### LAGPAC-endorsed slate achieves near sweep in Louisiana election

All Louisiana Lesbian and Gay Political Action Caucus endorsed candidates in statewide races won election in the Nov. 16 runoff. Those candidates were: Edwin Edwards, governor; Melinda Schwegmann, lieutenant governor; Richard Ieyoub, attorney general; Jim Brown, commissioner of insurance.

In local races within the New Orleans municipal area, LAGPAC had also endorsed two winners, Suzanne Mayfield Krieger, state representative, Dist. 76, and Ed Murray, state representative, Dist. 96.

The two candidates who received LAGPAC endorsements and lost their races were both outside the metropolitan area. They were: Velma Calais-Rogers, state representative, Dist. 54 and Sandy Ashby, state representative, Dist. 66.

LAGPAC co-chair Jim Wiltberger said of the good win ratio, "Our participation is significant, mainstream politicians are getting to where they recognize the power of the lesbian-gay vote." Wiltberger added, "Marc Morial, state senator-elect, credited LAGPAC with helping him win his seat.

Gay/lesbian leaders say the influence of the community vote is clearly evidenced in results of several races in last Saturday's election.

#### —Duke buried

Exactly one minute after the polls closed in Louisiana, national television's big three networks started announcing Edwin Edwards had defeated David Duke in the most contentious campaign since New Orleanians fought each other in The Battle of Liberty Place during the post-Civil War occupation. In both battles the issue was highly charged with racial bigotry.

Edwards, viewed by many as a willing heir to a heritage of corrupt Louisiana politics, nonetheless extracted a record vote from an electorate even more disturbed by David Duke and his pro-fascist activities beginning in youth and repackaged, many felt, to make his ideas more marketable.

Duke went down clutching 671,395 votes or 39 percent of the total. He was buried beneath Edwards' 1,055,366 votes (61 percent), the largest tally of votes ever collected by any candidate in Louisiana history.

### Maxey roast raises \$3,000 for Lesbian-Gay Rights Lobby

On Saturday, Nov. 16, the Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby of Texas hosted a roast and toast of State Rep. Glen Maxey. This event was held in Austin at Saengurrunde Hall and raised approximately \$3,000 for LGRL. Over 200 people attended the event.

Molly Ivins was the mistress of ceremonies and dignitaries included former Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower and State Rep. Elliot Naishtat. Hightower presented the "chronically underpaid" Maxey with a sign reading "Will legislate for food." Hightower quipped that he had seen Maxey holding the sign on a street corner in the heart of Dist. 51, Maxey's legislative district. He also stated that Maxey was the first

person in the history of the state to run for state representative because he needed the money. (State representatives make about \$600 a month).

Naishtat read a letter, allegedly written by Speaker Gib Lewis imploring Glen to not "be mean" and call for the record votes on the house floor. During the legislative session, Maxey became the nemesis of the powerful speaker by questioning the Speaker's ethics and demanded record votes on politically explosive issues.

Maxey was also roasted on a variety of other, more personal issues such as his notoriously bad driving and questionable taste in clothing.

LGRL board member Peter Brooks, a close friend of Maxey, suggested that because of Maxey's lack of fashion sense, the gay community should demand a hypothalamus measurement to make certain that the state's first openly gay representative is in fact gay.

LGRL plans to make the roast an annual event focusing on a different high profile person every year.

"The most important thing about the roast," stated Laurie Eiserloh, executive director of LGRL, "is that it is statewide, affordable and all of the money benefits the Texas gay and lesbian community directly. I think everyone had a terrific time and we plan to do it again next year."

### Many diverse workshops planned for 'ICOGLEAO' conference

The roles of the many and diverse players in the gay and lesbian political picture—a topic of hot debate locally in recent weeks—will be addressed in a diverse schedule of workshops planned for the International Conference of Gay and Lesbian Elected and Appointed Officials. The conference takes place this weekend (Nov. 22-24) at the Stouffer Presidente—Greenway Plaza Hotel. The host organization for the conference this year is the Houston Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus.

The conference, which in previous locations has hosted 200-300 elected and appointed officials, their staff and significant others, candidates, lobbyists, PAC organizers and others, this year also will include work groups for gay/lesbian political and direct action organizations. Also planned are workshops on major issues of concern to the gay and lesbian community, and on subjects directly relating to electing gay people to public office.

The 1991 ICOGLEAO is the seventh

such convention to be held in the United States and the first to be held in the South. Houston, as host city, and HGLPC as conference organizers, will entertain openly gay and lesbian city, county and state officials, members of Congress, and appointees to various governmental boards and commissions. Texas first openly gay elected official, State Rep. Glen Maxey of Austin, and Bill Scott, recently appointed by Gov. Ann Richards to the Texas Board of Health, are scheduled to speak during the conference.

Conference workshop topics include the following:

"The Texas Connection: Gay and Lesbian Politics in Texas." This panel will examine such issues as working a predominantly rural legislature; getting candidates elected; the Voting Rights Act and the gay and lesbian community; and "Where do we go from here?" The panel includes State Rep. Glen Maxey and local activists Ray Hill and Rob Bridges; the discussion will be moderated by Lori Eiserloh, executive director of the Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby of Texas.

"AIDS and the Law," a discussion with

lawyers and others of the following issues: (1) testing of patients; (2) testing of health care workers; (3) insurance; (4) discrimination in the work place. The panel includes local attorneys John Paul Barnich, Mary Ann Bobinski and Donald Skipwith; moderated by Chris Bacon, attorney and board chair of HGLPC.

"Building Bridges: Gender, Race and Party Affiliation in Gay Politics," an open discussion of how race, gender and party affiliation affect gay and lesbian politics. (Questions to be addressed in this discussion: Is there a gender gap? Are people of color under-represented in the gay and lesbian political structure? Is there a future for gays and lesbians in the Republican Party?)

"Getting Elected." This discussion will cover issues concerning getting gay and lesbian candidates elected, including raising money, making the "party scene," developing platform issues and working with the media. The panel includes Eric Rosenthal of the Human Rights Campaign Fund, Michael Krause, Annise Parker and Tom Duane. The moderator is San Francisco City Supervisor Carol

Migden.

"The 1992 Presidential Elections: An Open Discussion." The title of this workshop is self-explanatory. The discussion will cover how to ensure a gay/lesbian voice in the nominating process; how to get the major parties to focus on gay and lesbian issues, and what is known about the announced candidates stand on those issues. Facilitators: Mark Wallem, Suzanne Kraus.

"Dollars and Sense—Understanding HIV Funding Issues," a review of current trends in HIV funding and suggestions to HIV service communities on how to maximize funding. (Speaker: Harry Livesay).

HGLPC will also be holding its annual banquet this Saturday as a part of the ICOGLEAO schedule. The caucus' Sixteenth Anniversary Dinner (also the official conference dinner) will begin at 8:00 p.m. at the Stouffer Presidente. The featured speaker is Bill Scott, recent appointee to the state health board.

Recognition of gay bashing has won a new convert, one who richly deserves acknowledgement. A.M. (Abe) Rosenthal managed *The New York Times* for years and was directly responsible for that vaulted institution of "all the news fit to print" refusing to even print the word "gay," preferring the more clinical and cumbersome "homosexual," unless, of course, in a direct quote. After Rosenthal booted himself up to semi-retirement as a columnist, *The Times* slowly relented, allowing "gay" in headlines and then, finally, its use within a story.

And finally, last Friday, Abe Rosenthal, recognized as one of the foremost journalistic defenders of the First Amendment, finally wrote a column on gay-bashing—and a good one. Going directly to the point Rosenthal noted: "Harassment and assault of gays and lesbians is an illness in our society. What will it take to recognize it and try to treat it by legal medicine?"

And further, going to the issue of AIDS, Rosenthal added: "Sometimes I hear it said that harassment of gays is growing because many gay men have AIDS—a piece of mealy rationalization ... the AIDS epidemic provides the excuse for gangs that like to beat up people to roam the streets looking for gays."

Rosenthal then gives full credit to a recent issue of *The Advocate* for "the only good journalistic job I have seen on gay-bashing as a national disgrace." Quoting a Houston policeman working undercover, "You see what they go through on the streets out there, just for being who they are." Rosenthal concludes that "for all Americans to learn that, we may have to wait until some famous and admired American is shown on TV, beaten to a pulp but with enough strength to raise his head, smile and say with the charm and courage required of victims: 'This happened because I am gay.'"

Perhaps, Mr. Rosenthal, what might also help would be better newspaper coverage of gay-bashing—something for which *The Times* is not noted. Fortunately, in the same issue as his column, *The Times* gave prominent coverage to a gay-bashing murder trial in New York. But where have they been all these years? And even Rosenthal, in this self-same article, cannot avoid getting in a few licks at gay activist groups for "extremism," particularly the now so-called infamous penetration at St. Patrick's. One can only wonder where were Rosenthal and *The Times* while Cardinal O'Connor repeatedly condemned the gay and lesbian community while ignoring the bashing of that community.

But we mustn't bite the liberal hand belatedly extended. We welcome Rosenthal's conversion. His eloquent voice in "the paper of record" can only add to the rising demands for gay and lesbian justice. That he has finally recognized the parallels of his well-intentioned and well grounded faith in the First Amendment.

But as *The Times* coverage of the New York case and our own knowledge of the Broussard case here in Houston illustrate, it often takes gay and lesbian activists seizing the streets to gain acknowledgment of hate crimes. The very groups Rosenthal would exclude from his endorsement are essential to the process as it now exists. But Rosenthal is coming along, maybe in another 10 or 20 years he'll even recognize this obvious fact. At least he shows there is hope among the liberals, if not that vast majority of others, that gay bashing does occur.

The early projected win for Edwards was a stunning climax to the anxiety that built throughout the state during the campaign. Most people were expecting a long night similar to the wait for conclusive returns following the primary balloting. Those slow returns tossed the incumbent, reformer Buddy Roemer, out of the race and office after only one term.

The field was left to Duke, past leader of the Ku Klux Klan and one time self-avowed Nazi sympathizer, pitted against Edwin Edwards, thrice the state's governor and twice tried by federal prosecutors, though never convicted. Edwards' election to an unprecedented fourth term broke his own record of three terms as governor.

Edwards led the full slate of Democratic hopefuls to success, except for the tight race for Secretary of State, where incumbent Fox McKeithen defeated Democrat Doug Schmidt 824,670 to 813,261.

A week before the elections, gay/lesbian groups helped a pro-civil rights coalition

stage a raucous anti-Duke protest in New Orleans, and LAGPAC had mailed a sternly worded letter, warning against Duke and what he represents, along with its endorsements and sample ballot.

## —Schwegmann trounces gay-baiting opponent

Melinda Schwegmann, Democratic Challenger, racked up 1,005,754 or 58 percent of the votes over incumbent Republican Paul Hardy's 719,658 or 42 percent to win Louisiana's second highest office. Schwegmann, a resident of New Orleans will be the state's first female lieutenant governor.

Hardy's bid to retain his job turned recklessly offensive in the final two days of the campaign. Hardy aired television ads proclaiming Schwegmann a radical feminist endorsed by N.O.W. (National Organization for Women). In the ads, a Hardy spokesperson talked over red letters, repeating, "NOW endorsed Schwegmann...NOW supports gay and lesbian rights...lesbian education." (It was never made clear what

"lesbian education" is).

A spokesperson at Schwegmann's headquarters said she would have been happy to have gotten it, but Schwegmann did not have an endorsement from N.O.W. She did, however, state in the final days of the campaign that she was a supporter of the gay community and a reader of The New Voice. She stopped short of taking a position in support of gay rights.

Hardy switched from the Democrats to the Republicans in 1986 following the national "Reagan Revolution." Other Louisiana politicians followed that pattern right up to the early days of this campaign, when incumbent Buddy Roemer made history as the nation's first sitting governor to switch parties.

Roemer, formerly a Democrat, went down in defeat in the state's open primary wearing the colors of the Republican Party. The governor's race was the left to Edwards and Duke.

That race, which overshadowed all other races in Louisiana, caused the lieutenant governor's office—usually considered unimportant—to be potentially

very important. Before the polls even opened for the runoff, a movement was underway to recall whichever man was elected governor. Should this happen, Schwegmann would be the first female governor in Louisiana history.

## —Gay rights ordinance opponent defeated

Peggy Wilson, Republican member of the New Orleans City Council lost her bid for state insurance commissioner to former Secretary of State Jim Brown, Democrat, 997,169 (60 percent) to 668,409 (40 percent).

Wilson was infamous in New Orleans' lesbian/gay circles for saying during a past city gay rights ordinance proposal that the proposal did not concern her as she had no gays or lesbians living in her Uptown district. The proposal, which Wilson voted against, failed.

What Wilson's political plans are now are not clear. She is barred from running for re-election to her present council seat by a term-limit proposition passed in the primary election. Wilson was a strong proponent of such term limitation.

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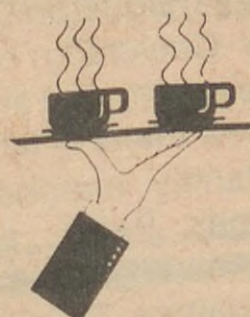

### San Antonio foundation plans photography workshop, adds new groups

The San Antonio AIDS Foundation and Very Special Arts/San Antonio will present an "Instant Photography Workshop" on Saturday, Dec. 7 at 10:00 a.m. at the San Antonio AIDS Foundation, 818 East Grayson Street. The workshop, described as an "easy and enjoyable, user-friendly gathering" aimed at individuals with HIV/AIDS, will teach the creative use of instant photography. Polaroid cameras and film will be provided and students may keep their pictures. The instructor of the workshop is Sherron Cooper, nationally known multi-media artist and humanities lecturer at San Antonio College. Cooper is known for her creative art courses at the University of Texas at San Antonio, St. Philip's College, and the Winston School.

Students will spend the first part of the workshop learning how to recognize the basic shapes found in nature, color and value, and ways to compose shapes within the photo frame. Supervan Inc. will provide transportation to the San Antonio Botanical Center (weather permitting) for practice photography exercises.

In other news from SAAF, two new support groups have been added to the established counseling schedule. Beginning Monday, Dec. 2 at 7:00 p.m., a volunteer from Alcoholics Anonymous will lead a weekly, open meeting. Alcoholics Anonymous is a well known twelve-step program which assists those who wish to stop drinking. A "Stress Management" group is also scheduled to begin meeting weekly starting on Wednesday, Dec. 4 at 1:00 p.m. This group will use a variety of counseling techniques to control stress. Both are drop in groups and are targeted to people who are HIV positive or

who have AIDS. Both groups will meet at the San Antonio AIDS Foundation.

SAAF continues to offer a complete counseling program for groups and individuals. An open, general support group for HIV positive persons meets each Thursday at 7:30 p.m. at the Foundation. The Family, Friends and Caregivers Support Group meets Mondays at 7:00 p.m. Call (512) 225-4715 for location. Pre and post-test HIV counseling is provided Wednesdays, Fridays and by appointment at the Foundation headquarters. All counseling services are provided at no charge.

SAAF is appealing to the community to donate a wide variety of provisions which are in short supply at the Foundation, 818 Grayson Street. Because of a cash shortfall, the Foundation must rely on such donations at this time, according to Sharon Rupp, executive director. "Due to the recent publicity about the funding

shortfall, many people have contacted us asking how they can help. We are always in need of supplies," Rupp said.

### Sixth Annual Tennessee Williams-N.O. Literary Festival planned

The Tennessee Williams/New Orleans Literary Festival has announced that Edward Albee, Pulitzer-prize winning author of "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf," "A Delicate Balance" and other famed titles of the American Stage will deliver a lecture and conduct workshops for actors and creative writing students at the sixth annual festival.

The three day program of lectures, readings and theatrical events is designed to highlight the "artistic heritage of New Orleans and the spirit of Tennessee Williams," who lived an openly gay life in The City That Care Forgot.

The only home Williams owned in his life was on Rue Dumain in the Vieux Carre.

Tennessee Williams grew up in Saint Louis but said, "If I can be said to have a home it is in New Orleans, which has provided me with more material than any other part of the country."

The festival is scheduled for March 27, 28 and 29 and will be held at Le Petit Theatre du Vieux Carre. A production of Williams' "Sweet Bird of Youth" will also be staged during the Festival.

Topics for panel discussion include in part: "I remember Tennessee," rowdy

remembrances of the playwright by people who knew him in and out of New Orleans; "Southern Writers Talk About Sex and Violence" and "Tennessee Williams, Scholars Panel," prominent scholars read between the lines of Williams' plays.

### New York's first hate crime figures show offenders mostly young white males

ALBANY, Thursday, Nov. 14 (AP)—More than 1100 "hate crimes" were reported to the state's major police agencies last year, the state Division of Criminal Justice Services announced Thursday.

The most frequent victims of reported bias crimes were blacks and Jews, and the offenders were overwhelmingly young white males, said the report.

based on data from the state Bias Crime Incident Reporting System.

"While all crime is a very serious mat-

ter, criminal acts motivated by prejudice have implications that go beyond the trauma and loss associated with other

forms of crime," said Commissioner of Criminal Justice Services Richard Girgenti.

Jose L. Perez-Luna, an energetic educator and activist for AIDS services and human rights, died in Washington, D.C., on Monday, Nov. 11 of complications associated with AIDS.

Since his diagnosis with HIV in 1986, Joe campaigned vigorously for AIDS information and services to Latino communities. He testified in April, 1987, before a Congressional hearing on minorities and AIDS, served as a panelist on the National Latino AIDS teleconference sponsored by the University of California—Los Angeles and Congressman Ed Roybal, and was also chair of the People With AIDS Task Force of the national council of La Raza. His last presentation was made in September, 1991 at the National Hispanic Conference on Substance Abuse Prevention, Treatment and HIV/AIDS, held in Los Angeles.

Joe worked as a public policy specialist at AIDS Project Los Angeles from Sept. 1990 until he left on medical disability in June,

1991. He also served as a representative to the AIDS clinical trial group, National Institutes of Health.

While living in Washington, D.C. from Jan. 1989 until September, 1990, Joe worked as an outreach specialist at Salud Inc., a community based agency providing AIDS education and prevention services to the Latino community of the Washington, D.C. Metropolitan area. He also helped to found a support group for HIV-positive Latinos and served as a member of the Metropolitan area AIDS educators committee and Enlace: The Coalition of Lesbian and Gay Latinos.

From 1978 to 1988, Joe lived in Houston and worked tirelessly to foster human rights for all people. In 1979, he joined the Chicano caucus of Houston. He grew along with the organization through its development into the Gay Hispanic Caucus and, finally, the Gay and Lesbian Hispanics Unidos (GLHU). He was editor of the organization's newsletter, Noticias, from July, 1986 until Nov. 1988. He was founder of the Lesbian and Gay Tejanos Conference in August, 1986, and served as technical assistant to Tom Coleman on the article "Sodomy Law," on Texas Penal Code Sect. 21.06. He was also a chapter organizer of the national Latino/a Lesbian and Gay Organization (LLEGO).

He was born in Weslaco, Texas, on May 6, 1961, the second youngest of eight siblings. He traveled as a young migrant farm worker with his family through Wyoming, Michigan, Indiana, Idaho, California and Utah. He attended Pan American University in Edinburg, Texas; Houston Community College and the University of Houston. He wrote creative poetry and short stories, and he loved to draw maps of imaginary places.

Surviving family members include his mother, Carmen Perez; sisters, Dolores Garcia Boughton and Berta Castaneda; and brothers Guadalupe, Sergio and Pedro, all of Weslaco. He also leaves many loving friends and associates across the United States. Joe's cremated remains will be

spread along the Rio Grande River at the Texas-Mexico border.

A Memorial Ceremony will be held Saturday, Nov. 23 at 2:00 p.m. at the Metropolitan Community Church of the Resurrection.

#### —"BUZZY" FANNING

William J. Fanning, better known as "Buzzy," died Thursday, Nov. 14, 1991, of intestinal gangrene at Southern Baptist Hospital in New Orleans. He was 71.

Fanning formed the unofficial organization that came to be known as "Buzzy's Boys and Girls" when he started regularly visiting patients suffering from AIDS in 1985.

He had worked for years in New Orleans restaurants, retiring in 1983 as maitre d' after 25 years at Brennan's on Rue Royal. Following retirement, other restaurant workers and bartenders learned he was regularly visiting AIDS patients at Charity Hospital and began contributing their tips. Events to raise money for Buzzy's Boys and Girls became a regular, popular activity throughout the community.

While working at Brennan's, Fanning got to know many of the regular customers, including Clay Shaw, who later was indicted and acquitted of conspiracy to assassinate President John F. Kennedy. During the filming of the Oliver Stone movie "JFK" last year in New Orleans he was hired as a consultant for scenes filmed at the French Quarter restaurant.

Buzzy Fanning was born in Brooklyn, N.Y. He served during World War Two aboard the Gripsholm, a cruise ship converted to prisoner-exchange hospital ship. He moved to New Orleans in the 1950's. He was buried in St. Stephen's Cemetery in Warwick, N.Y. A rosary was said in New Orleans, followed by an evening Mass at St. Vincent de Paul Church on Dauphine.

'We too feed at the public trough'--support the ICOGLEAO conference

Annise Parker went last year and we all can see how the trip inspired her.

The International Conference of Openly Gay and Lesbian Elected and Appointed Officials is being held in Houston this weekend. Your attendance is being encouraged whether you are considering seeking a position of public trust or helping someone else attain one. Billed as a conference for elected and appointed officials, activists, political action committees, members of Queer Nation and Act Up, political clubs, political party regulars, candidates, potential candidates and others, the conference promises a lively exchange of political ideas.

In Texas we have Rep. Glen Maxey, elected from a district in central Austin, and Bill Scott, appointed to the Board of health by Gov. Ann Richards. Other areas of the country have more elected and appointed openly gay and lesbian public officials. Many of those officials will be in Houston this weekend affording you the opportunity to meet, hear and talk to them.

The first openly gay or lesbian elected public official in the country was Elaine Noble, elected to the Massachusetts Legislature from a Boston inner city district. She frequently complained of how "red neck" the Massachusetts Legislature was. Many of us wondered at the time what she might have thought of the group Glen maxey now calls his colleagues. She helped pave the way for Harvey Milk to get elected (on his fourth try) to the San Francisco Board of Supervisors on the other side of the county. Success of any one of us helps the chances for the rest of us.

In Houston Carl Denton was the first openly gay candidate to get his name on the ballot (except for Precinct Judge, where Lee Marsters gets the recognition). Carl did not win, but then neither did any of the several other candidates from our community in the years since. But we have steadily improved our results. Gary Van Ooteghem did quite well in a Republican primary soon after

Carl's attempt. Ms. Parker carried our significant precincts in the recent city elections. Our votes are important to many of the candidates now in office. And the day is rapidly approaching when the right combination of district lines, opponents, coalitions and support from our own community will result in a successful campaign. Then we will all get to dress up and attend a swearing in ceremony right here in the Bayou City.

The process starts with the ambition of the person seeking public office; continues with the knowledge of how to wage a successful campaign and succeeds with the support of a broad base of voters. We have danced with many of the candidates we helped bring to the floor. It's time we had a steady date with one of our own.

When my son was brutally murdered July Fourth, I never dreamed I would be writing this letter several murders later. My son Paul Broussard is gone, but those who live in this area seem plagued by violence, and I ask you now to help stop the killing. Take action to do what you can to stop the violence, and stop the discrimination that leads to violence.

To the candidates for mayor of the city of Houston: I beg that your promise of a safer city be kept. We have heard both of you talk of your support to end crime. One candidate even met with us to discuss commitment, and a plan of action.

Mr. Lanier, I thank you for the opportunity to meet with you and other concerned citizens to discuss crime. I found your promises of cultural awareness

training for police officers, more officers on the street, and zero tolerance for crime to be very comforting. Unfortunately, I do not know if Mr. Turner shares your concerns. If Mr. Turner shares our views, he apparently does not care to return the calls of his constituency.

Mr. Turner, what is most important to you? Repeated attempts to meet with you have been ignored. Is this the type of administration you propose, the type of administration that refuses to address the concerns of individual citizens? Your aide, Mr. Thomas Jones, was quick to tell us of your past achievements and endorsements. Your unwillingness to meet with those you are running to serve concerns me. Your citizens want to know what your plan is and how you propose to take action against discrimination, anti-gay violence and crime.

Please meet with us, as did your opponent, to answer questions and concerns of the citizens of the Montrose area and the Greater Houston area.

This is the age of the political hack, the likes of Roger Ailes foisting Ronald Reagan on the nation and Lee Atwater who successfully obscured every issue with race to win the White House for George Bush.

More recently a man named Carville, unknown except on the East Coast, is credited with the surprise win of Sen. Wofford of Pennsylvania over Bush's attorney general. Later Carville was off to fight the wizard, in this case in Louisiana where the specter of neo-Nazism in the form of David Duke seems to have captured the imagination of a host of Louisianans—and others—who are not new to that unique branch of right-wingism since the days of Huey Long.

Recently in San Francisco, we witnessed the surge of support in the nation's most liberal big city for a former police chief to the right of Oliver North, Frank Jordan. And much of the credit for

his first place finish and runoff position opposite Art Agnos is given to Jack Favis, a gay right winger with a personal vendetta against Agnos.

Here in Houston, as Bob Lanier and Sylvester Turner court the support of former Whitmire backers, Lanier has captured Dan McClung, once Whitmire's pollster and strategist with unequaled Whitmire mailing list put to the disposal of the baron of River Oaks.

Political logic is telling both candidates they must win over a majority of Whitmire's supporters to win the runoff. And, while not giving it much space, the dailies did recognize that Whitmire ran the strongest in the Montrose area. And Whitmire ran in this area with the endorsement of the Houston Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus.

Without any public fanfare Turner did seek and win the caucus' endorsement for the runoff. Lanier made only a passing attempt for that endorsement. Turner, with some active gay and lesbian community leaders in his camp, at least based his appeal on the broad issue of public health without any specifics.

We recall during our participation in the caucus' screening of Fred Hofheinz two years ago that we marveled at his lack of knowledge of gay issues, particularly considering his support by and advice from several gay leaders.

So, again we must marvel, when even Turner missed a golden political and media opportunity to meet with a large and vocal Queer Nation protest. With the recent disclosure by basketball great Magic Johnson of his HIV infection, Turner could have appeared before the Queer Nationalists and tied the plight of blacks and straights to the gay issues of bashing and AIDS without forfeiting his black support and still displayed political courage.

Unfortunately Turner, Lanier and most of the city government chose hiding over shrewd political action which could only have garnered them votes and perhaps even a couple of editorials for such courage. Alas, their "handlers" chose the worst part of valor.

## First annual 'Strike a Pose' Voguer's Ball held in New Orleans

It was hard getting a crowd in New Orleans last week for anything not connected to the Nov. 16 election. Given that, Rosalyn Steiner's "Strike A Pose" Voguer's Ball on the eve of election day has to be seen as a smashing success.

About two hundred people came to the modish patron's party and voguing ball held at the chic City Lights nightclub located in the Warehouse district. The event was the first public gathering of the New Orleans International Festival of Film. Tickets were \$25 a head.

The Warehouse District is a downtown neighborhood across Canal street from the Vieux Carre. It was the location for the doomed 1984 World's Fair (equals) Fair. After the fair closed, leaving millions of dollars in unpaid debts, the hundred year old Mississippi River Warehouses were converted to upscale apartments. The apartments themselves have been a precarious development, struggling through the economic decline that nearly did in the World's Fair and plagues New Orleans to this day.

The neighborhood has survived and may be read as a mixed metaphor for

launching such an ambitious venture as an International Film festival and the cities "First Annual Voguer's Ball."

The voguers were local talent. Seven men, all black, were chosen by Steiner and her staff after advertising on posters throughout the city to step forward and strut their stuff for film buffs wishing to be a "voguer voyeur."

The mixed crowd, that ran a gamut from Uptown matron to Bywater mystery writer Tony Fennelly, seemed to enjoy what they were seeing—even though what they saw would not have been viewed in voguing's inner circles as au-

thentic.

The voguers strutted across the floor in a refined choreography that, while pleasant enough to watch, was more ballet than a display of voguing's indignant expression. Huge screens on the wall mirrored the dancers' movements with Madonna videos and rather charming old movie clips. The movie clips fit very well the movie/voguing theme of the party and came close to being that outer expression of inner turmoil that true voguing is.

The International Festival of Film hopes to offer its first slate of films in the spring.

## AIDS Alliance: 'First phase' of HIV care plan due by January

The Greater Houston AIDS Alliance announced Tuesday it has contracted with the University of Texas School of Public Health to develop a comprehensive plan for AIDS care in Houston, and will hold community forums to get public input on critical issues. Both forums will be held at the Metropolitan Multi-Service Center, 1475 West Gray on Wednesday, Dec. 18.

The public meetings will be an important part of the plan's development process, said Sue Cooper, executive director of the Alliance. The meetings will be held from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and from 6:30-8:30 p.m. and are open to anyone concerned about the response to HIV/AIDS in Houston.

The Alliance, which began working on the plan in September, must complete at least part of it completed by January, 1992 to meet a deadline imposed for Houston's

continued qualification for federal Ryan White funds.

"We've begun the process, but we are against a very short time table," said Dr. Charles Begley of the UT School of Public Health. The areas of focus identified for the AIDS plan are case management, education and prevention, early intervention, psychosocial services and AIDS care, Begley said.

Cooper and Alliance board members, along with UT officials and city and county epidemiologists, held a news conference Tuesday to announce the plan, but told reporters it could not yet answer questions about the plan itself, still in its earliest stages. Instead, they reported a new Houston HIV/AIDS statistical picture compiled to help in developing the plan by a team of epidemiology experts, including city of Houston epidemiologist Ann Phelps and Harris County epidemiologist Mark A. Canfield. These latest statistics—adjusted to account for a national average in

underreporting—show over one percent of the city's population, or about one in every 90 people in Houston, are presently HIV-positive.

A chart prepared by the advisory panel also indicates that suggested revisions in the Center for Disease Control's definition of AIDS will raise the diagnosed PWA population in Houston to almost 10,000 cases. As of Sept. 30, 1991 the Houston Metropolitan Statistical Area had reported 5883 cumulative AIDS cases, 95 percent of which came from Harris County.


The epidemiologist's projections estimate that the number will increase to approximately 17,000 in 1985, with a total of almost 48,000 persons with HIV disease.

While Houston, the nation's fourth largest city, is also fourth in the nation in AIDS cases, the city has never had a comprehensive plan for AIDS care, although the Harris County Hospital District wrote an AIDS/HIV plan in October, 1990. The GHAA, an umbrella organization estab-

lished in March, 1989, is the administrative body charged with generating resources and coordinating AIDS care in the Houston SMSA. Today, it is the lead contractor for and administrator of \$7 million in federal and state HIV/AIDS service grants.

The Alliance has been criticized by the AIDS Equity League and other activist groups for its delay in developing such a plan; however, Cooper said that Houston, unlike some other cities, has failed to attract grant funding to cover the cost of the plan. She said that the delay was due in part to GHAA's needing the money to pay for UT's services, and added that the Alliance is having to depend heavily on in-kind donations and volunteer help to minimize the other expenses involved in the plan's development.

Cooper said the "first phase" of the plan will be complete in time to meet the January Ryan White deadline.



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No other group has suffered more under the brutality of organized religion than lesbians and gays. AGLA not only exalts Jefferson's principle, but also advances a philosophy of Atheism ascribed to by none other than the nation's first openly-gay elected official, Harvey Milk, who, shortly before his assassination, stated publicly, *"I want nothing even smacking, or smelling, or hinting of religion."*

The voters marked a whopping 61 percent of their ballots for thrice former Governor Edwin Edwards. He was the candidate tried twice by the "Federalists" (but never convicted), and the colorful Cajun with the panache to say in past campaigns, "The only way I could lose is if the voters found me in bed with a dead woman or a live boy."

A bumper sticker, from the just-ended race, backhandedly supporting Edwin Edwards, flashed around The City That Care Used-To-Forget proclaiming: "Vote for the Crook: It's Important." Surely this is destined to be a collector's item. Ok, so we won't live long enough to reap any financial reward. Save the thing, give it to your posterity, Cher, now we have a tomorrow.

And what about all those blue signs with the squat lettering spelling "Duke" and the similar "No Dukes" and the

scary "More Dukes"? When the millennium ends won't this stuff be worth a good laugh at lawn parties? You say, no?

Well, maybe the election was an ill wind blowing less good than Hurricane Betsy. But hey, did you catch Edwin Edwards saying, "The only thing David Duke and I have in common is we are both Wizards under the sheets"? Great! I say, if you can't laugh at politicians what good are they?

It seems to me, when the electorate stops laughing at politicians and starts taking them seriously—like Duke—is exactly when you need to start looking for higher ground.

Michael Ferrand at Michael's Bicycles in New Orleans' Faubourg Marigny said, as he tinkered with my ten-speed two days before the election, "My grandfather left Germany the day after he shook hands with Goebbels."

He showed me a copy of "Question of Allegiance" by Pierre Ferrand (American Studies Press), it is his grandfather's personal history. The elder Ferrand had been the first radio ad man in Germany. He feared, first the turn to the right, then the rise of the Nazis, and

when they came to power he left.

"All my family did not see as clearly as he did what was coming. All of them did not leave. Those that remained did not survive the following years!"

As I pushed my bike out the door Michael said he wondered if he should think of leaving Louisiana.

The Sunday before that, Keith Woods, city editor of the Times-Picayune said in an editorial, for all to see: "If a majority of Louisiana voters decide that Duke represents what is truly in their hearts and minds, then I must leave."

Election day the weather warmed to 62 degrees, the sun burned off the morning fog and the choice was so clear it hardly seemed possible anyone could vote for Duke. But over three quarters of a million people did. That is scary enough, even without his winning.

"Why," asked Duke, and many otherwise good souls, "is it worse, voting for Duke than Bush or Reagan?" Bush's Willie Horton TV ads carried the same coded message as Duke's. And did democracy greater damage, cynically wedging the electorate apart and legiti-

mizing "double think." Intolerance became acceptable if we simply said it was not intolerance, Enter, stage right, David Duke, the fascist who says he is not.

Candidates, not on the fringe, abandoned voter education as part of the political process after the "Reagan Revolution." Rather than selling their agenda, most American politicians have been satisfied to entice the voters into their camp, whatever the cost.

The result has been twelve years of boiling frustration among voters jobs overseas and heaping blame on "them, the unworthies." Does anyone else realize the Persian Gulf War did little for Americans but close down oil production jobs in Louisiana and Texas? Does anyone at all think shipping jobs to Mexico will help workers in the Rustbelt?

There was much to laugh at in this election, albeit gallows humor. I'll leave you with this one: "If David Duke and Edwin Edwards were in a pirogue that sank over deep water, who would be saved?" Answer: "Louisiana!" Perhaps that should be "Louisiana and the U.S.A."

## Texans who attended 'Creating Change' call conference informative

As Houston prepares for an international gay/lesbian officials conference, activists who attended another national gathering say the experience has given them insight and inspiration. While only a handful of Texans attended the recent "Creating Change" conference hosted by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force in Alexandria, Va. those who went say it was well worth the trip.

Laurie Eiserloh, executive director of the Lesbian/Gay Rights Lobby of Texas, said going to the conference, which was attended by some 1000 gay and lesbian leaders and grass roots activists from all over the country, helped her identify some of the strengths and weaknesses of the Texas gay/lesbian political structure. For example, she said, "I was struck by the fact that only three other states—California, New York and Wisconsin—have a full time lobbyist working for lesbian and gay rights."

On the other hand, said Eiserloh, Texas is lagging a little behind in terms of coalition building and transforming the gay/

lesbian political center "from mono-cultural to a multi-cultural.

"I think we're moving in that direction...but we're not quite as advanced (as some other areas)" in moving toward gender and racial parity in community agenda building, she noted.

Also, she said she learned "we could get a lot more sophisticated in our fund raising techniques. (Other states) are seeing some new, innovative fund raising ideas that make Texas look like its in the Stone Ages."

Deborah Bell, the only Houstonian who attended the NGLTF conference, said the conference was amazingly well organized and was impressed by the fact that pre-conference "diversity training" was held that helped avoid issue conflicts later in the conference. "We got it all of the diversity issues out of the way before the conference started...so we'd already dealt with it and didn't have to bring it up again later," Bell said.

The conference, sponsored by NGLTF's Policy Institute, is an annual event, held this year at the Old Colony Inn in Alexandria, just outside of Washington, D.C. where the national group has its headquarters. Gay and lesbian activists came from some 40 states and the District of Columbia; England, Mexico, Nicaragua and other countries were also represented. The conference featured 63 workshops, ranging from skills-building seminars on media activism to organizational sessions on activism and stress to political plotting and planning. Pre-conference institutes on people of color organizing, diversity training and campus organizing were also held.

The conference also included plenary speakers, entertainment and a special AIDS activist panel.

Recent gay and lesbian political developments discussed at the conference include the Congressional Resolution calling for an end to the military ban on gays and lesbians; Magic Johnson's disclosure of his HIV positive status; the veto of the

California gay and lesbian civil rights bill by Gov. Pete Wilson and subsequent community organizing there; the increase in anti-gay/lesbian violence in several cities; and the National March on Washington being planned for April 25, 1993.

A March on Washington planning meeting for the region including Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Colorado is scheduled to be held Dec. 15 in Dallas. At that meeting, a steering committee for the region will be selected, which will incorporate ethnic and gender parity, Bell said.

Both Eiserloh and Bell said organizing and networking at the national level is extremely important to local gay and lesbian activists and lobbyists. "I feel now that I have built some bridges...that I have some people in other places I can call on," Eiserloh said.

Suzy Wagers of the Texas Human Rights Foundation, and Deb Elder and Bill White of Dallas also attended Creating Change.

NORFOLK, Va., Wednesday, Nov. 13 (AP)—A sailor faces court martial for failing to tell his dentist he has the virus that causes AIDS.

A Navy judge on Wednesday refused to dismiss charges against Charles W. Culver. His lawyer argued a Navy form that asks patients whether they have the virus is an invasion of privacy.

Culver faces court martial today for disobeying the Navy order that he must disclose his illness to medical personnel.

"The law is clear that the military has a legitimate interest in safeguarding the health of its personnel by preventing the spread of any communicable disease to ensure military fitness, combat readiness and the health of its members," the judge,

Capt. William T. Vest Jr., wrote in an opinion rejecting the argument.

The case is believed to be the first of its kind. Other HIV-positive people have been prosecuted for having unprotected sex or deliberately trying to spread their illness. In those cases, defendants were charged with some form of assault.

In Culver's case, he faces charges that only exist in the military—disobeying an order and making a false official statement.

Culver's lawyer and another attorney who specializes in AIDS litigation said the Navy's order is intrusive and unnecessary.

"From a public health standpoint, it's ludicrous to tell people you have to tell your dentist 'Oh, by the way ...'" said Kenneth

Labowitz, the AIDS specialist. "The dentist ought to assume in 1991 that anyone is HIV positive, or more commonly, than anyone has hepatitis."

Culver, 28, checked "No" to the HIV-virus question on a patient information form, even though he tested positive for the virus in 1988, prosecutors say.

Culver is not believed to have infected anyone at Portsmouth Naval Hospital in his visits in February and March.

"If your infectious control techniques are good, they're good," said Cmdr. Richard Sobie, the dentist who discovered Culver's case in a routine records check. "You may do a few extra things, like double-glove (your hands), warning the staff. ..."

Sobie said there are no reported cases of a

patient spreading the AIDS virus to a dentist, but said health care employees have contracted the disease HIV after poking their skin with contaminated needles.

Culver's lawyer, Lt. John Ray, said he planned to call an AIDS expert to testify that the risk to a dentist from a patient is "minuscule."

Tests show that Culver, who worked at Shore Intermediate Maintenance Activity in Portsmouth, has the presence of antibodies to the virus in his blood. He exhibits none of the symptoms or infections connected with a full blown case of AIDS.

"The military order is an unnecessary intrusion into the service member's personal life, forcing him or her to reveal embarrassing and private information about themselves," Ray argued in a legal brief.

# AIDS agencies using full-court press to get Magic on their team

LOS ANGELES, Thursday, Nov. 14 (AP)—How much clout does Magic Johnson wield as a fund-raiser?

Try this. For the past three years, golfers have forked over more than \$1,000 apiece to play in Magic's Golf Classic, a tournament benefiting the American Heart Association. This September, the event netted \$132,000 for the group's Los Angeles affiliate, and Johnson wasn't even playing.

As one of professional sports' most active participants in philanthropy, Johnson lends credibility and star power to whatever cause he undertakes.

Now, infected with the AIDS virus and retired from the Los Angeles Lakers, his cause is AIDS awareness, and research foundations and other AIDS service agencies are using a full-court press to get him on their team.

Barely an hour after Johnson appeared on national television last week to announce he is HIV-positive, a small agency called L.A. Shanti Foundation had assembled a proposal package and whisked it off to Johnson's agent, who was soon inundated by similar pitches.

Actress Liz Taylor, a founder of the American Foundation for AIDS Research, sent the Lakers star flowers in an attempt to court him.

"It's very intense," said Mark King, spokesperson for L.A. Shanti, of the

competition for Johnson's endorsement and financial support. "There isn't anyone who isn't trying to team up with him."

For a small-budget organization like L.A. Shanti, teaming up with Johnson can mean the difference in providing service to thousands, instead of hundreds of people with the AIDS virus and full-blown AIDS.

The organization wants Johnson to appear as the guest of honor at an event to raise money for seminars for people who have recently tested HIV-positive.

"He absolutely has the ability to turn this event from a \$200,000 event to a \$1 million event," King said. "He could fund the seminar for years to come with that one appearance."

"He's going to make a lot of money for whoever he chooses to go with."

Just how Johnson will choose to use his considerable clout is still up in the air. He has mentioned promoting AIDS awareness among the black community and may start his own foundation.

"It's still in the planning stages," said Janice Wise, who works with Johnson's agent in planning promotions.

Johnson smiles, and people's checkbooks seem to open, well, magically.

Three days after Johnson made his announcement, a Beverly Hills businessperson and Lakers season ticket holder named Harold Foonberg wrote out a check for \$10,000 at Sunday night's

game.

The Lakers and Johnson's agent have received checks worth about \$20,000, but hundreds of pieces of mail sent to Johnson haven't been opened yet. And a local AIDS telethon over the weekend far exceeded its fund-raising expectations, raising \$1.14 million by simply riding the coattails of Johnson's disclosure.

Johnson was a formidable philanthropic force well before his disclosure last week that he is HIV-positive. He has given of his time freely and in large amounts. That, in turn, has attracted contributors' dollars in large amounts.

In 1990 alone, he raised an estimated \$2.65 million for various non-profit entities, from the Muscular Dystrophy Association to tiny Rust College in Holly Springs, Miss.

To date, the biggest benefactor of Johnson's philanthropic endeavors has been the United Negro College Fund, which supplies scholarships to 41 private colleges and universities.

His annual all-star game has raised more than \$4 million over the past six years and is the largest ongoing fundraiser in UNCF's history, said development director Vincent Bryson.

The game and black-tie dinner, dubbed "A Mid-Summer Night's Magic," has grown into one of the hottest charity tickets in town, this year generating more than \$1 million.

Johnson staged the first game, in 1986, at Pauley Pavilion on the UCLA

campus, but demand soon forced a move to the Forum, where it has sold out the last five years. The NBA's biggest stars—including Michael Jordan, Dominique Wilkins, Larry Bird, Charles Barkley and Isiah Thomas—suit up for the event.

At Magic's Golf Classic, held at the exclusive Riviera Country Club, Johnson serves as the host and glad-hander, poses with each golfer for a photograph at the 14th hole and presides over a dinner and auction.

"It's one of our smaller fundraisers (in dollars), but as far as publicity and the Heart Association being able to get its name out there, nothing comes close to it," said Richard Brown, development consultant for the Los Angeles affiliate. "We may not raise a lot of money, but we make up for it in exposure."

Although it's one of the Heart Association's newer fundraisers, the golf tournament has drawn a capacity crowd and generated increased revenues each year. And all the credit goes to Johnson, Brown said.

"We feel very fortunate, very lucky," Brown said of his group's ties with Johnson. "Our other affiliates are very jealous that we have a Magic fundraiser."

However, Johnson now is likely to be spread even more thinly among philanthropic groups all competing for his time and fundraising prowess, and the future of both the golf tournament and the all-star game hasn't been addressed yet.

# Wigs On Fire makes 'Big Wig' donation to the Assistance Fund

Members of Wigs On Fire Inc. gathered recently to present The Assistance Fund, a foundation that pays insurance premiums for people with AIDS who are having financial problems, a "Big Wig" check for \$7,067. The donation represents 100 percent of the door proceeds from "Nightmare on Wig Street," WOIF's 1991 fundraiser.

"Nightmare on Wig Street" took place at the Heights Theater on Oct. 19. Assistance Fund president Harold Rains estimated the donation from the event will generate over \$100 million in health benefits for PWA's. (The fund pays insurance premiums to help keep PWA's from losing their insurance benefits because of temporary inability to pay the premium).

In addition, over 20 cases of food and other non-perishable items and approximately \$100 in cash were collected for AIDS Foundation Houston's Stone Soup Food Pantry at the Wigs event, members reported.

"That's What Friends Are For" has selected four charities representing six separate community funds as beneficiaries of the 1992 fund raising show, set for June 13 at the Westin Galleria Hotel. Primary beneficiaries are: AIDS Mastery, Colt 45's (Stone Soup Fund and AIDS Trouble Fund), the Pet Patrol and Texas Gay Rodeo Association (two accounts).

In a special agreement with TGRA, a portion of funds from next year's Gay Rodeo that are returned to Houston will benefit also benefit funds, Houston Clinical Research Network and The

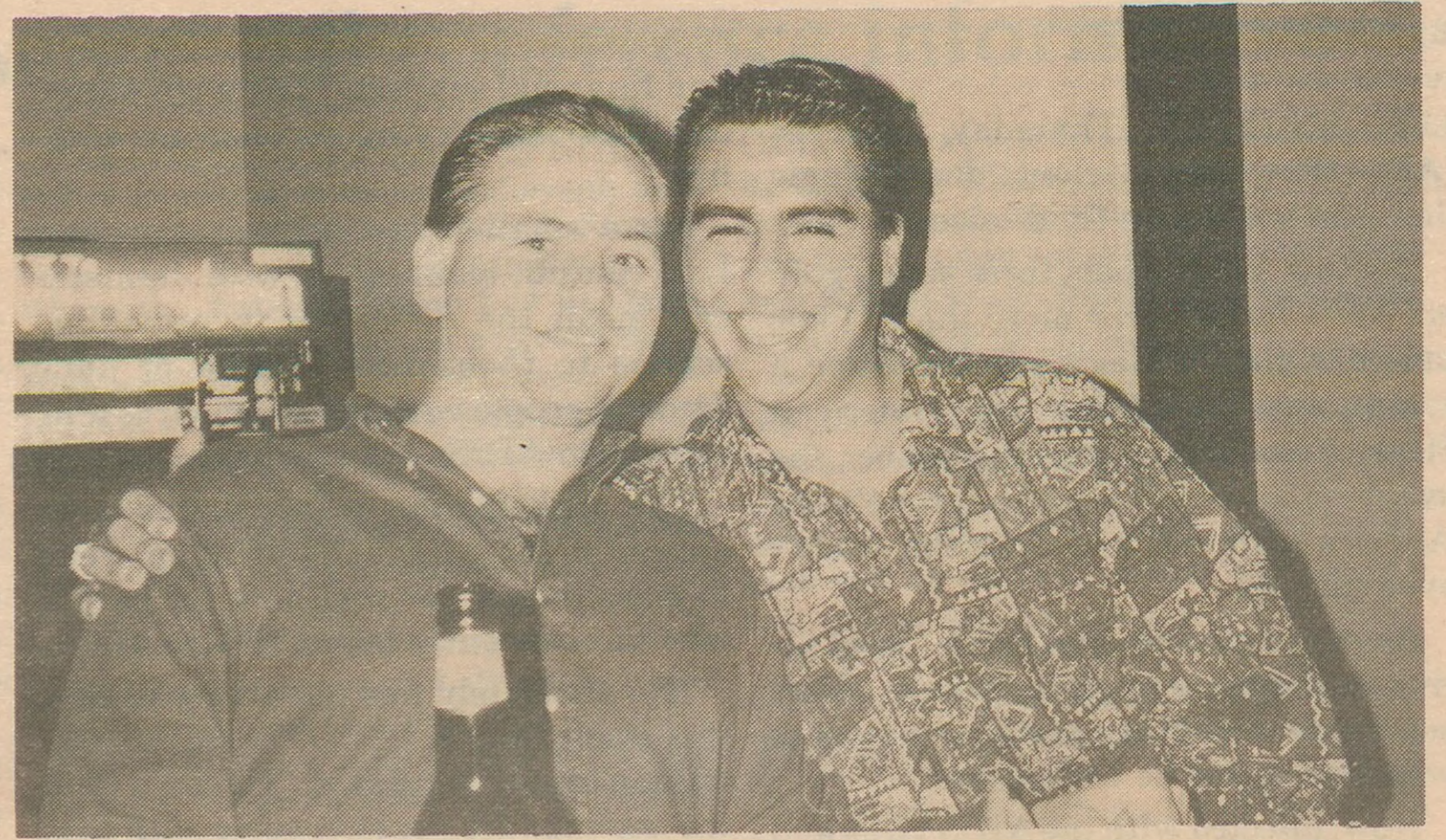

## 'Kook' or psycho blamed for homophobic AIDS handbill

SANTA FE, Thursday, Nov. 14 (AP)—Whoever distributed a flier saying 95 percent of Santa Fe chefs, waiters and waitresses are homosexuals who carry the AIDS virus needs psychiatric help, the head of the Santa Fe Restaurant Association said.

"It's absolute ignorance speaking here," association president Al Lucero said Wednesday.

City Councilor Ouida MacGregor, who

found one of the handbills Saturday, called it "vicious" and "nasty" and told fellow council members Wednesday that it represents "ignorance and homophobia that have no place in Santa Fe."

Other councilors suggested the New Mexico Association of People Living with AIDS work with the city Human Services Department on an AIDS education program. With more than 150 cases, Santa Fe ranks sixth among U.S. cities in per-capita incidence of AIDS.

Officials didn't know who distributed the fliers.

"It is a cowardly act perhaps by a disgruntled employee. The person needs psychiatric help," said Lucero.

"It's a form of terrorism," remarked J. Murphy, NMAPLA's deputy director in Santa Fe.

The flier says "95 percent of all downtown Santa Fe chefs, waiters and waitresses are gay or lesbian and have the AIDS vi-

rus."

It concludes: "Hope you don't catch it when you eat their food."

"Most Santa Feans are intelligent enough to understand that you can't contract the disease through casual contact," Lucero said.

State Tourism Director Michael Cerletti said he doubted the handbill would harm Santa Fe's famed restaurant trade. He said it sounds "like the work of some kook."

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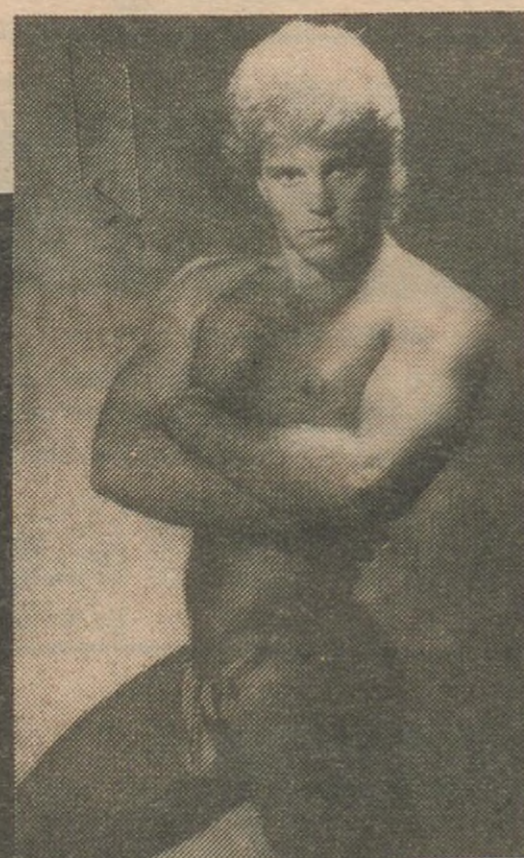

# Montrose patrol group may start up sooner after more crime reports

A new Montrose citizen's patrol group may begin training sessions this weekend, responding to new reports of crime in the area. The group is being organized under the direction of Queer Nation, although some contact names and numbers are taken from the list of a previously announced plan to form a patrol, Montrose Peacemakers.

Activist Ray Hill, who started planning the Peacemakers group, said Tuesday he planned to turn the list over to Queer Nation member Brian Bradley to avoid duplication of effort. "It's just less work for me," said Hill. "I think it's more important to have one well-organized group, I don't see any reason why there should be two."

Bradley said members of the new group, "Q Patrol," would go through two stages of training, by the organization and the Houston Police Department's "Citizens On Patrol" program.

The forming of a neighborhood patrol was sped up in response to new reports of crime in the Montrose area over the week following the shooting death of Phillip W. Smith. On Thursday, Nov. 14, police arrested a parolee nicknamed "Lurch" for the stabbing death of a Montrose man and rape of his pregnant girlfriend the day be-

fore. Jamie B. McCloskey, 27 of 1100 West Gray was charged in the slaying of 21-year-old Michael D. Dwyer.

Police said McCloskey, known to neighbors as "Lurch" probably because of his towering height, abducted the couple at knifepoint after asking them for a ride near their residence in the 400 block of Fairview then had the woman drive to an abandoned house in the 1800 block of Drew. There, he raped the woman and stabbed the handcuffed Dwyer at least eight times. The woman escaped and ran for help; Dwyer was dead at the scene.

On the night of that slaying, Queer Nation members held a news conference to complain about delays in implementing increased police protection in the area and installing street lights approved by City Council two months ago. Friday, Nov. 15, the group announced the citizen's patrol plans as another reported crime victim took his story to the media.

Gary Taylor, 31, told television reporters last Friday that he was attacked and robbed with a knife in a Montrose gay bar on Wednesday, Nov. 6. He said his attacker was an acquaintance of his roommate's and he was able to identify the attacker to police. He also said that the bar's staff and community leaders had been uncooperative with his efforts to find the robber.

Taylor said he filed charges against a man that his roommate knew from school, and later circulated flyers in the Montrose club district with a picture of the suspect, a parolee, provided by police.

Taylor said that Charlie Ray Doyle, 29, robbed him of two rings valued at \$1500 at the Atrium Club in the 200 block of Avondale. Management of the Atrium Club, however, said the bar's staff was unaware of an assault occurring there on the night of Nov. 6, and that the only information they have regarding the incident is what is contained in the flyer. A staff member who did not want to be identified said some of the bar's staff recognized the picture and that police would be called if Doyle were seen in the bar.

Police said Doyle was a parole violator who is wanted on charges of aggravated robbery with a deadly weapon. Sgt. H. Jeske of the HPD robbery division said he may also have been involved in other Montrose area robberies. He is described as a white male, five feet, eight inches tall, 185 pounds with short brown hair and a moustache.

In yet another incident which reportedly took place Nov. 6, three gay men were assaulted near Montrose and Drew. After shouting insults and following them by car and foot, four white males shot at the

men, then tried to follow them into a local business.

The three, Chris Jones, Chris Moody and Daryl Clifton, later complained that the responding police officer refused to file a report in the incident, even though they had the license number of the vehicle and a clear description of the assailants.

After several activists intervened on their behalf, the men were allowed to make a full report at the police station and charges were filed against two of the assailants, according to Gene Harrington, who said he was among those who intervened.

At a press conference on Nov. 11, Sgt. Chuck Jackson of the Neartown Police Community Center joined Houston Gay and Lesbian Political Caucus president Toni Knight in urging Montrose residents to report all crime. Jackson said that anyone who feels a legitimate crime is complaint is not handled professionally by an officer taking the report has the right to speak to a supervisor.

Harrington said he has sent letters to city, state and federal officials asking for an investigation of the responding officer's handling of the Nov. 6 shooting incident.

# Judge urges plea bargain in New York gay-bash killing

NEW YORK, Thursday, Nov. 14 (AP)—As the prosecution and defense both rested in the case of an alleged gay-bashing murder in Queens, the judge suggested that the two sides consider a plea bargain.

Justice Ralph Sherman of Queens state Supreme Court made the plea-bargain suggestion in a private discussion with lawyers Wednesday and confirmed it when questioned by reporters.

Erik Brown, 21, and Esat Bici, 19, are charged with second-degree murder in the

July 1990 death of Julio Rivera, a 29-year-old gay man, in a Jackson Heights schoolyard.

A third man, Daniel Doyle, 21, who admitted to fatally stabbing Rivera, pleaded guilty to a lesser charge of manslaughter and testified against the others.

Doyle testified that on the night of the attack, the three young men—who were hoping to revive interest in their skinhead gang DMS went looking for a homeless person, a drug dealer or a "homo" to beat up.

Rivera was beaten with a hammer, a wrench and a beer bottle and then stabbed.

Testimony ended Wednesday with the defense lawyers deciding not to call any witnesses.

The Daily News reported today that before proceedings began Wednesday, the chief detective in the case for the Queens district attorney's office received a threatening phone call from a member of DMS, which is named after a brand of boots favored by the gang.

Detective George Byrd told the News that the caller, who spoke to a secretary, left the message, "Back off, stop—with DMS!"

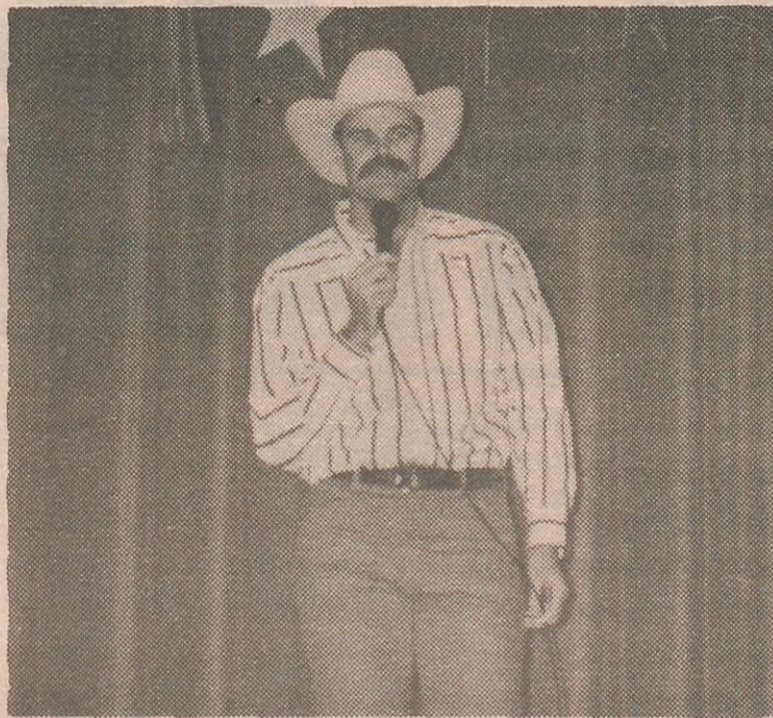
