These amendments will not go into force until the elections in 1952. President Valenti urged the adop-

tion of the amendments to "produce an incentive to participate in ex-student affairs." Valenti pointed out these amendments stemmed from a throughly democratic principle which states that only those who support an organization should direct its pol-

"This amendment would not put a damper on any other activities," said Valenti. "The only thing it concerns itself with is voting; everything else will remain the same. Every ex-student, whether he contributes or not, will continue to receive the EXTRA and all other information about the Ass'n. What this favorably-voted amendment says is this: If you are interested in your Association, you'll help it grow."

In his sophomore year, Hendrix was second team selection on the All-Lone Star conference team. The following year, UH moved to the Gulf Coast conference and Hendrix was named on the first team All-Conference selection.
