

FREE HURRICANE CHARTS---Neele Brown, Engineering Field Department, examines one of the Shell hurricane maps. Shell service stations in this area have been designated distribution centers for the hurricane information tracking charts. They are free and are available at participating stations. The chart contains a large map of the Gulf of Mexico-Caribbean Sea areas -- spawning ground for hurricanes which might threaten this area. The map contains clearly defined horizontal and vertical lines to indicate longitude and latitude to assist in plotting the progress and movements of a hurricane. The chart also contains general information about the nature of hurricanes, and lists several safety rules to follow before, during, and after a storm. A table beneath the map is provided to record timely data about the hurricane as the information is received from the U. S. Weather Bureau.







NOTE TO PARENTS

Some Texas teen-agers under age 18 may still obtain a driver's license before August 28, the effective date the revised driver licensing law goes into effect, according to the Texas Safety Association. Sixteen and 17-year-olds may obtain an operator's license whether they have passed an approved course in driver education or not, if they make application and pass the examinations prior to that date. After August 28, 16 and 17-year-olds may obtain a license only if they have passed an approved driver education course. However, an exception is to be made in cases where the applicant has not had an opportunity to take the prescribed course through his local school.


