The pictures will be returned without damage to the print.

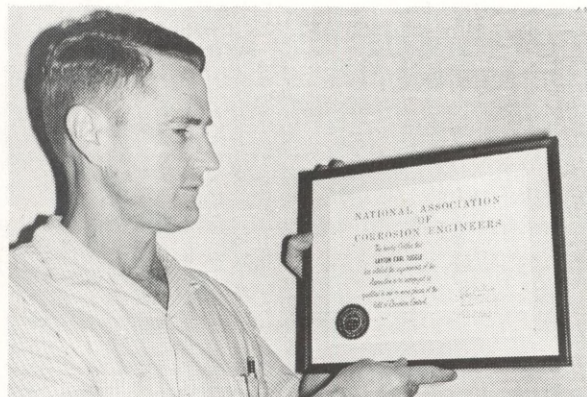


SCHOOL GROUP VISITS REFINERY...AND FISH POND

Country Club here in Houston. It matched Texas' own Ben Hogan against Sam Snead, winner of three PGA and two Masters' titles. This match is the only one of the series to be filmed in the United States.

On Tuesday, a television crew filming commercials for the show was at the Houston Refinery to take movies of several locations, and on Wednesday the TV crew moved over to the Chemical Plant. Each show in the series includes scenes of the area where the match is played. So for many reasons, local Shell people will be interested members of the TV audience when the Houston match is telecast next year.

Gene Sarazen and George Rogers will again be the commentators.

Selection of courses throughout the Western hemisphere and Europe and top-ranking international professional players is now being made and will be announced later. The foreign courses are expected to be in England, Ireland, Germany, Denmark, Luxembourg, Italy, Monaco, Canada, Venezuela, and Trinidad.

SHELL SUPPORTS CAR TRAVEL CAMPAIGN

Shell is helping support the American Petroleum Institute's automobile travel promotion campaign, which last year produced an estimated 27 per cent more trip-taking than there would have been without such a campaign.

Advertisements at Shell service stations and in newspapers, magazines and television will include a reference to the API campaign. The slogan, "See America Best...By Car," will be used as a part of all of Shell's newspaper advertising in 136 markets.

The API campaign will consist mainly of a series of newspaper advertisements featuring some local "Heritage Trail" tours which can be taken comfortably in one day and others which can be taken over a weekend. The advertisements contain detailed information for the entire tour, including mileage distances, references to historical and scenic points of interest and a road map of the route to be taken. The basic "Heritage Trail" tours are New England, Dixieland, Ozark, Hiawatha, Lincoln and Old West.
