IN THE BAG

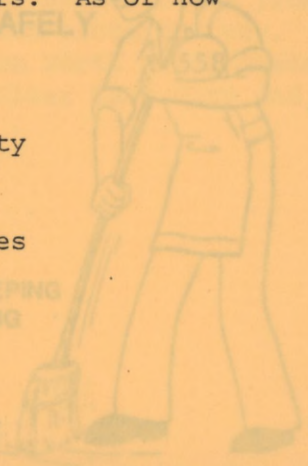
