Minutes of the November Meeting Margret Simmons

Learning Corner: David Bradford talked about sparrows found on the roadside and in hedgerows.

Chairman Skip Almoney conducted the meeting.

Bird Sightings: Two Short-eared Owls were seen this morning at Morrison & Pattison Rd. in Waller Co. Other birds seen recently were Broad-billed Hummingbird in Willowbend area; also White-tailed hawk and Pine Warblers.

Budget Approval: A sheet was made available with the 2001 budget and two proposed budgets for 2002, a "bare bones" and an "active" budget. A motion was made and seconded to approve the "active" budget. Some discussion followed about dropping some of the items (hawk count & Christmas count boat) and not wanting to raise dues any more since we lost some members the last time dues were raised. Suggestions were made to use grocery store cards or to have seminars with fees to raise money. Some were concerned that the "active" budget could leave us with a large deficit if we fail to get new members, but others thought it was worth the risk. The mo-

tion to accept the "active" budget passed.

Memorial Park Golf Expansion: After some discussion, a nearly unanimous decision was reached for the Ornithology Group to actively oppose any expansion of the golf course in Memorial Park in order to bring the PGA tour there.

Monthly Field Trips: Glenn Olsen announced that the December trip is the Houston CBC on the 15th; January 12 & 13 are David Bradford's sparrow trips to West Harris County; and February is a trip to Huntsville State Park.

Quarterly Field Trips: OG had a very successful trip to Rockport led by Michael Marsden. Thanks to Margaret Butler for all her work. The next trip will be to the Rio Grande Valley led by David Sarkozi February 15-17. The following quarterly trip is tentatively to Choke Canyon. A summer trip to Costa Rica is planned for June 8-15 led by David Sarkosi. David Poteet is planning to take a group to the Davis Mountains in early June for 6 or 7 days.

Environmental Issues: The ONC has a website at www.outdoornatureclub.org that has current information on environmental issues. Everyone is encouraged to go to the Dec. 12 hearing on expanding the Bayport Container facility to oppose it. Another concern is the proposal before Galveston City Council to build a golf course on East Beach. The EPA may have to get involved on the Houston ozone requirements being set by the Texas Senate environmental committee.

January 12, 2002 Saturday 7:30am

David Bradford will lead this field trip to West Harris County in search of the many wintering sparrow species. Meet at Peggy Wilson Elementary School.

Directions: From the intersection of I-10 and Highway 6, go north on Hwy. 6, past Clay Road to Keith Harrow Road. Turn left (west) onto Keith Harrow and continue to Windsong and the Peggy Wilson Elementary School (key map 407B). Park in the parking lot.

January 13, 2002 Sunday 7:30am

We are in for a special treat—David Bradford has offered to conduct this trip in search of wintering sparrows but with special emphasis for the beginner or those of us who need extra study on sparrows. Meet at Peggy Wilson Elementary School (see directions above).

February 15-17 Rio Grande Valley (Quarterly Field Trip)

David Sarkozi will lead this trip to the Rio Grande Valley for the weekend. Details have not been finalized, but we will drive to the Valley on Friday and have a full day of birding on Saturday and Sunday morning before returning to Houston. The preliminary itinerary is to bird Bentsen, Anzulduas and Santa Ana on Saturday and then visit a parrot roost at dusk. On Sunday we will probably bird the upper Valley, including Chapeno, Salineo and Falcon Lake, then try Zapata before heading home through Zapata, Hebbornville, Freer to US 59. A Sunday alternative would be to bird Sabal Palm or Laguna Atascosa and leave for home from there. It may also be possible for some birding on Friday afternoon, if people are able to drive down on Friday morning. If interested, contact Skip Almoney at skipalm@aol.com or 713-524-4285.

Summer 2002 Costa Rica

David Sarkozi will be the leader for this trip assisted by his wife Cheryl. This tentative itinerary and cost estimate are being published early to allow plenty of time for members to consider the trip and make necessary plans.

June 8, 2002	Depart IAH Saturday morning and arrive in Costa Rica in early afternoon. For the next three nights we'll stay at the Hotel Fiesta in Puntarenas.
June 9	Birding in the Palo Verde N.P. in the Guanacaste region
June 10	Birding in the Carara N.P., Pacific Lowlands
June 11	Travel to Monteverde. We'll stay at the Cloud Forest Lodge. We'll bird our way to Monte verde, plus birding on the Hotel's five miles of trails
June 12	Birding in the Monteverde Preserve
June 13	Birding at the Sky Walk or Santa Elana Preserve
June 14	Depart Monteverde. Birding in the afternoon at Tipanti N.P. in the Caribbean Foothills. Evening in San Jose at the Best Western Irazu.
June 15	Depart San Jose for Houston

The expected cost will be about \$1400 per person. This price includes lodging, transportation and airfare. The first three nights will be all-inclusive and includes meals, drink and alcoholic beverages. Meals will be out of pocket after that. One person should be able to eat very well on less than \$30 a day. David expects we can find at least 250 species of birds with some luck. Wow this was some month— 178 species were reported. I count 7 new weekly records the for the checklist, and 21 species were rare at least for the week. There was one blockbuster bird, ***Elegant Tern*** which, when the record is accepted, will be a new species for the Upper Texas Coast Checklist. Other very notable birds are ***Broad-billed Hummingbird*** (Texas Review Species) and ***Cordilleran Flycatcher*** (second UTC record). It was a huge hummingbird month. In addition to the previously mentioned Broad-billed Hummingbird there also Buff-bellied, Ruby-throated, Black-chinned, Calliope, Broad-tailed, and Rufous Hummingbirds reported for a total of seven species for the month. Wintering shore-bird diversity looks good, 27 species reported. Notable were several reports of Red Knots.

Keep those reports coming. This data is what makes our checklist so accurate.

The format this month is Species, date, County(location) # of birds, Observer. Those birds that are listed at uncommon to abundant in *A Birder's Checklist of the Upper Texas Coast 8th edition* for the whole month are summarized. Birds in **Bold** are rare by the checklist and those underlined are new to the checklist for that week. Notes are requested for those species listed in **bold**. Not all notes received for November are printed here because of space limitations.
