New York

churches, outraged at Spahr's appointment as a pastor of the Downtown United Presbyterian Church in Rochester.

In a 1978 policy statement, the General Assembly declared homosexuality "incompatible with Christian faith and life" and barred "self-affirming practicing homosexuals from being ordained as ministers in the Presbyterian Church."

The commission heard testimony for 75 minutes on the Spahr case. A church spokesperson said the commission will announce its decision on Wednesday from church headquarters in Louisville, Ky.

The Rochester church chose Spahr last November, and the Genesee Valley Presbytery, which includes the Rochester church, voted twice to approve her appointment. But appeals by 10 of the

presbytery's 75 churches have blocked her from assuming her duties.

In the meantime, Spahr has continued working at a special ministry serving homosexuals and people with AIDS in San Anselmo, Calif.

Spahr attended Friday's hearing, but did not testify. She sat in the front row beside her partner, with whom she lives in San Rafael, Calif.

On July 30, a regional judicial panel ruled 9-1 to uphold the church's call, finding that the Genesee Valley Presbytery "acted within constitutional limits" in approving the church's call to Spahr.

The regional commission ruled that the general assembly's 1978 declaration that homosexuality is "incompatible with Christian faith and life" did not apply to Spahr, who was ordained in 1974. She did not publicly acknowledge

her homosexuality until after 1978.

James C. Moore, a Rochester attorney representing Spahr and the Rochester church, said nothing in the church's 1978 policy statement "remotely hints or says that sexual orientation is to be a factor in the calling of a minister or any other church officer."

The 1978 statement only prohibited the future ordination of an avowed homosexual, Moore said.

Poppinga disagreed, saying the church's 1978 statement "was an amnesty of past conduct, but it certainly was not a license for a pre-ordained minister to begin such activity or to continue in it."

To allow someone already ordained to engage in conduct that would prohibit someone else from being ordained is clearly an impermissible double standard, Poppinga argued.

Bomb threat forces Kentucky bed-and-breakfast resort for gays to close

RUSSELLVILLE, Ky., Saturday, Oct. 31 (AP)—A bomb threat linked with the disappearance of dynamite temporarily shut down a bed-and-breakfast for gays and lesbians that has attracted controversy in this southern Kentucky community.

The Logan County sheriff's office was notified by Louisville police Thursday that 20 to 25 sticks of dynamite were stolen from the Louisville area and the bed-and-breakfast was the target of a bomb threat for Halloween night, Jim Turner, a co-proprietor of the resort, said Saturday.

No explosive devices were found on the property but a deputy sheriff was posted near the house, which was closed to guests Friday, said Turner, who operates the resort with his companion, Jimmy Cates.

"It's been kind of quiet," Turner said. "But it's a terribly grave situation. You don't know what to do. The sheriff told me he had to take it seriously. If they are going to take it seriously, I guess we should, too."

Turner said he assumed Louisville police uncovered the bomb threat through "some type of intelligence, but

I'm not sure how."

A Louisville police spokesperson would not comment on the case.

Turner said the sheriff's office recommended they close the house and leave temporarily. They canceled reservations from three couples for the weekend, but Turner said he and Cates decided to remain at the house.

"I don't want to give in to them and it's my house," Turner said. "I have no where else to go. It's like the captain going down with the ship."

Since the couple turned their hilltop chateau on 10 wooded acres into a bed-

and-breakfast, they have been the subject of sermons, harassment, prayers and death threats. Gay-bashing graffiti has been spray-painted on asphalt outside the house and effigies have been hanged from the oaks and maples along the private road leading to the resort.

This was the first bomb threat since it opened Oct. 16, Turner said.

The couple had previously hired several armed security guards, who remained at the house this weekend, Turner said.

They hope to reopen the resort early next week, he said.

Bill Clinton rejects legal and tax benefits for homosexual marriage

LITTLE ROCK, Monday, Oct. 26 (AP)—Bill Clinton does not believe homosexual couples should have the same legal and tax benefits as heterosexual couples, his campaign says.

The Clinton-Gore '92 Presidential Committee had been asked whether

Clinton's support for civil rights for gays included giving homosexual marriages the same legal status as heterosexual marriages, including the right to file joint tax returns and adopt children.

The Democratic presidential nominee "does not believe that same-sex couples

should have the right to marry and enjoy the same legal and tax benefits as heterosexual couples," said the statement, issued Sunday.

Clinton's support for "a civil rights bill for gays," is coupled with a pledge that it would provide "exemptions for religious organizations" and would set

"clear evidentiary standards" for use in court.

He also has said he would repeal the ban on gays and lesbians in the military or foreign service and would prohibit "discrimination in federal employment, federal contracts, and government services."

Health officials: Up to 101 medical workers have gotten HIV on-the-job

ATLANTA, Friday, Oct. 30 (AP)—On-the-job accidents may have infected 101 lab technicians, nurses and other health care workers in the United States with the AIDS virus, health officials say.

Only 32 of the cases have been traced to a specific incident, but 69 others are suspected. And there may be more cases because many health care workers aren't tested for the virus.

"We can't say what the degree of under-reporting is," said Carol Ciesielski, a medical epidemiologist for the

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. "We need more information."

The CDC counts the number of health care workers infected with HIV, the virus that causes AIDS, in order to document how it is transmitted in the industry.

By Sept. 30, the Atlanta-based agency had found 32 workers infected on the job since the start of the AIDS epidemic.

Twenty-seven were infected when they were pricked by a needle or cut by a scalpel that had been used on an HIV-infected patient.

Four were infected by the blood,

mucus or damaged tissue of an infected patient. One had both kinds of exposure.

Seven of the workers, or 22 percent, have developed AIDS.

The CDC suspects another 69 HIV-infected workers got the virus on the job because they reported no other known risks.

Yet only four of those said they were exposed to blood or lab specimens from HIV-infected patients. Fifty-four have developed AIDS.

"This survey doesn't show us the risk of infection for health care workers," Ms. Ciesielski said. "But it helps us identify

the circumstances of occupational transmission. ... When we learn where people are becoming exposed, we can issue guidelines to prevent further occurrences."

Although federal regulations require health care workers to be tested after exposure to HIV, not all are tested, she said. And others don't want their test results forwarded to the CDC for study. Also Thursday, the CDC released a survey that showed very few workers who care for or research sick primates become infected with the monkey strain of the AIDS virus.

Cornell University president condemns anti-gay graffiti on campus

ITHACA, N.Y., Tuesday, Oct. 27 (AP)—Cornell's president has condemned the scrawling of anti-homosexual graffiti on walls and footpaths on campus.

"Members of the gay, lesbian and bisexual communities should feel as free of personal intimidation as any other member of the university community," Frank Rhodes

said in a statement. "Violence and the threat of violence ... have no place at Cornell."

The graffiti first appeared last Tuesday, during a week of activities sponsored by Cornell's gay community. Some of the chalked statements apparently were in response to pro-gay messages chalked on

campus in connection with the weeklong event.

The statements included messages such as "Have you killed your fag today?" and "God didn't create queers," according to the university's public safety department.

On Friday, members of the gay community demanded that Rhodes respond to the

chalkings and that university take other actions to demonstrate its opposition.

Rhodes said the university already has programs in place to deal with homophobia. The administration will review those programs with any concerned students or staff and consider their suggestions, he said.

French doctor in AIDS scandal jailed, but maintains he is innocent

PARIS, Wednesday, Oct. 28 (AP)—The former director of France's blood bank, who returned Wednesday to be jailed for his part in an AIDS scandal, denied responsibility for poisoning of hundreds of hemophiliacs with AIDS-tainted blood.

Dr. Michel Garretta was whisked away by police from Charles de Gaulle Airport after arriving from Boston, where he had worked for a medical equipment firm, to face a four-year prison sentence.

He was taken under escort to La Sante prison in southern Paris.

Garretta told the Agence France Presse news agency on his flight home that he "absolutely refuses to assume the collective responsibility for contaminating hemophiliacs, which is a rumor and a lie."

This echoed the complaints of AIDS activists and the families of hemophiliacs, who consider Garretta a scapegoat and say top government officials were responsible.

Garretta, head of the National Center for Blood Transfusions in 1985 when the infected blood was supplied to hemophiliacs, said he willingly returned to France to face justice.

"I wasn't running away, I never thought of avoiding the judicial system of my country," Garretta told AFP. "I feel at the same time deep injustice and total disgust."

Before leaving Boston, Garretta said told reporters that the tragedy was the "collective fault of the system."

"The decisions I made were always in the open and were always made with other people," he said. "To pick out one single person, or four people as in the

trial, when there were dozens, even hundreds involved, flies in the face of justice."

Garretta was one of four former health officials tried for their roles in allowing the transfusions with contaminated blood to take place. Some 1200 hemophiliacs were infected with HIV, the virus that causes acquired immune deficiency syndrome. Nearly 300 have died.

Two other people also were convicted last Friday, but the court deemed Garretta, who received the maximum sentence, "uncontestably the inspirer and director" of the policy.

Edmond-Luc Henry, a member of the French Association of Hemophiliacs, said he was angered that Garretta took five days to return to France after his sentencing last Friday.

"I feel like I'm hallucinating," he said.

"It reminds me of what's happening in Colombia when the government was talking with (drug lord) Pablo Escobar, begging him to come back to prison."

Garretta's lawyers said they were uncertain whether he would appeal the guilty verdict, which also carried a \$100,000 fine. An appeal would risk a harsher sentence on more serious charges.

Garretta was convicted of "deception in the basic qualities of a product," for which he got the maximum sentence. By failing to import expensive specially treated blood stocks, he was deemed responsible for putting commercial incentives before human lives.

Garretta has maintained that he was acting on orders from Cabinet officials, none of whom were tried.

He has received numerous death threats, both in France and the United States.

AIDS activists welcome proposed new AIDS definition by CDC in Atlanta

ATLANTA, Wednesday, Oct. 28 (AP)—Activists welcomed a proposed new definition of AIDS that adds three illnesses they say signal the disease in women and drug abusers.

The Centers for Disease Control on

Tuesday proposed adding pulmonary tuberculosis, recurrent pneumonia and invasive cervical cancer to the list of diseases that indicate AIDS has developed in people infected with the virus.

Dr. John Ward, acting chief of surveillance in the CDC's AIDS division, said 50,000 new AIDS cases are expected

next year under the current definition, and the three new diseases would bring in several thousand more.

The new definition could make it easier for people infected with the virus to collect disability benefits available to those diagnosed with AIDS. It would also enable them to take part in drug trials and qualify for low-cost AIDS drugs.

"It's not enough but it's definitely a step in the right direction," said Tracy Cedar of the National Association of People With AIDS. She is infected with the virus and has cervical cancer but hasn't been diagnosed with AIDS.

"We just need more awareness from gynecologists that a person doesn't have to be gay or a white man or from a poor African-American community to have AIDS," said Tricia Grindel of AID Atlanta.

The CDC will take public comment on

the proposal until Nov. 16, but barring unusual developments the definition is expected to go into effect Jan. 1.


Currently, people infected with the AIDS virus are diagnosed with AIDS when they develop any of 23 indicator diseases, such as Kaposi's sarcoma, a type of cancer found mostly in men, and a certain type of pneumonia.

More than 1 million Americans are thought to be infected with the virus. More than 230,000—under the current definition—have developed AIDS, and about 152,000 have died.

The CDC last year proposed revising the definition of AIDS to include infected people whose level of the body's master immune cells, called CD4s, dips to 200 per cubic millimeter, or one-fifth the level of a healthy person.





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

U.S. Navy sailor to be discharged after announcing he is homosexual

BREMERTON, Wash., Saturday, Oct. 31 (AP)—A 21-year-old enlisted man has become the second sailor at the Naval Submarine Base Bangor in recent weeks to face discharge from the military after announcing he is gay.

Seaman Apprentice Frederick W. Seltzer Jr., a journalist at the base's public affairs office, told Navy officials this week that he is homosexual.

U.S. military policy forbids gay men and lesbians from serving in the armed forces. An administrative board hear-

ing has been scheduled for next month to discharge Seltzer.

"I do not want to leave the Navy," he said. "It has been everything to me. I'd like to stay in and serve my country."

Seltzer said he was engaged to be married at the time he joined the Navy, in Feb. 1991. But the engagement fell apart and he realized he was gay when he recently became involved with a man.

Seltzer said he could not be in the Navy and keep his sexual orientation a

secret.

"By hiding this, I'd be lying, not only to myself but to the service," Seltzer said. "I'm a person that can't deal with lies."

Seltzer's co-workers at the Hood Canal naval base praised his job performance. Lt. Cmdr. Scott Wilson said Seltzer is being processed for discharge only because he declared he is gay.

Seltzer is the second sailor in two months to announce his homosexuality at the submarine base.

Robert E. Matt, a radioman second

class aboard the Trident submarine USS Alabama, came forward in late September. Matt is also being processed for discharge.

Seltzer said he believes the Pentagon's ban on gays and lesbians is a double standard since the military does not allow other types of discrimination.

Allowing gays in the military would not affect morale, Seltzer said, as long as rules against fraternization between gays were enforced as they are between heterosexuals.

Adopt-a-Highway signs of Virginia homosexual group vandalized

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va., Wednesday, Oct. 28 (AP)—A homosexual group will have to pay to have its vandalized Adopt-a-Highway signs replaced, a state transportation official said.

Vandals have been defacing signs noting that the Hampton Roads Lesbian and Gay Pride Coalition has volunteered to clean a section of Interstate 64, the Virginia Department of Transportation said. The signs run in front of the Christian Broadcasting Network headquarters in Virginia Beach.

Two blue signs were erected in May to

show the homosexual group has adopted I-64 East between Indian River Road and Greenbrier Parkway.

The Adopt-a-Highway signs had been up only a short time when somebody used spray paint to obliterate the coalition's name, said Deborah Kallgren, the transportation department's Suffolk District spokesperson.

After several incidents, the department decided earlier this month that replacing the signs was getting too expensive, Ms. Kallgren said.

"We can't keep sending taxpayers'

money to replace vandalized signs," she said.

"This business of us having to shell out \$150 in order to clean up the highway is pretty upsetting," said Patrick Heck, a coalition spokesperson.

Members of the coalition said the group joined the volunteer cleanup program to protest opposition to homosexuality by religious broadcaster Pat Robertson and his network.

CBN does not endorse vandalism or any violence against groups, CBN spokesperson Gene Kapp said.

"Certainly we deplore any kind of vandalism and any kind of violence that would be used in that fashion," Kapp said. "We have nothing to do with it. We're not responsible for it."

The transportation department has offered the coalition, which represents 15 groups, other options for participation, such as using the group's initials on the sign or moving to a less controversial highway section, Heck said.

"But the Pride Coalition voted to stay there, realizing that we'd have to pay to replace the sign," Heck said.
