

RETIREE G. L. (LONNIE) STEWART DIES

It is with regret we report the death Tuesday, December 10, of G. L. (Lonnie) Stewart, retired Refinery employee. Mr. Stewart, 66, died in a Houston hospital following an extended illness.

Funeral services for the long time Deer Park resident were held yesterday afternoon at the Deer Park Methodist Church where he was a charter member.

Born in Dennison, Texas, Mr. Stewart attended schools there and at T.C.U. before coming to Houston to join Shell in June, 1929. With Shell over 32 years before his retirement in August, 1961, most of his career was served in the Treating Department.

Mr. Stewart is survived by his wife, Mrs. "Dolly" Stewart, three daughters and two sons. To this family, an expression of sympathy is extended by their many Shell friends.



WHAT CAUSES MOST OF OUR ACCIDENTS?....FALLS AND FALLING OBJECTS

From time to time our Fire and Safety people review the "records" to determine just what causes most of the disabling injuries we experience. The other day Louie Grossheim thumbed through the records and found that during the past two years....FALLS AND FALLING OBJECTS WERE INVOLVED IN OVER ONE-HALF OUR DISABLING INJURIES.

This information tells us - once again - that it requires concentration on our parts to make safety a part of our jobs....TO THINK safety as we go about our duties. For instance...is our footing sure when we are climbing or walking in an area; are housekeeping conditions such that we won't stumble over something - or have something fall on us! Are ladders and platforms properly fixed. Do we plan for the movement of objects that may be too heavy just to "pick up"....so they won't fall from our hands. The best method for moving such material is to use available hoisting equipment - and then stay clear of the load.
