


REFINERS ROBINSON AND ZEITZMANN AND RESEARCHER BALDWIN HEADED FOR NEW ASSIGNMENTS


Doug will be leaving Houston next Friday.



NEW SERIES OF INDUSTRY ADS "DISCOVER AMERICA BY CAR" SHOULD SELL MORE SHELL

Several million Americans will get help in planning their vacations and weekend trips from a series of newspaper advertisements currently appearing across the nation.

The ads, built around the theme of "Discover America Best by Car," are being published in 265 newspapers in 168 cities, under sponsorship of the American Petroleum Institute.

Each advertisement provides detailed routes, maps, and descriptions of attractions within easy motoring distance. A total of 300 separate tours are being featured.



THE OLD "BEAN BOX" IS LIKE A PICNIC BASKET - YOU CAN PACK A PECK OF TROUBLE INSIDE



Bugs in your lunch box - tiny ones you can't see - can make you violently ill or even kill you. It all comes from the same thing you think about when packing the picnic basket, but probably ignore when you bring your lunch to work. The current issue of Family Safety Magazine says that food poisoning occurs after eating food that:

1. Contains disease-producing bacteria (such as salmonella or dysentery organisms).
2. Contains poison produced by bacteria (such as staphylococcus toxins).

Since you can't always taste "poisoned" food, what can you do? Well, in the case of family picnics, the ice chest helps because bacteria thrive where it is warm. But you don't want to bring an ice chest

to work, and even if you did it probably would only retard the bug spread because most models can't keep "dangerous" foods cold enough. You should watch out for: proteins and carbohydrates - bacteria favorites. This means potato salad, fruit salads with whipped cream, mayonnaise, milk, puddings, custards, white sauces, hollandaise sauces, sandwich spreads, meat and fish sandwiches, cooked meat, and other combinations of these. Does that wipe everything out? No, it leaves nonperishables for those who don't want to be just "half-safe." Cheese, peanut butter, jam or jelly, canned foods including meat opened on the spot, and raw fruit and vegetables. "C" rations anyone?

GOOD ADVICE FOR POOR STARTING

If the old buggy's engine won't kick right off, don't grind on the starter. A Shell motor hint for making your car last longer says prolonged cranking can cause starter damage from overheating. It can also put a strain on the battery. So engage the starter for only a few seconds at a time, allowing a short rest interval in between. If you continue to have trouble, don't blame it on the starter - get a tune-up.





Here are some of the most frequent: No boat registration; no boat numbers displayed; no life preservers; pulling skiers without a rear view mirror; improperly displayed numbers; improper lighting after dark; reckless and dangerous boat handling; no fire extinguisher on boats with enclosed fire hazards; faulty life preservers; life preservers present, but inaccessible to occupants. A word to the wise: Refiners who enjoy water sports can appreciate the fact that most of these violations concerned the safety of the boaters, so be sure your boat complies with the Texas Water Safety Act. Copies of the code can be obtained from the Texas Park and Wildlife Department, Reagan Bldg., Austin, Texas.
