The "Covenant on Human Rights" of United Nations Has Turned Out To Be the Tail That Wags the Dog

A Thieves' Market Is the Natural Habitat of Crooks

As the avalanche of government scandals in Washington descends with an increasing force and momentum that causes Fair Deal officials to hop around like Mexican jumping beans, American taxpayers should take time out for a little calm appraisal and reflection.

After all, there should be nothing surprising in the disclosure that an organized ring of racketeers is operating in the Revenue Department from New York to San Francisco and points between.

The Federal tax set-up is a natural for skulduggery and sharp practises and the wonder is not how so many crooks could be gathered together in one agency but that there were not more vandals taking suckers who were ripe for the plucking.

The whole national tax structure is corrupt, immoral and unsound for it is based largely on an amendment to the Constitution of the United States which was conceived in error, born in ignorance and swaddled in avarice and greed.

When politicians are given a lawful license to steal and granted unlimited authority to rob the taxpayer of his money and his substance, the inevitable result is the building of a governmental Thieves' Market where the simple are shorn and the cunning reap the harvest of golden fleeces.

And so, it is asking too much of weak human nature to expect men to work, year after year, under conditions where legalized robbery, extortion and confiscation of property form the basis of tax levies they must collect, and not have the urge to shake down some of the easy dough themselves.

For that matter Harry Truman, himself, is the biggest political thief in all history and his right to steal is defended and guaranteed by an amendment to the Constitution which was written by members of Congress who did not realize what they were doing and ratified by members of State legislatures who didn't care.

How many Americans know that the Constitution as originally framed by statesmen and patriots, with a prescience and foresight which enabled them to envision the type of national leadership with which we are currently cursed, specifically prohibited Congress from levying a direct or income tax?

These wise founders of the American Republic could foresee that the right to levy such a tax could lead to the accumulation of vast sums of money and power by unscrupulous leaders which it was never intended for our elected public officials to possess.

ANY SENATOR SUPPORTING THE ADOPTION OF THIS MONSTROSITY IS COMPOUNDING THE FELONY HE COMMITTED WHEN HE VOTED THE UNITED STATES INTO A SUBVERSIVE WORLD ORGANIZATION.

We cannot believe that members of the Senate realized the enormity of their offense against the prestige and dignity of their country when, on July 28, 1945, they voted the United States into the United Nations in order to "insure peace and prevent aggression."

It is difficult to accept the proposition that duly elected representatives of the American people would deliberately commit us to membership in a world organization composed mostly of Socialist and Communist representatives, and intentionally confer on such organization the authority to override the Constitution of the United States and annual State and municipal laws in the nation.

But that is not only what can happen here; it is what has already happened in this "land of the free and home of the brave" with a threat of complete restriction of liberties if the Senate goes further and adopts the "Covenant on Human Rights."

First, the Constitution was negated by the president who, in direct violation of its provisions and in an unprecedented executive action, declared war on his own responsibility and without the consent and approval of the Congress. He neatly evaded the issue by asserting that the Korean War was a "police action" of the United Nations, even though it is mainly American boys who are stopping the bullets and American money which is paying the cost.

Second, a State law was just as casually annulled when a California Federal judge, one of the breed which is bringing disgrace to the whole judiciary, ruled that a law of that State was invalid because it was in conflict with the Charter of the United Nations.

His ruling was in connection with the Alien Land Law of California which prevents the ownership of land by Japanese and, regardless of whether outsiders think it is or is not a sound law, when it was adopted by the lawmaking body of that State it became, under our form of government, inviolate and subject to repeal only by a succeeding session of the California legislature.

Third, another of the misfits on the Federal bench ruled that an ordinance adopted by the Seattle City Council was unconstitutional because it was opposed to the policies of the United Nations.

The local ordinance in question prevented an alien from owning any business in that city and, again, regardless of any one's opinion on the subject, it was passed by their city council and is nobody's business except that of the people of Seattle who are solely possessed of the power to repeal it.

When the matter of voting on membership in the United Nations was before the Senate on that ill-fated day in July of 1945, there was a lot of steam and hot air let off to the effect that every nation becoming a member of the world organization would retain its full sovereignty and independence, and that our sole purpose in joining it was to "preserve peace and prevent aggression."

Less than seven years later, we find that not only has our own sovereignty been voided and our independence violated on national State and local levels, but that Russia, who, through her representatives, including Alger Hiss, largely dictated the United Nations Charter, has committed acts of aggression which has given her dominion over the major part of the world's territory and population.

Also, it is now clear that Americans stand to lose their basic individual rights when, and if, members of the Senate compound their act of felony and adopt the "Covenant on Human Rights" soon to be submitted to them in the form of a treaty.

Born in the distorted minds of neuter-gendered males and emotionally frustrated females who have labored like cut worms in a cabbage to grind out a textbook on human behavior, this monstrosity prescribes and limits the moral, social and political action of every American from the time when he is first laid in a swaddling cloth until that final hour when he's enfolded in his shroud.

One of the inalienable rights of Americans, from the highest to the humblest, is to question, counsel with, and advise those elected to frame our laws.

Proceeding under this prerogative, American voters in swarms and droves should ask each of their two senators, and demand an answer, as to whether or not he knew when he helped to vote us into the UN that "preservation of peace and prevention of aggression" was just a side issue and that the catch was the "Covenant on Human Rights", and its illegitimate offspring "UNESCO."

Also, he should be made to state whether or not he meant to confer on UNESCO the authority to re-vamp the educational system of this country and, in cooperation with subversives from Columbia University, the National Education Association and other Socialistic groups, to design a program for destroying all sense of loyalty and allegiance to the United States in the hearts and minds of American school children.

He should be compelled to say whether or not he favors UNESCO'S plan to sup-

We Should Take The United States Out Of The United Nations And Leave Mrs. Roosevelt In It

Archbishop J. Francis A. McIntyre, spiritual leader of 875,000 Catholics in the Los Angeles area, in a recent interview to the press, strongly condemned the idea of Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt serving as Chairman of the Commission on Human Rights of the United Nations.

His opposition was based on recent statements of Mrs. Roosevelt over a national radio chain in which she asserted that she didn't know whether or not she believed in a future life.

"She implies that she has outgrown a 'great many' of the Christian teachings her grandmother accepted," the Bishop said. "She states she is uncertain about a future life, and hence must doubt the immortality of the soul."

The Bishop further stated that he considers it a "strange situation that one who is chairman of the Human Rights Commission should, on the question of religion, assume the role of an agnostic and fatalist."

On the question of Mrs. Roosevelt's fitness to hold any official position in which the interests of the people of this country are at stake, we have very definite views.

In the case of the Commission on Human Rights, or any other division of the United Nations, however, we can understand why she would be chosen, and if the good Bishop had ever read the "covenant" of Human Rights, he would surely realize that it would be inevitable that some one like her should be selected.

No person who believes in the American form of government, who has respect for the Constitution of the United States, or reverence for the tenets of the Christian religion would associate with the rattle-brained Socialists, Atheists and Communists who, in the main, compose the United Nations, much less serve as chairman of one of its sub-divisions.

It is not important that we get Mrs. Roosevelt out as Chairman but that we put sufficient pressure on the members of the United States Senate to make them rescind their blundering action of 1945 when they voted us into the outfit.

In other words, let us get the United States out of the United Nations and leave Mrs. Roosevelt in it for she is in congenial company whose language she understands and with whose alien ideologies she is in perfect accord.

Negro Communist Sympathizer Charges Practice of "Genocide"

American fellow travellers and alien radicals who framed the "Covenant on Human Rights" apparently ran out of words and decided to coin their own.

One of the new terms bursting upon the horizon as a result of their deliberations was "Genocide" which they snatched out of thin air.

It does not appear in the dictionary and no one, including those who thought it up, knows what it means.

At the time of its initial appearance, we predicted that it was some new device to be used in connection with pressure for racial equality in the South and that is how it turns out.

Recently one thousand characters, headed by the notorious Negro Communist sympathizer, Paul Robeson, showed up at the United Nations and charged the United States Government with "Genocide" against negroes. The group was sponsored by the Civil Rights Congress listed by the attorney general as subversive and Communist.

The negro leader said that "Genocide" existed in this country "particularly in the South."

He and his gang were received with respect by the officials of the UN outfit who assured him the matter would be put "in the proper hands."

"We Killed A Bear," Says A Spokesman of United Nations

In one of her recent columns from Paris, Eleanor Roosevelt wrote feelingly of having witnessed a ceremony in which the flag of the United Nations was raised in honor of a group of Korean war veterans who are touring the world.

She was ecstatic to the point of having goose pimples over the fact that her two-year-old great grand son was present and so could be told "in after years" of having witnessed a symbol of the "collective effort against aggression" which she said was now being made by the fighting forces of the United Nations.

If her great grand son "in after years" ever develops to the point where he has the mentality of an under-nourished potato bug or the energy of a broken-backed caterpillar, he may do a little research of his own and find out that his great grand dame's ideas of "collective effort" were a wee bit cockeyed.

the Constitution, the Sixteenth amendment was later passed which not only nullified this wise provision but which specifically gave Washington tax grabbers the right to take every penny of a citizen's income if they decided they wanted it.

Evidently suffering from severe cases of mental malnutrition, those who wrote the amendment simply worded it in this brief manner: "The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on income from whatever sources derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration."

"That's all there is; there ain't no more." There was no ceiling or maximum amount specified and the sky was the limit. It was a case of winner take all and the taxpayers could go hang.

As we have pointed out before, it was the most cowardly and abject surrender of property rights in human history.

Not one person in ten thousand realized what was happening and a fast curve was unintentionally thrown the taxpayers with no one to warn of the dangers involved.

Fortunately, there are other groups now who are working just as quietly, but with loftier motives, to get the Sixteenth amendment repealed and substitute one which limits the amount of income tax which can be levied against the citizen to a maximum of twenty-five per cent.

Twenty-five States have acted favorably on the matter and when seven more have taken similar action Congress will be compelled to submit the new amendment back to the States for ratification.

Thomas Jefferson may have had this eventuality in mind when he said in the long ago:

"In questions of power, then, let no more be heard of confidence in man, but bind him down from mischief by the chains of the Constitution."

One person out of every 26 in the United States is receiving some type of public relief and during 1951 taxpayers had to divvy up almost two and a quarter billion dollars for relief and welfare. If we have to pay that much under Fair Deal planning for relief in "prosperous" times, what will the ante be when a depression hits?

Covenant On Human Rights Seeks To Override United States Constitution Attorney Charges

The United States by adopting the United Nations Charter has sold its constitutional birthright for a mess of world government pottage, according to R. A. Stuart, Fort Worth attorney, ranchman and oil operator.

Mr. Stuart who has made a special study of the subject and has been bringing the matter to public attention in various addresses to civic clubs, educational, religious and other groups gives documentary evidence that the Covenant on Human Rights seeks to nullify the Bill of Rights in our own Constitution.

Referring to the VI amendment to our Bill of Rights which provides that all persons charged with crime shall be entitled to a public hearing, he points out that Article 10, Section 1 of the Covenant on Human Rights invalidates this provision in our Constitution in these words: "The press and public may be excluded from all parts of a trial for reasons of morals, public order or national security, or where the interest of juveniles so requires or to the extent strictly necessary in the opinion of the Court in special circumstances where publicity would prejudice the interest of justice."

Amendment I of our Constitution which guarantees religious freedom and provides that no law shall be passed with respect to religion is overridden, Mr. Stuart points out, by Article 13, Section 2 of the Covenant which says: "Freedom to manifest one's religion or belief shall be subject only to such limitations as are pursuant to

law and are reasonably necessary to protect public safety, order, health or morals of the fundamentals rights or freedom of others."

The provisions in our Constitution which guarantee freedom of speech and of the press would be annulled by the Covenant's counter provision in Article 14, Paragraph 3 of the Covenant which says: "The right to seek, receive and impart information and ideas carries with it special duties and responsibilities and may therefore be subject to certain penalties, liabilities and restrictions but these shall be such only as are provided by law and are necessary for the protection of national security, public order, health or morals or the rights, freedoms or reputations of others."

Charging that the intent of those who wrote the Covenant to nullify the United States Constitution and set up one of their own choosing is obvious to the most casual reader of the document, Mr. Stuart expressed amazement that the Constitutional lawyers in the Senate had failed to recognize this infringement on our organic law and repudiate it, when a vote on our membership in UN was taken in July of 1945.

He expressed approval of a resolution before the Senate by Senator Bricker of Ohio which seeks to restrict the Covenant on Human Rights within the limits of the Constitution and expressed the hope that this resolution will be adopted by the Senate.

press the teaching of American history and American geography in American schools and if he endorses their proposal to substitute an International Anthem for our National Anthem in American class rooms as laid down in UNESCO's published volume titled "Toward World Understanding."

Also, he should be compelled to announce his position publicly on UNESCO's proposal to remove from little children's minds the "prejudice resulting from prior home influences" and to offset the "narrow family spirit" through propaganda as proposed in this same book.

He should be made to frankly give his opinion on UNESCO's proposal to conduct sex research in the class room and whether he would want his own young children or grandchildren asked these questions: "are there devices for limiting the family" and "what are supposed to be the typical feelings of a pregnant woman" as demanded in UNESCO's "Handbook for the Improvement of Textbooks and Teaching Materials."

He should also be pinned down on the manner in which the demand for the right of white persons and negroes to marry as provided for in the "Covenant on Human Rights" is going to advance the program of "preserving peace and preventing aggression."

In addition, he should be reminded that if he intends to support the Covenant embodying this unspeakable proposal, he is implying, by his vote, that he would offer no objection if his own young daughter should announce her engagement to a coal black negro from a Mississippi cotton patch.

No member of the United States Senate or any other lawmaking body on earth, has a moral right to officially approve depraved conduct in others and object to members of his own family participating in the same degrading practices.

If he expresses approval of this Covenant, or refuses to clearly state his position on any of the debased proposals of the filthy-minded degenerates who framed the documents, then a deluge of protests in the form of letters, post cards and telegrams should shower down on him like snowflakes on a Siberian concentration camp until he is forced to respect the viewpoint of the decent element of his constituency.

Only members of the Senate can vote on the adoption of the "Covenant on Human Rights" with its allied evil, UNESCO, and as there are only two senators from each State the job of convincing them that no further nonsense in regard to the United Nations will be tolerated, should be comparatively easy.

After all, a senator is a public servant sent to Washington to represent the will of the people of his State, to uphold the Constitution of the United States and protect and preserve our national sovereignty and not to conspire with aliens and subversives to change our form of government.

A bill by Congressman John T. Wood of Idaho has been introduced demanding that we withdraw from the United Nations altogether and this, of course, should be passed. But the majority of sentiment in the Senate seems to be that this organization is our only hope for "world peace" and that we are committed too far to withdraw from the outfit entirely.

Of course such views are not based on any original thinking. Somebody, somewhere at sometime, expressed that belief and, like a bunch of sheep stupidly following their leader, many senators fell in line and have adopted this opinion as their own. They can't defend it; they can only repeat it like parrots.

Whether or not we withdraw from the United Nations, the preservation of a decent way of life and of the Republic demands that its subversive affiliate known as the "Covenant on Human Rights" be overwhelmingly rejected.

It was designed by world Communists, assisted by their American stooges, for the regimentation of the American people, the abolition of the American form of government and the elimination of the American home as the basic unit of our society.

It is being submitted in the form of a treaty in order to insure that it will become the supreme law of the land.

It's a Long Way From Harry L. Daugherty to J. Howard McGrath

Harry L. Daugherty was the Attorney General under the Harding Administration who was labelled as a scoundrel of the first order because of some scandals in his department which at that time seemed a shocking betrayal of public trust.

Of course that was in the Twenties when the people were still operating under the horse-and-buggy theory that honesty and integrity were necessary attributes of those appointed to high office by the president.

We have come a long way since that dark period in history and our more enlightened conception of a public servant's responsibilities now enables us to appreciate that a government position is only a part-time job and that brilliant Federal employes cannot be expected to confine their activities within the narrow limits of their departmental responsibilities.

The evidence of our progressive thinking in such matters is just now becoming apparent with the revelations of a Congressional Investigating Committee which is presenting to public view some of the late models in government career men as selected by our last two Attorneys General, the Honorable Tom Clark and the Honorable J. Howard McGrath.

Meantime some of us old fogeys are so old-fashioned and antiquated in our mental processes that we still think the people back in those days had something when they demanded almost unanimously that an Attorney General who loaded his office with racketeers and crooks should be kicked out of office.

We were very intolerant back in the Twenties and didn't know a thing about the New Order and the Universal Brotherhood of man.

All we had sense enough to do was recognize a crook when we saw one.

Call Justice Clark, Too

More than one occupant of the attorney general's office owes an explanation of his conduct as the result of the expanding testimony before the house ways and means subcommittee which is investigating the scandals within the Bureau of Internal Revenue and the Department of Justice.

Justice Tom Clark of the United States Supreme Court accepted the hospitality of a man under investigation by the tax collectors while he was still attorney general. Mr. Clark was a guest of the same Mr. Whitehead who was so kind in providing air transportation to T. Lamar Caudle, then head of the tax division. Mr. Clark picked out such nice places as Myrtle Beach, S. C., and Atlantic City, N. J., as the points of destination for his trips. He evidently asked no questions about his host.

A more important line of questioning, if the house committee is able to get Mr. Clark to testify, is why was Mr. Caudle brought into the Department of Justice first as head of the crime division and then transferred to the top spot in tax prosecutions? Mr. Clark was responsible for both these moves and Mr. Caudle by the character of his testimony should never have been given either post.

Members of the investigating committee are anxious, they say, to determine by what reasoning Mr. Clark arrived at the conclusion that Mr. Caudle was qualified to head the tax division. He had had no tax law experience.

There must have been some reason why Mr. Clark thought it wise to move Mr. Caudle into a post for which he was not qualified by either training or experience. The obvious suggestion is that the action was political.

And that is the trouble with the Department of Justice now and for some time in the past. It has obviously been operated with political considerations rather than with even and equal justice. An examination of Mr. Clark as well as J. Howard McGrath, the present attorney general, may throw light into what appears at present to be very dark corners.

Judge Above Law?

It is growing quite evident that the House committee investigating the scandals in the Internal Revenue Bureau and the Justice Dept. is not going to call for the testimony of the Texan on the Supreme Court—Tom Clark—of whom Texas is not always proud.

The answer to "Why?" might be interesting.

Can it be that America has strayed so far from the ideals of the Founding Fathers that there are men in Government who are above the law?

If Mr. Citizen is called and questioned, why not Mr. Justice, or even Mr. President.

In the earlier days of the Republic—days when the country was tougher and freer and its government was more nearly honest—the justices of the Supreme Court were earthly citizens. They rode the circuit, they disagreed and quarreled, they took part in politics, they acted like men, not as so many legal eagles sitting aloof on a high perch watching the actions of the ordinary people below.

But today's justices can descend from their perch when they wish, as when two of them testified for Alger Hiss who was convicted of being a liar when he said he was not a Communist traitor. If two can do that, why can't one assist a congressional committee in its search for crooks in the government.

Mr. Justice Clark is responsible for T. Lamar Caudle. He hired him. It is no more than reasonable to ask him how he happened to pick such a faithless public servant.

If Representative King, the committee chairman, wants to make a thorough investigation of the tax scandals, he will call Justice Clark and if Clark balks at testifying, the people will have a basis for forming their own opinion of him. — The Fort Worth Press.

Piper Calls the Tune

The Civil Aeronautics Administration becomes the latest to get into the act. We mean the use of bulldozing tactics by federal agencies to force the South to accept Truman's so-called civil rights program.

This most recent instance crops out in Houston. There the city's new airport, being built largely with \$1,400,000 of federal funds, is threatened with a loss of funds unless the city council abolishes segregation in the terminal building. At least the CAA "warns" Mayor Holcombe and his colleagues on the council. It is not altogether clear whether the Washington agency demands no segregation in restrooms, or equal facilities in airport restaurants—or both.

What CAA is pressuring for is not the point; it is the pressurizing that affords. It is the old story, of course, of the present administration: The piper insists on calling his own tune, no matter who pays the piper. A large part of the \$1,400,000 being doled out to Houston came from Bayou City taxpayers in the first place, but this does not count. Washington has control of federal tax funds, and there seems to be a conspiracy among branches of the Executive Department to use them in an effort to remake the social order in the South. — The Dallas Morning News.

Superintendent Stoddard of the Los Angeles Public Schools estimates that it will take 500 teachers and \$2,250,000 to undo the harm which has been done by "Progressive Education" in that city. He thinks that when boys and girls in the last two years of high school cannot spell simple words, add a few small figures or even tell time by the clock, it is high time something was done about it. What was sown in the hey-day of "Progressive Education" is now being reaped in a bumper crop of misinformation and ignorance, Superintendent Stoddard said in the Los Angeles Examiner.

Parents of Dead Marine Administer Merited Rebuke to Harry S. Truman

The anguish and heartache of every

American parent who has contributed a son to the senseless slaughter in Korea was encompassed in the eloquent and stinging rebuke given to the Chief Executive in a letter from Captain Eugene R. Guild and his wife, Isabel, written in their home at Roaring Fork Ranch, Glenwood Springs, Colorado, recently in which they said:

Dear Mr. Truman:— We have received your scroll bearing the impressive seal of the United States and signed by you in ink. On it you ratify our son as a patriot; his dying "that Freedom might live" receives your approval.

You use noble words, Mr. Truman. How did you earn the right to use these words about our son and other dead sons?

First—Did you not slur the Marines in which he fought?

Second—Did you not tie his hands with political restrictions against tactics and weapons, and did he not die so shackled?

Third—Did you not (before stopping it) for months, pressured by their owners' fear of lost dollars, allow American ships to carry the metal and munitions which killed him and his companions?

Fourth—Did you—do you even now—blast with righteous anger our "allies" who gave recognition and aid to the enemy which killed these boys—and which now has murdered 8,000 in cold blood?

Fifth—Did you not supinely and complacently sit by while a leaderless United Nations tremblingly debated for 12 weeks whether to brand the Reds aggressors, while 4500 more of our sons died?

Sixth—Did not your appeasement follow our son to his grave in America's Valhalla,

lest a war be on your record, and forbid him the right to have the war in which he died appear on his headstone?

Seventh—Did you not dishonor all American fathers and mothers by taking the position that they would rather see their sons die shackled than share with them whatever risk of reprisal there might be in allowing them to fight an honest war, with a chance for victory and a better chance for their lives? Did you not dishonor us by thinking we would sit by while you paid blackmail with our sons' blood?

Eighth—Are you not the first American President to preside at an ignominious American defeat—in which we were ejected from most of North Korea with 35,000 battle and operational deaths?

Ninth—Are you not the first American President to seek a truce with a murderous enemy? In the face of 8,000 helpless, bound American boys butchered by official order from top Reds, do you not today say to our sons' murderers, "Let's make a deal, boys?" Will not such a dishonest truce lose more lives in the long run—has it not already—than would an honest victory?

Those noble words on the scroll may be used only by those who earn the right by one Marine speaking of another; by a Lincoln grieving for one of his soldiers. Your use of these words will heighten, not lessen, the anger of those who saw their sons die for a policy of fear and appeasement.

You honor neither the words nor our son by using them. We return the scroll to you.

May God forgive you; we cannot.

Truman and his Fair Deal stalwarts are making much of the fact that we are having unprecedented prosperity and full employment and are making it their campaign issue.

Houston War Veteran Sets A Grand Example

An illustration of what one person can do in fighting subversion has been forcefully illustrated by Bill Dalton, World War II veteran and Legionaire of Houston.

The State Teachers Convention which met in Houston in November had scheduled two speakers whose records in connection with subversive organizations were such that they should not have been invited to address any group, much less school teachers entrusted with the education of American children. One was a man, the other a woman and both had impressive records for Communist-front activities.

Carefully assembling the facts in each case and giving only the record as released by the Committee on Un-American Activities, the ex-fighting man, at his own expense, sent out a few hundred copies of this document, at first.

Later, other good Americans came to his rescue and sent stamps so that it could be widely circulated throughout the State.

The result was such a deluge of protests to the headquarters of the State Teachers Association that both speakers were cancelled out. The man retired gracefully while the woman sputtered and babbled in the press that she would bring suit, but of course she did nothing of the sort.

If one courageous person can accomplish as much as young Dalton, how much good could be achieved if a thousand would display similar alertness and concern in their country's welfare.

Buffett's Retirement Is A Definite Loss

Congressman Howard Buffett of Nebraska has announced that he will retire to engage in private business and will not be a candidate for re-election in 1952.

This is a definite loss to the people of the United States for Mr. Buffett is one of the soundest thinkers in the Lower House of our national lawmaking body.

There are many persons in both the House and Senate whose retirement to private life would advance the cause of good government but, somehow, they stick to the job like leeches while those who, like the Nebraska solon, have the understanding and the courage to render valuable service are becoming fewer in number as the years roll by.

Truman Administration Sustains A Big Loss

Officials of the Truman administration are much disturbed because Stuart Symington is resigning as head of the RFC, and retiring to private life.

It seems that through some miscalculation in appointing him, Truman selected a man who was both capable and honest and since this type of bureaucrat in a Federal agency is as rare as a whooping crane, his departure is causing a lot of moaning at the bar.

"All Americans and especially all parents of school children would do well to read this over and over again and get the full meaning and import."

"Who authorized teachers to 'reconstruct our economic system' anyway, and by what authority are they trying to establish a world order in which national sovereignty is subordinate to world authority?"

"Any teacher, male or female, who teaches such tripe as this to students should be literally kicked out of the door and their socialist textbooks thrown after them."

"The job for which a teacher is hired in this country is to instruct pupils in the rudiments of reading, writing, arithmetic, American history, geography and allied subjects and not to undertake to change the American economic system or institute Socialism as a form of government in this country."

Wholesale Deportations Would Solve Many Problems

Congressman Jakob K. Javits of New York says that we need 500,000 more aliens in this country in the next five years and has introduced a bill in Congress to that effect. His measure would do away with the principles in our immigration laws based on quotas for each country and would let them come in according to their own sweet will and that of their friends in this country.

The point at which we disagree with Congressman Javits, is that we would like to see at least 500,000 of the undesirables already here deported and returned to the countries whose government is based on the principles they advocate. This includes many who were born here.

If this could be done the job of cleaning up corruption and bringing about a return to Constitutional government would be greatly facilitated.

Parents Should Protect Children Against Evil Propaganda As They Would Defend Them From The Attacks Of A Mad Dog

The National Education Association, or NEA, largely controls the curricula of the public schools throughout the United States.

This association, in turn, is controlled by Socialistic leaders who have made it the CIO in the educational field.

For instance, one of their honorary presidents is John Dewey who has been listed fourteen times by the House Committee on Un-American Activities. He is also the "Honorary President" of "The People's Lobby" in Washington whose published program includes Socialization of the Steel Industry, Socialization of Banking and Credit, and of Coal, Oil, Water and Gas; heavy progressive taxation of incomes, personal and corporate, of "International Cooperation" and other socialistic proposals.

Mr. George W. Robnett of the National Laymen's Council, Church League of America, Chicago, is rendering a valuable service to the people of the United States by his exposure of the methods by which NEA operates.

The League recently reproduced a photostatic copy of "Defense Bulletin No. 8" issued on January 10, 1944 which was marked "Confidential" and distributed widely by the NEA to teachers throughout the country.

In this bulletin, teachers were warned to "plan their action in the 1944 election campaigns with their senator's attitude on Federal Aid in mind."

Teachers were asked to go out and campaign for members of Congress who would vote for Federal Aid to education and to work against those opposed to this Socialistic legislation.

They were warned that their "first civic obligation" was to find out how candidates for Congress stood on this issue, when all along most Americans thought that the first obligation of a teacher was to teach school and stay out of politics.

In 1947, bragging of some of their political achievements, one Dr. Howard Dawson, an official of NEA, boasted that NEA was responsible for the election of Lister Hill, Alabama New Dealer, Claude Pepper, Florida stooge of Labor Unions and Wayne Morse of Oregon, Republican New Dealer in the Senate. Dawson's speech, making this boast, was printed in the Congressional Record, page A-4257, 1944.

According to Congressman Ralph Gwinn of New York, the NEA has a registered lobby in Washington which is larger than those of the Democratic and Republican headquarters combined.

It is on record with statements showing their opposition to the American Free Enterprise system; they plug constantly for the mixing of the races in schools, regardless of State laws on the subject; they have strenuously opposed laws which compel school teachers to take the oath of loyalty to their country and have defended the right of Communists to instruct American school children.

With such a set-up, it is only natural that Socialism, and worse, should be spawned in the headquarters of the outfit and channelled out to teachers to be propagated in the various schools.

This aggregation of red-hot torch bearers for Socialism cannot be broken up by ordinary means. It is far too powerful for that since it has influenced and coerced nearly a million teachers into its ranks.

It can only be broken up on the local level by parents who lay the law down to their school boards and demand that the principles of Americanism and not those of Marxism are taught in their schools. Members of School boards are elected by local taxpayers and are answerable to them and if voters make their influence felt, they can nullify the NEA propaganda and in this way kill off the cancer at its roots.

The NEA is no longer an educational but a political organization trying to formulate a new social and economic order for Americans.

They should be stopped dead in their tracks.

Truman Advises Violation Of The U. S. Constitution

The president of the United States not only seems to take pleasure in violating the provisions of the Constitution but advises others to do so.

Recently he made the suggestion that immigration officials be given the right to search a farmer's property for Mexicans who are in this country illegally and known as "wetbacks," without prior notice or benefit of a search warrant.

The Constitution specifically provides that a man's property shall not be entered without a search warrant and yet the president, sworn to uphold the Constitution, suggests that it be violated.

What hope have we for cleaning out "corruption in government" until the White House itself is purged of its corrupt occupants?

Congressional Forum Draws Large Crowd

The Congressional Forum held in Fort Worth in December attracted around 750 persons from all walks of life anxious for clarification of some of the proceedings in Washington which appear confusing if not downright idiotic to the average voter.

The Congressmen who attended the Forum answered all queries forthrightly and without equivocation or any attempt to excuse or gloss over Socialistic policies which the current administration has attempted to, and in many instances has, put into effect.

The meeting was not only beneficial to those composing the audience but was bound to be helpful also to the members of Congress in attendance who seldom get a chance to obtain first-hand reactions of the people back home.

Although there was physical evidence of Truman followers at the Forum, in the main it was composed of voters in the Fort Worth area who demonstrated by their applause of answers to leading questions that they are thoroughly disgusted with Truman's Socialistic views and want a return to sound principles of government.

The Forum provides a medium for the exchange of ideas between Congressmen and voters which could be followed all over the nation with great benefit to both.

Florida Governor Cheers Truman

Governor Fuller Warren of Florida, generally regarded as one of the three weak links in the chain of Southern Governors expected to attempt the rescue of the Democratic Party from Socialistic domination, is reported to have cheered Truman lustily at a party banquet recently.

This was probably not only because the president holds the same political views as he, but because of a sort of fellow feeling for a man in high office who travelled practically the same road to get there and had the same type of backers on the way up.

What Crimes Are Committed In The Name of Education

Out in California where "Progressive Education," like other screwy cults and fads, has obtained a foothold, investigators found that a high school girl not only could not spell, or add a column of figures but that she actually could not tell time by the clock.

When amazement was expressed at her ignorance on the subject, the young lady flippantly passed it off with this nifty:

"So what? My parents can't afford to buy me a watch any way."

Well, that's one line of reasoning, at that, and probably just as valid as any other excuse for deserting fundamental methods of teaching essential subjects and trailing off after procedures advocated by Socialistic educational experts.

Why Should a Public Library Promote The Works of Subversive Writers?

The Houston Public Library has issued a pamphlet entitled "What is the American Heritage?" In order that readers may get a proper conception of "The American Heritage" the library suggests a list of twenty-one books to be found in the library, which Americans should read.

Among them is "The Americans as a Reformer" by Arthur M. Schlesinger. This writer was named by the Dies Committee on Un-American Activities as being associated with the American Student League which was formed by a merger of two other Communist-Socialist organizations, the National Student League and the Student League for Industrial Democracy. This organization has been active in defense of teachers and students charged with Communist activity.

Another book which the Library suggests is "Living Ideas in America" by Henry Steel Commager, professor of American History at Columbia University. Commager was on the reception committee to welcome the Very Reverent Hewlett Johnson, the Red Dean of Canterbury, according to the Daily Worker, September 22, 1948, page 5.

Still another was "To Secure These Rights," a report of the President's Committee on Civil Rights, 1947. The record of a majority of the members of this Committee and their Communist front affiliation has been published many times and no denial of the charges were ever made.

Another suggested book was "American Songbag" by Carl Sandburg. The Daily Worker, official Communist paper in the United States, on September 3, 1940 carried a list of the leaders of the National Council of American Peace Mobilization, and Carl Sandburg was among the number as was Paul Robeson, the notorious Negro Communist who has publicly denounced the American government and praised that of Russia.

Another book suggested was "Americans, a book of lives," by Hermann Hagedorn, listed by the California Un-American Activities Committee of California, 1948 report, page 330 as being a member of The National Institute of Arts and Letters, a Communist Front organization.

Other suggested books are by the late Louis Adamic who made no secret of his Communist affiliations; Stuart Chase, listed as a member of the Communist front Committee for Better Education in Hollywood; B. A. Botkin, cited as a member of ten Communist fronts; Erskine Caldwell, cited as a member of Communist fronts and other well known Communist fronters and left-wingers.

If a student earnestly seeking knowledge can't depend on a public library for information on Americanism, where can he turn? What chance has a young American to avoid embracing the ideals of Joe Stalin when the way is pointed out to him by an institution supposedly a part of the American economy.

And, above all, who issues the instructions ordering libraries to put out subversive bait like this?

Truman Warned By Hoover Commission

Any one who is so deluded and stupid as to think the president is sincere in recommendations for a re-organization of the Internal Revenue set-up has a short memory.

Two years and a half ago, the Hoover Commission recommended that the Bureau be taken out of politics, appointments made on a civil service basis and unnecessary employees discharged, and warned that corruption was inevitable under existing conditions.

Truman now proposes this plan to Congress but his reaction two and a half years ago to the Hoover Commission Report was to ignore its suggestions.

Instead of reducing the list of useless employees, he added 8,795 more to the list, insuring this additional number of Fair Deal voters at the ballot box.

Pro America Group Plans Thorough House Cleaning

A woman's crusade is well under way and by Fall they expect to have accomplished one of the most thorough house cleaning jobs in history.

Leader among the movements to curb Crime, Corruption and Communism in government is the National Association of Pro America, an organization of patriotic women which has made impressive strides, both in membership and accomplishments, during its comparatively brief existence.

Under the able leadership of Mrs. R. S. Knappen of Tulsa, Oklahoma, it has reached out for recruits until it now has local organizations extending all the way to the Pacific Coast.

The organization is non-partisan and includes in its membership and among its officials, Republicans, Constitutional Democrats and women who have not yet made a decision on their party affiliation. Its announced purpose is to help preserve the American form of government as set forth in the Constitution of the United States.

A novel and clever innovation originating with Pro America is the "Broom Brigade" open to women both in and out of that organization who are determined to use their broom for a thorough house cleaning in 1952.

"The Broom Brigade unites the women of America who are keepers of the home—the heart of our country; women who want to clean the house for their husbands and their children" a brochure put out by the organization explains.

"To some women a broom means plain drudgery, but to most a broom is the universal symbol of house cleaning" the brochure continues. "In 1952, we women of America are going to use this broom as a glamorous symbol for one of the most thorough and old-fashioned house cleanings in history."

A miniature, gold-washed broom is sent to each applicant for membership in the "Broom Brigade" and with it goes a list of instructions for a thorough governmental house cleaning:

"Get rid of cobwebs—this is no time for fuzzy thinking; stop sweeping errors under the living room rug; look for inflation termites, graft termites, Communist termites, government-spending termites and others which are undermining the foundation; go under the bureau with the broom and sweep out the bureaucrats; use a spray gun to clear the air of false propaganda and foreign ideologies; toss out literature that is poisoning the children's minds with destructive 'isms'; throw out all cans of red herring from the pantry; see that all canned food is free of 'Red' coloring; move the deep freeze to see what is behind it; spray the moths out of the closets to protect old coats which have good lines and never go out of style like honesty and integrity. They may not be glamorous like mink coats, but their wearing qualities are above reproach."

One of the most active State groups of Pro America in the nation is the Fort Worth organization headed by Mrs. W. F. Collins assisted by a staff of equally alert and intelligent women who have specialized in research work on subversive speakers in order to give accurate information on Socialistic lecturers who seek to propagandize the people through the medium of the public forum.

So effective have been their efforts along this line that the leader of a subversive group in planning a program of speaking engagements in 1952 was heard to remark to an associate: "We will have to skip Ft. Worth this year. There is no use trying to accomplish anything there."

The Secretary of the Vice-President who tried to get approval of a \$1,100,000 loan from RFC for a Miami Beach Hotel has been defended by Barkley who declared she did it only because she is a "big-hearted woman."

Luck of the Irish Attends A Supreme Court Justice

Judging from his capacity for dodging disaster, we think Tom Clark who so obviously approximated Truman's ideal of a Supreme Court Justice that he was appointed to membership on that body, must carry a four-leaf clover or a rabbit's foot, or something in his left pocket.

Twice he has escaped embarrassing investigations by the skin of his teeth.

The first occasion was an investigation by the Texas Senate in 1935 from which he was rescued by his benefactor Tom Connally who at that time was drinking through the same straw with Roosevelt and who used New Deal influence to stop the investigation, whisk his protegee out of the State and place him in the Department of Justice.

The latest escape was from the Congressional Investigating Committee probing Department of Justice scandals. They wanted to ask Clark why he placed Theron Lamar Caudle in a responsible position in that agency when he was Attorney General.

He was saved by the fact that members of the Supreme Court, by tradition, are not compelled to testify in investigations.

Why this should have prevented his being subpoenaed is a little confusing since breaking traditions has been a favorite indoor sport in Washington for years. New Deal and Fair Deal politicians, including those on the Supreme Court, have never let little things like tradition and precedent slow them down.

Of course he could have appeared voluntarily as some members of that body did when they appeared as character witnesses for Alger Hiss, but he did not choose to do so.

However, it was stupid of the Committee to want to ask him why he placed Caudle in an important position in the Department of Justice whose responsibilities he not only could not discharge but couldn't even grasp.

That's routine procedure for Fair Dealers in selecting their staff.

They'll do it every time.

CIO Outlines Truman's Message to Congress

What would have been bitterly resented by every president of the United States up to 1933 as an insult and a direct challenge to their integrity was offered to Harry S. Truman recently and apparently received by him without rancor on his part.

A labor union racketeer representing the CIO called on him at the White House and presented him with a program which they didn't request, but demanded, that he send to Congress.

The proposals as outlined were duplicates, in the main, of the platform demands of the Socialist and Communist parties before leaders of these two parties decided that Truman's policies were acceptable to them and quit putting out a ticket of their own.

The proposals demanded civil rights legislation, including FEPC, anti-lynching, anti-poll tax and anti-segregation laws; increased taxes on higher income groups; Federal ownership of the Tidelands; government control of education through Federal aid; nation-wide rent control; increased housing units; Federal health insurance; increased minimum wages; government control of the unemployment system; repeal of the Taft-Hartley law, increased social security and other Socialistic proposals.

The incident forcefully illustrates the shrinkage in stature and debased political morals of a Chief Executive who allows himself to deteriorate to the status of an errand boy and official mouthpiece of a minority group alleged to control large blocs of votes.

Speaking of prosperity, D. E. Burt of Dallas reminds us that under Coolidge we had such prosperity that Al Smith, a Democrat, could not be elected. There was practically no unemployment, he says, farm prices were good even though there was no Brannan plan, and no cotton was plowed up, no hogs killed or potatoes dyed blue. And Coolidge only spent eighteen billion dollars in six years whereas our present "prosperity" has cost us \$250,000,000,000.

Jack Patton, cartoonist, points out that if you want to get by, disguise yourself as a foreigner and borrow a million dollars from the government.

Stalin Being Appeased On All Fronts

A press dispatch tells of a Chinese Communist patrolman who shouted "Merry, Merry Christmas GI's" and then opened up with rifle fire against them.

MY NIGHT

I frequently receive letters from anxious mothers which indicate their awakened sense of responsibility as parents and it is always a pleasure to me to assure them that Amalgamated Countries is sponsoring a program which will relieve them of all parental duties.

When they left for college, I saw to it that each was provided with a copy of the inspiring life story of a poor and under-privileged lad named Al Capone who overcame the obstacles of our maladjusted social system through sheer aggressiveness and eventually acquired great wealth and extensive power and influence in important circles.

Having given my sons this solid foundation in literature, history and other cultural subjects, I felt that my responsibility was ended and I insisted that each use his own judgment in selecting the work to which he was best adapted.

They took my advice in the matter and several of them engaged in a practical aptitude test by having a brief try at rum-running, cattle-rustling and opium-smuggling before deciding on a permanent career. I have always felt that this valuable experience influenced to a great extent their social behavior and business transactions in later life.

I feel that the young mother who has written me is perhaps unduly distressed for she will probably be spared all the effort, time and thought which I was compelled to devote to the training of my sons.

Federal Government Is A Creature of the States

More than that, national government has become so involved in our daily affairs and so unwieldy that no body of men on earth, no matter how efficient or how dedicated in purpose, could possibly operate it equitably."

The Nasty Old Press Is Cause of Corruption

During World War II, the SEC compiled a secret report on the affairs of the Empire Ordnance Company in which they divulged that there was a "tremendous amount of larceny, bribery, perjury and fraud" in the company's operations.

This report was compiled in 1942 and has been suppressed by the White House since that date.

This information was brought to light recently by a staff writer in the Washington Times-Herald, Jerry Greene, who pointed out that this outfit was the parent of the Empire Tractor Company of Philadelphia which recently figured in the news when Frank McKinney, new National Democratic Chairman, made \$68,000 from a small investment in that concern.
