Excavation Almost **Complete On New Cullen Building**

About 90 per cent of the excavaion for the Ezekiel Cullen Administration building is now complete, John D. Kenney, Jr., project engineer of Bellows Construction Co., has announced. Within one or two weeks, excavation is expected to be completed, he said.



Bottom and side beams for the first floor are being built in the north wing. Footings are being poured in the center section, and the ground floor wall forms are underway in the south wing of the deluxe administration building, Mr. Kenney said.

"It will be one of the finest buildngs the Bellows Construction Co. has ever built," A. G. Gardner, superintendent of construction, said. The front wing of the building, facing the reflection pool, will be 434 feet long. From the front wing (Continued on Page 3)



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
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
