## From The President

One of the advantages of being president of a NOW chapter is the opportunity to have a place to spout off on any topic that enters your head. As most of you know I do that very well (my opinion and others won't be considered) and very often. However, this gives me a chance also to brag. And brag, I must. Betty Yancy, one of our original members, one of our quiet and efficient workers, a person that I admire, respect and love very deeply has been awarded a great honor. Two of Betty's photographic pieces will be on display at the World's Fair in New Orleans. I asked Betty for information and how to present it. She sent me the following info and Betty, I am going to present it just like you wrote it. It's beautiful and we are all proud of you.

...."Phyllis, you had asked for some information on the photographs which will show in N.O., so here goes. Two of my pieces (and I say "pieces" because each one consists of two photographs each) from "The Dead Animal Series", will be shown at the National Women's Art Exhibition in the Women's Pavilion of the World's Fair from May 12 to Nov. 11. What better place to exhibit than in that building and in that exhibit, which also happens to be a national juried show!

Since the subject matter is not very pleasant (although the pictures are beautiful if you are able to overlook that - which I hope you can't), perhaps a little explanation would be in order because they will hang without the explanation I had written for the display of the whole series on display at the Blaffer Gallery last May. And besides, this one is more accurate, written as it is for a feminist audience and from a more distant perspective.

I had been reading Susan Griffin's Woman and Nature (after reading many other feminist books, including Mary Daly), and the parallel between the way our society treats nature (or environment) and the way it treats women became very clear to me. At about the same time I began seeing dead animals on my daily rounds, whether to school, work, the grocery store, or anywhere. It got so that I could not go out without seeing at least one dead animal, and on one particularly grim day, there were five. I have since become aware that my compulsion to photograph them was an expression of what I perceive to be the eventual death of our society, killed by paternalistic attitudes toward the

world we live in and the people and animals who live in it. These are pretty grim times for all but Reagan and his ilk, and based on my feminist readings, what else could we really expect? I have more hopeful moments but for the most part, I think mankind (and I do mean Mankind) is methodically and often knowingly destroying the planet for his own greater glory.

I've just read over all that, and it might sound pompous, but it is a growing effort to affect a wider audience, which may or may not work. And in this regard, in the past I have hesitated to "exploit" my feminist friendships for fear of alienating some of the real relationships in my life. But I have begun to feel that it can be not only a positive good but is in fact a responsibility I must take. I have made tentative efforts in the past to photograph a few women in Bay Area NOW. It is now becoming increasingly important to me to document every woman in the chapter photographically in her home or other workplace. Each woman would get an 8x10 print for themselves in exchange. We who do not sit on boards or hold governmental offices have little enough documentation of our lives, as everyone who has looked at "history" knows. Working together, we can make an important contribution to a growing body of knowledge about women and their lives.".....

Thank you Betty! It is because of women like you that I and many others keep on going. Some days it would be a lot easier to just give into the system. However, with friends and sisters like you and others of your ilk, not only will we keep on going, we will change that damn system.

The Equal Rights Amendment, which states "Equality of Rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex," has been studied in a logical manner over a number of years.

In its statement on the ERA the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights (1981) says: "Sex discrimination has been an integral part of the laws, customs and official practices of the United States throughout its history.

"The Commission believes that the Equal Rights Amendment will provide a needed constitutional guarantee of full citizenship for women, and will assure the rights of both women and men to equal treatment under the laws. Ratification of the ERA is an important and appropriate means of alleviating sex discrimination — just as the adoption of the 13th and 14th Amendments was vital to the cause of racial equality."

The fundamental guarantee of equal rights, equal dignity under law embodied in this amendment belongs in our Constitution. . . .

## Women: Work still has biases

The number of women in the workplace jumped by 85 percent between 1970 and 1983, but "occupational segregation is as prevalent as it was 20 years ago," says a report to be released today.

The study was prepared by Women Employed, a 3,000-member national advocacy group of working women, for its 10th anniversary Friday.

■ There are 48 million women now employed in the USA, compared with 26.2 million in 1970.

■ There has been a 70 percent increase in the number of working women who are married; the number of single, widowed, divorced or separated women in the workforce has doubled.

■ Since 1970, households headed by women increased 70 percent. Women are the sole earners in 15 percent of families.

■ Women now hold 28 percent of the "officials and managers" jobs, compared with 16.6 percent in 1970.

■ Women have gained access to many jobs once held only by men, but in 1982, 46 percent of all working women were clerks, saleswomen, waitresses or hairdressers. And while the number of women professionals increased to 18 percent from 12 percent in 1960, 84 percent of those are teachers or health workers.

■ Women managers and administrators earn 60.5 percent of what men earn; women in blue collar jobs, 67.1 percent; and women professionals, 70.8 percent.

**DALLAS (UPI)** — The number of women employed in professional occupations and managerial positions in Texas increased by 104.8 percent between 1970 and 1980, the U.S. Census Bureau reported. The bureau's survey showed the total number of women who were managers and professionals leaped from 268,751 in 1970 to 550,529 in 1980. The number of women in the work force climbed by 70 percent from 1.6 million to 2.7 million.

## Sexual Harassment

As we gather more information and talk with more people about the issue of sexual harassment, the whole problem becomes mind boggling. First of all we wanted to assist one of our people with her suit against Kroger, then another member has filed a suit against her ex company on charges of sex harassment. People are calling the house asking for assistance and about all we can do is tell them the procedure and give them a sympathetic shoulder. We are researching lawyers who will take cases on a contingency basis without much success. However, we have been in contact with the Woman's Advocacy Project here in Austin and they are really great. Although money is not readily available, the project is able to assist victims and their lawyers by furnishing briefs of suits that have been won. The Women's Advocacy Project has also sent us a 12 page bibliography which we shall attempt to make copies for whomever would like them. Besides sexual harassment in the workplace, the issue of sexual harassment in education is really being brought to light.

According to statistics compiled by the Project on the Status and Education of Women at the Association of American Colleges in Washington, 20% of all undergraduate women - or 125,000 each year - experience some kind of sexual harassment.

In a Harvard University study, 49% of non-tenured faculty women and 41% of women graduate students said they experienced sexual harassment. 34% of the undergraduate women said they received unwelcomed advances.

A University of Florida study during the 1981-82 school year found 31% of women graduate students and 26% of undergraduate women reported that professors had made unwanted advances.

This past fall, a University of Michigan psychology professor resigned after a tenure committee urged dismissal following an investigation into charges he made sexual advances to students and staff members.

The stories and statistics go on and on, but the fact of the matter is that most women don't complain to courts, companies or colleges. Research shows that most endure the abuse, fearful of reprisals by male-dominated management.

That is tragic. It robs women of dignity and denies them opportunity. It deprives institutions of their talents. It is demeaning and dehumanizing. Join with the sexual harassment committee. We need your help to make this social change.

# Reproductive Rights

LUTHERVILLE, Md. — Since Thomas Malthus stated in 1798 that we can't bake bread fast enough to feed our baby booms, birth control has not only produced nasty side effects but divided nations.

Jonathan Swift's "Modest Proposal" had a solution — eating our children instead of feeding them. But since American stomachs are notoriously queasy, that would never spell relief.

There's one foolproof solution. Unlike the pill, the diaphragm, the creams, the IUD, and the condom, abstinence produces no cancer, needs no knowledge of anatomy, is not messy, causes no bleeding, and gives no feeling of taking a bath with your shoes on.

With abstinence, taxpayers would save billions of dollars, the Church could stop preaching the rhythm method (no better than Russian roulette), and

pill manufacturers would cease fighting the FDA. The battle of the feminists against the right-to-lifers on abortion would be over.

What's more, in our age of sexual permissiveness, abstinence, like yoga, would be a great character-builder.

It is not as difficult as we think. There's no reason why American families have to look like the Brady Bunch. If we can master the self-discipline of the diet struggle and conquer the boredom of jogging, abstinence should be a cinch.

And there are little tricks that could help in the withdrawal period. As a Trappist monk once admitted to me, whenever he gets the urge, he eats a quart of chocolate-chip ice cream and listens to *La Traviata*. One Carmelite nun I know does 200 pushups with cold packs tied to the nape of her neck.

Abstinence is easier for some nationalities such as the British, in whom there is a natural built-in frigidity. And though the French Catholics have not been known as sexually continent, they have one of the lowest birth rates in the world. The Church claims this comes about by Divine Providence, so maybe burning a few candles might help.

At times, abstinence may need a little positive reinforcement. In the United States, many teen-agers and single-bar habitues have, of their own free will, given up indiscriminate sex, and reverted to other habits, like *Sesame Street* and bowling. Their resolve, however, may have had a boost from a tiny virus called herpes.

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DEAR ABBY: About a year ago you ran a letter from "A Bible Student" who presented the biblical view on abortion, and in so doing quoted the Scriptures.

## Violence Against Women

Last year the ski-mask rapist was finally brought to trail in San Antonio. The trail and the resulting decision brought reporters from all over the country. Our sisters and brothers in San Antonio NOW fought long and hard to see that justice was done. Well..to quote from Sam Milsap, the district attorney of San Antonio, " The victim was raped three times; Twice by the rapist and the third time by the justice system!". "The decision of the jury was that the rapist was indeed guilty, however his sentence was to be treated with the drug Depo-Provera. 60 Minutes came to San Antonio and spent quite a lot of time and film footage talking to people about the crime and spoke with the San Antonio members. The following is from the San Antonio NOW newsletter, SANOW NEWS, February-1984:

FROM THE PRESIDENT.....

Since the press conference on the Bexar County Courthouse steps on August 30th, you've probably kept up with the events in the case of the Ski mask rapist. Hopefully, you viewed the final episode of the case on the 60 Minutes program Sunday night, January 15th.

I imagine you have been as outraged as I have, at the ignorance of men who continue to find excuses such as Depo-Provera to side step the real issue. Depo-Provera won't stop rape, only men can do that, because men rape, Depo-Provera doesn't.

60 Minutes leads you to believe that rape is a crime of sex, and the solution is chemical castration. The producers called me and said " they didn't have adequate time to show our (feminist) viewpoint. " After seeing the show, I understand, since it would have destroyed the theme of the show and presented the truth without sensationalism.

The abuse of power is one reason behind why men rape, it is also the reason why 60 Minutes produced a show with a strong bias that leads us to believe that men are not responsible for their actions. As long as men keep coming up with excuses for their behavior and keep us believing in them, the inequity of power will continue to exist.

# Legislative / Political

"The first women in America to wield political power were Indian women, particularly those of the six nations of the Iroquois in New York State. Their important economic roles as porperty owners and producers of food gave these women considerable political status in their tribe. They determined the fate of captives, could influence plans for war, and selected tribal leaders."

In the last legislative session we won a small victory by changing and improving the Texas' sexual assault statute. The bill with strong support from legislator's like Debra Danburg (D-Dist. 137) was not quite as strong as we had hoped, but much better than we have had in this state. It may interest you to know that Debra offered an amendment to the bill which would have allowed any spouse to be prosecuted when the act of sexual assault was committed regardless of living arrangements. This amendment was narrowly defeated by a vote on the motion to table 70-67-2. When a legislator voted to table the motion it was in fact a vote against the amendment. I am printing the votes of the Houston delegation. You may want to share these with your friends in other districts. Remember the vote A (aye) was a vote against women.

Once again, your energy, commitment and most precious resource, your time, is needed to make the Texas Women For The 80's Houston campaign a success.


