

JOHN SHEEHAN, FORMER HOUSTON REFINER,  
NAMED TO HEAD OFFICE EXPANSION POST

P. J. Merkus, Vice President, Manufacturing, announced the establishment of a third General Manager's position in the Manufacturing Organization to be called General Manager, Refinery Expansion.

J. W. Sheehan, Manager, Martinez Refinery, has been appointed to the new position effective July 1, 1967. A successor to Sheehan will be announced at a later date.

Merkus said continuing extensive plans for refinery expansion and modernization over the next several years had given increasing need for closer supervision and coordination of the effort of the Manufacturing Technological and Engineering Departments than could be provided through the present organization.

John Sheehan, who holds B.S. and M.S. degrees in Chemical Engineering from Texas Technological College and a Ph.D. in Chemical Engineering from the University of Texas, joined Shell as a Senior Technologist.







gist in 1947 at the Houston Refinery. He became Assistant Manager of the Gas Department in 1952 and moved to Head Office Manufacturing Technological Department in 1954, as a Senior Technologist. In 1956 he was named Chief Technologist at Wood River Refinery and two years later he was appointed Refinery Superintendent at Norco Refinery. He returned to Wood River in 1962 as Refinery Superintendent and in March, 1964, was named Refinery Manager of the Odessa and Ciniza Refineries. He became Refinery Manager at Martinez in December of 1964.

Under the new organization, Manufacturing Technological and Manufacturing Engineering will report to the General Manager, Refinery Expansion. Previously, these departments came under the General Manager, Technical Departments. The title of this position, held by G. A. Lorenz, now becomes General Manager Research and Development. Lorenz continues to head Research activities, and the Products Application Department.

The title of General Manager Refineries remains unchanged. H. E. Walker, who was appointed to this position April 1, 1967, will continue to oversee the Scheduling and Operation of Refineries.

ADD A LACE CAGE TO YOUR TRAVEL WARDROBE



#### WHEN YOU VISIT A TEXAS STATE PARK YOU SHOULD ADHERE TO THEIR RULES

As a service to Refiners who visit the Texas State Parks the following rules are published to keep them from getting into trouble with the Park Rangers.

Record 1967 park attendance rate indicates, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, that the millions of fun seekers will need to mind their "Emily Post manners" this year.

The official regulations do not cover snorers or sleep walkers that are accepted as inevitable in the best of regulated nocturnal areas, but there are some rigid rules designed to keep the patrons compatible and contented. For example:

1. Firearms or fireworks may not be displayed or used at any time. Hunting in state parks likewise is strictly forbidden.
2. Pets permitted on leash only.
3. Speed limits generally are 20 MPH, with travel exclusively on designated routes and only authorized traffic permitted after 10 p.m.
4. No intoxicating liquor or beverages may be sold or publicly consumed within state park boundaries.
5. Loud unnecessary noises are forbidden.
6. No wild flowers, trees or shrubs shall be picked, cut, broken or otherwise mutilated.
7. Minors will not be permitted to register or stay overnight in a park, unless chaperoned and accompanied by adults.
8. Radios, recorded music and musical instruments will not be played after 10 p.m. beyond the concession building or connecting patio.
9. Camping and shelter occupancy will be for a 14-day limit between May 1 and September 15.
10. Overnight camping (including shelters) will be by permit only and at the site or location approved or assigned by the Park Ranger.
