

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Lalor wants changes in wrecker procedures

"Ripoffs by wrecker drivers and storage lot operators have reached epidemic proportions in the City of Houston. This indiscriminate towing of cars around... clubs in the Montrose area, and subsequent ripoffs at storage lots, are a particular concern," said a prepared press release from the office of City Councilman Lance Lalor.

Lalor, who represents Montrose and Southwest Houston, is head of the City Council Wrecker Committee, which in April heard from people who had fallen prey to "unscrupulous wrecker and storage lot operators."

The committee was said to be meeting weekly in May with the Police Department, the City Attorney's Office, Public Service Department and the District Attorney's Office to draft changes to the city's wrecker and storage lot regulations and enforcement procedures.

Some of the changes the committee was said to be working on included requiring a parking lot to post signs listing the address and phone number of the storage lot where cars would be towed to, setting out clearly the liability of the wrecker driver and the storage lot for damages to cars and missing property and requiring insurance and bond to cover settlements, allowing wreckers to tow cars only to storage lots within the same geographical area as the place where the car was picked up, limiting the number of storage lots that could receive police-authorized tows and requiring them to meet high standards, and increasing the requirements of wrecker companies, wrecker drivers and storage lots and stipulating that licenses and permits would be revoked if standards fell below those requirements.

3 charged in grocery store holdup ring

Two Montrose men and a southwest Houston man were charged May 14 in connection with a string of about 30 grocery store robberies, it was reported.

They were identified as Thomas Catalano, 22, of 1656 Harold and Douglas Darrell Mosier, 22, of 1522 California, both of Montrose, and John Nichols Crook, 22, of 5711 Gulf-ton in southwest Houston.

The three were arrested May 13 after a robbery of a Safeway store at 10500 Gulf Freeway in south Houston, news accounts said.

Police investigators said their were strong similarities in that hold-up and about thirty others that remained unsolved. Guns were used in the robberies, and shots were fired on some occasions, police said, but no one was injured.

Perdue changes plea, admits guilt

NEW ORLEANS—Michael E. Perdue of Montrose, a member of the gay community, pleaded guilty in federal court May 20 to charges he helped plan and finance an ill-fated effort to overthrow the government on the small Caribbean island of Dominica last month.

Perdue, 32, was known in Montrose as a "security buff" who helped gay clubs guard customers from attacks by roving gangs of youths.

He was also friends with several Houston policemen, but investigators say they have uncovered no information that links any police officer to knowledge of the attempted overthrow.

Perdue struck a plea-bargain agreement in New Orleans

with federal prosecutor Lindsay Larson, but Larson was reported to have refused to say whether Perdue would be providing proof needed to convict others involved.

A Treasury Department official was reported May 20 to have said that he has "high hopes" for additional arrests.

Perdue pleaded guilty to one count of a seven-count indictment returned by a New Orleans grand jury May 7. The other six were dismissed and he is scheduled for sentencing June 17.

The charge to which he pleaded guilty carries a maximum fine of \$3000 and three years in prison.

Perdue, of the 1600 block of Marshall in Montrose, and eight other alleged mercenaries earlier had pleaded innocent to federal charges of conspiring to overthrow the government of Dominica.

Federal Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agency investigators were said to have confirmed that at least 26 individuals, including two Houston police officers, had been or would be questioned about Perdue.

Among the other eight arraigned with Perdue included an imperial wizard of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, it was reported.

Perdue was initially held under \$500,000 bond.

The men were arrested April 27 when they arrived at a marina near New Orleans with automatic weapons, dynamite and other military gear.

Perdue was reported to be in line to receive \$150,000, Domin-

ican citizenship, responsibility for training the island's defense forces, and to head up a commercial enterprise that would have, among other things, controlled agriculture development and constructed an airport.

TV to air series on gay Houston

KPRC, the NBC affiliate on channel 2, announced plans to air a five part series called, "Gay Houston, How It Started and How It Is Now."

The series will air within the 10:00 p.m. newscasts each night, starting Sunday, May 24, and continuing through Thursday, May 28, they said.

The newscast, with the series, is scheduled to be repeated each night about 1:00 a.m.

Officers no-billed in 1400 Richmond shooting

Two Houston police officers were cleared by a county grand jury May 15 in the wounding of

a man accused of shooting first at them in the parking lot of the 1400 Richmond apartment complex.

Officer's Paula Fleming and H.P. Trumper were nobilled in the shooting of Barry Wayne Stone, 21, of 6806 Conley.

Stone's charges included shooting a man in flight, robbing three men and sexually abusing two of them.

Stone was shot three times during the gun battle on Dec. 30, 1980. He was arrested and sent to Ben Taub Hospital in critical condition and later charged with attempted capital murder, aggravated sexual assault and aggravated robbery.


His condition improved at the hospital and he was released to the police.

His brother, Leroy Melvin Stone, was also arrested at the scene and later charged with auto theft.

Police said that two other men in their early twenties, having just parked their car at about 2:00 a.m. at the predominately-gay apartment complex, were robbed of \$22, threatened with a small-caliber pistol and sexually abused.

One of the victims was said to have managed to strike the assailant on the head with a rock, then they hailed a passing police car. Officer John R. Dziedzic called on the man to surrender, the police report stated, but the suspect reportedly fired at Dziedzic and ran away.

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Section 21.06 trial date approaches

DALLAS—As June 15 was approaching, Texas gay activists were waiting patiently for the start of the constitutional trial of Section 21.06 of the Texas Penal Code, set to begin here on that date.

Section 21.06 is the "homosexual conduct statute" which, according to the Texas Human Rights Foundation, "legalizes the invasion of privacy" by state officials and "encourages police harassment by identifying the entire gay community as a criminal subculture which would be singled out for 'special attention' by

law enforcement officials."

The foundation is one of the principle backers of the 21.06 challenge.

Dallas activist Don Baker, a former school teacher, filed the suit against the county and city district attorneys of Texas as a group. The suit is also known as Baker vs. Wade, as Henry Wade is the district attorney for Dallas County.

Said a THRF official, "This suit is known as a 'class action' suit because all district attorneys and all city attorneys in the state are grouped as defendants. The fact that Henry Wade's name appears as the representative of the 'defendant class' is quite appropriate. Under his leadership, the Dallas District Attorney's Office is well known for its prejudice and unequal treatment of gay defendants."

According to a THRF press

release, Wade had argued in court documents already filed that to say gay people are discriminated against because the legislature criminalized homosexual activity is analogous to claiming that thieves and rapists are discriminated against because of laws against those crimes.

Robert Schwab, president of THRF, answered with, "To equate private consensual sexual activity with violent acts like rape shows the depth and prejudice existing against gay people. If the state would focus its police enforcement power toward crimes of violence, instead of activity which takes place in the privacy of the bedroom, we would all live in a safer world."

THRF has assisted in formulating case strategy, selecting expert witnesses and funding the costs of litigation. Schwab

said they were also prepared to pursue the case through the appellate court system if necessary.

Baker addressed delegates to the Gay Press Association convention in early May and emphasized the national importance of the case.

He said this would be the first time that a state criminal statute aimed solely at gay men and women was under direct attack on the proposition that its very existence is unconstitutional. He said the final court decision would eventually affect other states with a similar law.

The Texas Human Rights Foundation said that in court documents released in Baker's suit, the State of Texas asserts that "private consensual (sexual) acts have never been the subject prosecution."

THRF said that the State's claim is untrue.

"This is simply incorrect," said Schwab. "We have documented a significant number of prosecutions of private homosexual conduct."

The suit was filed in 1979. Schwab said that the State has further challenged the jurisdiction of the federal courts to hear the case by claiming that the law meets all constitutional requirements. Schwab said that the Attorney General contends "the rationality of the statute ... would be that (homosexual) activity would interfere with the basis premise of society, the survival of the people ... should homosexual conduct become too widespread, society would lose the means of reproducing itself."

Schwab noted, "This reasoning contradicts recent court decisions regarding abortion and contraception and is based upon a naive concept of human sexuality in general and homosexuality in particular."

"The belief that homosexuality can be compared to a disease and is therefore capable of being spread has been soundly rejected by the medical and psychiatric community. Uninformed attitudes such as these are the basis for repressive legislation and prejudice against gay people," Schwab said.

Another court document filed on behalf of the State paid a considerable compliment to the political success of the gay

rights movement, said Schwab.

Wade, in a motion for summary judgement before a Dallas federal judge, reportedly said, "The gay rights movement seemed to exercise a considerable amount of influence in the 1980 election, thus opening an avenue of approach to the state legislature to address the feasibility for the continued need to proscribe homosexual conduct."

Wade reportedly continued, arguing for the necessity of laws against private homosexual acts between consenting adults, citing "the deaths and abuse of young men by homosexuals and violence associated with homosexual conduct in general."

Wade was said to have described sodomy as "abominable and detestable crime against nature."



Supreme Court upholds decriminalized of sodomy in New York

WASHINGTON—The U.S. Supreme Court May 18 left intact a New York state ruling, without comment, the declared a New York state anti-sodomy law unconstitutional.

The case deemed unconstitutional a New York law which prohibited homosexual activity as well as certain kinds of heterosexual activity between unmarried persons.

Texas has a similar statute, section 21.06 of the Texas Penal Code, but it prohibits only homosexual activity. Former Dallas school teacher Donald F. Baker filed a suit in 1979, which is scheduled for trial starting June 15 in Dallas federal court.

The New York law, like the Texas law, made it a crime to engage in sodomy, which was defined as "deviate sexual activity," which in turn was defined as "anal or oral sex between persons not married to one another."

The case involved a man who was arrested and convicted for violating the law and who in fact admitted engaging in sexual activity with another adult male, but in the privacy of his home. He claimed the law violated his constitutional right to privacy and claimed that he had a right to do whatever he wanted in the privacy of his home.

The State of New York in its defense used a recent southern case where the Supreme Court

of Virginia upheld a similar law without even writing an opinion. The New York Court refused to go along with Virginia and pointed out that the U.S. Supreme Court had struck down statutes forbidding the use of contraceptives by married and unmarried couples.

The New York court said that personal sexual conduct is a fundamental right which must be protected by the right of privacy, because of the transcendental importance of sex to the human condition, the intimacy of the conduct, and its relationship to a person's right to control his or her own body.

The court said that sexual activity carried on in an atmosphere of privacy has little likelihood of offending the public. The court also said there's no proof that such conduct is destructive to traditional principle of family and marriage.

Commented Boston attorney Neil J. Chayet, who specializes in the field of health law: "And so the court reversed the conviction, overturned the law, and in the state of New York, at least, what goes on in your bedroom won't be replayed in the court room."

Harvard to apologize

CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—The students who put out Harvard's yearbook were preparing an apology to the university's gay community for calling an undergraduate house a "haven for homosexuals," said AP May 13.

Harvard senior Jared Corman said he was just trying to be funny when he wrote the description of Adams House, it was reported.

Sarah Yedinsky, president of the Harvard—Radcliffe Gay Student Association and an Adams House resident, said, "Corman exploited stereotypes and misconceptions under the guise of humor," AP reported.

Yearbook editor Steven Fine was reported to have said that the apology would be published in the Harvard Crimson newspaper, inserted into 900 yearbooks that were still to be distributed and circulated in the college's dining halls.

Extraterrestrial civilizations: less likely than we thought?

Whether or not there are other intelligent beings in the universe (with whom we might be able to communicate) is a question that has always fascinated our species. The prevalent opinion in the astronomical community during the 1970s was that the likelihood of relatively nearby extraterrestrial civilizations was fairly high. Some recent research, though, had led to increasing doubt.

Astronomers break down the large question of the existence of extraterrestrials into a series of estimates. Among the factors they consider are such things as the likelihood that a given type of star will have planets and the probability that life, once it starts on a planet, will evolve to intelligence.

These various estimates are then strung together in the "Drake Equation" (named for Cornell astronomer Frank Drake), which yields our best guess of how many civilizations exist now in our Galaxy.

One crucial factor in the Drake Equation is an estimate of the likelihood that a star which has planets will have at least one of them in its "habitable zone": a region around the star within which a planet would be neither too hot nor too cold for life. Until recently, stars' habitable zones were thought to be wide enough so that any star with planets would have at least one suitably placed for life.

Physicist and astronomer Michael Hart has cast doubt on this assessment and concludes that we are very lucky that Earth is just where it is.

His computer simulations of what Earth would be like were our planet at some different distance from the Sun seem to show that had we been as little as five percent closer or one percent farther away, then liquid water (and life as we know it) could not exist. Thus the Sun's habitable zone is very narrow indeed; it is only about four million miles wide while the total diameter of the solar system is several billion miles.



Hart has extended his planetary atmosphere simulation program to analyze the likely habitable zones around other types of stars. Their results are startling. If his procedures are correct, more than ninety percent of all stars have no habitable zones at all. Most of these stars are cooler and dimmer than the Sun (which is actually a relatively hot and bright star), and any orbit of an earth-like planet around them would cause water to either boil away or freeze solid on a global scale—with no possibility of an intermediate condition.

The habitable zones around the remaining ten percent are all quite narrow according to Hart's results, the widest being somewhat broader than six million miles. Such narrow habitable zones reduce the probability that any of a star's planets would be in it. In fact, a relatively simple statistical calculation discloses that the chances would be several hundred to one against such a planetary placement (if the size of our solar system and the number of planets in it are typical).

Such low probabilities do not absolutely rule out the existence of other civilizations, since the number of stars in our galaxy is so huge that freak occurrences must happen occasionally. (It is also conceivable that intelligent life might arise on planets which are not earthlike: Jupiter, for example.)

But still, Hart's results seem to indicate that our previous estimates of how many civilizations are out there—which currently range up to many thousands—may be hundreds of times too large.

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




