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Wortham alarm system neglected for two years

The fire alarm system in the Communication Building and the Wortham Theater Complex have been inoperable for about two years, according to UH Fire Marshall David Cox.

Although smoke detectors in the buildings are working, a roof leak apparently caused all the fire alarms to short-out Cox said. Cox, who has been with UH since

April, 1980, said he has been trying to get action on the problem since his employment. At a Facilities and Planning meeting about a month ago it was finally decided to replace parts of the system and make it operative.

DeWayne TeVault, director of architectural and engineering services of facilities planning and construction, said he has been aware of problems in the fire alarms at the Wortham complex for at least two years but he was

not aware that they were completely inoperative until a few months ago.

TeVault said corrective steps have not been taken until now because, "certain questions needed to be answered." Facilities and Planning wanted to know if the installer was at fault and what the source of damage was to the alarms, he said.

TeVault also said no funds were available to repair and extend the system at the time the problem

was realized. Money is now available from the Energy Maintenance and Environmental Control Project, he said.

The regular procedures of bidding and awarding a contract for the new fire alarms must be observed, TeVault said, but the problem will be corrected "as quickly as possible." It will probably be at least a month before they could begin installing a new system, he added.

Although fire alarms are not

required by Houston's building code in schools beyond the 12th grade, the fire department would like to see them installed, the city fire marshal said.

Cox said fire extinguishers and hoses are available in the Wortham complex but in case of a fire that cannot be put out with this equipment one should call the city fire department. People should then be evacuated as efficiently as possible, he said.



Hundreds of people from the Science and Research Building I were evacuated at 5:00 p.m. last night when a burning smell was detected in the basement and the sixth floor of the building. While firefighters searched all eight floors of the building for the source of the smell, students went back to their classes. Firefighters had difficulty in trying to find the source because many of the rooms in the building were locked and the maintenance personnel who had many of the keys were not immediately available.

District Fire Chief R. Robert Hanless said he did not know where or what the source of the smell was, but added that firefighters would continue to search for the source Tuesday night. "The smell is definitely electrical but the source is unknown," Firefighter George Press said. (Photo by Phil Marcus)

Speakers examine cultural values

Women and their lifestyles are being discussed in a three day symposium sponsored by the anthropology department. Eleven sessions are scheduled for Feb. 17-19 in the Honors Lounge at M.D. Anderson Library between 9 a.m. and 10 p.m.

"The point of the symposium is for American women to learn from women in the rest of the world, as these women speak through the reports made by women anthropologists," said Dr. Pauline Kolenda, an anthropology professor in charge of the symposium.

Three speakers discussed the topic "Women in Sweden and in West Germany" in the Tuesday afternoon session attended by approximately 40 people.

Anne-Marie Qvarfort from the National Labor Market Board, Stockholm, Sweden told the audience, "In Sweden everyone's right to work is sacred." She said education is the key to changing attitudes which will permit sexual equality in Sweden. A recent

change, she said, is that more young women are entering agricultural professions.

Qvarfort said child care facilities are essential to sex equality. Approximately 50 percent of Swedish pre-school children are cared for in such facilities but the government's goal is to provide 70 percent public child care by 1983.

Dr. Joan M. McCrea, professor of economics, The University of Texas at Arlington spoke of sex equality in both Sweden and China from a foreigner's point of view.

McCrea's slides on China pictured women doing manual labor and working in small industries. She said that the Chinese had made more progress in sex equality in the labor force by moving in one generation from footbinding of women to fairly equal work. McCrea praised Sweden for its outreach to disadvantaged women.

Dr. Helge Pross, visiting professor from University of Siegen, West Germany said that although women in West Germany had equality in the legal sense, the Parliament was male-

dominated. She said women hesitated to seize political power because they would have to sacrifice leisure, family harmony, and approval from society. She went on to say that women in Germany have not yet developed personality characteristics such as ambition, self-confidence, endurance, love of power and acceptance of power conflicts

needed to compete with men in politics and employment.

Pross said child care facilities were not available in West Germany for children under three years. Grandmothers often care for young children, she said. The audience responded with laughter when Pross said that in Europe the four major "grandmother countries are Italy, France,

Belgium and West Germany."

Other talks last night covered minority women and women at LaGrange, the town where "The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas" is set.

TAs to rally in UC Arbor today

Rallies to express solidarity between teaching assistants here and at the University of Texas at Austin will take place today on both campuses. The rally here will be in the UC Arbor from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

The Teaching Assistants, Teaching Fellows, and Lecturers Association of UH and the UT Support Committee joined to form the Houston-Austin Solidarity Coalition, Feb. 7. They agreed on the need for salary increases and benefits on state supported campuses for part-time instructors. The Coalition plans

to strengthen the support for its demands in the Texas Legislature.

The rallies are organized by the Coalition to demonstrate that the problems are state-wide, according to Chris Domino, a teaching assistant in the English department here.

Danielle Jaussaud of Texas said their group hopes to gain the attention of the administration, and get a response to their arguments.

Julie Gianellone, former President of the UH Teaching

Assistants Association and Eliza Willis from Austin will be two of many speakers at the rally here, Domino said.

Speakers at Austin include: Rep. Gonzalo Barrientos, D-Austin; two faculty members, a representative of University Employee Union and people from different departments within the campus.

Ike Dean, of the health, physical education and recreation department, and Katherine Guilde, of the Teaching Assistant Core Committee, will represent UH at the rally in Austin.

commentary Security deposit rules protect tenants

Editor's note: Hutton's commentary today deals with recovering security deposits from landlords.

When you get ready to move out of the apartment, there are a couple of important points to remember. First, if giving a 30-day notice to the landlord is a condition for security deposit refund, then it must be stated as such in the lease. It must be underlined and placed in a "conspicuous" fashion so as not to underrepresent this as a condition for refund. Second, the

initial inventory list that you and the landlord signed is only half of your total protection. A second inventory should be taken—complete with photographs of all the damaged areas, etc.—so that a comparison record is available. This is valuable protection in the event the landlord wants to charge you for, say, extra kitchen cleaning just because you had a disagreement about what "ordinary wear and tear" was on the carpeting. Proper before-and-after documentation of apartment conditions can prove invaluable in attempting to recover your security deposit from an unscrupulous landlord.

Another essential step on the

road to security deposit recovery is to leave a forwarding address with the landlord or resident manager. If you cannot leave it with the manager when you move out, then mail it to him via registered letter as soon as possible. While your rights to a security deposit refund are never forfeited as a result of failing to leave a forwarding address, the landlord is under no legal obligation to refund the security deposit unless he has a forwarding address. Don't get trapped in this paradox! Leave a forwarding address when you turn in your apartment key. If you have complied with all the regulations, the landlord is required to furnish your refund within 30 days after

you surrender your apartment.

One last caution is in order. do not, under any circumstances, withhold any rent to cover your security deposit! This is "prima facie" evidence to the court that you have acted in bad faith and puts you in violation of Texas statutes. If are taken to court, you could be liable to the landlord for three times the rentals illegally withheld plus any reasonable attorney fees necessary to recover the withheld rent. In landlord-tenant matters, your legal position is always much stronger if you have adequately documented everything and if you are paid up on your rent as well as on other charges.

There are certain legal obligations that the landlord has to fulfill regarding security deposit refunds. First, if the landlord does have valid reasons for withholding all or part of your security deposit, he must furnish you with an itemized list of the deductions. If there is a positive balance left after the deductions, he must refund it to you as well. However, the landlord is not obligated to furnish the itemized list if there are any rentals due and unpaid at the time of moving out, or if there is a controversy over any rentals due or unpaid.

The landlord cannot retain any security deposit to cover "normal wear and tear" to the premises. Normal wear and tear is defined to mean "that deterioration which occurs, based upon the use for which the rental unit is intended, without negligence, carelessness, accident, or abuse of the premises or equipment or chattels by the tenant or members of his household, or his invited guests." It is interesting to note that the landlord has the burden of proving abnormal wear to the courts. This is further protection

for the tenant even though quite often, abnormal wear and tear can be easily proven.

If a landlord retains a security deposit "in bad faith", he is in violation of Texas law. If taken to court and convicted, the landlord can be liable to the tenant for up to \$100 plus the amount of that portion of the deposit which was wrongfully withheld from the tenant and for reasonable attorney's fees in the lawsuit to recover the withheld deposit.

In addition, a landlord who in bad faith fails to provide a written description and itemized list of the damages and resulting charges, forfeits all of his rights to withhold any portion of the security deposit or to bring suit against the tenant for damages to the premises. He is also liable to the tenant for reasonable attorney's fees in a lawsuit to recover the security deposit. The landlord is not liable, however, unless it can be proved that he acted in "bad faith." If the landlord fails to return the security deposit or fails to provide a written description and itemization of deductions within 30 days—this is automatically considered proof of "bad faith" on his part.

The Texas legislature set down these security deposit rules as a protection for Texas tenants. Although they have served our apartment-renting population well, the statutes by no means provide total protection. The majority of your protection must come from yourself. Abide by the agreements in your lease, inventory the apartment before and after your residency, and take as good of care of your residence as you possibly can. By following these few simple guidelines, you can have a delightful and rewarding tenant experience.

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commentary Students, faculty vie over committee

Editor's note: This is the last part of Maxwell's commentary on minority admissions to the Bates School of Law.

On Friday, Feb. 20, the faculty of Bates College of Law is scheduled to reconsider a 19-6 vote taken in closed session Jan. 30 not to allow ethnically designated voting seats on the law school admissions committee. This move upset the Student Bar Association (SBA), the Chicano Law Student Association (CLSA), and the Black American Law Student Association (BALSA).

The dispute between the racial minority organizations, SBA, and the faculty over composition of the admissions committee is a very narrow question of the best means of implementing the established, fair admissions policy.

The composition of the admissions committee for the last three years has included two student voting positions. The faculty still wants students but without votes. CLSA and BALSA want designated voting seats selected by them, not the faculty.

SBA theoretically supports that position, demanding only one designated seat for SBA, but in practice it is willing to set itself up

as the nominator for all students.

The faculty apparently feels threatened by the possibility that if CLSA, BALSA and SBA had independent power to designate the student voting members on the admissions committee they may send up people who would look out only for the narrow interests of discretionary admits — white as well as non-white.

The student organizations respond by saying that in the rare instance when that might happen, the faculty is still protected by the fact that the it would have a majority of five against a maximum of three students. No application can be approved by

the admissions committee with only three votes.

The faculty majority is an adequate safeguard, unless two faculty members join the coalition of irresponsibles in protecting only the narrow interests of discretionary admits. Another safeguard is that unqualified discretionary admits, white as well as non-white, would be flunked out the first year of law school.

The student organizations apparently feel threatened by the

possibility that the faculty might hand pick students opposed to the interests of discretionary admits and-or stack the admissions committee with faculty members who want an elitist, numbers-only approach to admissions, which is a lot easier to administer.

The faculty has to decide which choice of composition of the admissions committee will better implement the law schools fair admissions policy.

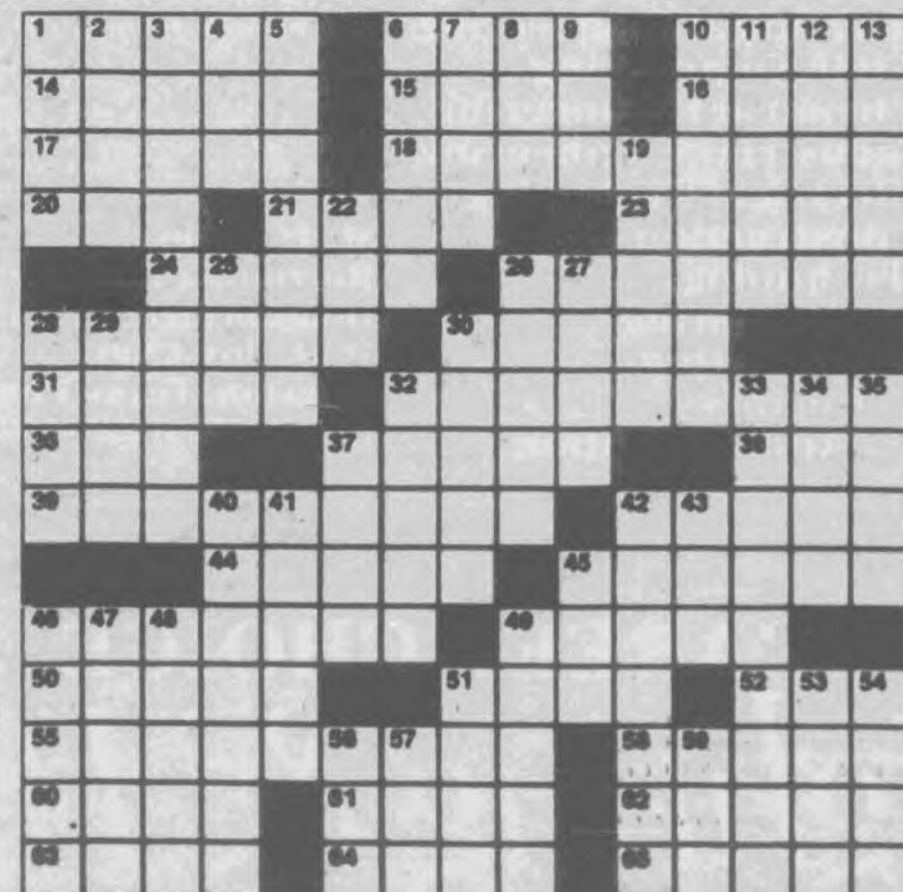

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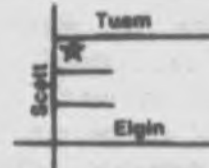

Child support

Plan would use tax refunds

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Reagan administration, despite protests by civil libertarians, is proposing to withhold federal income tax refunds from parents who fail to make court-ordered child support payments.

The proposal, called "Project Intercept," would be a major expansion of the government's efforts to enforce payment of child support. The underlying purpose is to save the costs of welfare benefits for children whose parents won't pay child support.

Welfare benefits can become involved if a parent's failure to pay court-ordered support makes the child eligible for welfare. Thus, forcing the parent to make the payments would reduce or eliminate the child's eligibility for welfare, Medicaid and other

government benefits.

Critics say the program poses a threat to the privacy and rights of taxpayers and represents misuse of the Internal Revenue Service.

"The IRS has enormous powers to gather information from people who are required to give it, without the right to protection from self-incrimination," said John Shattuck, national legislative director for the American Civil Liberties Union.

"The powers of the IRS should be limited to the very important purpose of tax collection," he said.

The proposal surfaced in budget director David A. Stockman's working papers on federal spending cuts which have been widely available in advance of President Reagan's announcement Wednesday night of his tax and

budget cut plans.

Officials at Stockman's office of Management and Budget and at the Department of Health and Human Services, which would administrate the child support enforcement program, refused direct comment.

A key element of the program, according to the Stockman documents, is taxpayer fear of the IRS.

"The IRS would be required to halt and collect from an absent parent's federal income tax refunds the amounts owed for child support arrearages," the working papers say. "A number of states have used this procedure successfully and have found that many absent parents began making regular support payments when they learned of the existence of the procedure."

LeRoy to get award for NAACP work

In honor of Black History Month the UH chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and the Black Student Union will present an award to Moses LeRoy. The ceremony will take place at noon, Wednesday, Feb. 18, in the UC Houston Room.

LeRoy was the plaintiff in the original lawsuit against the City of Houston which led to the single-member city council district plan known as 9-5. His case against Southern Pacific Railroad and Local Union 1534 for discrimination in hiring practices and

promotions of Black people was a precedent-setting case and became a federal statute. He was one of the instrumental persons in getting South Park Blvd. changed to Martin Luther King Blvd.

He has been a member of the N.A.A.C.P. since the forties and has served on its board for several years. He says it was very dangerous to say you were a member of the N.A.A.C.P. back in the 1940s and 1950s. He was in the organization when Houston had its largest membership (13,000).

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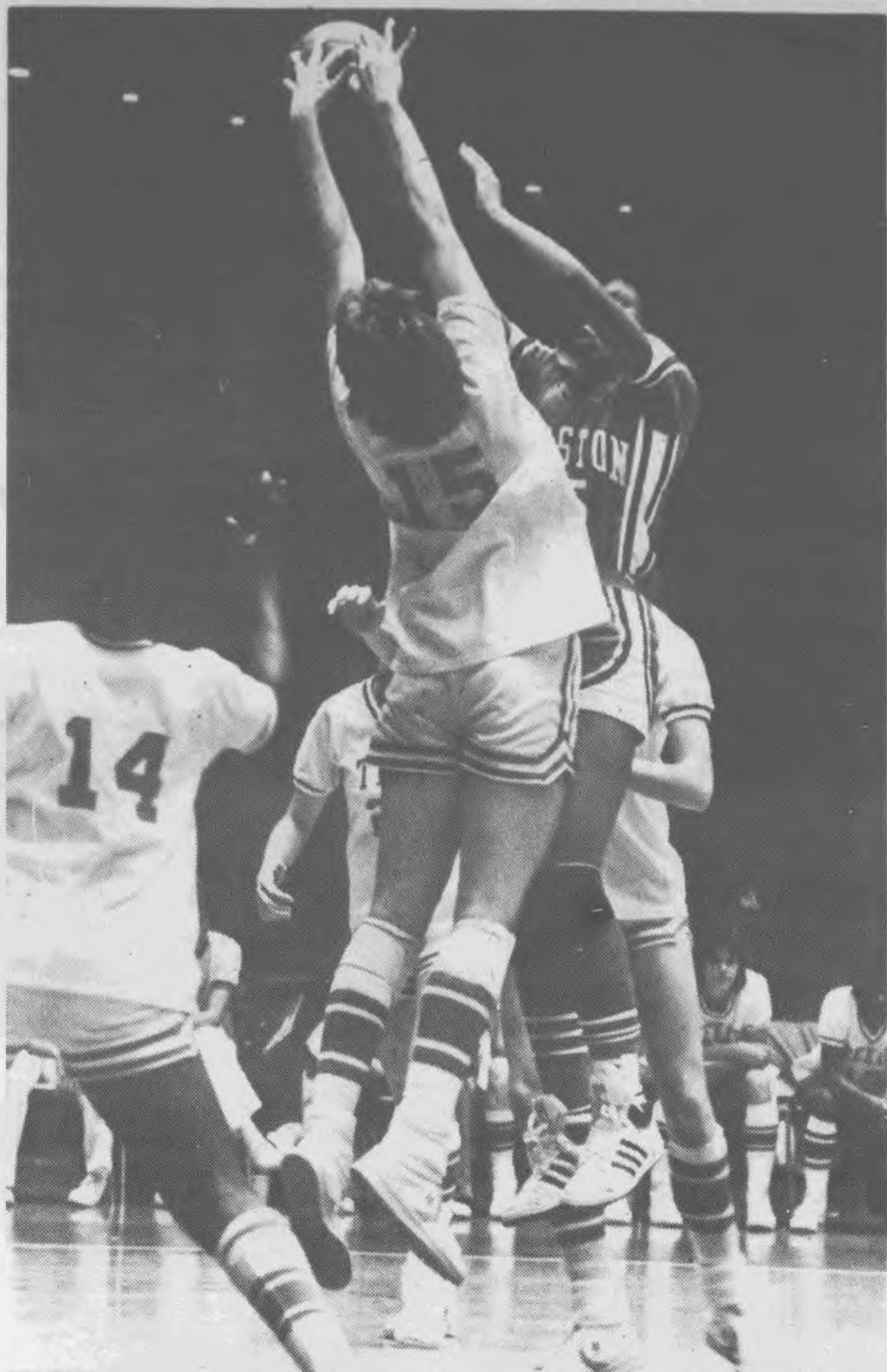

Lady Coogs prepare for tourney

UH's women's basketball team is seeded fourth for the upcoming Texas Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women Tournament scheduled for Feb. 19-21 at North Texas State in Denton, Texas.

For the first time in UH history, the 16-6 women's team will be seeded above the number five position, having already received a bye in the first round of the championships.

Stephen F. Austin is the number one seed, Texas is second, Wayland Baptist third, UH fourth, Baylor fifth, Texas Tech sixth, SMU seventh, and Texas Womens University will be eighth. Despite Houston's high ranking

they are still in the familiar underdog position for this series.

"We have always been the underdog," UH coach Dot Woodfin said. "The team as a whole gets really geared up when they know someone has been placed in front of them."

As evidenced by the Coogs' performance in the first SWC tournament, the third seeded Cougars upset Baylor and came close to knocking off Texas in the championship game. Houston will play the Waco women again as a result of the Bear's first round win over the University of Texas at Arlington. Baylor is bent on revenge and Woodfin feels concerned about their upcoming

game with the Bears.

"I'm sure Baylor will be riled with where they are (in the seeding) and they are going to be out to prove they're better," Woodfin said. There are other concerns on the mind of Houston's coach besides the teams forthcoming opponent.

"My biggest concern right now is the mental attitude of the team," Woodfin explained. "We have the talent and ability to win

third in this tournament, but I'm concerned about the mental part. You try to tell them where we are and what we have to do and if they listen, fine. It's up to them."

Knauss named as law school dean

The Dean Search Committee of the Bates College of Law announced the appointment Monday of Robert L. Knauss as the new dean of the law school. Knauss accepted the appointment and was approved by the UH System Board of Regents Academic Affairs Committee.

Knauss, reached by phone late Tuesday, said UH presents "a unique opportunity in legal education. UH has the opportunity to become one of the

best law schools in the country. There is a commitment to the school and a core of faculty members that want to make it a noteworthy institution."

According to Professor John Nixon, chairman of the Dean Search Committee, "We wanted someone with substantial experience as dean of a major law school." Nixon described Knauss as "a fine scholar" and said he will be "able to carry the law school into a higher plateau of achievement."

Knauss is currently professor at

the Vermont Law School and visiting professor in Business Administration at Dartmouth University. He received his A.B. from Harvard and his law degree from the University of Michigan. He has served as a law professor and vice president at Michigan. He was dean of the Vanderbilt Law School from 1972-79. Among his accomplishments, Knauss has co-authored three casebooks in the field of business and he is a former legal consultant to the Securities and Exchange Commission.

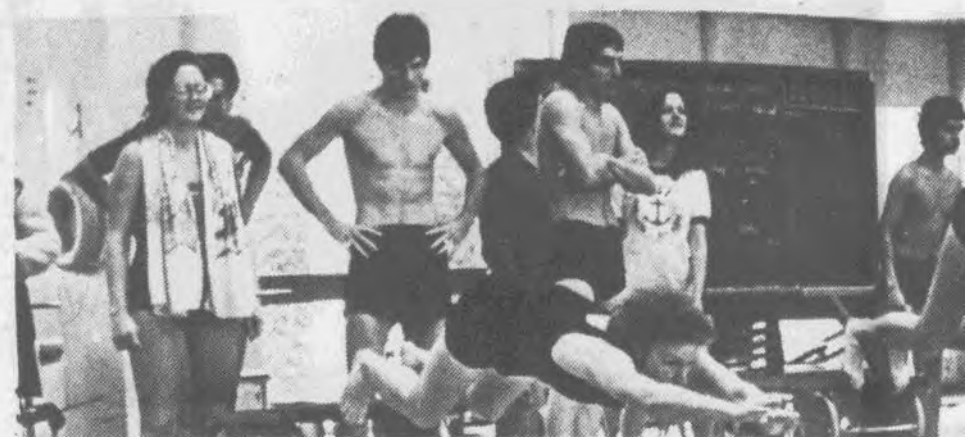

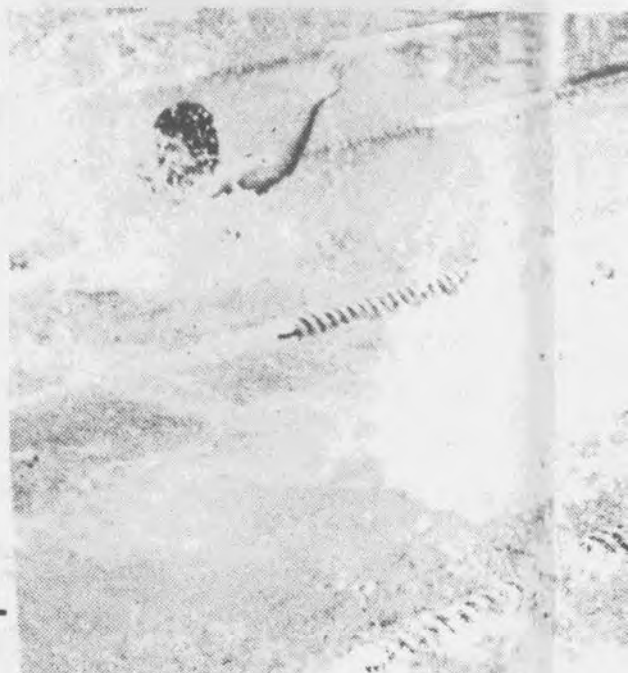


Delta Gamma sorority held its 5th annual Anchor Splash swim meet last Friday in Melcher Gym. The splash is a competition among UH
