UF CONTRIBUTIONS TOP \$107,000

Over \$107,000 in contributions have been collected throughout the complex during the 1976-77 United Fund campaign.

Each United Fund committee exceeded its goal and all still had cards that hadn't been turned in.

The refinery campaign topped its goal of \$40,000 early in the solicitation period and reported contributions in excess of \$43,000 with 100-plus cards still to be turned in.

Chemical reported contributions of \$31,200 with 300 cards still out.

The complex campaign netted \$32,800 with a few cards still to be collected.

The committees and solicitors wish to express their appreciation to all of you who gave so generously to the United Fund campaign.

SCORA members interested in joining a square dancing group should contact Sandra Bradbury on 6119.



YOUR VOICE CAN BE HEARD BY GOVERNMENT

Too often citizens believe they have no voice in government, that the "man on the street" is being forgotten. However, there are ways in which Americans can speak out on the issues - to either approve or disapprove of Congressional

actions.

One of the most effective means of speaking out on the issues is the personal "letter to Washington." Here's how to go about writing such a letter:

Write to your own senator or representative. Excep-

tions to this are aspirants to a higher office, usually the Presidency, or members of committees deliberating issues of concern to the writer.

Your letter should be:

- Written on personal or business letterhead (preferably typewritten), with sender's address shown on the letter itself as well as on the envelope.

- Specific as to its subject, identifying the legislation by House or Senate bill number if the letter is about legislation.

- Confined to a single issue, not scattershot.

- Carefully reasoned, clearly stated and brief.


- Reasonable, not extravagant in its demands or threatening in its tones.

- Well-timed, preferably sent when the bill is in committee.



The party took place September 28 at 7 p.m. at the Deer Park Library.






RETIRED SHIFT FOREMAN LARY DIES

He was survived by his wife, Mary, who resides at 1904 Leneva in Pasadena.





