

## MARXIST TEACHERS TAKE OVER CULLEN, MAKE NO DEMANDS

E. CULLEN BUILDING (AFI)—The scene here yesterday was one of confusion and panic as members of a leftist teacher's organization overran administration building guards and took control of UHCC's nerve center.

University spokesperson Wendy Reddada said that although a final tally of administrators taken hostage by the insurgents was incomplete, several key members of the UHCC were in the hands of the teachers.

The list of those being held by the terrorists included UH System President Charles Bishop, UHCC Chancellor Barry Munitz, UHCC Provost George Magner, and the maid who brings the top administrators their coffee and soda pop from the kitchen in the administration building.

Reddada also said the UH Board of Regents Chairman Leonard Rauch was in the building during the takeover, but no trace of Rauch has yet been turned up.

The teacher's group is the self-proclaimed radical element of the Teaching Assistants, Teaching Fellows, and Lecturers Association. TATFLA was formed last spring in an effort to institute pay reform measures in the University salary structure.

The radical group, whose leadership is not yet known, referred to itself as "McNamara's Band" in a press release it dropped from a sixth floor window of E. Cullen after the administration building takeover. The group said it has adopted forties singers Bing Crosby and Merv Griffin as its spiritual leaders and cries of "Viva Max!"

## BISHOP, FALWELL AGREE ON TERMS FOR SALE OF 'TDC'

TUN'S TAVERN, PHILADELPHIA (AFI) — Ownership of *The Daily Cougar* will be transferred from the University of Houston to the local chapter of the Moral Majority on Monday, April 6.

The report was confirmed yesterday by UH Chancellor Barry Munitz and Moral Majority leader Rev. Jerry Falwell.

The *Cougar*, which is currently funded by student service fees and advertising revenue, will retain the current editorial staff, Falwell said. He said he has appointed the Rev. Bill Bob Clem Joe Johnson to oversee operations here, but added that he would keep a firm hand in the control of all Moral Majority publications.

Falwell said he had already made arrangements with the editorial staff, and believes "they'll fit in right nice" with his plan to "revitalize the morals of the campus." The "arrangements" include salaries

punctuated the air both during and after the rush against the building.

A TATFLA member who asked to remain unidentified said his organization knew nothing of "McNamara's Band," but he would not deny the radical group may be receiving arms and other supplies from communist elements operating from bases in the Caribbean area.

"I'm not sure how this situation will be resolved, if it ever gets resolved," the spokesman said. According to him, a third administration will be called in to act as a courier for messages between the TATFLA, McNamara's Band and whatever remains of the university administration.

A generally reliable source said the University of the Permian Basin may serve as the go-between for the negotiations.

Permian Basin President Lollgore Billyswap said he would consider the job, but he reserved his final decision "until I hear from one of the parties concerned."

Board of Regents spokesman Lyle Hammerstock said the board would meet in an emergency session on the third of next month to consider who should run the university, should the radicals keep control of the administrators and the nerve center.

"We're a little unsure about the chain of succession," Hammerstock said. "But after watching former Secretary of State Alexander Haig on television last March, I don't feel so bad. Heck, everybody knows the Chief Justice of the United States is next in line after the vice president!"

of \$1,200 per month for all staff members, six new staff cars and tuition and fee waivers.

Munitz said of the transfer, "Now this is strictly off the record, but they offered me and Chuck (Bishop, UH systems president) big bucks to carry this out, and, well, a little propaganda never hurt anybody."

Also off the record, Munitz said Falwell had expressed interest in "purchasing" Student's Association and Program Council saying, "we'll hit 'em at every angle, by God."

## JAMES CAAN AS AL HAIG IN 'ONE DAY IN MARCH' EX-NUKER PRAISES MERITS OF THE RADIOACTIVE LIFE

LOS ALAMOS, NEW MEXICO (AFI)—This is a story of personal tragedy, of personal triumph and of masochism. Its the kind of story which, at best, spawns great works of literature and, at worst, fills space in college newspaper joke issues

Meet Bors "Rads" Geiger, former nuclear plant technician and current microwave oven salesman.

This reporter first met Rads while investigating reports of 8-foot-tall stink bugs reported to haunt the area surrounding the test site of the first A-bombs. I noticed an eerie blue glow emanating from the White Appliance Mart on the corner of Proton and Neutron in Los Alamos. Being a crack newshound, I followed my instincts and investigated.

There sat Rads, glowing like a house lit up for Christmas. As I approached, my skin began to prickle and my hair stood on end. I knew I was on to something.

I asked the first question that popped into my mind, "Why the hell do you glow like the Aurora Borealis?"

Rads grinned and said, "I swallowed a street lamp." My inner sense told me this wasn't the whole story.

Undaunted, I continued the interview and was told a story that will haunt me to my grave.

Rads told me he was born in 1944. His father was a technician in the early nuclear power plants. "He used to take me to work with him and I'd study his old physics books by the light escaping the main reactor chamber. I got my technicians license by the time I was 17. I never had time for sports or girls like the other boys, but it really didn't bother me since I never grew over five feet and tipped the scales at a hefty 78 pounds," he said with a haunting twinkle in his eyes.

After working in the plants for 30 years, he was forced to retire after his health deteriorated. "I

couldn't understand it. I ate right, I'd run six miles a day around main housing, and I still kept deteriorating. I think it was a genetic problem. My father went the same way," he said.

I asked if he thought exposure to high levels of radiation for 30 years might have affected him. "Anyone who says radiation is harmful doesn't know an atom from a bean pod. I worked around it for 30 years and i'm still alive," he replied.

I noticed he was wearing a rubber suit under his clothes. He said he wore the suit to keep the pus from the running sores, which cover 80 percent of his body, from soaking into his clothes. "My mother had psoriasis real bad so I

guess that's where it comes from," he said

He wanted wanted to stay close to the nuclear industry, so Rads took up selling microwaves. "I'm now the biggest distributor in New Mexico, besides I don't have to pay light bills," he said.

The plucky little dynamo zooms around the store in his fission-powered megachair, undaunted by personal adversity and stupidity.

"I'll keep going till they bury me. I want to give the nuclear industry back just a little of what they gave me. Want to buy a microwave?"

So there you have it. A story that few would believe and fewer would print, but needed to be told.

# Three major networks to share Nixon award for 'responsible' news

SAVANNAH, Ga. (AFI) — The Board of Governors of the Institute for the Evaluation of the Social Responsibility of the Broadcast Media announced yesterday that all three major American commercial television networks will share the Richard Nixon Accuracy in Broadcasting Award.

It is the first time any commercial network has ever been nominated, let alone won, the prestigious award.

"It was too difficult to decide on a single winner," Institute chair Regis Philbin told television reporters at a press briefing in the basement of the Weingarten's store near South Alabama Street.

"We were very impressed with the way NBC and ABC predicted the events of the day Ronald Reagan was shot," Philbin said. "Even before the president had been taken into surgery, those two reported the operation was over. And by golly, it happened just the way NBC's and ABC's reporters said it would."

"We had pretty much decided NBC and ABC would share the award when CBS broke the news about James Baker," Philbin explained.

"Rookie anchorman Dan Rather showed remarkable aplomb when he was informed that Baker was still alive after he

had already been eulogized. While that doesn't do much for CBS's marks in its ability to see the future, its grade for flexibility skyrocketed," Philbin said.

When informed of the Institute's decision to include CBS in the award because of his aplomb, Rather refused to comment, only asking, "Do you have verification for that?"

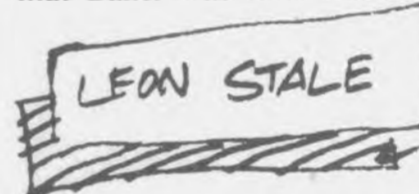
Roone Arledge, president of ABC's Wide World of News said it was unthinkable that a rookie act like Rather's should receive such attention from the Institute.

"Dan Rather just hasn't made enough of a name for himself, but apparently that makes no difference," Arledge said.

"Heck, ABC has been in front of everything that has happened for the last three years. Being accurate in broadcasting goes beyond just reporting the news — sometimes you have to invent things and hope events turn out that way."

"CBS has never operated that way, and for that network to be commended on the basis of a mistake made by a piker like Rather is obnoxious. Why, I'll bet CBS doesn't even know what happened to the space shuttle project yet. We've already written the script," Arledge added.

No one was available for comment from NBC.

# REAGAN WOWS 'EM IN SWEDEN

STOCKHOLM (AFI)—American President Ronald Wilson Reagan was here today to receive the Nobel Prize for Humor. It was the first time the prize in the category has ever been awarded.

"We found the instructions for the Humor Prize just last month," King Olaf of Sweden told television reporters who had packed themselves into a telephone booth to question the monarch.

"The instructions are a total surprise to us," the King said. "No one who has ever served on the Nobel Prize Awards Committee never thought Alfred Nobel had a sense of humor.

"Nevertheless, it appears that he did," the monarch continued. "And in accordance with Lord Nobel's wishes, we have bestowed

this highest award for humor on the President of the United States. Swedish Prime Minister Ulla Grigsten read the text of the

award to a combined session of the Parliament. Some 67 million European television viewers were estimate to have watched the proceedings.

This is the text of the 1981 Nobel Prize for Humor that was awarded to Ronald Reagan:

"In the dark hours after the attack on your person in 1981, you kept your countrymen and women at ease with your tremendous senses of Humor and Wit.

"Through those hours of tenseness, during that period of wondering and fear, your reported stream of one-liners, the same one liners that paved the way for you to become President of the United Staes, gave the entire free world a olive branch to grasp.

"The ability of a person to

think under anesthesia is truly commendable, and the capacity to quote great comics while in such a condition is even more remarkable.

"On the whole, I'd rather be in Philadelphia," the great American social philosopher W.C. Fields once said. And if it's true you penned those words while coming out of anesthesia after 3 hours of surgery at George Washington University Hospital, then you are truly worthy of the Alfred Nobel Prize for Humor, awarded this date before the combined session of the Parliament."

Reagan's acceptance speech had the members of Parliament and award nominees from 200 other nations rolling in the aisles.

"Well," the president began "even back in the forties, I knew I had a lot of fans in Europe!"

"But you know," he continued, "I always wanted to play a John Wayne role, and that day was my screen call. I couldn't pass up that script!"



## EVIDENCE OF PRIMAL ART FOUND IN UC SATELLITE

SCIENCE AND RESEARCH BUILDING I (AFI)—UH anthropology professor Wilhelm Reich announced yesterday that he has found evidence that a primitive culture once existed on the site now occupied by the University Center Satellite.

"I went in to the Satellite for a cup of coffee last Thursday, and there it was — the most complete example of primitive cave art yet to be found in North America. I have estimated it, judging by the technique and the material used, to be at least 160,000 years old," Reich said.

The cave drawings to which Reich referred were found in a recently excavated cave on the east side of the Satellite's dining area.

"The drawings," Reich said, "seem to have something to do with space travel. The crude drawing of the rocket-propelled craft, the rather cosmic renditions of various celestial bodies, in fact the whole project, indicates the artists were profoundly affected by, perhaps, a visit from extra-terrestrial beings."

"After I complete the preliminary investigations such as dating and typing, I will endeavor to prove that what spacemen indeed visited the Houston area some time ago," Reich said.

One of the artifacts of particular interest to Reich is a bead curtain hanging in one of the entrances of the cave.

"The beads seem to be made of some space-age plastics," Reich said. "The fact that they look like they are quarter-inch stainless steel ball bearings is quite interesting. I think the primitives used them as psuedo-weapons to scare away intruders. The beads look quite lethal, yet in fact they are quite useless and cheap. But then, I'm no interior decorator."

Lord Alfrington Busimorht, the curator of the British Museum in London, said he was "ecstatic" at getting the news about Reich's find.

"I will be travelling to the colonies immediately to take charge of Dr. Reich's find," Busimorht said from his London office. "Eventually, I hope to have parts of the find transported to London for permanent display in the Museum. Of course, this will make the University of Houston one of the most prestigious anthropological research institutions in the world."

UH System President Charles Bishop said he would be happy to cooperate with the Lord Buisimorht. "I promised Texans

helluva time analyzing footage to determine what's legal and what's not legal to have concealed in one's tights, Bishop said.

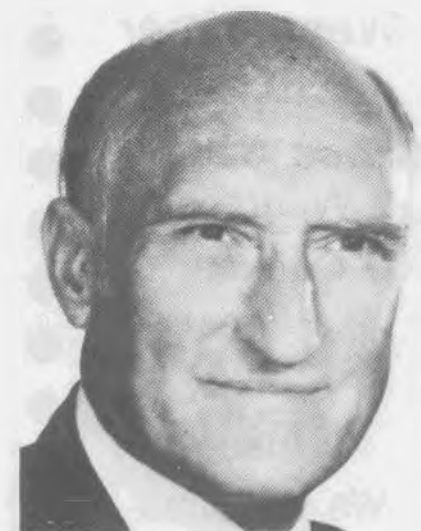

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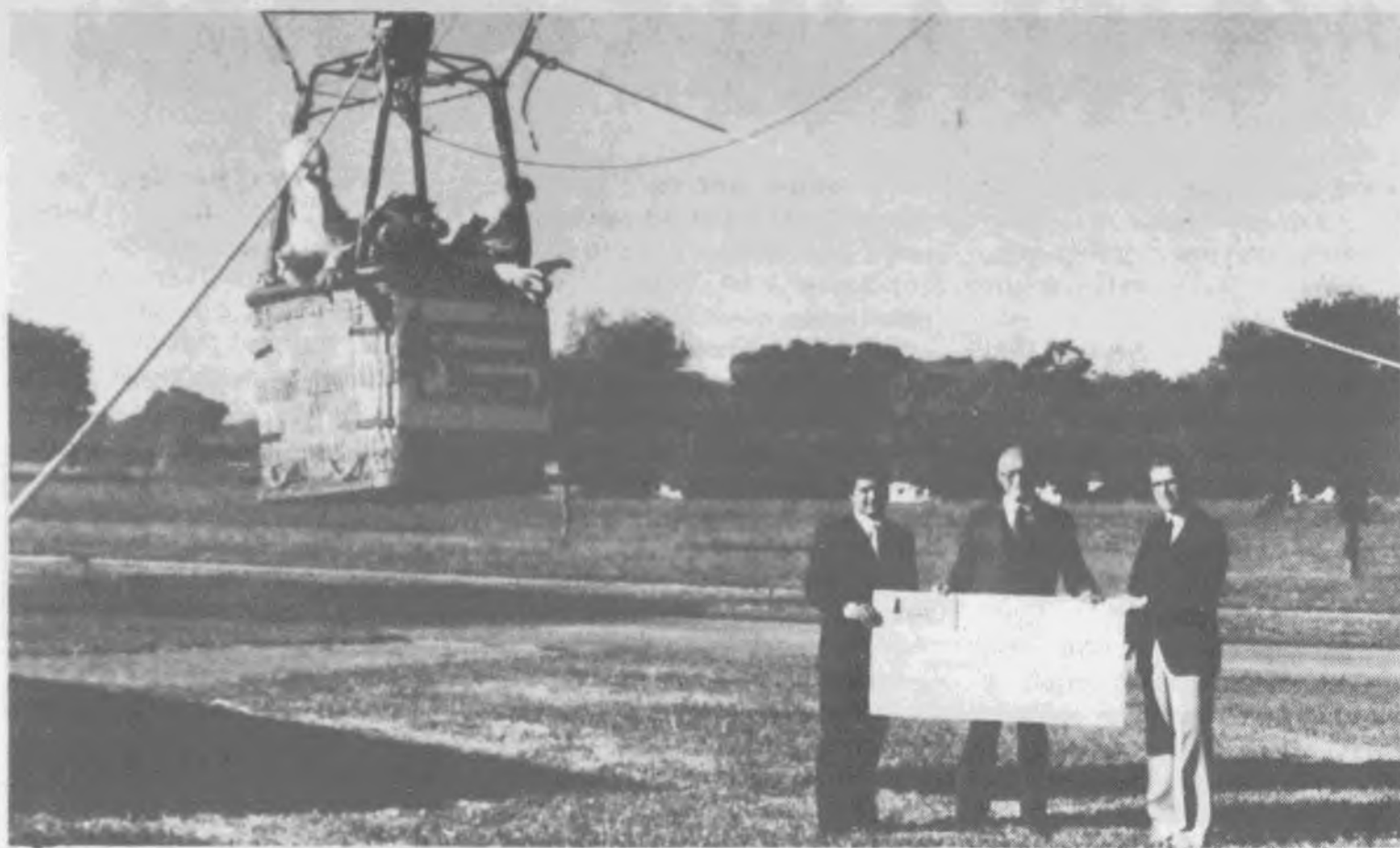

## BISHOP ANNOUNCES THAT UH WILL SOON BE WORLD'S GREATEST

THE CASH REGISTER (AFI)—University of Houston System President Charles Edwin Bishop announced yesterday that UH is the recipient of a \$125,000 Public Broadcasting Service grant to study mass media.

Along with the grant is a one-semester long seminar on the problems and promise of commercial mass media in the United States that will be led by public broadcasting personnel.

"We were very lucky to get some real quality instructors from PBS for the seminar," Bishop told television reporters. "Beginning next September, Big Bird, Bert and Ernie will join the university family as guest lecturers. The three are mainstream educators, and I am looking forward to working with them."

The three guest lecturers arrived in Houston yesterday in a hot-air balloon to emphasize what they called "an immediate need to upgrade the telecommunications research branch of the University

of Houston School of Communication."

"We are sure," Big Bird told television reporters, "that with our help and the grant from PBS, the University of Houston can become one of the most vital research centers for space age communications in the world."

Bishop, who served as the representative for the three, told Bishop that his two colleagues were looking forward to working closely with the administration next fall.

"It's been a long time since we worked with a really original crew," he said. "And from what we've heard about these folks... well, let's just say we are anticipating a very novel experience."

Bishop, who appeared to be star-struck while watching the balloon descend from the skies, merely clapped his hands rapidly and nodded his head back and forth for television reporters.

writing columns anyway," referring to the plan to make the editorial page a forum for reprints of Falwell's sermons.

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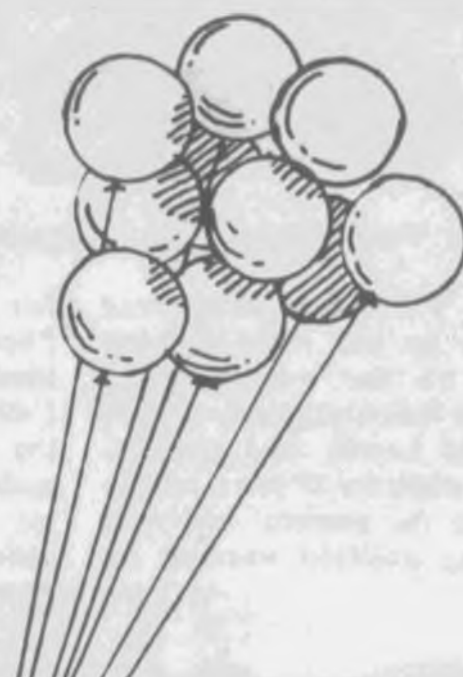
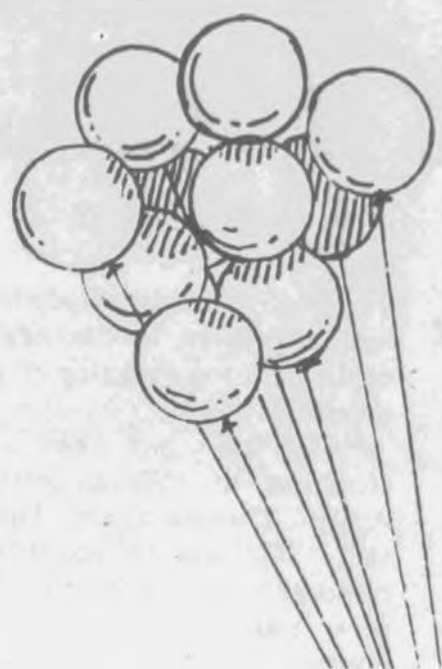

## LEWIS ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT, MAKES SWITCH TO VOLLEYBALL

Guy V. Lewis announced Tuesday he will retire as head coach of the university of Houston basketball team. The 58 year old Lewis, who coached Cougar teams for 25 years, said he will take the womens' volleyball coaching position vacated by

resignating Ruth Nelson.

"I thought it was about time for a change," Lewis said. "Sometimes you can really get tired of being a basketball coach. I mean, all those smelly bodies in the locker room and the news media always hounding me and my players. I feel going to volleyball will give me piece of

mind and the media never bother those people."

Lewis had a distinguished career as UH head coach. His teams have had 22 consecutive winning seasons. The 1968 team beat UCLA in the astrodome in front of the largest audience ever to view basketball. That same team ended the regular season ranked

number one in the nation while finishing fourth in the NCAA playoffs. Last year, the Coogs finished second in the Southwest Conference and won the SWC postseason tournament.

Lewis' players seemed indifferent about their coaches surprise announcement.

"Guy who?" Rob Williams asked.

"Don't make no never mind to me," Larry Micheaux said. "As long as I don't go with him. I hate volleyball."

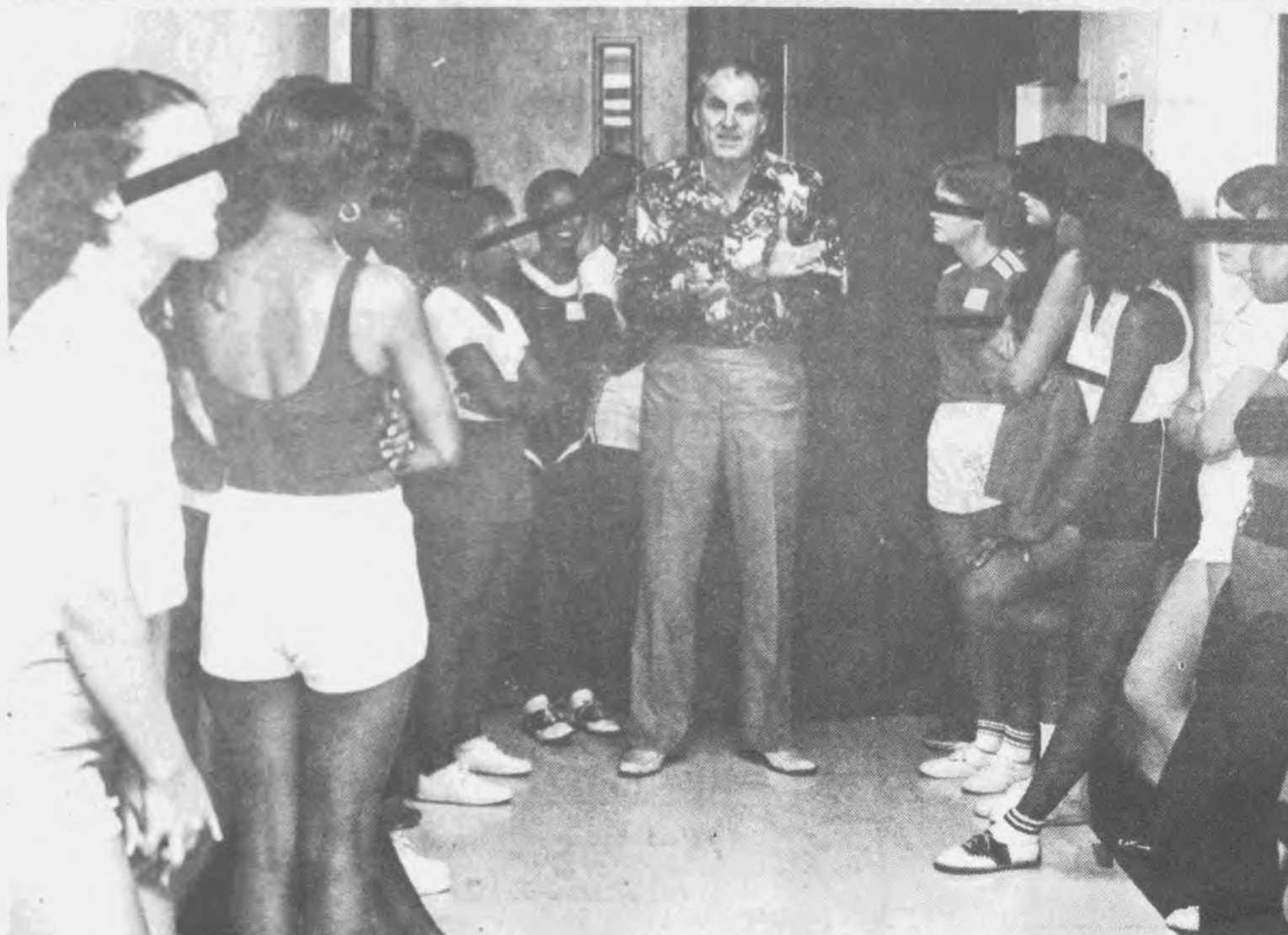
"I know Guy got me here and everything," said Michael Young, "but I got a possible career ahead of me and I can't get concerned

over a little thing like a coach leaving."

6 foot 7 freshman Clyde Drexler was astonished at the news but could not stop laughing to give a comment.

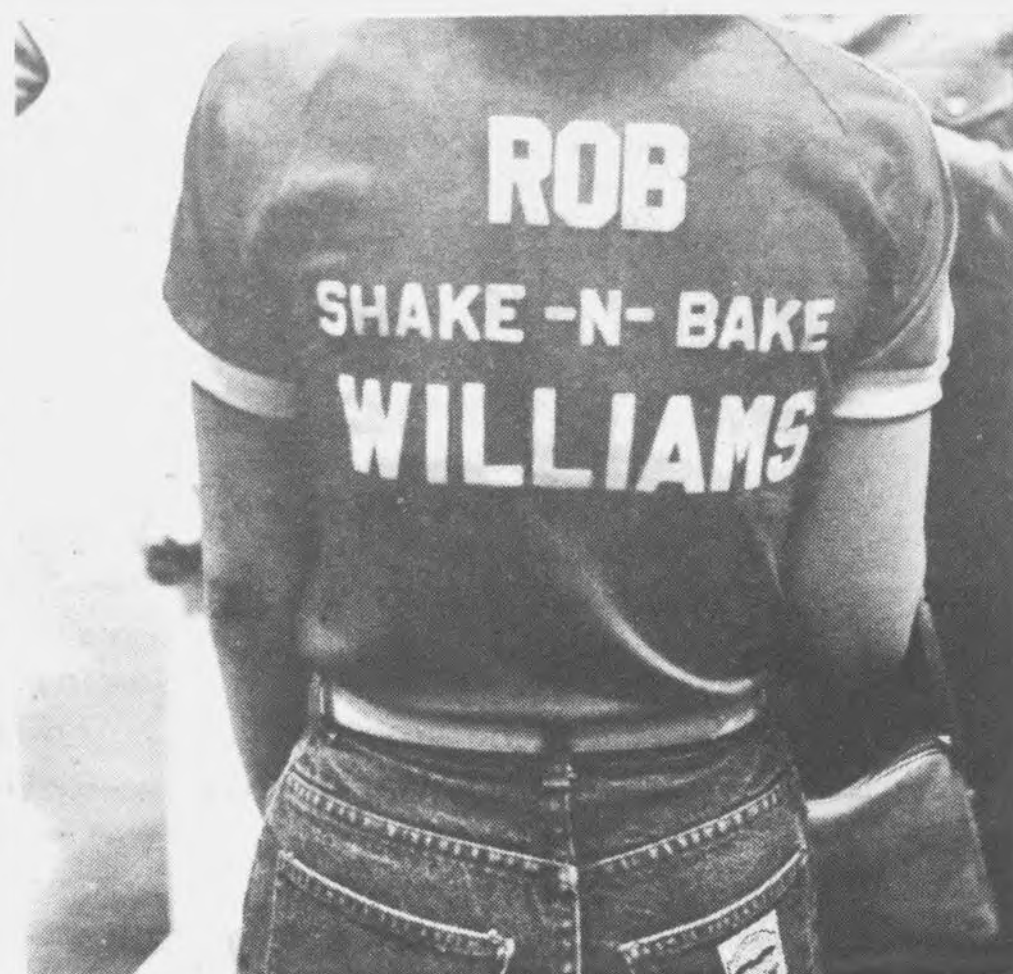
"The man has been an institution at this university," Athletic Director Cedric Dempsey said. "He will be receiving the standard volleyball coaches' salary now but he still wants the position."

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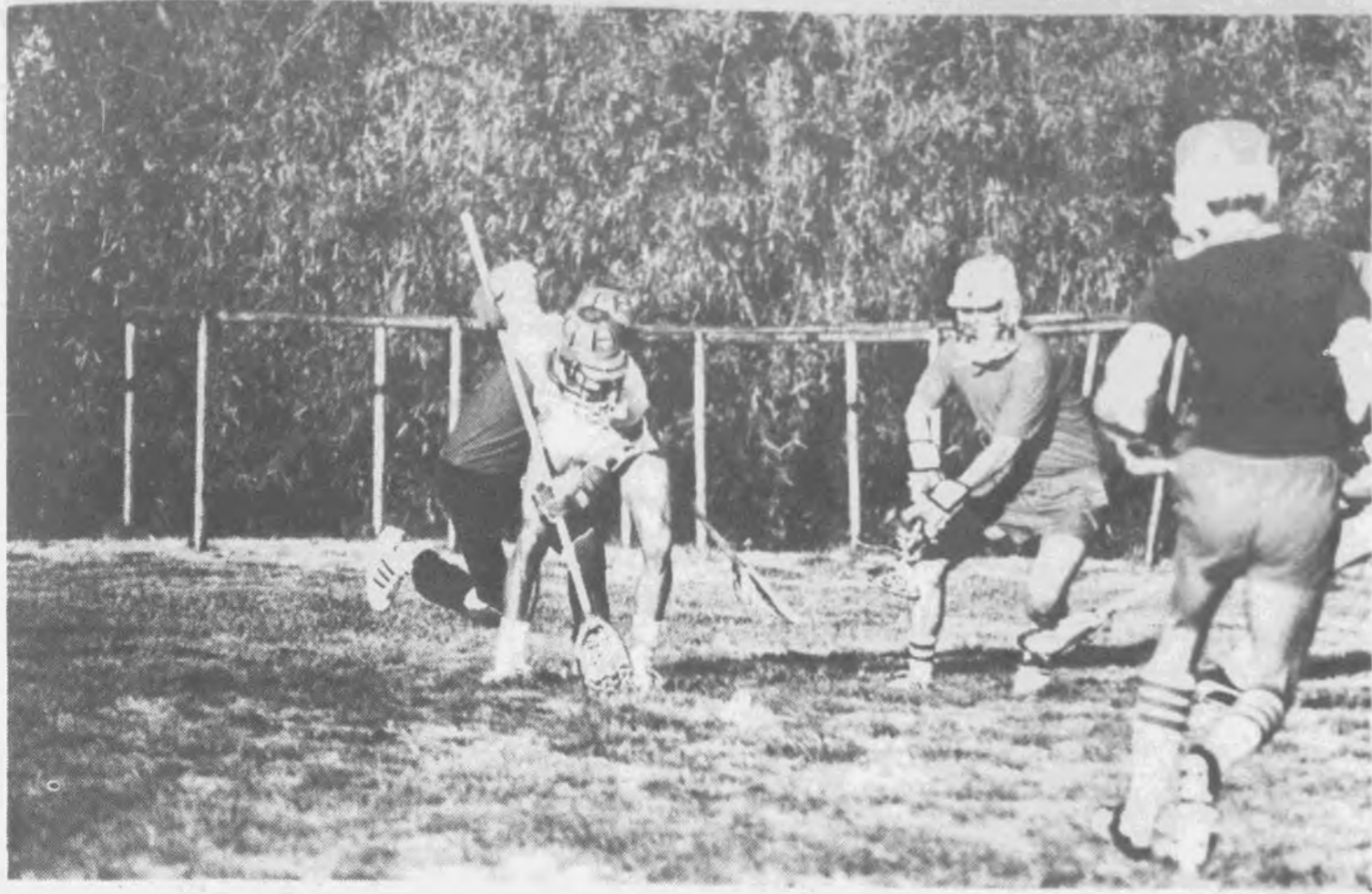

## TANKERS TO SCOOP AT NCAA CONTEST

The UH swim team may have had difficult challenges this semester but none will be as tough as the task they face tomorrow in the UH Natatorium.

Using only the cups in front of them, Houston's swimmers, pictured at the right, will attempt to empty the UH pool in the first round of the NCAA Pool Drying Contest. The marathon meet will take place for the entire summer.

Several UH athletic teams are showing other athletes in the country that dancing and athletics can mix.

"She told me she could help the team win more games this season," he continued, "and anything that will help my team win I'll go for. She wanted to teach them ballet but I told her we're a 'down home type' of ball club so she taught us some square dancing lessons. We've had a lot

of fun even though the games have been tough."

"One time it got out of control," the outspoken coach said. "We went up to A&M and you know they got a lot of country folk up there, a lot of farmers, and we were in the 5th inning of the game with a 6-3 lead. Darned if one of them Aggies didn't pull out a tape recorder with the 'Texas Star' music on it. Well, our players went wild; I couldn't control them. They just started dancing together on the field, on top of the dugout, and we couldn't finish the game. A&M won the contest on a forfeit."

Walton said it was one of the worst defeats of his life but he asserts his team is young.

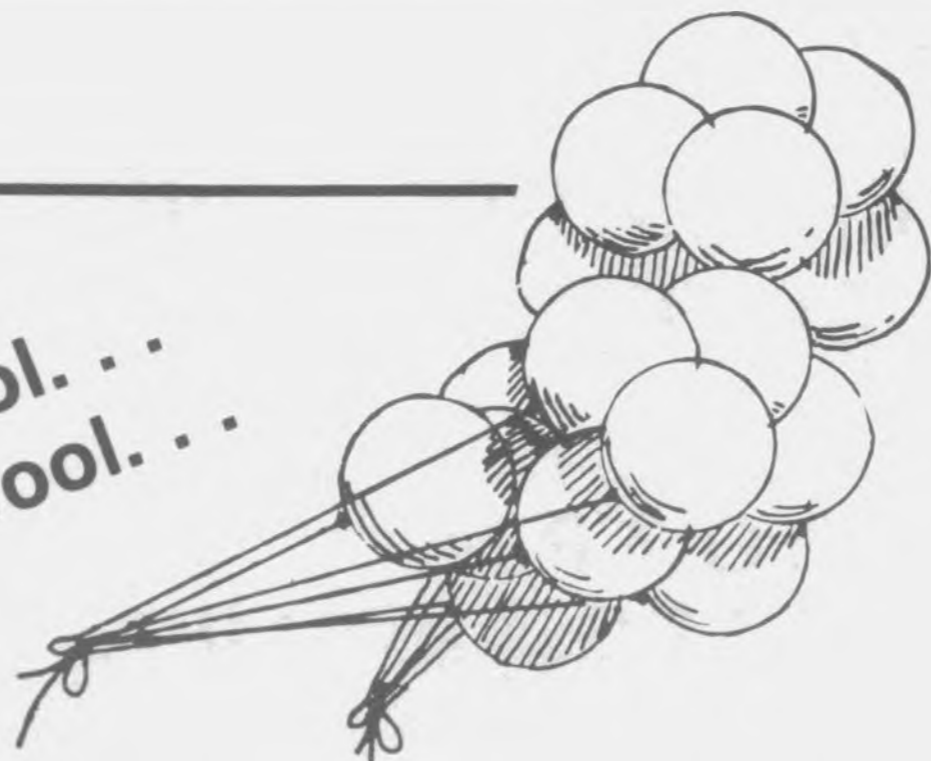
"We're young," he said. "We've got a lot to learn. We need to learn when to dance and when to play ball."

# ALLEN DIRECTS BOFFO SCI-FI FLICK

Hinsel Town (AFI)—"I couldn't believe it myself," said director Irwin Allen of his current project, "I mean, if someone had asked me if I would ever have considered doing another disaster flick, I would have extinguished my cigar in their face. But here I am."

Allen, director of such distinguished television series as "Land of the Giants" and "Time Tunnel," and director of film classics like "The Swarm," is speaking of his upcoming epic disaster film, tentatively titled "Poseidon Adventure in Space." The multimillion dollar production is, in Allen's own words, "Big. We want to make the most incredible disaster film ever. We've spent over \$42,000 on the coke machine sequences alone."

The screenplay, written by Allen, has the ill-fated ocean liner Poseidon being floated to the surface of the Atlantic ocean, and then towed to shore in the year 2055.

"The great part," he chortled, "is that they refit the Poseidon to be a space ship. On her maiden

voyage to Alpha Centauri, she gets hit by a 90 foot asteroid, and capsizes."

Understandably, Allen has been criticized for ignoring the fact that in space, there is no up or down. He shrugs it off, saying: "Hell, every movie you make is subject to petty criticisms. People are jealous because I'm famous and know Richard Basehart personally and all that stuff. In any case, audiences don't care about all that technical crap."

"Poseidon Adventure in Space" boasts an all-star cast. While Allen's efforts to lure Gene Hackman into the role of the spacecraft's lunatic clergyman were in vain, he has assembled what he modestly calls, "a glittering galaxy of stars." Among the cast will be James David Hinton ("Galaxina") who will play Buzz Schwartz, the swash-buckling Jewish astronaut who leads a band of survivors through the capsized space ship. Boxoffice superstar John Saxon will appear as captain Dan Solo, and Roddy McDowall will star as Ming Vador, the evil certified public accountant. Allen commented on

the cast: "I'm very enthusiastic. They're all great. It's a privilege to work with such seasoned professionals. I still wish we could have gotten Gene (Hackman). What a prima donna."

No expenses are being spared on the mammoth production, which is being filmed in a top secret location in Houston's fifth ward.

"We built a full-scale mockup of the Poseidon, and we have an awesome special effects sequence in which all the extras in the dining room simultaneously light their cigarette lighters. We spent half a million on lighter fluid alone."

"Poseidon Adventure in Space" is tentatively scheduled to be released this July, though Allen

states "It may take a little longer. I'm a serious filmmaker and you can't rush quality."

Asked if he has another project lined up, Allen gleefully admitted that "if this one goes over big, I'm going to make another space movie. I think I'll call it "Towering Inferno on Mars."

# BISHOP TO RUN COUGAR

Communications Center (AFI) —As of yet there have been no applications for the position of editor for the Summer and Fall 1981 semesters of **The Daily Cougar**. In an emergency meeting of the UH Crisis Management Team, UH System President Charles Edwin Bishop said if no one applied for editor by 5:00 p.m. tonight he would appoint himself editor-in-chief.

"As of tonight I will be in control here at the **Cougar** pending the application of 'anyone' for editor," Bishop said.

Chancellor Barry Munitz was reported in stable condition at the University Health Center after being told he would have to double-up jobs and assume the position of news editor. While he

Students at UH were shocked at the course of events and were heard repeating over and over, "The whole campus is going crazy. Wednesday is a day gone

beserk."

Members of CRAP, a pro-religious group of moonies, urged all students to join them in praying for at least one application from anyone for editor of **The Cougar** at a rally they staged in front of the newsroom.

Current editor Bob Engler will not submit his application for the upcoming semester and said, "Just how crazy do you think I am?"

President Bishop said, "This is deplorable, I can't believe society is deteriorating to the point where students are not fighting each other for the chance to be editor of the **Daily Cougar**."

This is the seventh attempt in

UH history to try to assassinate student control of the paper.

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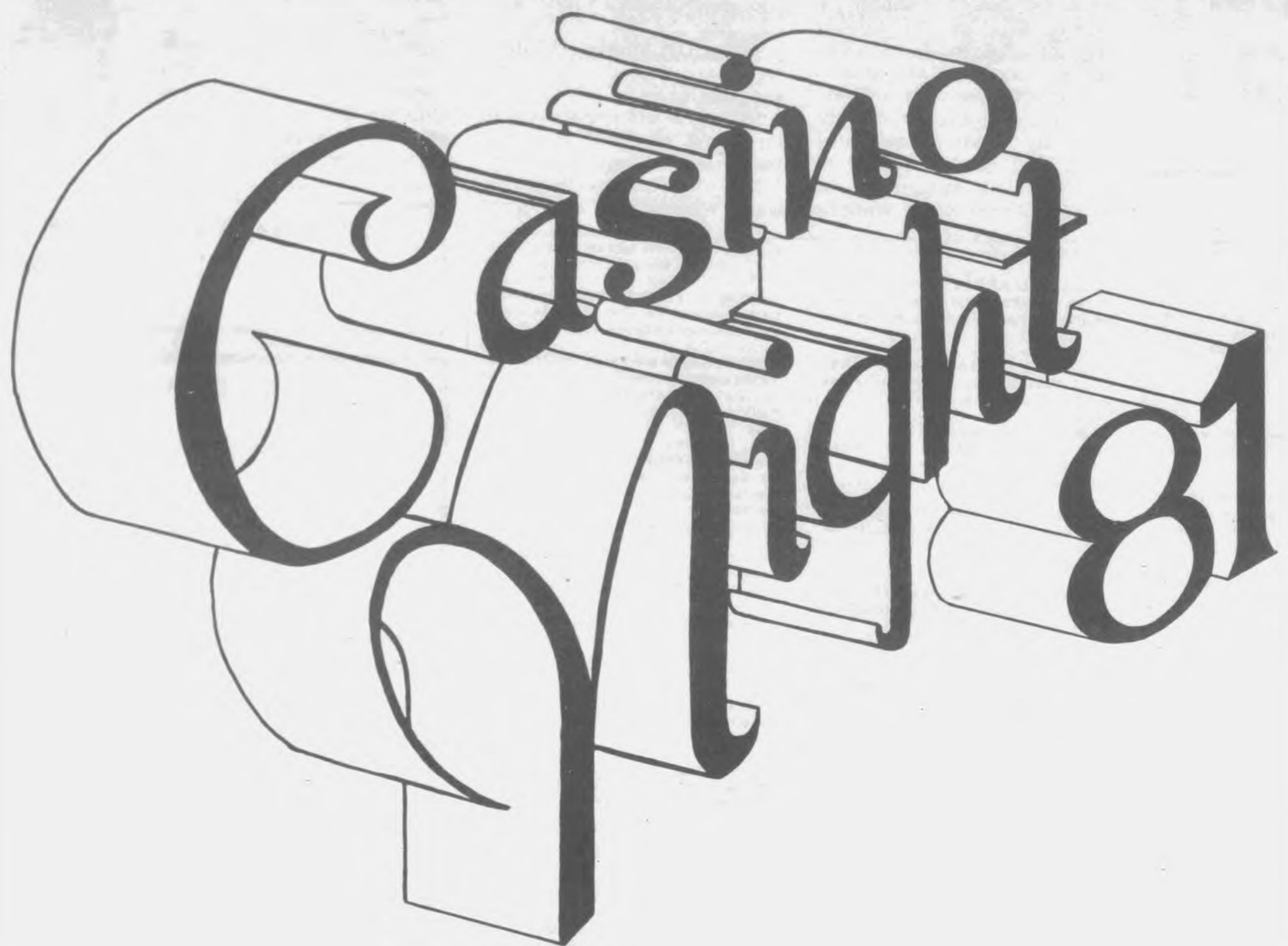
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
