



Trichel Enjoys Driving Vintage Roadster To Work

The dash of the Model A differs considerably from the 1978 ones. While the new models display numerous gadgets and accessories, the Model A has only the essentials: a speedometer, a gas gauge and an amp meter. It also has a thermometer on its radiator cap to let you know when the engine is running hot.

One of the Model A's more distinctive features is a rumble seat for two. Anyone remember those? Better yet, anyone ever ride in one. For those of you too young to know what a rumble seat is, try to visualize a car trunk lid which


