Referring to Mr. Wooding's communication of November 7th addressed to you submitting estimates of cost on the street trees required:

You may now issue instructions that this order be placed for delivery and planting at the proper time, accepting Mr. Wooding's recommendation for trees rated $1\frac{1}{2}$ " to 2" in diameter, purchased from the Japanese Nursery.

I assume there are no replacements, or if so, they have been otherwise provided for, and the live oaks planted inside the hedge. If they have not been so provided for, they should be taken care of at the same time.

I further assume that the location of the trees shown on the print, that is, the distance from the property or curb line is correct and allows for the usual space between the curb and the walk, a point that should be kept in mind as the probability is that when constructed, the sidewalk around the property will be not less than $4\frac{1}{2}$ ft. in width and may eventually be increased to $5\frac{1}{2}$ or 6 ft. I am returning the correspondence herewith.

You understand that the cost of the present tree planting under these instructions will be borne by me and not rebilled to the city as applied in one case previously.
