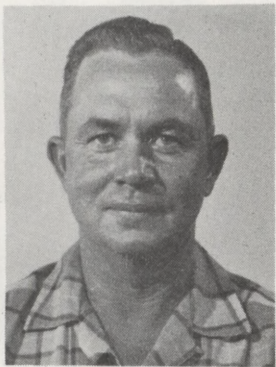


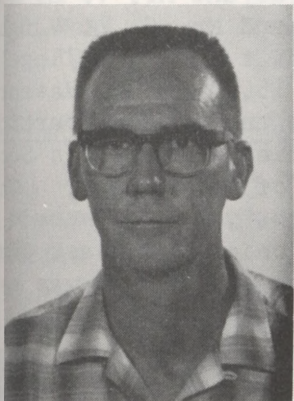
HOUSTON REFINERY STAFF APPOINTMENTS INVOLVE DUNBAR, TARVER, DAVIS, AND SCOTT

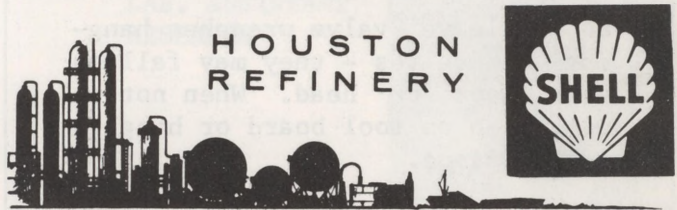

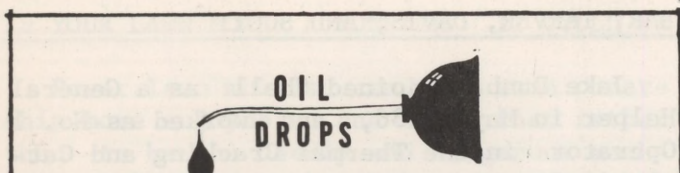

LAST OF THE SHORT DAYS? LONG DAYS? OR WHAT?

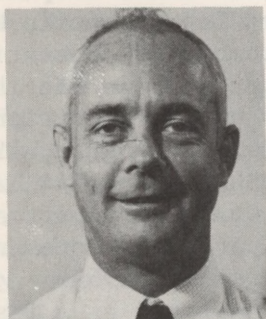

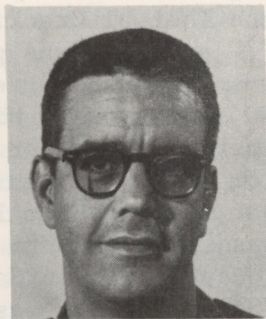

REFINERY EMPLOYEE D. L. BARFOOT DIES

D. L. Barfoot, 57, died Saturday, April 22, in a local hospital following a lengthy illness. He was a long time employee of Shell, having been associated with the Company's service stations in the early 1930's before joining Shell's Houston Refinery in Deer Park, in 1935. At the time of his death he was a member of the Refinery's Automotive Department.



He was born and reared in Union, Mississippi, where he also attended school. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and of the Bayshore Baptist Church.

Survived by his wife, Myrtle, and a son, Doug, as well as several sisters and a brother, his funeral was at the Art Simpson Chapel with burial at the Grandview Memorial Cemetery on Monday, April 24.

CHEMICAL PROGRESS WEEK FOCUSES ON POLLUTION CONTROL

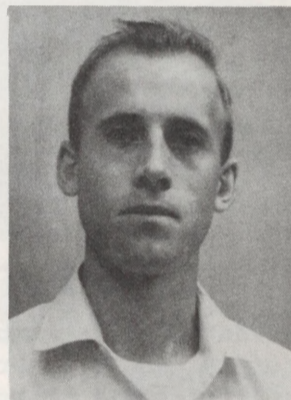
The chemical industry focuses on one of man's long-sought goals -- a clean and healthy environment -- during the 14th national observance of Chemical Progress Week, April 24-29.

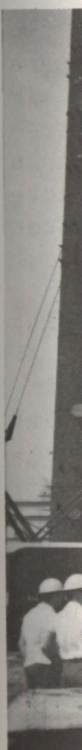
