



CESAR A. LOMBANA BECOMES U.S. CITIZEN

Cesar A. Lombana of the Technological Department became a proud citizen of the United States of America the morning of August 6, 1965. A brief congratulatory "coffee-break" for Cesar was held in the Tech Library that same afternoon.

Cesar moved with his family to the United States from Panama City March 29, 1960, on a non-visa resident's card. This card, which had to be carried at all times, entitled Cesar to apply for citizenship after five years.

At the time, Cesar knew very little of the English language. Nevertheless, he enrolled in Nicholl's College in Thibodaux, Louisiana, in September 1960, and took an engineering course for two years. He had to learn the English language the hard way as his studies progressed. In September 1962, Cesar was admitted to Tulane University on a scholarship. He graduated with a B.S. degree in Chemical Engineering in the Spring of 1965 and was employed as an Engineer in the Technological Department June 3.

Cesar made application for United States citizenship in New Orleans on March 29, 1965, and took his oral examination at that time



BE HAPPY, GO LEGAL

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced that it has shipped new fishing and hunting licenses to the licensed dealers throughout Texas. The new licenses are required after September 1, and cost \$2.15 for fishermen and \$3.15 for the hunters.

The shrimping season in the major bays on the Texas Coast opened recently. Regulations this season are essentially the same as last year. A sportsman possessing both a sport fishing license and a three-dollar Individual Bait-Shrimp Trawl License may take up to 100 pounds of legal size whole shrimp per day from the major bays.

The sportsman's trawl may not exceed 20 feet in width or have mesh size smaller than 5 stretched meshes in 8-3/4 inches. Trawl boards up to 15 to 30 inches or 450 square inches are permitted.

REFINERY SON WINS DIXIE PONY LEAGUE TROPHY




Gary Jensen and the bat that won him this year's Dixie Pony League batting championship.




ENGINEERING FIELD'S W. L. CALHOUN AND RETIREES J. B. JONES AND B. C. SYKES DIE
