



FROM THE CREDIT UNION...FACTS ABOUT
LIFE INSURANCE

The Shell Credit Union has had several questions raised recently concerning the free insurance that is included with member loans and savings deposits.

Here are the facts: Free life insurance for insurable members' loans means that in event of the death of the member, his loan is paid off, up to a maximum of \$10,000. Also, should the member become totally and permanently disabled before reaching the age of 60, the loan is paid off. On savings deposits, providing he is insurable at the time of the deposit, the member receives free life insurance up to a maximum of \$1,000. This means that for every dollar deposited, the member's survivor would receive another dollar in life insurance up to \$1,000, providing the deposit was made prior to the member's 55th birthday. For money placed on deposit after age 55, the scale is trimmed downward (ages 55-59, 75¢ for each \$1 deposited; 60-64, 50¢ for each \$1 deposited; and 65-69, 25¢ for each \$1 deposited).

ARMED FORCES BIG CONSUMERS OF OIL
PRODUCTS

America's armed forces use more than 300 million barrels of oil products a year.

The Defense Petroleum Supply Center, an agency of the Department of Defense, reports that during 1962 it purchased 317.8 million barrels of jet fuel, aviation and motor gasoline, diesel fuel and other oil products.

The agency purchases petroleum products needed by all U.S. military units throughout the world.

During World War II, military petroleum purchases reached 588 million barrels a year. Last year's total represented a post-war peak.
