

Dedication of the 1945 Houstonian

It is with the sincerest feeling of gratitude and respect that the staff of the 1945 Houstonian dedicates the 1945 yearbook of the University to the first president of the Board of Regents and his wife — Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Cullen:

Gratitude on behalf of the University for their fine and generous benefactions to the University of Houston and, through the University, to the cause of education. One memorial to their generosity, as well as to their late son, Roy Gustav Cullen, has already been a matter of comfort and convenience to thousands of former and present students who have studied in its modern classrooms. This is the Roy Gustav Cullen Memorial Building. Another is the recent oil grant which will permit, among other things, the erection of a great modern educational structure to complete the main University of Houston quadrangle . . .

Gratitude, too, in common with thousands of other Houstonians, for the uncounted instances of kindly and humanitarian giving to causes of good and mercy, as typified by the four gifts of this past year to hospital developments so badly needed by Houston . . .

But an even deeper gratitude for the abiding interest of these two Houstonians in the cause of education which leads them to give so much of their time and good services to the over-all planning of the University of Houston's development. This has been well exemplified by the fact that Mr. Cullen has agreed as a public-spirited citizen to serve in the important position of chair-

man of the newly organized Board of Regents, the first separate governing body for the young University of Houston.

Respect for Mr. and Mrs. Cullen for their role as leading developers and shapers of the industrial and cultural progress of their community and of this entire section.

Mr. Cullen is president of Quintana Petroleum Corporation and Mrs. Cullen is vice-president. Both are deeply interested in and active in numerous cultural projects. Together they have developed a flower garden which is one of the important spots in Houston's famous Azalea Trail. Mr. Cullen is president of the Houston Symphony Society, and he and Mrs. Cullen have done perhaps more than any other Houston couple to promote the cause of good music for this part of the country. Mr. Cullen was one of the founders of the Houston Museum of fine arts. He is listed in "Who's Who in the Oil Industry of America."

This latter publication has a sentence about Mr. Cullen's personal characteristics which will serve well to conclude this dedication. It declares that he is noted for "kindness, generosity, friendliness, and untiring energy, humanitarianism being his motivating force."

It is well known to friends of these leading citizens of Texas that Mrs. Cullen's quiet and wise counsel always precedes any important decision on a philanthropy or a contemplated public service, and that the announcement always comes as a joint decision.

First Board of Regents of the University of Houston



Following passage of an enabling act by the Texas Legislature in March, the Board of Education of the Houston Independent School District, for 18 years the supervising body for the University of Houston, named the above group the first Board of Regents of the University of Houston. The University of Houston School of Nursing

The nursing education program began as course affiliations between the Hospital Schools of Nursing and the University of Houston. The program is based upon criteria set up by the curriculum committee of the National League of Nursing Education. Each hospital operates as a separate entity, admitting and registering its own students; in addition, the students are enrolled as freshmen in the University, and receive credit for courses on both the University and the Hospital campus.

The Nursing Education Program was elevated to the status of a School in June, 1944, when the title "School of Nursing" was adopted. All nurses become candidates for the Associate in Arts Degree.

The director of the School of Nursing is Miss Vivian M. Stuart who came to the University in 1943.




No. 9 - Miss Marijo Brigham: I like her sparkling vivacity and friendly personality, which overcome a slight irregularity of features.

Although the Navy has left the campus the club will continue to function as a service to near-by camps and service clubs.



When the University of Houston began its new term in September 1944, veterans of World War II were coming into its student body to pick up their education where they left off before going into the fighting forces of their country.

When the first meeting was called for a conference with the officials of the Veterans Administration who were here to arrange with the University for the training of returned veterans, twenty-nine students were on hand. Near the end of September Dr. W. W. Kemmerer designated R. O. Jonas as chief counselor for veterans, with instructions "to do whatever is necessary to develop a successful program of education for veterans." As the program expanded, M. L. Ray was designated veterans counselor for vocational and technical students and O. W. Rote was named as additional counselor. Faculty members from each department were called upon for conferences in their fields.

To serve veterans who had not completed high school, or who had been out of school some time, or who wished better backgrounds for engineering or technical programs, or who wanted related work to go with vocational training, a group of "150" courses proved to be an innovation of real usefulness. Also, the policy was started of admitting veterans at any time during the year. Guidance facilities of the University were put at the disposal of veterans, as well as facilities for helping them file necessary papers. Finally, near the end of the year it was announced by Dr. E. E. Oberholtzer that the University of Houston had been selected as the site for an area advisement center of the Veterans Administration.

In October 1944 the machinery was set in motion to organize a Veterans Club, to be a student society independent of any national or state affiliation. Its purpose was to bring veterans together for fellowship and also to work toward better school spirit and school activities for the University as a whole.

A big reception and dance in November and a campaign for a campus memorial in honor of former members of the student body who have given their lives were the two highlights in the year's accomplishments. Participation in assembly programs, radio, and University activities drew the interest of other service men and women.


