


ONE SHELL PLAZA TO HOUSE MORE EMPLOYEES--

REFINERY UNITED FUND COMMITTEE VISITS AGENCIES TO SEE WHERE YOUR CONTRIBUTION IS PUT TO WORK

A group of 11 United Fund committeemen visited the Harris County Center for the Retarded, the Lighthouse for the Blind, DePelchin Faith Home and the San Jose Clinic to see how the contributions of citizens are utilized.

These agencies receive certain percentages of their operating budgets from the United Fund. The remainder of the money needed is provided by private contributions and fees.

Shell Oil Company plans to move its manufacturing, transportation and marketing organizations as well as four divisions of its subsidiary, Shell Chemical Company, to Houston from New York.

About 1,000 persons, most of whom are in management positions, will be involved in the move which is scheduled to begin in late 1970. Payroll of the group was estimated at \$9 million.

The Company plans to move the Head Office departments into One Shell Plaza, now under construction, and the Houston employees will be housed in this building and in Two Shell Plaza another building under construction across the street at 777 Walker.

Top Shell officials moving to Houston include M. B. Holdgraf, Vice President-Marketing; Paul Deisler, Vice President-Transportation; and Harry Walker, Vice President-Manufacturing.

Remaining in New York in addition to the corporate offices will be the executive offices of Exploration and Production, Manufacturing, Transportation and Supplies, Marketing and Shell Chemical Company. Other organizations maintaining their executive offices in New York will be Shell Development Company; the Finance, Public Relations and Legal Organizations; and the Shell Companies Foundation, Inc.

OLDTIMERS GIVE YOUNGSTERS SECOND CHANCE ONLY TO TAKE A BEATING IN 23-12 BALLGAME


Galloping to a score of 23-12, the Youngsters have finally beaten the Oldtimers.

About 54 agencies are United Fund members and benefit the people with 78 hope-giving services.

At the Harris County Center for Retarded, children of all ages are trained so that they may become responsible members of the community. Many of the children receive training in the center workshop and are placed in jobs in the community. Those that cannot work in the outside world remain in the workshop and earn an income there.

The employees of the Lighthouse for the Blind learn to overcome their handicap and many go into jobs in business. At present, a group of blind people are taking instruction in typing medical reports.

Along with the MTM staff moving to Houston will be Shell Chemical's Industrial Chemicals, Petrochemicals, Plastics and Resins, and Synthetic Rubber Division.

Necessary staff support organizations also moving include Financial, Employee Relations, Public Relations, Purchasing, Legal and Shell Development Licensing.

In a related move the Agricultural Chemicals Division office will relocate in late 1970 to northern California, within about an hour's drive of the Biological Sciences Research Center in Modesto.

R. C. McCurdy, President, said the decision to move "follows a year long study which indicates it would provide closer co-ordination among activities of affected organizations.

Oil experts have said that this move shows the significance of Houston's role on the worldwide oil scene is paramount because more and more national and global operations of U. S. producers are largely directed from Houston. The move is just one more indication that outstanding world oil decisions, including operations on the Alaskan North Slope, are being made in Houston by major oil companies which have headquarters here.

At the De Pelchin Faith Home, children, who cannot be taken care of by their parents, or, who have no parents, are provided a family environment in the different cottages.

The San Jose Clinic, in the midst of a low income area, provides health services to hundreds of people every week. The clinic is staffed by volunteer doctors, dentists and ophthalmologists.

OIL INDUSTRY DRILLS MORE AND ENJOYS IT LESS COST OF DRY HOLES IS RISING OVER LAST YEAR

The cost of the average "dry hole" well is going up, according to recent petroleum industry studies. Dry holes now cost more than \$830 million a year.


Funds invested in unsuccessful drilling projects in the years 1959 through 1966 totaled an estimated \$6.5 billion. During that period the cost of the average dry hole increased by \$13,000--from \$43,000 to more than \$56,000.

In offshore operations the average dry hole costs \$443,000.

Despite modern technology, oilmen continue to battle heavy odds in searching for new petroleum reserves. When they explore areas where gas and oil have not been found previously, only one well in nine is likely to find any oil or gas. And, on the average, only two or three of every 100 of these wells find enough oil or gas to be considered commercially profitable.

10 AND OVER PARTY OCT. 11





