# Texas Congressman Stalks Wilds, Fears AIDS

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. Jack Fields, R-Texas, a member of the Houston Safari Club, is on the southern tip of the African continent on another big-game hunting trip. But he is not without fear.

It's not an animal in the remote wilds that Fields is concerned about—he reportedly bagged a lion on a previous trip. It's the possibility of serious injury, the need for blood transfusions and the chance of contracting AIDS.

Fields' African hunting trip and his concern about AIDS are the subject of a Jack Anderson column that appeared in newspapers Tuesday.

In a recent letter to U.S. Embassy officials inquiring about medical care in Zimbabwe and Namibia, Fields cited the "high incidence of acquired immune deficiency syndrome in Africa and the potential for a hunter needing a blood

transfusion" as a cause of grave concern among those in his party.

A copy of an unclassified State Department transcript of Fields' letter shows that Fields asked for a list of hospitals—"exact locations, contact names and phone numbers"—at three locations in Zimbabwe and one in Namibia.

"Additionally, I understand our embassy in Zimbabwe, in cooperation with local military personnel, will provide a C-5 military transport for a medical emergency," Fields wrote.

Fields, a member of the House subcommittee on health and the environment, also indicated a need for AB-positive blood.

"Because a member of the delegation has this fairly rare blood type, it is necessary to determine if there is an adequate supply of 'safe and screened'

blood of this type on hand in the event of a medical emergency," Fields said.

A spokesman for Fields said the conservative congressman requested information that "any American citizen in the world is entitled to request."

Bryan Wirwicz, Fields' press aide in Washington, noted the vacation was a private trip financed with private funds.

"If someone is dying and needs medical attention, I don't see that as a particular outrageous request," Wirwicz said of the letter. "I would think any American businessmen and women traveling over there would have the same request."

Wirwicz said the U.S. Ambassador to South Africa, Edward J. Perkins, wrote Fields that "the mission will meet your party upon arrival in Johannesburg Aug. 9 and will provide information on emergency evacuation possibilities."

"The embassy will provide additional transportation assistance as necessary," Perkins wrote, according to Wirwicz.

Asked if the additional transportation assistance included a military aircraft, Wirwicz said, "I assume it could include a ride on a blimp."

Columnist Anderson said: "State Department officials said they extended to the congressman the same 'facilitative services' they provide for any citizen, nothing more."

And Anderson quoted Fields as saying it is a "personal trip, my money, my business. ... What I do on my time is really nobody's business."

Wirwicz said Fields would be return before Congress reconvenes in early September after the annual August recess.

### ☒ Tempting Arrest

I am writing to solicit any interested volunteers who share my desire to respond to the Supreme Court sodomy decision with acts of civil disobedience that openly flout sodomy laws.

Although I intend to participate in the civil disobedience action that is planned on the Supreme Court steps in the upcoming National March, I think that this action is not enough, and that we could be making a more direct and forceful statement by tempting arrest for actual sodomy. I think that it is a serious failure of gay leadership not to meet the sodomy decisions with organized, open defiance. My own attitude is not to wait for leaders if they are not taking the type of action that is needed.

We cannot hope to cast off millennia of oppression if we are willing to risk nothing more than a slap on the wrist. We have to decide whether we are just going to make a little noise with token actions, or create genuine pressure and political embarrassment for those who perpetuate sodomy laws. We can't allow straight bigots to think that if they make insanely severe laws, we will never dare to defy them.

I think that many straight politicians know perfectly well that treating consensual sodomy as a felony is absurd, but they don't care because they expect never to have to enforce the laws. They avoid the risk of appearing pro-gay by letting the laws stay on the books, thinking that there is no real harm, because the only effect will be to stigmatize us. We cannot allow them to continue to play this little game, and the only way to put a stop to it is to surprise them with open defiance.

I will personally pay to place a newspaper ad taunting the straight political establishment with an announcement of an upcoming act of sodomy. I am not planning sex in public locations, and plan only the safest of sex. In the District of Columbia, the slightest touching of certain body areas constitutes a criminal act, and actual sex is not even needed.

My own preference is to keep trying new approaches to get arrested, if the police do not respond to the newspaper ad, but I would like to hear from any interested persons, even if they are not willing themselves to go quite this far.

## Hill Announces for Council

Longtime gay activist Ray Hill says he intends to run for the Houston City Council against incumbent at-large Councilman Jim Westmoreland.

Hill, who was imprisoned for four years in the early 1970s on a burglary and theft conviction, says he has learned his lesson and "paid my dues."

He Aug. 6 conceded his chances of victory were slim, but said his actual goal is to "draw Westmoreland into the campaign and have him and his ideas face public scrutiny."

Hill said he hopes the public will consider him as something other than a gay activist trying to win an elected post.

Hill won national attention recently when the Supreme Court sided with him on his challenge of a century-old Houston ordinance that allowed police to arrest people who interrupt them in the line of duty.

Registration fee is \$30 for those registering prior to August 15 and \$35 thereafter. The fee includes continental breakfast, lunch and the concert.



# Experimental AIDS Vaccine Tests for Side Effects

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—Vanderbilt University Medical Center announced Tuesday it would join five other organizations to begin the first U.S. tests in humans of an experimental AIDS vaccine.

Baylor College of Medicine in Houston is also one of the test sites.

Dr. Barney Graham, the assistant professor of medicine who will head the Vanderbilt study, said the vaccine trials were the first phase toward developing a completed vaccine, which the scientific community hopes will be ready in the 1990s.

"The purpose of the initial study is not to see whether the vaccine is going to protect people from AIDS, but is primarily to study the side effects of the drug," Graham said.

The testing program would recruit about 20 healthy volunteer adults who have been tested to ensure they are not infected with AIDS or have any other chronic illness, said Dr. William Schaffner, chairman of the Vanderbilt Preventive Medicine Department.

The vaccine will consist of purified glycoprotein—derived from a small portion of the AIDS virus, Graham said. The drug is similar in formula to one developed by a French researcher, Dr. Daniel Zagury, who inoculated himself and French and Zairean volunteers.

The French vaccine induces the pro-

duction of antibodies that, when extracted from the volunteers' blood, neutralized the AIDS virus in test tube experiments. However, no one knows whether the drug—or any like it—will protect against AIDS virus infection and resulting symptoms of disease.

Because the vaccines do not contain the whole, live AIDS virus, they do not cause infection themselves.

Schaffner said the vaccine candidate is the first of several and has been developed by a private firm, but will come to Vanderbilt through the NIH.

"We have been told to be prepared," he said. "Things are moving so rapidly. We're not sure (exactly when testing will begin) but we've been told that we might begin as early as October."

Graham said the Vanderbilt study would be limited to adults who have only one sex partner, to minimize exposure to the virus. Homosexual men, who have had a monogamous relationship and no evidence of the AIDS virus or Hepatitis B virus infections may participate, Graham said.

The university said it was chosen by the National Institutes of Health to be a test site. The other centers are the University of Maryland, Johns Hopkins University in Maryland, University of Rochester in New York, Marshall University in West Virginia and Baylor College of Medicine in Texas.

The Food and Drug Administration

must approve any vaccine candidate before testing in humans can begin. A spokesman there said two organizations have announced their application to the FDA for permission to test a vaccine. At least one other has sought permission, but its name has not been revealed.

"More than that, I can't say," the spokesman said.

A spokeswoman for the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, the NIH branch coordinating AIDS vaccine research, had said earlier in the day an announcement about a candidate AIDS vaccine and testing centers was expected in about a month, depending on FDA action.

However, the spokeswoman, Elaine Baldwin, said in a subsequent interview that all she had meant to indicate was that she would know more about the situation in a month.

Commenting on the Vanderbilt announcement, she said, "We had nothing whatever to do with that."

"It is true that we have talked with them (Vanderbilt officials)," she said, but "there's no specific vaccine" to test at the moment.

Robert E. Loeb, spokesman for the University of Rochester Medical Center, said the center will test "one of several vaccines" for the NIH starting this fall.

He said the details of the trial will be completed Aug. 19 at a meeting scheduled between the NIH and the investigators. The school hopes to recruit 10 to 20 volunteers this fall and have 100 within a year, but whether they would be drawn from high-risk populations was uncertain, he said.

Susannah Griffin, a spokeswoman for Baylor, confirmed the school had been designated as a test center.

However, Bruce Goldfarb, spokesman

for the University of Maryland, said the school had been told only it was one of six being considered as test sites.

"No grants have been approved yet," he said.

# Keeping the Silence: Knowing When and Where to Discuss Health

Marc Daniels has filed a complaint with the Texas Commission for Human Rights (TCHR) against a local Speedy Printing shop claiming he was fired because his roommate tested positive for the AIDS virus.

Stephen Little is suing Randall's Food Stores because he allegedly lost his job when management suspected him of having AIDS.

Another Montrose man was recently evicted from his apartment following weeks of harassment from neighbors after they learned he was suffering from the syndrome.

These instances and many more like them have something in common. Not only do they involve acquired immune deficiency syndrome, in each of the aforementioned incidences the individuals involved volunteered information regarding personal health matters to people they felt they could trust.

A Houston attorney who handles a number of human rights cases warns that as the gay community specifically, and society in general, wrestles with what many fear to be the most devastating health crisis of the 20th century, it has become increasingly important that people be extremely careful as to who they take into confidence when discussing personal, especially health, matters.

Attorney Jim Kuhn, who is currently assisting Daniels and Little in their fight as well as other clients in AIDS-related discrimination cases, says because of ignorance and panic individuals should avoid discussing their medical situation on the job.

"Remember what you are dealing with—hysteria," said Kuhn. He continues, "There's no need to discuss your medical situation on the job. It's not natural."

However, it is natural after spending many eight-hour days over a period of time, to establish a somewhat close relationship with your colleagues. In the case of Little, he confided in a fellow meat cutter.

Jack Bryce is named as a co-defendant in Little's case. Little claims that Bryce reported to Randall's management after Little told him he thought his roommate might have AIDS.

Little was asked to resign. When he refused, he was terminated.

Oftentimes under stress brought on by the knowledge that one has been touched by a life threatening disease, it is comforting to turn to a friend. In the case of Marc Daniels, it cost him his job.

According to Daniels, while involved in a conversation over AIDS testing with a co-worker, he revealed that his roommate had tested seropositive. He was dismissed from his job within 45 minutes.

"You can get caught off guard. You

don't think about it," warns Kuhn. "You just shouldn't be talking about in on the job."

Caution in discussing health matters should not be limited to the workplace. Even in social settings one should be careful as to whom they discuss health concerns.

Kuhn cites the bars as another place where open discussion of health matters, especially AIDS, should be avoided.

"People walk up to me and talk about taking the test and the results," related Kuhn. "You don't know who's around. It could be a landlord or neighbor."

Kuhn emphasizes that it is also important not to discuss the health status of others.

"For God's sake, don't gossip about someone's health," pleaded Kuhn. "Never repeat something you've heard."

Although voluntary disclosure of personal health matters should be avoided, Kuhn says that when approached by a superior on a health concern, honesty is important.

If asked by an employer about a health matter, Kuhn said the first response should be to ask for a reason for the inquiry.

Kuhn advises, "Ask them why they want to know."

If any medical costs covered by an employee insurance plan are involved, the employer already knows, adds Kuhn. Regardless, telling the truth is of utmost importance if any litigation is pursued following a job action.

"I just can't defend anyone who has lied," he added.

If one does find himself in a job-

threatening situation regarding AIDS there is some recourse. The Texas Commission on Human Rights accepts complaints and investigates charges of AIDS/ employment bias. The commission takes a maximum of six months to look into the matter and attempt a settlement. The commission usually seeks reinstatement with back pay for those found victim of discrimination. TCHR primarily handles employment complaints. Currently, they do not handle cases involving AIDS bias in housing.

Although the commission and attorneys such as Kuhn could possibly help an individual who has lost a job because of AIDS hysteria, Kuhn advises that one "avoid going through the hassle" by using a common sense and not discussing things that should remain private.

Even though recent headlines have been dotted with cases involving AIDS discrimination in housing, employment and the insurance industry, Kuhn says the only a small number of the people affected are coming forward.

He says that many are "ashamed. They take the B.S. and walk off (the job)." He continues, "I really wish they wouldn't."

Currently many human rights organizations are fervently lobbying state and national legislatures to gain more protection, not only for those with AIDS, but also those who are victims of a frightened and often uninformed society. But until the unlikely time that job protection can be guaranteed without lengthy and expensive bureaucratic and legal battles, it appears that silence is probably the best protection available as the AIDS witchhunt continues.

## Haughton Leaving Houston

Dr. James Haughton, Houston's health director, will be leaving Houston in a few months to accept an offer that he said he could not refuse.

Haughton, 63, refused to say where he was going until he made a formal announcement at a news conference Tuesday.

People close to Haughton say he accepted a post with the Drew P. Charles Postgraduate Medical School in Los Angeles. Haughton left that facility to come to Houston four years ago.

He said a salary increase was the main reason for his decision to leave. "Big bucks. It's that simple,"

Haughton said. "It's a new and different job. It will be challenging."

Haughton's salary in June 1986 was \$92,138. Although he has advised supervisors of his resignation, he said he plans to remain on the job in Houston for about two months.

He denied that recent controversy about his stance on AIDS triggered his resignation. Haughton has said acquired immune deficiency syndrome is a major health problem but not "the city's most serious health problem."

Houston, the nation's fourth largest city, ranks fourth in the number of AIDS cases.

## Judges to Send Prostitutes for AIDS Tests

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (UPI)—The chief of the state's District Court wants judges to give the names of prostitutes to health officials for possible AIDS testing because giving someone AIDS "sentences them to death."

Chief Judge Albert DeRobbio's decision is in line with a new Rhode Island state law that allows the head of the state Health Department to force an AIDS test on anyone who may be a threat to the public health.

The policy will cover prostitutes and anyone convicted of having sex with a prostitute, DeRobbio said.

"If you give someone AIDS, you sentence them to death," DeRobbio said Aug. 6.

Health Department Director H. Denman Scott said he will probably ask prostitutes to submit to the AIDS test because most people who are asked to take the test do.

If prostitutes or their convicted clients refuse, doctors will evaluate each case to determine if a test should be ordered. Doctors will examine several factors, including any apparent AIDS symptoms, in making their decision, Scott said.

DeRobbio, who had a clerk research his idea, said there's no question that the testing is constitutional.

Judges in Wisconsin and Texas have required AIDS tests for convicted prostitutes, and a Georgia judge offers reduced sentences to prostitutes who voluntarily take the tests.

Steven Brown, director of the Rhode Island American Civil Liberties Union, said, "I think it's a very unfortunate proposal."

"It will amount to a very serious invasion of privacy and yet do nothing to really counter the AIDS problem," he said.

The court policy, which is an advisory to judges, will take effect this month, DeRobbio said. The policy addresses earlier concerns about a proposal in which judges themselves would have ordered AIDS tests.

DeRobbio on July 9 became the first Rhode Island judge to order an AIDS test for a prostitute. Noting the test results are confidential, DeRobbio did tell the attorney general's office to charge the prostitute with attempted murder if her AIDS test was positive and she is caught soliciting again.

## AIDS Cases Climbing In San Antonio


SAN ANTONIO (UPI)—City health officials are anticipating a steep climb in AIDS cases, with 42 new cases reported in the city so far this year, compared to 48 cases for all of 1986.

Dr. Diane Simpson, the San Antonio Metropolitan Health District's coordinator for communicable diseases, said she expects the final 1987 count to double the 1986 rate of new cases of the acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

But Simpson said the higher numbers are not a cause for alarm, since San Antonio lags a year behind deficiency syndrome.

## 'Threat of AIDS' Claimed as Man's Defense

HOUSTON (UPI)—A man accused of murdering a high school teacher has asked a state district judge to order AIDS tests on the teacher's body or its autopsy samples.

Gerald Lynn Jackson, 20, is trying to build a self-defense case in the death of Joseph E. Lewis, 55, who was beaten to death in his home on Jan. 12. Lewis was an English teacher for Ross Sterling High School for 15 years.

His body was found after he failed to appear for work.

"I've heard of cases where the defend-

ant was tested for AIDS, but this is the first case I've heard of where we are asking for the deceased to be tested," defense attorney Wes Hocker said Thursday.

State district judge Doug Shaver has scheduled a Tuesday hearing on the matter.

Hocker claims Lewis threatened to transmit acquired immune deficiency syndrome by biting Jackson if he did not have sex with him.

"My client declined," Hocker told the Houston Chronicle. "There was a hell of a battle leading to the death."

The Harris County medical examiner's report on Lewis' autopsy made no mention of AIDS, but officials said AIDS tests are not routinely conducted in autopsies.

## Visitors to India to be Tested

NEW DELHI, India (UPI)—All foreign visitors planning to stay in India for more than one year will be required to take an AIDS test, a cabinet minister said Wednesday.

Saroj Khaparde, minister of state for health and family welfare, also told the upper house of Parliament foreign students would be admitted to Indian educational institutions only after proving they did not have the disease.

Khaparde said current foreign residents would be exempt from the new measures, but people intending to stay more than 12 months must give blood samples after arriving in India.

She did not specify exactly when the ruling would be implemented, but officials have said all foreign students applying for the 1988 academic year will be screened for AIDS.

That decision has prompted protests from African students, who constitute about 80 percent of India's foreign student community and claim the measure is racist and discriminatory.

Khaparde told legislators 13 people—nine Indians, two U.S. citizens and two Swiss nationals—had been diagnosed in India as having AIDS.

## Insurance Industry Wants AIDS Tests

AUSTIN (UPI)—The state Board of Insurance was considering an emergency rule Tuesday making it clear the insurance industry can require AIDS tests for applicants for life and health policies.

Although the industry often tests for the disease now, a recent law adopted by the Legislature raised doubts about the legality of the practice.

The new law restricts the use of AIDS test results but does not specifically mention insurance.

Lyndon Olson, chairman of the insurance board, said he does not believe the law was meant to apply to insurance companies. Industry officials say if they cannot test for AIDS, it would have a devastating effect on their ability to write new policies in Texas.

The board is scheduled at a later date to consider proposed regulations for the use of AIDS test results by the insurance industry.

Clovis Johnson, the assistant principal who hired Lewis, said Lewis "wasn't in the habit of threatening people" about anything. Johnson said he had no knowledge of allegations Lewis had AIDS.

"It looks like this young man (Jackson) picked up the paper and saw that AIDS is the thing to say," Johnson said. "It's a smoke screen to get out of killing a man."

Prosecutor Joan Campbell said she had not read Hocker's motion and could not comment. Lewis' relatives in Beaumont and homicide detectives who investigated the case were not available for comment.

# AIDS Changes School Board Policies

MIDLAND, Texas (UPI)—The Midland school board has given tentative approval to a policy on teachers with AIDS that was prompted by the disclosure that an elementary school teacher took a leave of absence in June because he had the disease.

The school board Tuesday night on first reading approved the policy, which is similar to the one in place for students with AIDS. If passed at the next school board meeting in two weeks, it will become district policy.

School district information officer Becky Ferguson said that teachers with AIDS will be handled on a case-by-case

basis. A review board comprised of the teacher, a school administrator, the teacher's physician and a physician selected by the school district will decide if the teacher is well enough to teach.

The policy also allows for the

teacher's right to privacy, but upon written authorization from the employee, the principal of the school may notify other teachers and the parents of students in the affected teacher's class.

The teacher will be observed daily for open lesions or skin breaks, Ferguson said.

The school district's policy is the same for children except for a section on student behavior such as biting, the spokeswoman said.

The Midland rules are not based on

any other because the Texas Association of School Boards does not have suggested policy on teachers with AIDS, Ferguson said.

The disclosure that a teacher at Crockett Elementary took a leave of absence because he had AIDS sparked parent meetings and eventually the proposed policy, Ferguson said. The teacher, whose name has not been disclosed, is on leave of absence from the school district and is not expected to teach this fall.

# This is a 'Maid to Order' Fairy Tale

*Maid to Order* is presented as a fairy tale in modern dress. Given the conventions of that form, it succeeds adequately.

Most fairy tales are predictable. This one is certainly no exception. Before the movie is half way through, you know what is going to happen. Then it does. Is this necessarily a negative factor?

My friends say yes, and not just in this movie. They feel that many of the movies lately are too predictable.

I once read a book that said that there are only some 50 plots which are ever used in any kind of fiction. Then, in a very scholarly way, it proceeded to list them. I agree with that book. I don't think audiences would be happy any other way.

If you were actually surprised by anything that happened in a movie, I think you would feel cheated. What if the sleuth (presuming we have been set up to root for him) never did find out who the murderer was? It happens all the time in real life. I have only seen it happen once in art. It worked that time, but only because the author had foreshadowed it. We had been, in several small ways, warned to look for it. And we were told who the murderer actually was, even if the detective wasn't. Otherwise, I'm sure I would never again have bought another book by that author.

We do like it when the writer flirts with us. If he tries to make us think that the inevitable is not going to happen, so long as he makes sure that he doesn't succeed, we applaud him for it. If he succeeds, if he blindsides us, we probably give him the cold shoulder. Don't worry. Most fairy tales don't even try to do that. This one doesn't.

It's straight forward. There are no turns from which you cannot see the rest of the path. A spoiled rich girl learns humility by having to work as a maid. She's rewarded by falling in love and seeing her new friends succeed. Period.

We like it when the standard plot is used to get across a point. Or at least we like it when pure escapist fare looks like it is trying to get across a complex message. That way we can feel smug about it without really having to think. Fairy tales have very simple morals very easily deciphered. They hit you over the head with them. This time out, it's important to really care about other people.

Style and wit also help. That's one place where this movie really shines. My neighbor Neal De Palma, the soon-to-be-published, didn't like the movie, but he loved the song. He knows *much* more than I do about pop music. So don't be surprised if it turns up in the top 10.

Fairy tales all pull from a common pile of elements. So do all genres, ultimately. This one pulls a lot, but usually is more than ready to admit it. You know how trendy it is to joke by obviously quoting another movie. This one not only does the expected fairy tale jokes—lost shoes, disappearing bubbles filled with magical women, etc., it also very wittily sails right over the audience's heads by pulling a Marlon Brando speech directly out of *Streetcar Named Desire* and putting it into the mouth of the heroine.

Maybe if the movie had been paced a little faster, we wouldn't have had time to have calibrated the ending so exactly. Still, it's a sweet little nothing widespread in our collective ear.

## □ *Masters of the Universe*

*Masters of the Universe* is a lot of fun. Artistically, it is a very derivative movie.

The legions of Skeletor's army are pure cannon fodder. The body count is enormous. Thankfully, nearly everyone dies the first time he is hit by a force beam. There is no realistic carnage here. These toy soldiers fall over as easily as toy soldiers (small ones) always have. I doubt any child will be led to violence by this movie—at least not any more violence than is already inherent in those little brutes.

Plagiarism is another matter entirely. But who among us has not copied something he shouldn't have?

When those soldiers first appear, not only are they wearing Star Wars storm trooper uniforms painted black, they are also marching very solemnly to a

the flying shirt, scarf and hat combo. Instead we have Billy Barty playing a very charming fantastic-dwarf. Unfortunately, he is obviously inside a puppet as was the guy playing Howard the Duck. You'd think they would have made it so that his facial expressions could change.

Also, most of the action takes place on Earth. I think they did that as much to save money as to try to make the movie more relevant. It also allows them to cross-index to *Back to the Future*.

Also, He Man's voice is not as heroic. Dolph Lundgren sounds like a cross between Schwartzennegger and Stallone. It's a little off-putting in this role. But he has a wonderfully gentle yet massive presence. Since the Oak is following Rambo down Violence Lane, let's hope this BB stays gentle and becomes the new Steve Reeves.

But, as with many "children's" shows, the villains are more interesting than the good guys. Meg Foster makes a deliciously nasty henchman. But the best thing in the movie is Frank Langella as Skeletor. Who else could be menacing and camp at the same time with such suave authority?

Not every movie needs to be artistically valid. All High Art and no playful Grade B would make Hollywood a very boring dream factory. This movie is hokey, but if that's what you're in the mood for, nothing else will do it, right now. (Well maybe Superman IV, which I've unfortunately missed myself so far.)

Patrick Swayze in person is fashionably dressed in very muted colors. He sports a two or three day old beard. He has a warm expansiveness you'd like to hug. He's everybody's big brother.

He smokes almost all the time he's talking to us, except when someone's taking pictures. He won't be photographed smoking because it'd be bad for the kids.

He grew up in Houston, went to Waltrip High School, fell in love with Arabian horses when he was about 10.

"I wanted for so many years to get rich enough to raise them. Now it turns out you don't have to be rich. You can go into partnerships, like my wife Lisa and I have with Tom McNair International.

"Horses don't lie. They don't backtalk. Well, they do backtalk. But that shows you they've got spirit you want to harness, not squelch. Still, it's not easy not to use the old two-by-four method of training when a horse pisses you off."

His mother Patsy had a dance company in Houston for 25 years.

"I'm a much better dancer than Johnny Castle." That's the character he plays in *Dirty Dancing*, which opens next Friday. "It was a real test for me to hold back by technique and years of training to fit the character.

"I don't consider this 'My Dance Movie.' This is a prick-tease dance movie. That last number could have gone off the boards and it doesn't. It'll seem like it does, though, to people who don't know dance.

Some of the most exciting footage seems lifted out of F.W. Murnau's *Metropolis*. Indeed, while that scene is going on, the screen subtly becomes nearly black and white.

But as Uncle Miltie says, "If it works, steal it." Nobody will mind so long as you can make it work, too. And they do make it work here. It's just that they swipe such large chunks at a time.

Those of you who are fans of the cartoon series will note several major changes in the movie. Two fairly major characters are missing: Battle cat and

"Lisa and I have three films in development for our company. Two of them are dance films. One of them features Gene Kelly. Now, there's a man's dancer.

"I've had four complete knee reconstructions in my life. After the first one from high school football, I still went to college on a gymnastics scholarship. But I'd better do the 'blow the cookies' films now. I'm not even sure I'll be able to run with my children a few years from now. But if I'd done dance films sooner, I would have lost some credibility as an actor.

"Lisa (Niemi) and Nicholas Cage and I wrote a play about dancers in New York, called Without a Word—although it's got plenty of them. It won six critics' awards in L.A. I hope it opens in New York soon.

"I've been best known for action films so far. That's dangerous, too. Filming *Uncommon Valor*, an uncooperative fight partner broke the cartilage in my ear and two of my ribs. Now I don't have to play Mr. Tuff Dude anymore.

"Hollywood's continuous sell-out for action or sex makes me want to puke. I don't want to take even a lead role anymore unless it will contribute to other people's lives and affect them—leave a mark on them. I want to play real human beings, based in reality. I would have given my left, uh, ear to play the gay character in *The Kiss of the Spider Woman*.

"I'm real passionate about this stuff about my responsibility to impressionable kids. That's why I took this role in *Dirty Dancing*. It encourages kids to go for their dreams.

"It's worth finding the discipline at all costs. Keep styding. Too many people get off the plane as good as they're ever going to get."

**Summer Movies are Hits on Music Charts**

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Hits by rock star Madonna, "Who's That Girl," and the Latino band Los Lobos, "La Bamba," from movie soundtracks grabbed the top two spots on Billboard magazine's singles chart this past week.

Pop queen Madonna took only six weeks to reach No. 1 with "Who's That Girl," her fifth chart topping single.

Although the Warner Bros. movie starring Madonna and Griffin Dunne has withered in the summer heat at the box office, the "Who's That Girl" soundtrack was a brisk seller at No. 13 in its second week on the Top LP chart.

When "La Bamba" was originally released by Ritchie Valens in 1959 it only climbed to No. 22, but the Los Lobos version hit No. 2 after eight weeks on the chart.

The "La Bamba" soundtrack, like the movie—which has played to packed houses in both English and Spanish—has surprised industry professionals by moving into the eighth slot on the LP list.

Los Lobos, an East Los Angeles band that draws on its Hispanic roots to offer a variety of Tex-Mex, evocative R & B and old time rock 'n' roll released their second LP, the weighty "By The Light Of The Moon," last winter to rave critical reviews.

"Sure, we're singing about some heavy things, but there's more to life than problems," says drummer and guitarist Louie Perez, who along with

lead singer David Hidalgo writes most of the group's music. "But there's more to life than problems. Music is for good times and good feelings and as much as we wanted to tell the truth, we also wanted to rock the house."

The "material girl's" previous chart toppers include "Like A Virgin" (1984), "Crazy for You" (1985), "Live to Tell" (1986) and "Papa Don't Preach" (1986).

Elsewhere on the the Hot 100 singles chart, Suzanne Vega's "Luka" moved up to No. 3, followed by Richard Marx's "Don't Mean Nothing." Dropping two spots to No. 5 was George Michael's controversial "I Want Your Sex."

Whitney Houston remained queen of the Top LP chart with "Whitney." Whitesnake's "Whitesnake" moved up one place to No. 2, pushing Heart's "Bad Animals" to No. 3. L.L. Cool J's "Bigger And Deffer" rapped steady at No. 4, as U2's "Joshua Tree" stood tall at No. 5.

Levert's "Casanova" romanced its way to the top of the Hot Black singles chart, followed by Natalie Cole's "Jump Start" at No. 2. Smokey Robinson was "One Heartbeat" away at No. 3. Leaping four rungs to No. 4 was Force M.D.'s "Love Is a House." Georgio' "Tina Cherry" was in the fifth slot.

"Love Power" by the dynamic duo of Dionne Warwick and Jeffrey Osborne edged out Steve Winwood's "Back In The Highlife Again" for top honors in the Hot Adult Contemporary category. Vega's "Luka" remained vigilant at No. 3 for another week, as Robinson's "Heartbeat" moved to No. 4 and Michael Jackson's "I Can't Stop Loving You" jumped six places to round out the top five.

Restless Heart's "Why Does It Have to Be" crowned the Hot Country singles chart, followed by Highway 101's "Whiskey, If You Were A Woman," and Hank William Jr.'s "Born To Boogie."

Exile moved to the fourth spot with "She's Too Good to Be True" and Kenny Rogers and Ronnie Milsap were in No. 5 with "Make No Mistake, She's Mine."

"Jane Fonda's Low Impact Aerobic Workout" remained a step ahead of "Top Gun" on Billboard's videocassette sales chart, "Callanetics" danced to No. 3. Walt Disney's "Here's Mickey!" remained strong at No. 4. Fonda's "New Workout" grabbed the fifth slot.

For the second week, "The Color Purple" topped videocassette rentals, followed by the "The Golden Child" and "Crimes of the Heart." "Little Shop of Horrors," No. 4, edged out "Hannah and Her Sisters" at No. 5.

# Success of 'Painting' Depends on Illusions

The Houston House production of *Painting Churches* is the second time I've seen this script done. This is a very nice production. If you've never seen this play, I recommend it very strongly. Unfortunately if you have, then I don't.

Tina Howe's script depends, for its full effect, on several illusions. These secrets are just under the surface, scratching to find a way out. This results in itching suspense, unless of course, you know them already.


With just three characters, Ms. Howe somehow shows us the grandeur, horror, and pity of the human condition in nearly mythic proportions. Even knowing what to expect, some scenes affected me very deeply.

The elements of the plot are all too simple. It's too difficult to forget any of the details. An artist, the daughter of a poet laureate, returns home to help her parents pack to retire for good at their beach house. She is on the verge of real success and it would mean a great deal to her to have a portrait of her parents. For some mysterious reason, however, her mother doesn't want her to paint it.

Marilyn Rogers, as Mags Church, the painter is sweet, pretty and intellectually interesting. As her dizzy mother, Phyllis Dorflinger is very good, but I wish he had been a touch dottier. Martin Fleck is every inch the preoccupied philosopher and reads poetry in a way that captures all of the music and the meaning. The Alley production a while back was all sharp corners and slick surfaces compared to this softer homier version. These people are more the nice family down the block. I don't really think it's their fault that their secrets were open books to me right from the start.

Director Dottie Greenwood has made excellent use of the Houston House's unique space. She has also carefully pointed up all of the humor, and there is a lot of it, inherent in the piece.

Believe me, tenderfoots should hot foot it downtown to see this treat.
