


"I believe that alumni and students who enter public service are adding another chapter to the growth and progress of our university," Elliott said.

The annual Ex-Students football season ticket campaign will begin somewhere in July, Jim Sibley and Bill Swanson, co-chairmen of the drive said.



University law student Eugene Pitman made within two points of the highest score. Pitman has the highest grade average here at the University law school.


