### Morton Defeats Nation's 5th Ranking Net Star; UH Beat Rice Netmen 6-0

Jason Morton, No. 1 Cougar tennis star, defeated Miami university's Sidney Schwartz, fifth ranking intercollegiate player of the nation, Wednesday afternoon on the campus courts.

The next day the Cougars shut out the Rice Owls 6 to 0. The victory over the Owls closed out the Cougar's home stand with only one defeat - that at the hands of the Miami University stars. In defeating

the Owls, Morton downed one of the top performers in the Southwest Conference, Jack Turpin 6-1 and 7-5.

The University team went down to its first defeat of the season, 4-2, but their showing against the great Miami squad was one that will not soon be forgotten by Cougar net fans.

## PORT CITY STOCK YARDS

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University of Houston students can now boast that they occupy one of the most modern functional libraries in the entire United States.

The new M. D. Anderson Memorial Library, a gift of the M. D. Anderson Memorial Foundation, was formally dedicated April 1. Dr. Karl W. Bigelow of Columbia University was the main speaker at the dedication ceremonies.

"Education should not be limited to the select few, but it should be made available to as many as possible," Dr. Bigelow said. It is the responsibility of the librarian to develop the habit of wise and continued use of the books, so every student will be prepared for self-education after he graduates from college, he explained. "The Anderson Memorial Library is a splendid example of that trend," Dr. Bigelow continued.

The building will house approximately 150,000 volumes. Facilities for individual study booths, microfilm projectors, seminar rooms and sound recording equipment are available in

the \$15,000,000 building that was designed by John F. Staub and John T. Rather, Houston architects.

Work on the structure began in the fall of 1949. Contemporary Texas limestone lines are relieved by vertical panels and spandrels of maroon Tennessee marble. The main entrance is surrounded by large windows.

Inside walls are paneled in walnut, oak and leather. Fluorescent tubes running the breadth of the ceilings furnish lights.

A small auditorium for lectures and visual education, the administra-

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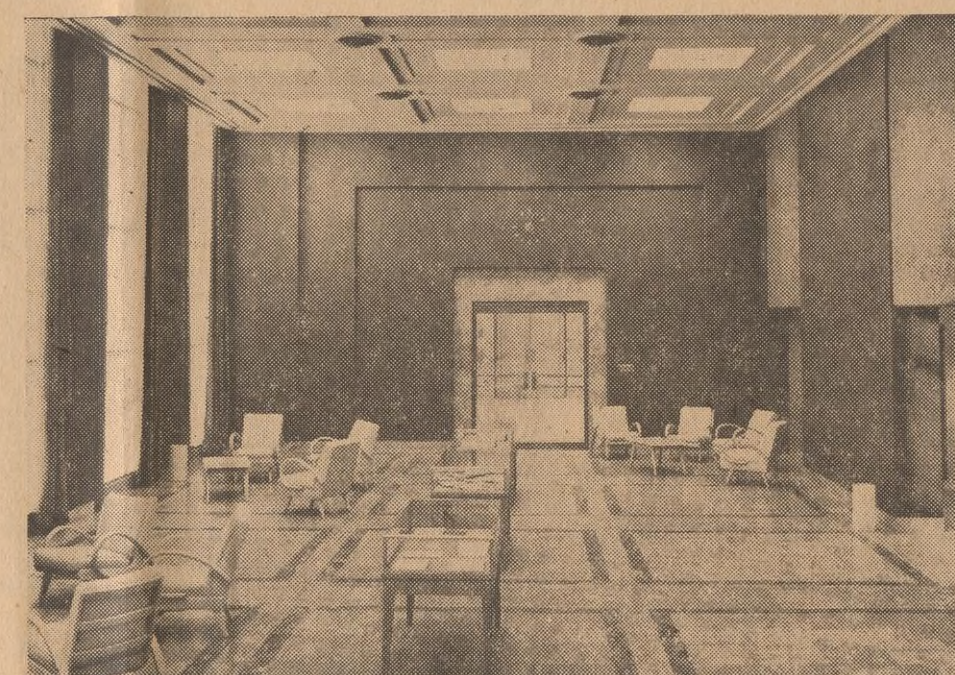
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## Nichols Made Managing Editor Of The Citizen Newspapers

Ex-Student Richard H. Nichols, a young man who has spent most of his newspaper career in the community newspaper field, this week was named managing editor of The Citizen Newspaper.

His appointment was announced by Howard W. Greenwood, general manager of The Citizen.

Mr. Nichols succeeds John H. Murphy, formerly managing editor, who recently became vice president of News, Inc., publishers of The Citizen, and general manager of the

commercial printing plant operated by News, Inc.

The new managing editor did his first newspaper work for The Fort Worth Star Telegram in 1941, and except for finishing college and an interruption for service in World War II, he has been associated with newspapers since that time.

He joined The Citizen in September, 1947, and soon became news editor of The Hyde Park Citizen. During almost four years service with The Citizen, he was in turn working in one capacity or another on each of the community newspapers published by The Citizen. He was, until his promotion, editor of The East End Citizen.

In World War II, Mr. Nichols served in the Army Infantry and Parachute Infantry. He earned three battle stars and a combat infantryman's badge in the European Theater.

He returned to civilian life and to college in 1946. At the University of Houston, he became editor of the school newspaper, The Cougar, and also served as correspondent to The Chronicle before completing his journalism courses and joining The Citizen.

Mr. Nichols and his wife live at 3814 Sylvania.

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## Wilson's Fiesta Gazette Gains National Acclaim

The fourth annual Fiesta Gazette hit the midway on opening night of the 1951 Frontier Fiesta with headlines screaming little-known "facts" about Texas history.

Brainchild of Ex-Student Jack Wilson, the Gazette carries on the tradition of printing "all the news that's fit to print." Each year Fiesta patrons pay the price of finding out what history would have been if our grandfathers had had a sense of humor instead of a civil war.

The Gazette's first appearance in 1948 was an attempt to present the Fiesta program in a lively humorous

manner. The Press association had lost money the year before selling printed programs and was seeking a more successful way of making money. The Fiesta Gazette filled the bill. It sold 3,000 copies the first year, and 5,000 the next. In 1950 when it was an established part of the Fiesta, it sold 9,000 copies. Wilson, now business manager of THE COUGAR, said that 15,000 copies were sold this year.

The Gazette's fame has spread far beyond the University campus. Each year requests are received from many parts of the United States for copies and information on how it is produced. Last year's issue, "South Wins Civil War," came to the attention of officials of the University of Michigan. They requested a number of copies and information concerning its writing and printing with the intention of incorporating something of the sort in "Show Week," annual affair on their campus.

This year's issue, "Union Joins Texas," told the story of the benevolent Sam Houston allowing the United States to join the Texas republic. Reconstruction of the North was begun by making New York into an Indian reservation.

Other stories told of routine happenings in Fiesta City. "Twenty-eight Killed During Dull Boxing Match; Promoter Lynched" tells a story that our great grandparents are reputed to have been familiar with. "Contestants Scare Bandits To Death At Beauty Contest" is an early testimonial for the traditional beauty of Texas girls.

## Max Clark Signs Pro Contract

Max "Cracker" Clark, sparkplug of the Cougar football team last year, has signed a contract with the Cleveland Browns professional football team it was announced recently.

Clark will leave for the Brown's summer training camp in Bowling Green, Ohio in July.

The 174 pound scatback, who was seventh in the nation in scoring with 90 points last fall, lettered three years at the University.

He gained 936 yards on 134 carries last season and kicked 24 extra points for the Red and White.

The "Cracker" received his Bachelor's degree in February and is now studying for his Master's.

Clark had what was considered the best game of his career against William and Mary last fall when he scored three touchdowns and kicked three extra points to lead the Cougars in their first win against "big time" competition. He carried the ball 19 times for 198 yards in that game for an amazing 10.5 yards per carry.

He climaxed his college career in the Senior Bowl at Montgomery.

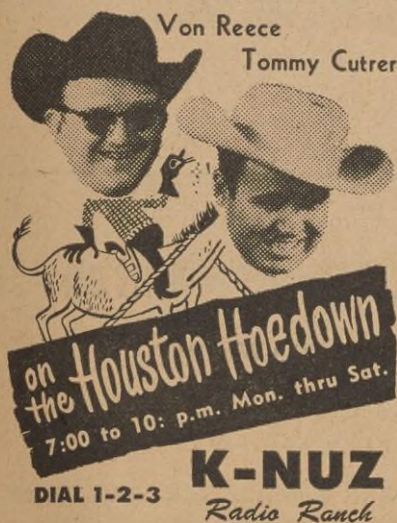

The second Cougar victory came when Morton teamed with Earl Caldwell to drop Schwartz and Jerry Slobin, 10-8, 6-3, in a doubles match.

It was a bad day for Schwartz who was undefeated this season before running into the alert Mr. Morton. The defeat was the third in the tanned Miamians college career.

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**Lloyd Hendrix Joins Phillips 66 Cagers**

Lloyd Hendrix, 6-foot 1-inch forward at the University of Houston, has joined the Phillip's 66'ers of the National Industrial Basketball League.

A four-year letterman with the Cougars, Hendrix was the highest scoring player in the Missouri Valley conference in the 1950-'51 season despite Houston's last place finish.

In 14 MVC games, he scored 213 points, hitting 42 percent of his shots for an average of 15.2 points per game.

In Houston's 28-game season, Hendrix scored 375 points for a 13.4 average.

The 24-year-old product of Honey Island, Texas will report to his job

in Oklahoma in September. He will work in the Supply and Transportation department at Phillip's, but is now connected with the Houston office while finishing work on his master's degree in Physical Education.

During the regular season of his senior year, Hendrix had his best night against Trinity university, in San Antonio, scoring 24 points. His best conference performance was against Detroit, when he hit for 21.

In the post-season AAU tournament at Denver, Hendrix played with the Ada Oilers of Houston, and scored 25 points against Jansco, of Sioux City, Iowa.

Winning the MVC scoring title meant out-doing such formidable opponents as All-America Gene Melchiorre and tall Elmer Behnke, both of Bradley. Melchiorre and Bernke tied of the runner-up position with 196 points.

Although Hendrix had many better nights from a scoring standpoint fans in and around Houston will remember him best for his performance against Oklahoma A&M, the nation's No. 2 team.

Weighing only 170 pounds, he consistently crashed through the tight Aggie defense for close lay-up shots, and scored 15 points. He was fouled eight times in the process.

In his sophomore year, Hendrix was second team selection on the All-Lone Star conference team. The following year, UH moved to the Gulf Coast conference and Hendrix was named on the first team All-Conference selection.

This year, the Cougars played in the Missouri Valley conference, considered the top basketball circuit in the nation, and Hendrix won the scoring honors and made second team, All-MVC.

**Dave F. Thompson  
Named Justice**

Ex-student Dave F. Thompson was appointed unanimously to the position of justice of the peace on precinct 2 by the Commissioners Court Thursday. He will succeed Neal Shurtleff who resigned Wednesday "under pressure."

Dave is a veteran of World War II and is a practicing attorney in Houston. He received his law degree from the University in 1950.

A married man with one child, Dave said that he had not asked for the job and did not know that he was being considered for the post. "I was amazed and overwhelmed and the job came as a complete surprise to me."

He further stated that he "will try to the best of my ability to see that justice and fairness avails to all."

In addition to Justice Thompson, seven were considered for the position.

be eligible to run for officer and director posts.

3. Only contributing members will be eligible to vote.

These amendments will not go into force until the elections in 1952.

President Valenti urged the adoption of the amendments to "produce an incentive to participate in ex-student affairs." Valenti pointed out these amendments stemmed from a thoroughly democratic principle which states that only those who support an organization should direct its policies:

"This amendment would not put a damper on any other activities," said Valenti. "The only thing it concerns itself with is voting; everything else will remain the same. Every ex-student, whether he contributes or not, will continue to receive the EXTRA and all other information about the Ass'n. What this favorably-voted amendment says is this: If you are interested in your Association, you'll help it grow."

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
